**MARFA'S RADIO STATION**

About May 15th there will be installed in Marfa at the Opera House an up-to-date and one of the most improved Radio Receiving Stations.

This will come to pass through the enterprising efforts of two of Marfa's young business men, namely C. E. McFarland of the Union Drug Store and R. C. Battle, movie operator at the Queen theatre, who have formed a partnership to operate such a station here for the benefit of the city as well as for themselves.

The instruments necessary for such an up-to-date station as they will install, cost them in the neighborhood of \$600. The complete radio receiving set comprises one amplifier 2 stage, one magnaron with a radius of several thousand miles. In fact, they will be able to reach Los Angeles, Denver, Dallas, Austin, St. Louis and as far north as New York and Washington.

When installed, McFarland and Battle will give to the public, free of charge every day, the Ft. Worth stock market reports. In the evenings they will give hand concerts, lectures and operatic performances at the Opera House for a small admittance fee. However these performances are absolutely subject to the static conditions of the air.

They will also be in a position to transmit excellent music from Denver and other large cities, suitable for dancing and their reproducing sounding box can be so adjusted that it will sound as loud here in Marfa as if the musicians themselves were playing before us.

Therefore in the future the young people of Marfa will be able to dance to the music of some of the most able orchestras in the land and will be able to learn the latest step by music that will be perfect. To attend these dances McFarland and Battle will make a charge but it will be very small in proportion to what it has heretofore cost the dancers to have music come from El Paso and other places for such occasions.

The Radio Receiving station that Marfa will soon possess will be in line with all the big cities of the

country and will be a big asset to each individual resident here.

Folks, it's the most wonderful invention of the age. We could write columns in regard to this wonderful instrument, but space forbids.

The New Era is certainly proud of the fact that Marfa will soon have this radio station installed and we are glad we have two such energetic, progressive and liberal young men as McFarland and Battle, who have put their money into this thing so soon after the perfection of this most wonderful invention of the age, and we hope their investment and untiring efforts to put Marfa on the map in the line with other big cities of the country will prove very beneficial to them.

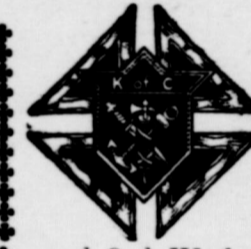

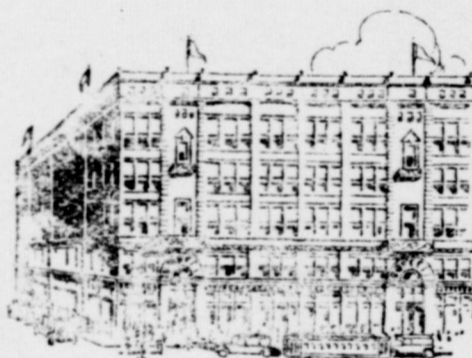

**Sanford John Truman Dies**

Sanford John Truman, 51 years of age, died yesterday at a hospital in Salt Lake. The cause of death was hemorrhage of the brain. He fell on an icy walk on April 16 and was taken to a hospital, where it was found impossible to reduce the fracture on account of other complications.

Mr. Truman was born at Nashville, Mich., December 25, 1870. He was educated at Olivet College, in Michigan, and became a merchant in his native city. Later he left Michigan and became associated with the St. Stevens Land and Water Company. He operated in irrigated lands in Texas. He married Miss Carolin Leidigh of Kansas City. A daughter was born to them. Mrs. Truman died subsequently and later he married Miss Jane Bell Willis of Nebraska, who, with his daughter, survive him. Mr. Truman came to Salt Lake to locate in 1915, and had been interested in mining in the Cottonwoods and Park City. He was connected with the L. C. Gillham Advertising agency. He was a mason and a member of the University club.

Funeral services will be held at the S. D. Evans mortuary chapel at 4 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. The body will be interred in Michigan and will be accompanied east by his widow; his sister, Mrs. W. Mont Ferry, and his father, George A. Truman.—Kansas City Star.

Mr. Truman was well known in Marfa, where he had many friends, who will regret to learn of his death.

While a resident of Presidio county he had charge of the construction work on the San Estavendam on the Bogel ranch.
