The second contest game was 4A Dumas vs. 3A Perryton. You all picked Dumas. Perryton upset the Demons.


Notre Dame lost big to Michigan State. BYU beat Arizona State. No one picked the Cincinnati Bengals to beat the Detroit Lions.

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

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

RUSHING MARK FALLS **Chieftains Stampede** Past Brownfield, 49-3

by BILL ELLIS It didn't take the Chieftains long to assert themselves in their home opener against Brownfield last Friday, a game they would win 49-3 with a record-setting offense.

Matthew Kendrick dashed 80 yards on Friona's first play from scrimmage to give the Chiefs a 6-0 lead with just 20 seconds gone.

Kendrick, who also had returned the opening kickoff out to the 20, reminded Friona fans of his 95-yard kickoff return against Littlefield in the 1998 home opener, which keyed the Chieftain offense in that big win as well.

The 185-pound senior found himself in the secondary at about his 40-yard line, then won the footrace for the rest of the way, up the left sideline. Trent Cook's PAT kick was just low, but Friona had an early lead.

Three plays by the Cubs failed to convert, and the visitors were forced to punt.

Noel Grajeda got the first handoff from the Friona 15, and almost duplicated Kendrick's TD feat. As it was, it took Brownfield's last defender to save the day, but Grajeda had sprinted 54 yards to the Cubs' 31.

After Kendrick posted 16 yards in two tries, Grajeda got the call four straight times, and ran the ball in for a touchdown on the final try. Going for a two-point

Two plays later, a Daniel- minus 24 yards for the Kendrick pitchout went visitors. astray and Brownfield recoverred the muffed ball at the Friona 22. Three plays gained only three yards, and the Cubs' kicker, Joe Gauger came in to kick an impressive 36-yard field goal to get the visitors on the scoreboard as the opening quarter was ending.

The Chieftains seemed to have a drive going as Kendrick, Grajeda and Daniel had good gains. Daniel also hit Grajeda on an eight-yard pass play. But once again Daniel's pitchout to Kendrick was bobbled, and the Cubs dodged the bullet, taking over on their own 30.

Again benefitting from a penalty, Brownfield drove to the Friona 34, before the Chieftain defense dug in and took over the ball.

Kendrick and Grajeda took turns running the ball, and Grajeda raced 34 yards to the Brownfield one. He was given the handoff once again and got the ball into the end zone for his second TD. Cook kicked the PAT, and Friona's lead became 21-3.

Jesse Allen's saving tackle on the ensuing kickoff helped preserve the 21-3 halftime lead.

Friona, which had held the visitors to just 54 yards in the first half, turned its defense up a notch in the with just 39 seconds second half.

The Kendrick-Grajeda

When Grajeda ran for the TD and Cook made it three for three, Friona's lead became 35-3. Jose Baeza blocked a Brownfield punt, and that prompted Coach Mike Scott to put the Chieftains' second unit on the field.

With Nathan King running the offense, the Chieftains' second group didn't miss a beat. Hugo Rivera carried the ball six out of eight times, and seemed to get better with each run.

The 190-pound senior had runs of 14, 12, 10, 10, 5 and 24, the final one being a touchdown. Cook's fourth straight kick made it a 42-3 game with 7:34 remaining.

The backup offensive group again took over at their own 13 yard line, and King engineered yet another scoring drive. Junior runningback Sergio Campos showed promise in the backfield with gains of 20 and 32 yards, as the young Chieftains marched goalward.

The team overcame a holding penalty and a pair of five-yarders on the drive. Rivera got the call from 18 yards out, and posted his second TD of the game. Cook made it five straight PATs, and the scoreboard read 49-3 remaining.



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



An infant child and a daughter, Julia Warren, preceded her in death.







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The law requires all employers in the United States to report information regarding newly hired and rehired employees to a centralized state database.

One of the primary goals is to identify individuals who owe child support payments and to detect and prevent fraud in unemployment workers' insurance, compensation, Medicaid, and food stamp programs.

Most producers have probably already received a packet containing the new reporting form and information about the new requirements.

> The Texas High Plains estimate dropped from 2.2 million bales in August to 2.07 million bales in the latest report. The drop further reflects the poor crop prospects following serious drought conditions across the Texas High Plains.
