



Friona ISD Joins World Wide Web

The Friona Independent School District is on the world wide web! Friona schools, with the help of West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative and WT Services, Inc., have completed a local area network to support technology for the future.

Local funds were enhanced by the receipt of \$100,000 from the Federal E-Rate Program and \$98,500 from the Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund Board.

These funds were used to create the infrastructure to provide Internet access for students and staff members on the five district campuses. The initial plans were announced while WT Services/Friona were installing fiber-optic cable to carry telephone and cable television service to Friona customers.

All of the fiber-optic cable installed between the five Friona school campuses was part of the WT Services/Friona project and at no cost to the school district.

WT Services, Inc., a subsidiary of WTRT, submitted the winning bid in competition for the contract to install the computer network infrastructure.

Because the E-Rate and TIF funds can only be used to

pay for the infrastructure in instructional settings, WTRT and WT Services paid for the wiring of all of the administrative offices.

Had the district been required to purchase the fiber and hire a contractor to install it, a large portion of the local funds would have been expended.

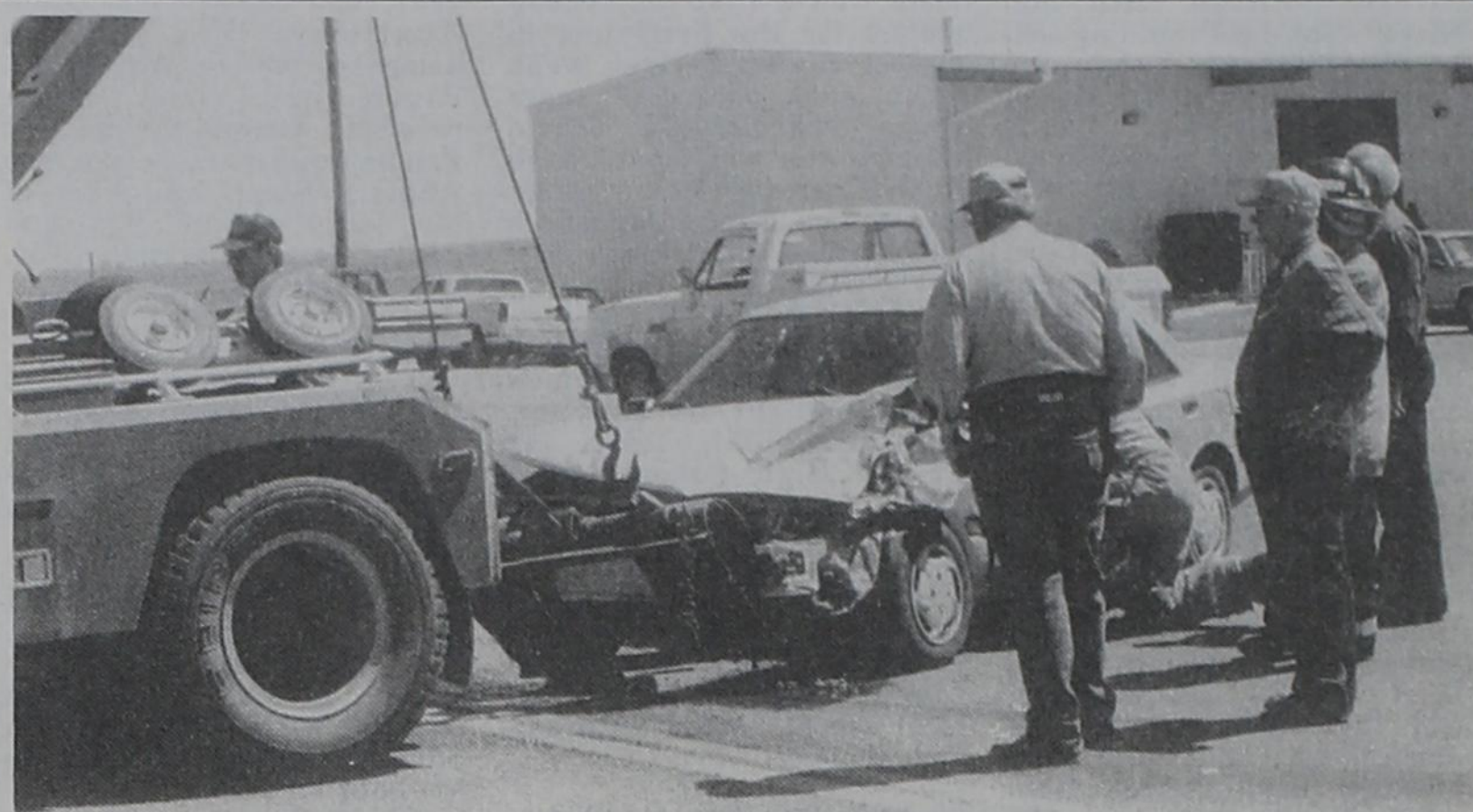
The Internet has been accessible for Friona I.S.D.'s students and faculty since January 4, 1999. Efforts are being made to update existing equipment and purchase additional equipment so that every classroom will have at least one computer.

Technology educational enhancements will include electronic field trips; simulations; multimedia projects; opportunities for teachers and students to create their own knowledge base by searching for and sharing information; E-mail communication and pen-pal initiatives; interactions with global cultures; and opportunities for students and teachers to participate in electronic communities as contributors and authors.

"Not only will this technology initiative enhance the educational opportunities for our students and staff, but

also our community. The district will be sharing computer work stations and providing additional technology training similar to the three Internet classes that were held during March. Other training sessions will be planned for the future" said Tonya Gober, curriculum director for FISD.

"As our world changes, our commitment to Friona's students must be to prepare them to participate in the workplaces of the 21st century and to participate in tomorrow's global society. By implementing technological advancements into an academic curriculum, Friona's graduates will be successful participants of society, Mrs. Gober concluded.

Chamber To Host Candidate Forum

The Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture legislative affairs committee will sponsor and conduct a Candidate Forum on Monday, April 19 at the Junior High Cafeteria at 7:30 p.m.

The candidates running in the school board race are: Jayson Grimsley, Dee King and Alan Monroe. Candidates for city council positions are: John Gurley, Robert Jones, Clint Mears, Mark Neill, Mark Osborn and Sandra Turner. All the candidates have been invited to participate. The forum will give the public a chance to hear from the candidates.

A two minute time period will be allowed for introductory remarks, then there will be a question and answer session with questions selected prior to the forum.

Thirty minutes prior to the forum, each candidate will be given a list of all the questions being asked, but will later draw to see which particular question he/she will address. There will be a two minute time limit for responses.

The forum will be video taped and broadcast on W.T. Services Channels 6 and 76 and on Classic Cable Channel 6 on Thursday, April 22 at 7 p.m. and Thursday, April 29 at 7 p.m.

Early voting begins Wednesday, April 14 and continues through Tuesday, April 27. Early voting for the school board race can be done at the Administration Office at 909 East 11th. Early voting for the City Council race can be done at the City Office at 623 Main Street.

The election will be held on Saturday, May 1 with voting taking place at the Fire Station at 102 East 8th Street. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m.

"Voting for the public officials is not only a right in our country, but a privilege which some people in our

world do not have. We urge everyone who is eligible to exercise this privilege," a chamber spokesperson concluded.

Hereford Red Cross Chapter Accepting Kosovo Donations

The Tri-County Chapter of the American Red Cross is located in Hereford. They will be assisting all American Red Cross chapters with donations toward the relief effort for the Kosovo refugees.

Officials estimate that the American Red Cross will need \$1 million a week for the next few months to meet the emergency humanitarian needs. Americans have already contributed more than \$1.5 million for the relief operation.

They will be acquiring warehouse space, forklifts, vehicles, and relief supplies for use in Macedonia and Albania. Some of the funding will be used in Bulgaria to purchase blankets, food and other relief supplies as well as the transportation necessary to get that relief to Macedonia.

Cash donations to the American Red Cross are the best way to help victims of this conflict and allow for the most immediate use of resources.

According to Sally Walker of the Tri-County Chapter in Hereford, they will be accepting donations earmarked for Kosovo or Balkan relief in the Hereford office.

City Cracks Down On Dangerous Dogs

The City of Friona plans to begin enforcing its animal control ordinance, specifically where it applies to what are considered dangerous or vicious animals, according to City Manager Paula Wilson.

Any animal, which the city's animal control department believes to have a dangerous disposition, and likely to be harmful to humans or other animals are to be the target of the stricter enforcement policy.

Mrs. Wilson said that if in the opinion of the city the dogs are deemed dangerous or vicious, they cannot be tied outside. "This type of dog must be in a secured enclosure or fence. If they are taken out of their enclosure, for example, to go on walks, this type of animal must be securely muzzled," the city manager said.

Violators of the ordinance will first be given a warning, after which they can be ticketed and/or the animal can be removed from the owner's possession.

The fine for violating the animal control ordinance can run up to \$200 per incident, it was stated.

Hospital Dist. Sets Election

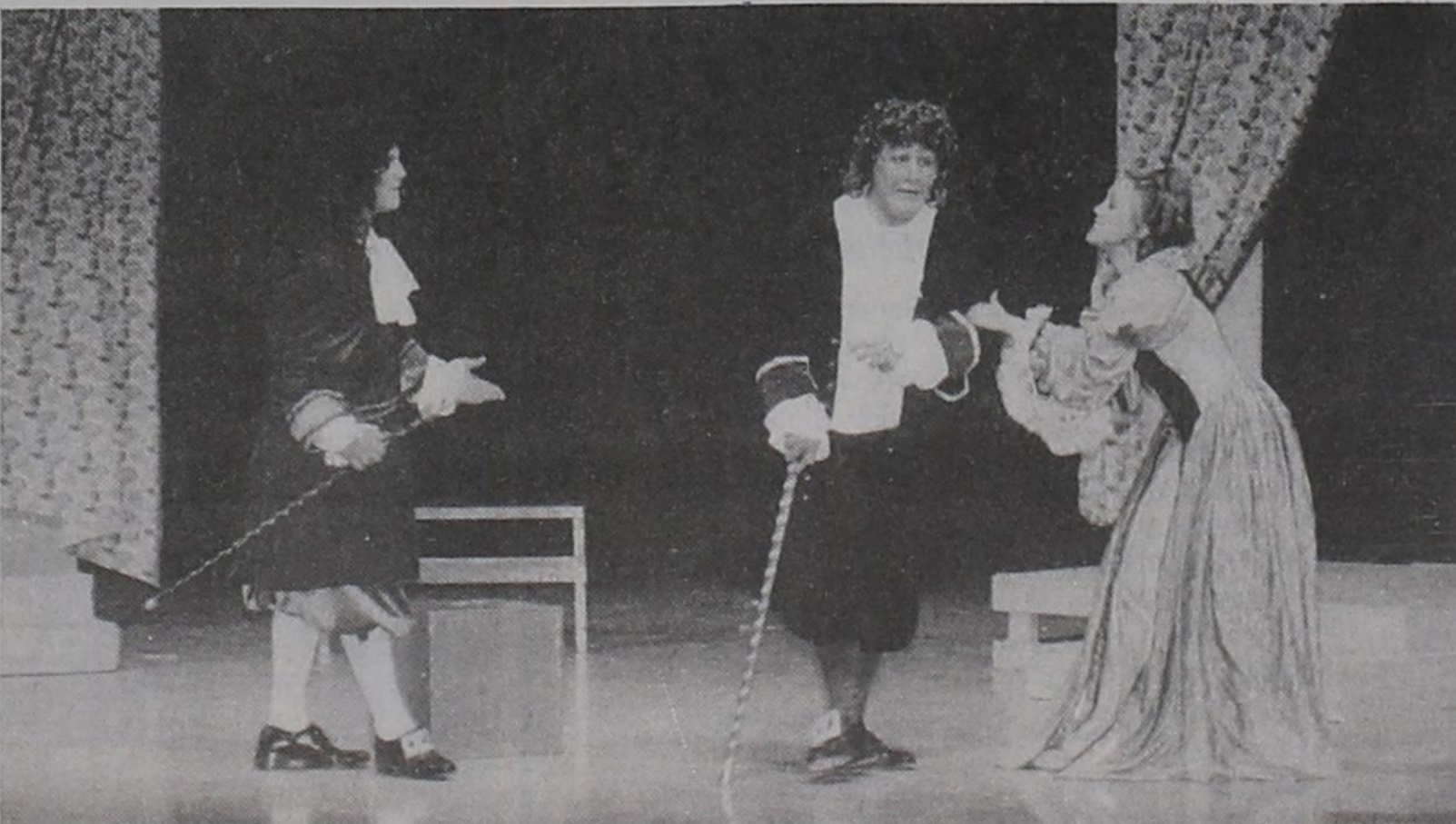
Parmer County Hospital District announces an election to be held on May 1, 1999 for board of directors.

70 Yrs. Ago--Apr. 12, 1929
Ground was broken Monday for the erection of another new business building on the east side of Main Street, between fifth and Sixth. The new building will be fifty by eighty feet in size and will be constructed of brick and concrete. It is being built by the Turner-Parr Trading Company, and half of it will be used by them to house their office, machinery and implement business. The other half will be let to some individual or corporation for the installation of some line of business.

60 Yrs. Ago--Apr. 7, 1939
Members of the Friona Post of the American Legion and the Friona Legion Auxiliary dedicated their new Legion home with a program and a feast Tuesday night. D. K. Roberts, commander of the local post, served as toastmaster, and there were visiting Legionnaires from other Legion posts of the Panhandle territory.

50 Yrs. Ago--Apr. 8, 1949
Friona can now boast of another business place, since Leonard Coffey, formerly of Clovis, New Mexico, has opened his Paint and Body Works in one of W.M. White's buildings on the south side of Highway 60.

45 Yrs. Ago--Apr. 8, 1954
O. J. Beene was elected to the city council as a write-in candidate on Tuesday. With 130 votes cast, Beene, local druggist, received 67 votes to 57 for H. K. Kendrick. Incumbent Raymond White was returned, and Mayor Charles Allen, unopposed, was re-elected.

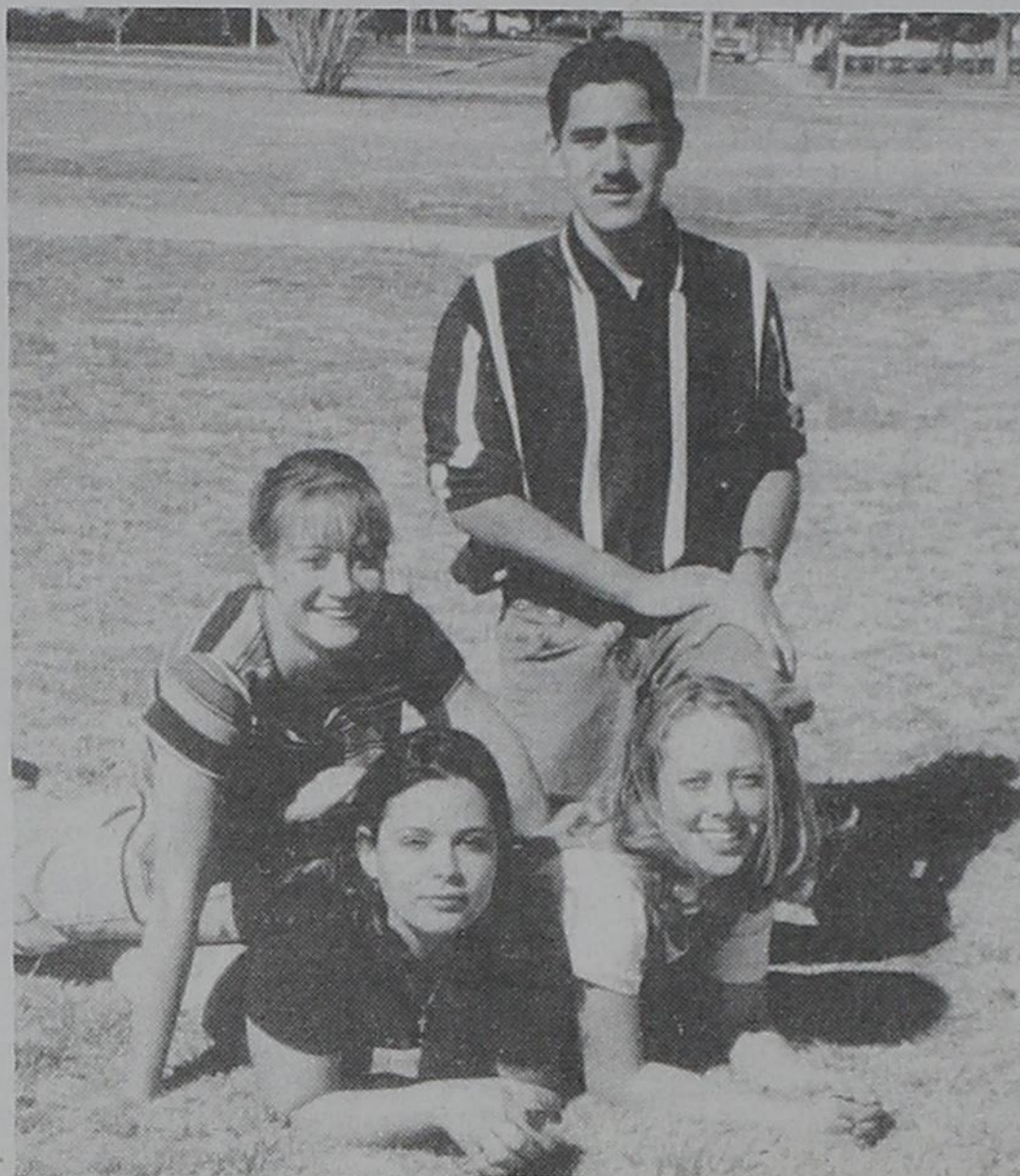

Chieftain Golfers Win District Title

Friona High School's boys golf team won the district championship for the first time since 1981, shooting a 342 as a team this past Monday at Friona Country Club.

The Chieftains edged Muleshoe by five strokes to win the title. Muleshoe had the lead going into Monday's third and final district tournament, holding a six-stroke lead over Friona, 681-687.

Friona's score was 11 strokes better than the Mules on Monday, 342-353.

The Chiefs had a great balanced performance by their top four players (the top four scores are used for the team score). Tyson Neill led with an 80. Trent Cook shot an 87; Gaines Butman shot 91; and Cason White 84. Colby Ingram posted a 103.

Friona's second group of golfers placed seventh, beating out Littlefield's only team. Their scores were: Barry Procter 205-105-310; J'lond Jarecki 191-94-285; Justin Grimsley 188-100-288; Dale Williams 207-94-301; and A. J. Carrasco, 201-104-305.

Two other Friona individuals played: Trevor Fields, 218-99-317 and

Justin Boyd, 206-100-306.

In medalist competition, Neill placed third at 242; Cook was sixth at 254; White was eighth at 265 and Butman ninth at 268. Roosevelt's Jason Toelle was medalist with a score of 237 and Muleshoe's Ryan Hodges runnerup with a score of 238.

A school record performance by discus thrower Sheri Fiel and a personal best time by hurdler Whitney Ellis paced the Squaws' participation at Dumas' "Demonette Invitational" track and field meet last Friday.

Miss Fiel tossed the disc 122 feet, four inches to break Courtney Carthel's record of 121-3. She got the record toss in the prelims. The Friona High School senior had to settle for third place in the meet, behind a pair of class 4A performers.

Miss Ellis won the 100-meter hurdles with a time of 14.88, which is her personal best.

Whitney's mark shot her to the top in the area, and Sheri's ranks fourth in the

Other point-winners included V'Laura Wilcox, third to Miss Ellis in the hurdles with a time of 16.65 and Jena Grimsley was fourth in the 800-meter run in 2:29.

Friona's 400-meter relay team (Kristie Jack, Cara Evans, Wilcox and Ellis) ran a 54.41 race, but didn't place in the top six.

The Squaws also competed in the 800-meter relay and 1600-meter relay. Miss Jack also ran the 200-meter dash and threw the shot put.

In the JV division, Sandra Mendez placed fourth in the discus throw with an effort of 90-8. Also participating for the JV were Ashlee Hunt, Cheree Lewellen, Rocio Lugo and Felicia Lafante.

Chiefs Win One Medal At Amarillo

The Chieftain track and field team was limited to just a single medal at the 50th annual Amarillo Relays last Thursday and Friday.

Friona managed only 13 points in Division II (3A-2A-1A), which was conducted at River Road High School.

Cotton News

from Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

First look at 1999 Loan differentials adds fuel to the fire underneath Plains Cotton Growers' (PCG) long-standing opposition to the use of Spot Market Quotations to set new crop loan premium and discounts.

PCG has been working to bring about a change in the methodology used by the USDA to determine loan differentials for several years. PCG has advocated the use of real-world marketing data, instead of spot quotations, to determine loan differentials. This effort has already led to significantly lower discounts for bark the past several seasons as a result of the analysis of real-world sales figures instead of spot quotes.

PCG officials note that the biggest change in the

1999 loan chart is the fact that there is no longer any provision for "Below Grade" cotton. Instead they will be assigned an initial value 4000 points less than the applicable base loan rate for the growing region.

This means that all cotton produced, regardless of grade, will be eligible for the loan and subsequently Loan Deficiency Payments. This would of course provide some relief to producers unfortunate enough to have this type of low grade cotton.

Other than the elimination of the "Below Grade" moniker, there is really nothing about the new loan schedule that will provide additional income protection to producers.

In fact, discounts increased across the board,

albeit more so for staple lengths of 1 inch or less. Premiums actually increased slightly for the few grade-staple combinations that qualify for them.

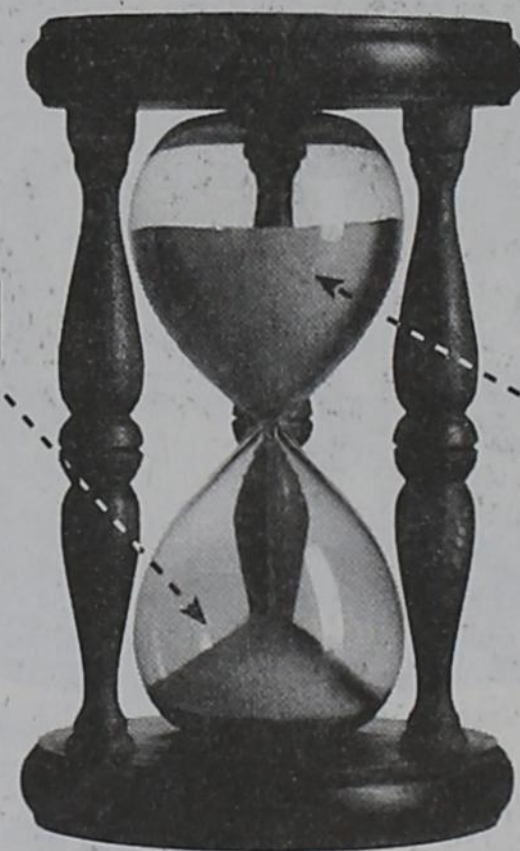
By and large, however, the 1999 loan schedule will reflect the tough marketing year experienced in 1998 and producers will experience generally lower loan values for their crops in 1999.

Base loan rates in effect for the Lubbock area in 1999 will be 51.65 cents per pound. This is five points lower than the rate in effect for 1998.

Additional information and copies of the loan premium and discount table as well as loan values calculated basis Lubbock will be available from PCG in the coming weeks.

Every month a resident of Prairie Acres Nursing Home submits a story about his/her life's history to be submitted in the home's newsletter, "The Prairie Times," and for printing in this issue. This month we feature Johnnie Inez "Nanny" Hamilton.

Johnnie Inez Hamilton was born to John Russ and Eva Roberson on September 24, 1909 in Kaufman County, Forney, Texas.

She was raised on a farm and participated in farm chores, field work and house work. Inez had two brothers and two sisters: Oba Roberson of Forney, Dick Roberson of Athens, Ruth Jones and Marie Roberson of Friona.

Inez was the fourth child. The other four children have all preceded her in death. She was 89 years old on September 24, 1998. She attended all ten years of school at Forney and graduated in May of 1926.

Inez was married to Harry Paul Hamilton on January 29, 1933. They made their home on a farm at Forney, where Harry was a farmer and carpenter.

Harry and Inez moved to Spade, Texas in December of 1942 where they were farming and milking cows to make their living. They moved to Friona in December 1952 where they were engaged in farming until Harry passed away.

Inez worked in the field hoeing and picking cotton until 1948. Later she just stayed at the cotton wagon taking care of the weighing, as the hands pulled cotton. She was a full time housewife along with helping in the field and chores around the house.

After moving to Friona, she was a mother and housewife and would bring dinner to the field during planting and harvest season. She was an active member of the First Baptist Church until about six years ago when Harry got sick. At about the same time, she was slowly becoming an Alzheimer's patient.

After Harry passed on she had in-home care for about 22 months, then entered Prairie Acres Nursing Home in March of 1996 where she is still a resident.

Inez has two sons, Thomas Harry Hamilton and Marilyn Jean Hamilton of Friona, who have four daughters, three son-in-laws, three grandsons and four granddaughters; John Ross and Juanette Hamilton of

Garden City, Kansas, who have two daughters and one son-in-law and two grandsons and Marshall and Helen Stinnett of Portales, N.M. They have four sons and one daughter who have five grandsons and two granddaughters.

We, the family of Johnnie Inez Hamilton, would like to thank the staff and all concerned with the fine care and treatment given to our loved one at Prairie Acres. It is sure a nice facility to have in Friona to take care of anyone who may need such care.

Friona Library To Be Honored During Week

Friona will commemorate National Library Week on Friday, April 16, during a ceremony honoring the efforts of the Friona Public Library to promote literacy and offer expanded educational opportunities in the community.

The ceremony is set for 1 p.m., April 16 at the Friona Public Library, 109 W. 7th Street in Friona.

Eric Sawyer, West Texas regional assistant for U. S. Senator Phil Gramm, will present the library with a certificate of appreciation from Gramm. Sawyer will also read a letter from the Senator recognizing the library's efforts to promote literacy in the community. Also participating in the ceremony will be local librarian Darla Bracken.

National Library Week is being celebrated April 11-17. This year's theme is "Read! Learn! Connect! @ the Library!"

"In every city across America, libraries are making a commitment to help promote literacy and learning," said Gramm, a former teacher.

"National Library Week is a time to recognize the people who have already made education awareness and reading a part of their life, and offers us an opportunity to encourage others to volunteer their time and talents to their local library," the Senator added.

National Library Week, sponsored by the National Library Association, was initiated to promote the use and support of all types of libraries and to make the public aware of the many services libraries provide their communities.

FINALLY, A MISSILE DEFENSE

During the third week of March, the Senate debated a simple but profound question: Shall it be "... the policy of the United States to deploy as soon as technologically possible an effective national missile defense capable of defending the United States against limited ballistic missile attack?"

The Congress, at long last, made the right decision: We will deploy a missile defense system as soon as technologically feasible. As President Reagan said on an historic night 16 years ago, describing his vision for a missile defense: "Wouldn't it be better to save lives than to avenge them?"

This bill had been blocked by a filibuster for two years but ultimately had strong support from both sides of the aisle. As more and more members of Congress became convinced that a missile defense is critical to our nation's security, the support was overwhelming and even President Clinton dropped his opposition.

The need for missile defense is vital and the danger is growing every day. Chinese missiles can now reach our mainland. Apparently with U.S. assistance and through espionage, China has tremendously boosted its military space and missile capabilities in recent years.

China is now directly threatening Taiwan. It has even warned us not to include Taiwan in our defense umbrella.

North Korea probably already possesses the capability to target our shores. Iran and Iraq are not far behind. The Clinton administration, incredibly, said that we would have a warning time of 15 years before North Korea and Iran could acquire such missiles.

But in January, North Korea launched a ballistic missile over Japan, and it now appears that this ballistic missile was a three-stage missile rather than a less sophisticated two-stage rocket, as originally believed. That launch suggests North Korea is capable of a lot more than simply striking Japan, South Korea, Taiwan and U.S. bases in the Western Pacific. Very soon, it will be able to threaten attacks against the United States in Alaska and parts of Hawaii.

There never was a good argument against deploying a missile defense as soon as possible.

The bill we passed does not mandate a specific missile defense or authorize a particular funding level. It is simply a confirmed policy, and an extremely important step for our national security.

The bold, innovative nation that put a man on the moon can and will meet this technological challenge. Our top scientists have researched anti-missile technology for decades. We have had a formal missile defense program since President Reagan launched his Strategic Defense Initiative in 1983. An operational system is now within our reach.

Finally, we will strive to end this nation's shocking vulnerability to the world's most threatening weapons.

2. The second one goes with the first: exercise. Not only do most pets in the United States need to go on a diet, they also need more exercise. Walk your dog at least five times a week and both of you will improve with this. Buy an old fashioned bottle of bubbles with a small wand and have your cat chase and jump at the bubbles. This is loads of exercise for your cat and will provide a good chuckle for you, also.

an annual basis and be sure to give heartworm preventative to your cat and dog. Preventative medicine is always less expensive in the long run and much more safe for your pet.

4. Share your pet with others. Take your dog or cat to a local nursing home and let the residents enjoy your pet. This is a very rewarding experience that you will come to really enjoy. (You will need to check with the home first to find out about their regulations.)

5. Consider your neighbors. Don't let your dog bark for hours and hours. You can usually tune out this barking where your neighbor probably can't. Be sensitive to the people around you when your pet is concerned.

6. Take safety precautions. Always walk your pet on a leash. Never let them roam the neighborhood. If they must be unleashed, make sure they are in a fenced area.

7. Give your pet a home checkup at least once or twice a week. Check your pet's eyes, ears, skin and general attitude. Be on top of a problem rather than let it slip up on you.

8. Invest in obedience training. You can't imagine how much more you will enjoy your pet if he or she is properly trained. An unruly pet simply cannot be enjoyed the way they should be.

9. Pet-proof your home. Keep your medicine and food up and away from your pets. Nosy pets will get into candy left on the coffee table or your medication on the bedstand. Pretend your pets are like two-year-old children and take the same precautions.

10. Love your pet. This may sound foolish, but I mean it. I have seen so many pets put in the back yard and forgotten about. Remember, there is a responsibility to owning a pet. There is not a pet in this world that doesn't like a rub on the head or pat on the back.

Success With Contact Lenses

Wearing contact lenses successfully starts with expert fitting by the optometrist, but it also requires careful eye hygiene on the part of the wearer. Check these important points:

- Remove the lenses before going to sleep, unless they are specifically prescribed for extended wear.
- Cleanse and sterilize soft contacts every day. Use an enzymatic cleaner weekly to remove protein deposits, or more often if needed.
- Wear sunglasses on windy days to keep dust particles out of your eyes and off your lenses.
- Discard torn lenses, no matter how minor the tear.
- Protect eyes and lenses from hair spray and other chemicals.
- If eyes get red or there is pain, remove lenses promptly.
- If there is a change in vision, or frequent discomfort from the lenses, see the optometrist right away. Schedule routine follow-up examinations, too.

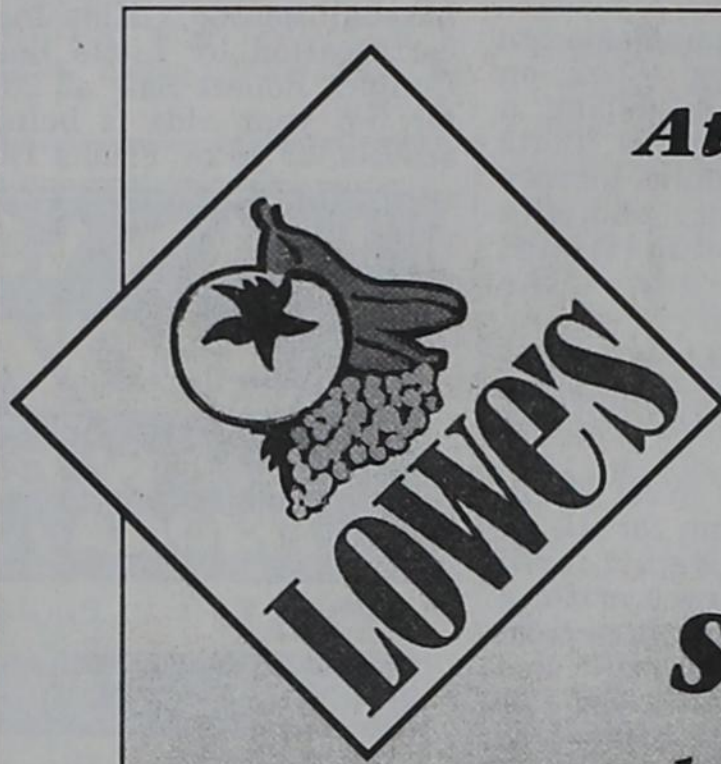

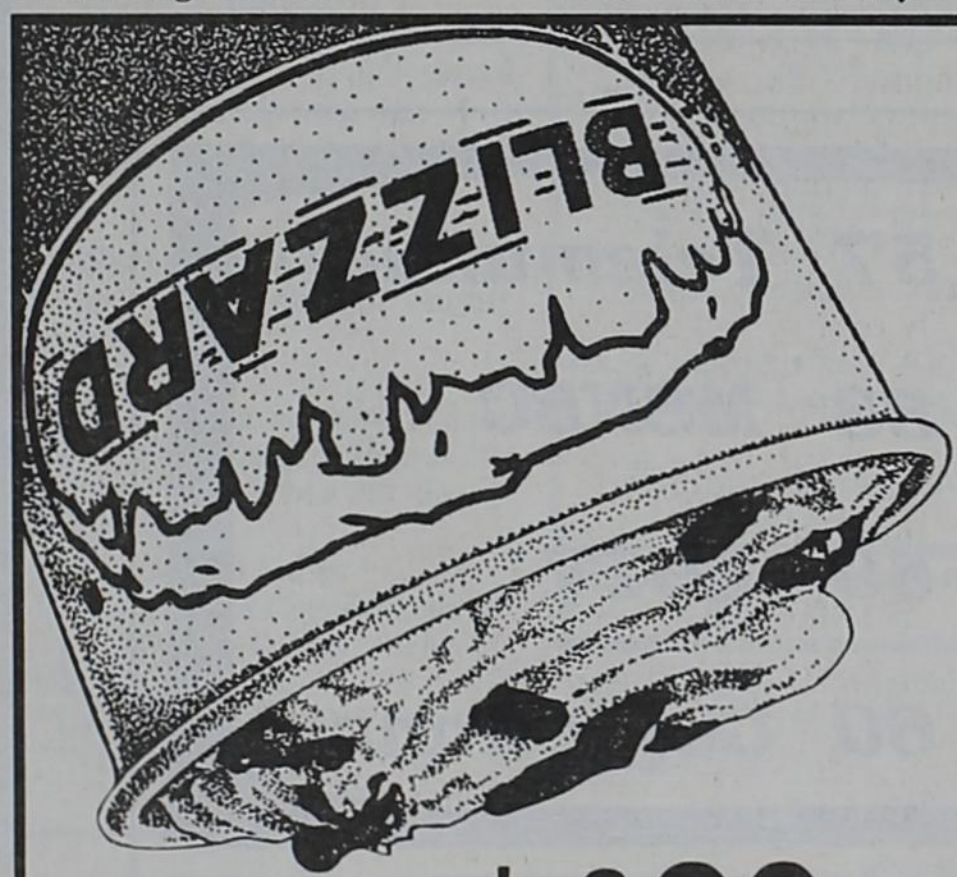
