OFFICIALS TO BE SHOT ON SIGHT

ST. PATRICK'S DAY EVE FINDS CHAOTIC SITUATION IN IRELAND

ORDER THEATERS TO OPEN

Dublin Ablaze With Lights Despite Irregulars' Threats and Prohibition of Prize Fight

Dublin.—On the eve of St. Patrick's Day, attention is directed to the status of the conflict between the Irish Free State and the irreconcilable Republican element.

Up to date all rumors of peace have proved unfounded. The fight remains apparently as lively as ever and the opponents of the Government continue to assert that they are winning, but the recent captures of important Republican military chiefs in Ireland, followed by the wholesale cornering of their friends in Great Britain, have evidently weakened the Republican resistance.

As the Republican ranks thin out the fight is becoming less of a military adventure and more in the nature of a general attack on all property.

Hence, houses are burned which belong to men unconnected with politics and of no importance to the Free State ranks.

Numerous peace moves are constantly being organized, but the Government turns them all down and insists that its own terms—the unconditional surrender of all arms—are the most to which it will ever agree.

A document found in a raid in this city reveals startling plans for the destruction of residences and a campaign of shooting on sight.

"To meet the desperate and barbarous methods being adopted by the enemy to destroy the Governments," the document says, "the Republican Army's general headquarters has decided to amend and in some cases make more drastic the action ordered in recent general orders to commandants.

"Some of these orders have been canceled and the action directed in them embodied in a new order which will come into operation if any further executions by the enemy are carried out in this area after this date."

Among those mentioned as liable to be shot on sight are members of the Free State Parliament, army officers of all ranks, Judges, legal advisers and "the proprietors and directors of the hostile press in Ireland and the senior officials employed by the same, such as editors, subeditors and leader writers in cases where it is known that those officials are hostile."

STATE OF WARFARE EXISTING IN THE RUHR

Despite Efforts at Settlement, No End of Imbroglia In Sight

London.—Casualties increase, disorders spread and become more serious and business is completely paralyzed as the coal war of the Ruhr enters into the third month.

Even the most optimistic observers can gather nothing but gloom from the dispatches reaching here from the continent.

Despite the fact that the French Government has stated that it is willing to consider any peace offer made by the Germans and despite the reports of mediation by Italy and Britain which are making the rounds of Europe's chancelleries, diplomats see no early let-up in the serious situation involving the Germans and French in the Ruhr.

Untoward events in the industrial area have opened the mouths of many publicists who hitherto have been silent concerning the Franco-German embroglio. Many sections of the press are hammering away daily attempting to force Premier Bonar Law to intervene, or at least to state his objections in a formal note of protest to France.

Many declare that a virtual state of war exists between the French and Germans.

Word comes from Essen that two German officials, Doctors Wirtz and Kaditz, have been taken by the French as hostages and are forced to ride in locomotives running between Essen and Steele as a guarantee against acts of sabotage.

POLISH-RUSSIAN FRONTIER FIXED

Problem Has Been One of Most Irritating Left by the World War.

Paris—The Allied Council of Ambassadors has finally settled one of the most irritating problems left over from the peace conference by fixing the frontiers between Russia and Poland. The Council's action was on the surface a mere perfunctory sanctioning of the terms of the Riga Treaty between Russia and Poland and acceptance of the existing situation, but it was really the ending of an uncertain situation, which it was feared might develop serious trouble. In fact, the allies had never formally accepted the territorial divisions made under the Riga treaty, and questions had been raised as to the fate of Eastern Galicia. This matter had come up on several oc-

casions before the assembly of the League of Nations, twice on a resolution introduced by the Canadian delegation to the effect that the council of the league do its utmost to urge final settlement of the status of the province.

The Polish Government showed considerable uneasiness at these manifestations of sentiment that the boundary of Eastern Galicia had not yet been definitely fixed.

Count Skrzynski, the Polish Foreign Minister who came to Paris with instructions to declare categorically that there was no longer any Galicia boundary question, as it had been settled by the treaty of Riga, expressed great satisfaction over the treaty of Riga and expressed great satisfaction over the action of the Ambassadors.

The Ambassadors' action also provides that the Vilna district shall be attached to Poland, thus enjoining the long dispute between that country and Lithuania beginning with the raid on Vilna in 1920 by the Polish General, Zeligowski.

BRITISH LABOR MEN TO BREAK BREAD WITH KING

Four Laborites and Their Wives Are to Dine With His Majesty.

London—Britain's labor leaders are ready to make their debut into court society.

For the first time in history the King of England is to entertain in Buckingham Palace the radicals in British politics.

Although King George has long been known as a democratic ruler, he is creating a sensation unprecedented in the world's dynasties—a sovereign becoming chummy with a group of possible future national administrators, whose so-called revolutionary ideas have been bitterly assailed by the nation's press as threatening to undermine all traditions of Old England.

Four laborites and their wives are to break bread with His Majesty. They are Ramsay MacDonald, leader of the opposition in the Commons; J. R. Clynes, president of the National Union of Workers; J. H. Thomas, general secretary of the National Union of Railwaymen, and Philip Snowden, a foremost laborite leader in the Commons, whose views on world politics are not only respected in England, but have become familiar to Americans through his news writings.

It steadily becomes more apparent that some day England may have a labor Government—a day thought of which strikes dismay in the hearts of Tory England. King George and the laborites would seem to be merely undergoing the process of being introduced to each other in preparation for a time when MacDonald or some other laborite, might reside at 10 Downing street.

The four British labor leaders may appear in any sort of costume they desire, even overalls, when they dine with King George.

The presiding officer of the House of Commons has ruled that Labor members can appear at any social function in any dress they prefer and do not have to don the silk knee breeches which are always worn at court functions.

Japanese Reject China's Proposal

Washington—China's latest move to abrogate the famous "twenty-one demands" treaty of 1915 has led Japan to inform her that such a proposal is contrary to accepted international practices and will "fail to contribute to the advancement of friendship between our two countries."

To Buy Road Maintainers

Fort Worth, Texas.—Purchase of two road maintainers for Tarrant County and State highways has been authorized by the Commissioners' Court. The maintainers will be assigned to the department of Damon Davis, County Engineer.

Exhibit Train Attracts Children

Temple, Tex.—Rural school children seem to be deriving out of the Santa Fe-A. & M. demonstration train a benefit which the managers of the enterprise did not count on when they began their itinerary. Hundreds of the older pupils have attended the meetings, paying as much attention to the lectures as their elders did. They were required to write essays about what they saw and heard.

Austin, Texas.—A number of members of the Texas Legislature will be in San Antonio on their way to Los Angeles, Texas, to attend the barbecue that is to be given there.
