

ELLINGTON PLANES STOP IN PECOS

The planes scheduled to visit Pecos some time ago came into view Sunday noon and after circling the town alighted in the landing field west of town.

Three airplanes formed the squadron which was in command of Lt. C. C. Nutt. They were from Ellington Field, near San Antonio, and are visiting the principal cities of Texas, in the interest of recruiting men for this branch of the service.

The planes were of the bomber type—huge affairs—and were not adapted to fancy flying. It was the intention, however, to give demonstration flights, but the high winds and rain prevented.

Early next morning, after refueling and making minor repairs the airplanes continued their trip west.

ARMY TRUCKS FOR COUNTY ROADS

County Judge James F. Ross informed the Enterprise that this county has secured five army trucks from the government which will be used in work on the county roads. The trucks proffered were from two to five tons capacity and the selection of the commissioners was the two-ton class.

Four of the trucks will be used in Reeves and one in Loving county.

These trucks are valued at from \$2500 to \$3000 each, but with the exception of \$2 per truck per month are furnished the county free of cost.

The acquisition of the trucks will facilitate much of the necessary work in the county, and will go a long way toward the upkeep of our roads.

Already possessed of the greatest single stock of gold in history, the United States could lay claim today to most of the remaining free gold of the world in payment of its favorable merchandise balance, the Federal Reserve Bulletin will say in its July issue. The balance approximated \$9,000,000,000 in the last three years, and bids fair to continue at the same rate this year, affording a problem to arrange payments without bankrupting debtor nations and still further enhancing the cost of living here through the importation of more metal.

Under the gold embargo, which recently was lifted, making the United States practically the only free gold market in the world, the Federal Reserve Board issued 1142 licenses for the export of \$152,326,976 of gold and 1500 licenses for the shipment of \$502,756,003 in silver. About 755 applications of all classes were declined. The net movement under the embargo was \$5,293,532 excess of gold imports and \$281,732,589 excess of silver exports, heavy shipments of the latter metal having been made to British India, Hong Kong and France.

CLAY COOKE RETURNS TO FORT WORTH OFFICE

Attorney Clay Cooke returned to Fort Worth Tuesday afternoon after two weeks spent in Pecos on business.

Cooke, until recently, resided here and enjoyed an enviable practice throughout this section. He is president of the Golden Rod Oil Company of Wichita Falls, and one of the wells is now rated at 1600 barrels, though not completed. Many Pecos people have stock in the company.

LOCATING OIL IN TOYAH COUNTRY

Excitement was rampant in the little town of Toyah Monday morning when it was announced the several locations for oil wells were to be selected.

The selection of these sites caused more than the usual flurry among the people because of the method employed by Mr. Smith, the locator.

Aside from being a geologist, Mr. Smith has invented an instrument that not only locates the oil underground, but indicates the exact depth at which the oil lies and the amount in barrels which the well will produce.

These things are a little out of the ordinary, and no doubt this gentleman's claims will be discounted by an overwhelming majority, but those who have seen the instrument at work, and had it act for them exactly as it did for Mr. Smith, are about won over to the opinion that there is something to it after all, and the faith of the inventor, and the guarantees made by him, strengthen the opinion.

E. B. Daniel, who was in Pecos on Tuesday, informed the Enterprise that he is a firm believer in the claims of Mr. Smith for this instrument, from what he has seen and experienced. Daniel's description of the instrument and its workings is as follows:

In appearance it looks like one of the metal boxes used for shaving-sticks, a little larger, possibly, but easily carried in the pocket. In making a test this cylinder, which is sealed on both ends, is made fast to the end of a piece of ordinary telephone wire. Grasping the other end, and holding it in front of him, the start is made. There is no response from the instrument if there is no oil, but as soon as the oil vein is reached the rod begins to show signs of life, swinging up and down with no effort from the holder. After the up-and-down motion, it stops a moment and begins to swing from side to side—so many times—then stops and begins the up-and-down motion. This will continue as long as the holder remains over the spot.

Mr. Daniel stated that on walking away from the spot over which the instrument worked it would pull back in that direction and bend the wire. Several other Toyah people have held the instrument and had it work perfectly for them and Bill Collins, who was one of them, said that anyone saying the "finder" won't work doesn't know what they are talking about.

The queerest part of all is the significance of the instrument's motions. The up-and-down movements, according to the inventor, is the depth of the oil from the surface. Each foot is indicated by seven dips of the rod, while each barrel flow of oil is indicated by the side movements of the rod. For instance, if the rod dips 700 times and moves sideways 1000 times it means oil is 100 feet below the surface and the flow is 100 barrels. These calculations are Mr. Smith's and on several occasions he has backed them to the limit.

A well being drilled by W. M. Hopper near San Martine was located by Smith, who placed the depth at 315 feet for a 100-barrel well. It is more than likely that wells will be drilled close to Toyah on the strength of this instrument.

The composition of the "finder" is, of course, a secret, and the result of ten years' of continuous experiment, according to Mr. Smith.

FEED OAT STRAW TO HORSES.

Gives Nearly as Good Results in Feeding Animals at Light Work as Timothy Hay.

Oat straw gave nearly as good results in feeding horses at light work as timothy hay, according to an experiment at the Missouri experiment station. In each case 1,400-pound horses were fed 15 pounds corn and cob meal and one and two-thirds pounds oil meal daily. At the North Dakota experiment station it was found that horses when fed oats or bran and shorts needed about a fourth more grain feed when fed oat straw than when given upland prairie hay.

Section 1. That Section 9 of Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended that the same will hereafter read as follows:

Sec. 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed thirty-five cents on the one hundred dollars' valuation...

No debt shall be created by or on behalf of the State, except to supply casual deficiencies of revenue, repel invasion, suppress insurrection, defend the State in war, or pay existing debt; and the debt created to supply deficiencies in the revenue shall never exceed in the aggregate at any one time, two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000); provided, however, that the Legislature may enact such legislation as may be necessary to authorize and direct the Governor to issue bonds of the State in a sum not to exceed Seventy-five million (\$75,000,000) dollars...

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the first Tuesday in

November, the same being the fourth day of November, A. D. 1919, and the Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election...

Section 3. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the State Treasury...

Section 4. The fact that the Legislature is restricted by the provisions of Section 49, Article 3 of the State Constitution from enacting needed Highway Legislation creates an emergency and an imperative public necessity exists...
