## 25,000 SOLDIERS NEEDED FOR BORDER

General Pershing, Chief of Staff, declared on March 14th, in his opinion to further reduction of the standing army, that 25,000 men alone were needed on the Mexican border, that there should be at least 1500 men for 100 miles there. According to this, there should be in the Big Bend territory 6000 soldiers. Without question the Big Bend border owing to its distance from transportation, is the most exposed part of the border.

President also is opposed to cutting the Army any more. This is made known when the secretary of War stated, "The administration is undoubtedly in sympathy with the intent of congress to reduce army expenditures, but the president and his advisers believe the way to do this is not thru slashing reductions in the size of the army, but the elimination of a great number of useless army posts.

Political considerations have for years saddled the army establishment with the support of these obsolete garrisons, many of which were created decades ago to carry on war fare against Indians, not for 40 years have any of these posts justified their existence, Secretary Weeks believes, but the moment an attempt to eliminate them is made, protest to congress have prevented their abolition.

The result in the administration viewpoint, is to scatter the army over the United States instead of concentrating it to strategic advantage.

With out question it is political pull which keeps thousands of soldiers stationed in cities, when there are thousands of miles of border territory unprotected.

### EX GRADUATE OF MARFA HIGH SCHOOL HONORED

John Mead, member of the graduating class of 1919, and now a student in the Texas University, has been highly honored in being among those elected to membership in the Tau Beta Phi, honorary engineering fraternity of the University of Texas. The results of the election were announced at the annual banquet of engineers.

This organization was first founded as a National fraternity at Lehigh University in 1885, the Texas chapter being established in 1916. The qualifications for membership in this fraternity are high scholarship and recognized ability for leadership. John is surely endowed with these qualities as has been shown by his High School and university career. This honor is no surprise to those who know the quality of his school work where he distinguished himself by having attained in his Senior year first place in the essay contest, and salutatory honors. This excellent work presaged his career in the University. Much is expected of a person with such a record.

## REBEL ACTIVITIES UNDER U. S. PROBE

Investigation was undertaken by department of justice agents yesterday into activities of six men, believed to be revolutionists, in El Paso prior to their apprehension at Fabens. Three men whose names were withheld, were taken into custody by immigration authorities near Fabens. They were in a truck containing several hundred rounds of ammunition, medical supplies, two U. S. Government revolvers and a box of horseshoes.

Department of justice agent are holding Gen. Erineo Villareal, Jose Rojas and a third man at Marfa. Gen. Villareal according to authorities, led a number of filibustering expeditions in Mexico from Brownsville, Texas, during the past few months. They will be brought to El Paso, according to local officials.

Arrest of the group near Fabens was made by immigration officials on request of the department of justice agents.

When taken into custody the men denied revolutionary intent. "We are going to Boquillas to work on a farm" they told the officers.

Gen. Villareal was known to have been in El Paso a short time ago, officers said. It is believed that revolutionary plans were laid in this city. The general is said to be a brother of one of the eight men reported executed by federals in the state of Nueva Leon, March 9.

We have been watching operations of the group arrested near Fabens, Mexican authorities said yesterday. "Their plans were known," they said.—El Paso Herald.

### Marfa El Maida Shrine Club Meets New Officers

Another meeting of the Club was held on Tuesday night at which new by-laws, rules and regulations were read, approved and adopted. In as much as the Marfa El Maida Shrine Club is purely a social organization it was decided to appoint an entertainment committee, whose duty it is to get up entertainments as often as the committee deems it advisable. This committee is composed of F. C. Melard, J. Anson Coughran, and N. L. Casner. The regular meeting will be held Saturday night March 18.

### Shriners Will Not Stop Off Here

The committee in charge of getting up the entertainment for the Shriners (Mecca Temple) who will pass through Marfa en route to San Francisco in June, has received notice that the special train will be unable to stop off here as the schedule has already been made and it will be impossible to change same. This special will pass thru Marfa some time early in the morning.

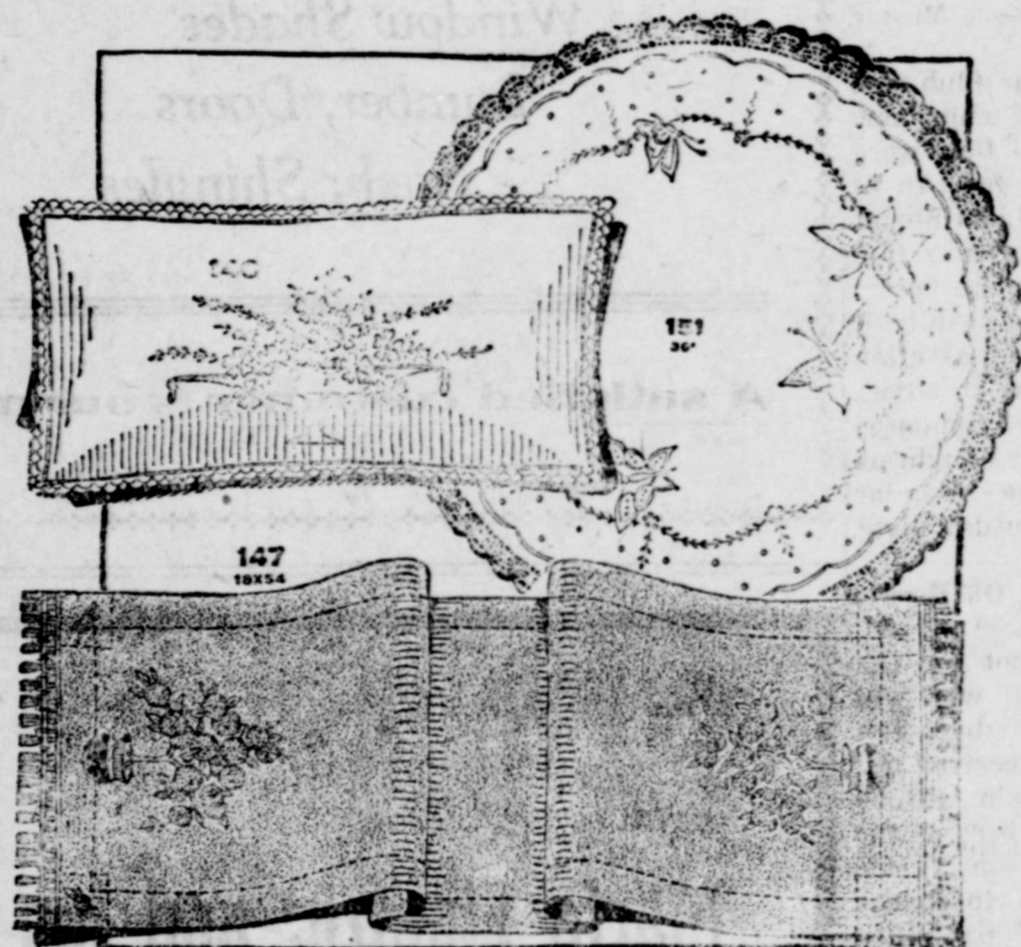

### JAMES WALKER PASSES AWAY

One by one the old timers of Marfa are crossing the Great Divide. With the death of James Walker, which occurred at his ranch home about twelve from Marfa on March 15th, there left us one of the first settlers of our little city. In 1884 he came here with John Humphris, known throughout West Texas as Don Juan, and a brother-in-law of the deceased, Chas. Murphy, Henry Young, S. E. Walker and several others. It was then that the firm of Humphris & Co. was formed, composed of John Humphris, Chas. Murphy and James Walker. About 1898 John Humphris retired from the firm and then was organized the firm of Murphy and Walker.

Several months ago the deceased fell from a windmill tower, receiving at the time what was thought to be fatal injuries, but his rugged constitution caused him to recover apparently, and when taken with pneumonia a few days ago, he had been up and engaged in his usual employment on the ranch. But since his fall he had not been well. It appeared that the injury had affected his right lung, and therefore, he was unable to withstand the attack of pneumonia.

Funeral services took place on Thursday morning, Rev. F. M. Johnson of the Episcopal church, conducting the services. The remains were buried in the Marfa cemetery.

James Walker was born at North Beach, England, December 28, 1854. When he came to America he was about 21 years of age, and except one, has been continuously a resident of America, having become a naturalized American citizen as soon as the laws permitted.

He is survived by his wife and son, a sister in England, and a number of other relatives in America and the United States.

### Prof. J. E. Conner, Supt. Marfa High Schools

#### MAKES GOOD RECORD

Prof. J. E. Conner, to whom this issue of the Shorthorn, edited by the Junior class, is dedicated, came to Marfa four years ago as Superintendent, and assumed charge of the Marfa Public Schools. Mr. Conner is a man of wide experience in the school business. Before coming to Marfa he was at the head of some of the best schools in West Texas, and since he has assumed control of the Marfa schools, by untiring efforts he has builded a school system here that should be the pride of every citizen and patron of Marfa. Mr. Conner is just in the administration of school affairs, alert to the interest of pupil and patron; he has the hearty co-operation and loyal assistance of his teachers, commands the love and respect of the pupils, and holds the commendation and confidence of the citizens and patrons.

When Mr. Conner came to Marfa, the schools here had only sixteen units of affiliations with the higher institutions of learning in the State. At this time, there are eighteen and one-half units of affiliation and four additional units are being asked for this year. The work on these subjects has been such that it is reasonably expected that the credits will be allowed. This is an especially creditable showing when it is considered that only six teachers are employed in the High School, and two of these teachers conduct some classes in the grades, while in most of the schools over the State where they have a similar number of credits, from eight to twelve teachers are employed in the High School. During the past three years, on account of conditions arising and generally prevalent over the country, many schools have lost from two to twelve units of affiliation, while Marfa has steadily increased its number.

Mr. Conner's theory is that no plant, whether it turns out material products or mental products, can operate at full capacity or with one hundred per cent efficiency, unless it has modern and sufficient equipment. To this end the school board has given every encouragement, and carried out his ideas. There have been many improvements in the last two years. The old office room at the High School has been fitted with shelves for the State text books, and the books arranged in orderly and systematic manner. In addition, a regularly employed librarian is in charge of the school library, giving her entire time to the work. In the laboratory, running water has been arranged for each cabinet, and about \$175.00 has been expended for chemicals and apparatus. The lots adjoining the school grounds on the north have been purchased, closing the streets heretofore crossing the grounds and the campus now consists of a solid tract of land, heretofore constituting six large city blocks. The athletic field has one of the best tennis courts between El Paso and San Antonio, if not the best. Baseball grounds, circle tracks, tennis courts, volley ball courts, giant strides, slide, swings, teeter boards, make the ground both attractive and useful. The most distinctive addition this year was the installation of a shower bath, together with facilities for heating water for the baths.
