### BRITE TESTS HEADQUARTERS WELL WITH COMPRESSED AIR PUMP

Mr. L. C. Brite recently tested a well at his headquarter ranch, using a compressed air pump. The well is about 300 feet in depth, but the water stands within 30 feet of the surface. The test gave a flow of 150 gallons per minute, without any indications whatsoever of exhausting the supply of the well.

Quite an interesting piece of history is connected with the discovery of this vein of shallow water on the Brite ranch.

The exact spot on which this remarkable well is located was at one time considered as dry and as poor a prospect for water as any in the country. In fact, Mr. Brite had bored a well 813 feet in depth less than half a mile distant from this well without striking water.

One day during the Spring of 1909 during one of the worst drouths ever experienced on the Brite ranch, one of the employees came in and reported having found a small pool of spring water "over there on the flat."

No credence was given the report, because of the fact that this particular flat had been ridden over most every day for 20 years, and the fact was well established that prior to this time there had been no water there.

A few days later two of the cowboys came in and said, "there sure is a small pool of water over there on the flat."

Mr. Brite then went over in company with the men to the spot where they had located the water, to investigate for himself, and to his utmost surprise, found the water in question, which had risen to the surface and had formed a small pool, and this too, during one of the driest years ever known.

There was not more than a gallon of water in the pool, but it proved to be real genuine Spring water.

Several years later Mr. Brite had a well put down within a few hundred yards from where the Spring water had made its appearance and a splendid well was obtained, with the water standing within five feet of the surface and from which several ranch houses and stock watering places were supplied through pipe lines.

Two years ago Mr. Brite decided to put a well down on the identical spot where the Spring water had made its appearance, and this is the well he tested out this week and which proved such a winner.

Mr. Brite is now putting in thirty miles of pipe lines that will be supplied from the two wells at his headquarter ranch and pumped with compressed air.

There will not be less than twenty-five watering places for his stock attached to this pipe line and seven deep wells located within the territory so covered, will be abandoned, eliminating considerable expense in repairs and upkeep of same.

Mr. Brite already has pipe lines covering other sections of his big range and when his present plans have been perfected, he will have not less than sixty miles of pipe lines, making his range one of the best watered within the State of Texas.

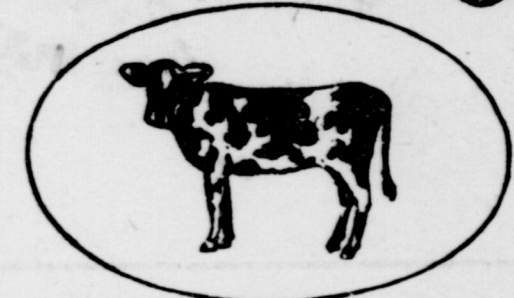

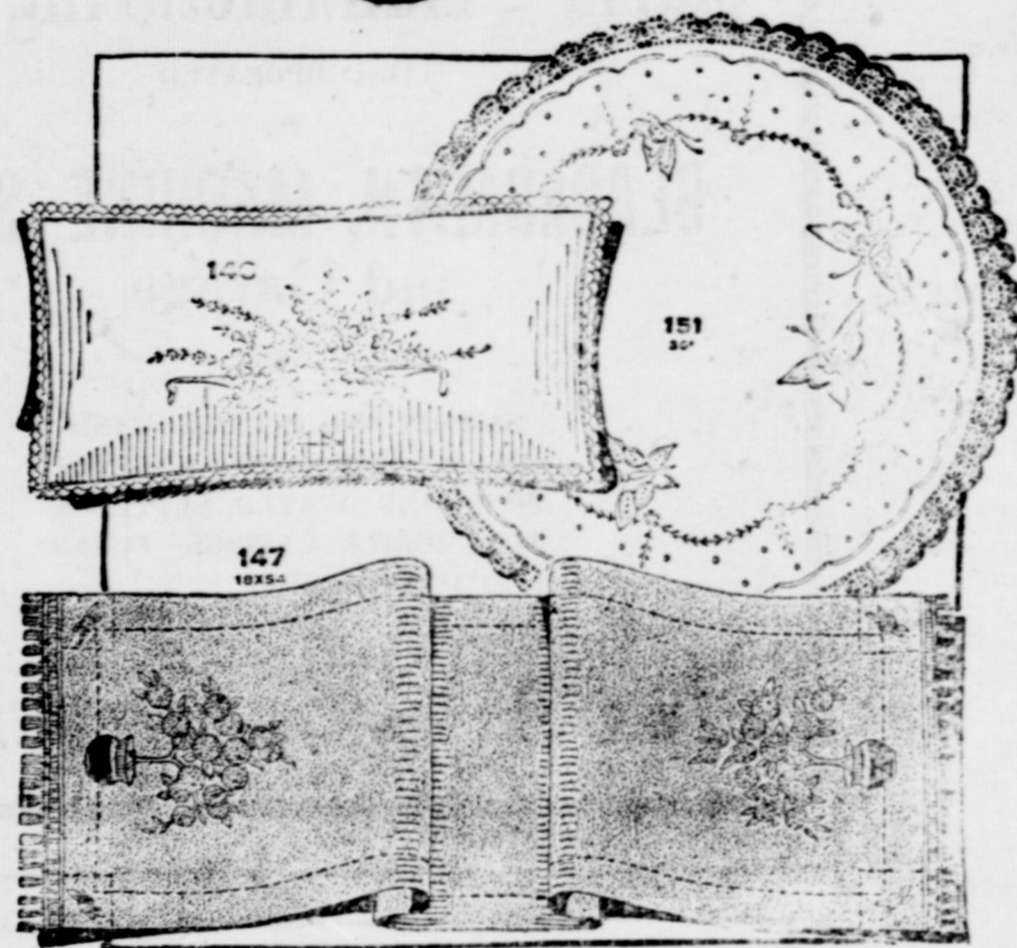

## LAWS ON REPORTING COMMUNICABLE DISEASES—BIRTHS—DEATHS—PENALTY

Every physician in the State of Texas shall report in writing or by an acknowledged telephone communication to the local health authority, immediately after his or her first professional visit, each patient he or she shall have or suspect suffering with any contagious disease and if such disease is of pestilential nature, he shall notify the President of the State Board of Health at Austin by telegraph or telephone at State's expense, and he or she shall report to the said health authority every death from such disease immediately after it shall have occurred. The attending physician is authorized and it is made his duty to place the patient under the restrictions of character described herein below in the case of each and every respective disease.

Physicians, Surgeons, Midwives and Parents shall report births. All physicians, surgeons or accouchers (midwives) who may attend at the birth of a child, or, in the absence of such attendance, either parent of the child, shall report the fact, together with all statistical data relating thereto, within five days from time of birth to the city or county registrar as hereinafter provided for.

Every person acting as an undertaker shall file with the proper registrar a certificate of death and all persons furnishing a coffin or box in which to bury the dead, shall be deemed undertakers.

All certificates of births and deaths shall be made in the manner prescribed by the State Board of Health and in the form of certificate prescribed by the State Registrar to the aforementioned registrars (certificates obtainable from local registrar.)

It shall be the duty of every physician in the event of death (including stillbirths) occurring in any case at which said physician is the

last in attendance, to promptly and accurately fill out the questions in the "medical particulars of the death certificate" presented by the undertaker.

Any person who shall violate any of the rules, regulations or provisions of the Sanitary Code of Texas, as herein set forth, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction, shall be fined in any sum not less than ten dollars and not more than one thousand dollars.

## Major Overton to be Honored by Cadet Squad

The announcement from the War Department at Washington of the promotion of Captain Winfield Scott Overton, U. S. Army, retired, San Francisco, R. O. T. C., to the rank of major, was the signal for the 943 cadets of the city to arrange exercises in honor of their chief, to take place tomorrow morning at 9 o'clock at the Galileo High School, in the Civic Center.

There will be present at the ceremonies cadets from all the High Schools, accompanied by color guards, the principals of the High Schools and a delegation of forty from the Lions Club, of which Major Overton is a member. The silver bars of a captain's rank will be removed from Major Overton's shoulders by John P. Nourse, principal of the Galileo high school, who served under Overton in the Philippine insurrection, to be replaced by the gold leaves of a major in the U. S. Army.

Among the speakers will be Major General Hunter Liggett, retired, former commandant of the western department of the Army; Colonel M. M. Falls, chief of the 9th corps area R. O. T. C., and August Vollmer, chief of police of Berkeley, who served in Overton's battery in the Philippines.

Major Overton is one of the best known army men on the Pacific coast. He entered West Point in 1893 and graduated with honors. As a lieutenant he commanded G battery, 3rd artillery, during the Philippine insurrection, and was retired in 1908, owing to wounds received in battle. In the late war he was called back into active service, and was in charge of the R. O. T. C. at Harvard University, going from there to Yale University, later being transferred to serve as commander of the University of California students army training corps regiment. At the conclusion of hostilities Major Overton came to San Francisco and organized the Junior R. O. T. C. —S. F. Chronicle.

## OVERTON RECEIVES RANK OF MAJOR

An American version of "Soldiers Three" was depicted at Galileo High School this morning during the ceremonies of investing Captain Winfield Scott Overton, commander of the Junior R. O. T. C. in the high

schools, with the commission of major. The "soldiers three" were Major Overton, Chief of Police August Vollmer of Berkeley and Sergeant J. C. O'Connor, a member of Major Overton's staff in the R. O. T. C. Twenty-three years ago Overton was a lieutenant in command of Battery C, 3rd U. S. Artillery in the Philippines. Sergeant O'Connor was a stern young "non-com" under him and Chief Vollmer was one of the raw and eager "rookies."

Overton, who was decorated for bravery on the field during the Spanish war and was made captain in less than a year after he left West Point, received his present promotion for work among the high school members of the R. O. T. C.

He organized the force in San Francisco and has brought it up to a regiment of 1000 boys.

Chief Vollmer and Sergeant O'Connor told personal recollections of the days on the battlefield and Major General George F. Barnett revealed memories of the new major when he was a young second lieutenant in Washington.

Major J. P. Nourse, principal of Galileo high school, pinned the oak leaves, emblems of the office, on Major Overton's shoulders. Nourse presided during the ceremonies, which included speeches by Colonel M. N. Falls, Adjutant-General J. J. Borree, the principal of the city high schools, Edward Rainey, representative of the American Legion and the Lions, and George E. Gallagher.

Under Major Overton's leadership the cadets of the R. O. T. C. will take part in the "Bundle Week" drive, April 3-8, for the purpose of collecting old clothing for the children and refugees of Russia and the near east. They will collect the bundles—S. F. Bulletin.

The line-up of the Marfa High School base ball team, a swell as we can learn, is as follows, viz:

Bailey, catcher; Jackson, pitcher; Livingston, 1st base; Ballew, 2nd base; Frinfrock, 3rd base; Church, short stop; Pruett, left field; Holliman, center field; J. Bean, right field; W. Bean sub; Logan, sub. This team promises to show us some rattling good games this season. They have already several to their credit and the season has just begun.

## AMERICAN LEGION NOTES.

In the past few days in the public presses of our nation it has come to the attention of the ex-service men that there has been an intensive campaign of venomous slander directed at them on account of the bonus proposition that has been put before the lawmakers of our country. They are taking the attitude that the once soldiers are using their voting strength to club them into passing the bonus bill.

This campaign is not only taking the form of misleading and in many cases, insulting, special articles and editorials, but they are also using cartoons, such as the one that appeared in several Texas papers, picturing the ex-service man as holding up Uncle Sam with a revolver, marked the ballot and commanding him to come across, while Germany is giving us the horse laugh. Such cartoons are nothing short of an insult to every man who wore the uniform in defense of his country, and it is a disgrace to the American people.

In the first place there has never been any threat made against any member of Congress.

The American Legion in particular, has confined its campaign strictly to educating the American people as to just what the bonus is and to refuting the half-truths and straight-out lies that have been published with the express intention of concealing the real issue, and diverting the people's attention from the simple fact that in paying the bonus the Government is not only fulfilling their promise to the men but is defraying a moral and legal debt.

The Government has never found any difficulty in defraying her other obligations, such as those to the railroads, manufacturers of war munitions and thousands of other claims. They also seem able to allow Europe to support huge armies that should be used for paying at least the interest on their debts, on the billions of dollars they owe us, and are even advocating in some quarters that we extend to Germany a few billion dollars credit, not to mention the fact that some of them are wanting to donate the allies debts to them.

The whole affair reminds one of the soldiers progress, which runs as follows.

- In 1917, the flower of young manhood.
- In 1918, our heroes.
- In 1919, the returning soldiers.
- In 1920, the soldier element.
- In 1921, the unscrupulous despoilers of our treasury.
- In 1922, bums and BEGGARS.

After the Revolutionary war, George Washington fought for adjusted compensation for his veter-

ans, and that at a time when ship-builders and munition workers did not get from ten to fifteen dollars per day.

He was also confronted with the same arguments against such compensation that confronts the present Congress, viz: that it was putting a price on patriotism. In reply, Washington said, "I may be allowed to say that it was the price of their blood and our independence. It is therefore more than a common debt. It is a debt of honor. It can never be considered as a pension gratuity, nor can it be cancelled until it is fairly discharged."

And yet the business interests, which form the bulk of the opposition to the adjusted compensation act now, under consideration, continue to cry, "a price upon patriotism," totally disregarding the fact that, during the war the man that made the bullets drew from \$10 per day upwards, while the fellow that STOPPED the bullets was getting \$1 per day and "deep sea soup" three times a day.

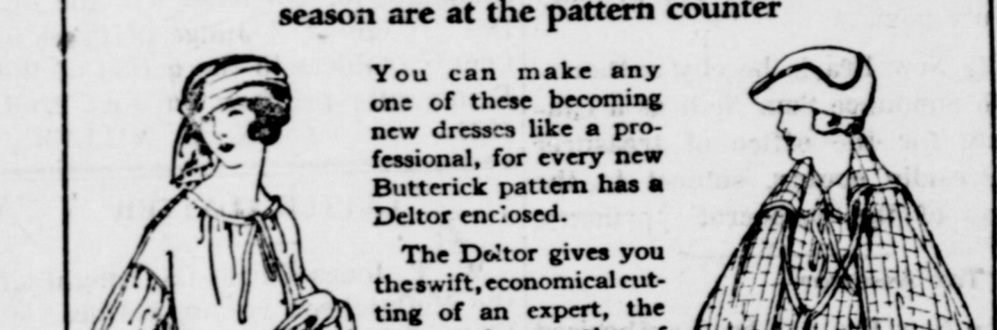
