Cotton-Plow-Up mits Fail to Arrive

The cotton-plow-up campaign which was scheduled to begin the first of this week has been delayed, due to the fact that the permits issued by the government in Washington, have not

Permits are being issued at the Texas.

tthe work in Callahan county, representing the government, says, out of the 880 agreements sent in from this county, only one was returned for correction. This one being a case where a farmer gave his yield at one-half bale per acre, wereas his neighbors all gave the yield at one-third bale and the agreement was sent back with the request that it be changed and put on a basis with other farmers in the community, which was done.

All agreements have been acceppledged must be destroyed. Some farmers will grase their stock on the cotton to be plowed, and some plan cotton Stalk Hay for hay. Mr. Jenkins says this is permissible, but in each case the stub ble must be plowed up after the stalks have been cut or grased off, before payments will be made.

IN ANSWER TO A LADY'S LETTER

A lady writes to say that she does not understand why an 8-cylinder car does not cost more to run than a car with fewer cylinders. She refers to my statement that our Ford V-8 develops more power on a gallon of gas than any car we have made.


