MARFA HAS SPEED COP

Beware all you high flyers in Liz-
zie Fords and Hudson Sixes, or the
jinks will be with you, for the city
of Marfa has employed W. T. Bur-
ditt as speed cop, who also will act
as city pound master and dog
catcher.

Mr. Burditt is a fine man with a
good reputation as an officer of
the law, and hails from Sonora,
Texas. He has only been in our
city about two months, but is al-
ready pretty well known to many
of Marfa's citizens, for he has been
helping Paul Propst rebuild our
city streets.

His duty will be to run down and
arrest all those who are inclined to
violate the State and city ordi-
nance, also gather up all the stock
that might graze along our public
roads in the city limits, and to cor-
ral all the Soup Bone Hounds or
mongrels that run around the
streets of Marfa without a license.

If we are going to maintain a city
we must abide by the laws regulat-
ing same, and even though the
mayor has employed an officer to
see that these laws are enforced, we
really feel like there will be but
few arrests, for it is the desire of
most every good citizen to do his or
her part to live within the law.

The only problem Policeman Bur-
ditt will have will be the dog ques-
tion, for there are hundreds of
worthless canines in our city that
will have to be caught and execut-
ed, unless saved by their master
through the purchase of a dog tag
or license.

These captured dogs will have
three days of grace before they are
put to sleep. This is only fair to
the owners for it gives them a
chance to save the life of their dog
if they choose to do so.

Therefore be on your guard if
your pup has no tag for the dog
catcher will surely hang onto him
sooner or later, and should your
dog disappear, get in touch with
Policeman Burditt if you want to
save him from execution.

Mr. Burditt is very fair and
wishes to give all the public proper
warning before he begins making
arrests, for he desires to give the
public full time to get acquainted
with the laws which he proposes to
enforce.

After a weeks time he will mean
business and those who will not
heed, will have to stand the conse-
quences. He means what he says,
and will do what he says he will
do, so look out and don't jeopardise
your freedom.

Let everyone abide by the laws
regulating our city, and have Peace.

TO THE CITIZENS OF MARFA

I wish to inform the citizens of
Marfa that I have been employed
by the officials of your city as
speed officer and pound master.

I further wish to make it clear
to everyone that I am going to en-
force the laws regulating your
town. However, I will abide a
reasonable length of time so all
can acquaint themselves with your
city ordinances, so that no one can
say that I did not give them a
chance.

The speeding of automobiles in
the city limits must cease. All
traffic regulations must be respect-
ed and lived up to hereafter, or a
fine will be imposed on all viola-
tors.

All dogs must be tagged with a
dog license tag. Male dogs license
tags will cost one dollar and bitch
license tags will cost five dollars.
All dogs without tags will be gath-
ered up and executed after four
days of grace. To get a dog out of
the pound will be one dollar in ad-
dition to the tax. No dog will be
returned to owner before he pre-
sents a license tag.

All stock running loose in the city
limits will also be rounded up and
impounded, and owners must pay
to have same released.

I hope every citizen will co-oper-
ate with me by not violating your
city ordinances.

POPULAR THEATRE NOTICE

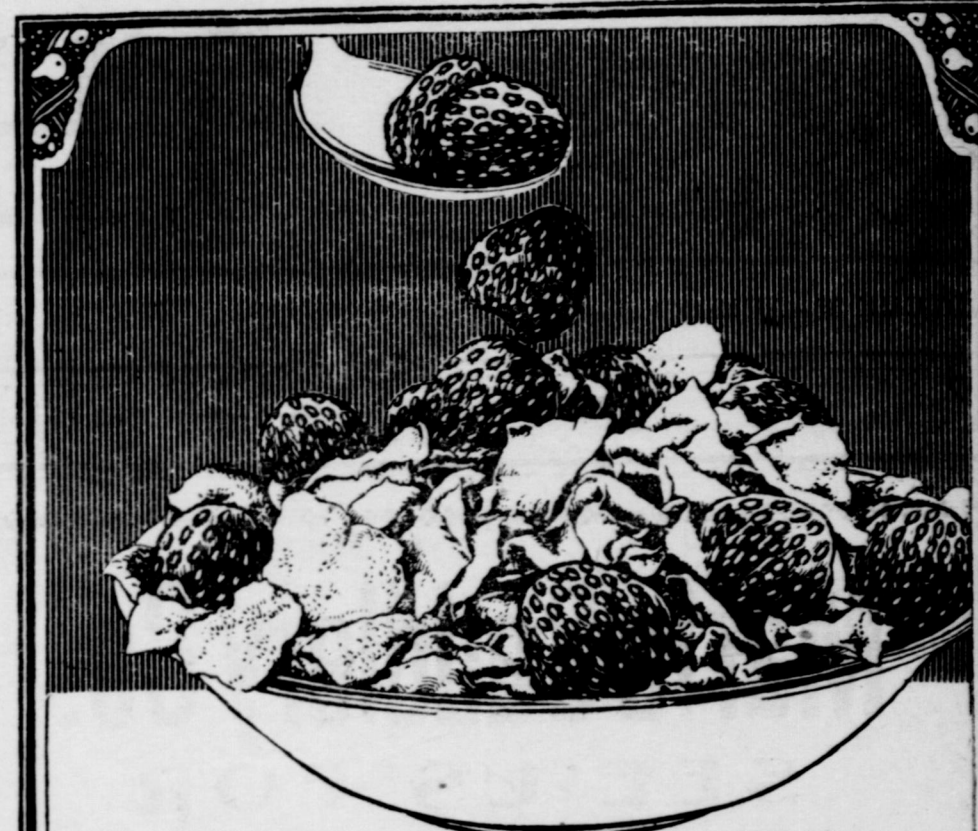

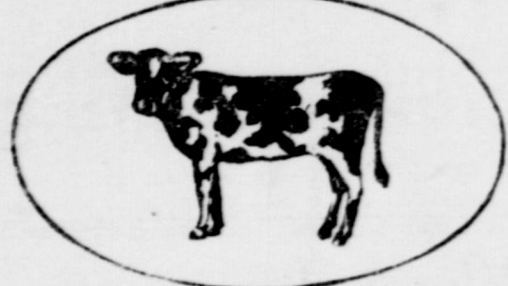
