#### A TERRIBLE SITUATION

The poverty and suffering among  
some of the Mexican population  
along the Rio Grande has become  
appalling.

Major L. G. Coop of the American  
Red Cross, who came to Presidio  
County from El Paso about ten  
days ago to personally make a sur-  
vey of this terrible situation, has  
returned to Marfa with some facts  
that are hardly believeable for we  
people here in Marfa have never  
had the real first hand facts point-  
ed out to us until Major Coop in-  
vestigated the situation.

Major Coop visited Ruidosa, Pul-  
vo, Redford, Presidio, Indio, Shafter  
and also crossed into Ojinaga, and  
at all these places he found many  
families in dire need of assistance.

For immediate relief Major Coop  
carried with him quite a supply of  
provisions, which he distributed to  
those in most need, but found that  
some sort of permanent relief for  
at least three months has to be ar-  
ranged for.

Therefore he has made out a re-  
port of his survey and turned it  
over to the local Chapter of the Red  
Cross, who will attend to this relief  
work as per his suggestions.

The co-operation of some respon-  
sible resident at each of these Riv-  
er towns will have to be solicited  
who can aid the local Chapter of  
the Red Cross in supplying these  
poor people with food and clothing  
as well as medicine, which they  
need very badly.

At Ruidosa Major Coop found the  
situation considerably worse than at  
any other point. Here he found, for  
instance, one family of nine, father,  
mother and seven small children,  
actually starving. The father had  
been sick with typhoid fever for  
six weeks and barely able to sit up.

One of the younger children lay on  
the barren dirt floor of their adobe  
hut, with high fever, with some  
sort of breaking out on its mouth,  
with the scab sealing the lips of the  
child so that it could not partake of  
nourishment, had they wanted to  
feed it. Its face was covered with  
a swarm of flies, that it tried to  
brush away in its feeble way, by  
raising its little arm, which fell  
limp at its side, with the swarm of  
flies returning to its face as quickly  
as they had left. Only death await-  
ed this child, as there was nothing  
that could be done to save it, as it  
was beyond all hope.

The father, unable to work, and  
the other children too small to earn  
anything, and with absolutely no  
work in sight had they been able  
to earn their own livelihood, plac-  
ed this family in a very worst form  
of destitution.

In another family he found a  
young deserted mother, with a  
small child and an old grandmother  
in a state of starvation. The young  
woman had partly lost her mind  
over worrying, and the grand-moth-  
er was too old and feeble to care  
for the others, although she was  
hard at work, swaying to and fro,  
trying to grind up a hand full of  
corn that some kind neighbor had  
given her. He supplied this family  
with wholesome food to last them  
for a week, after which they will  
have to receive another portion, and  
so on until something can be done  
to make these people self support-  
ing.

We could write columns of in-  
stances that Maj. Coop related to us  
but we think it best not to broad-  
cast these sad stories, but rather  
get together and do something, and  
that at once, to relieve this sad  
situation.

The local Red Cross is doing all  
they can to relieve the situation  
with a war relief fund that they  
still have on hand, but additional  
assistance has been assured them  
from the Red Cross from Washing-  
ton headquarters, but anyone de-  
siring to lend their assistance in  
this great work will get in touch  
with the ladies of the Marfa Red  
Cross. Especially do they solicit  
the assistance of good citizens liv-  
ing near the places mentioned  
above, where these poor people re-  
side, as they need reliable men and  
women who will see that these poor  
people get proper relief.

These poor families are not all  
local Mexicans, but most of them  
have come into the United States  
out of old Mexico, where conditions  
are even worse, but since they are

here among us, it behooves us to do  
a Christian act and care for them,  
and at least spare them the agonies  
of starvation. Really, some sort of  
work should be found for them  
that they could earn enough to  
keep them up.

Maj. Coop informs us that he  
found possibly fifty or sixty fam-  
ilies along the river that need help  
and he has made out a detailed re-  
port on each case that he found, so  
it will be easy for the relief work-  
ers to locate these families and  
they will know exactly the status of  
each case.

At Ojinaga Maj. Coop found the  
small-pox situation quite bad and  
he has ordered 500 vaccine points  
sent to this place which are to be  
used to prevent a possible spread of  
the disease. Dr. Moore of Presi-  
dio, has offered his assistance in  
vaccinating the Mexicans up and  
down the river and to lend such  
other aid as might relieve the suf-  
fering of the poor.

Maj. Coop deserves much praise  
for the prompt and efficient work  
he has done among these people.  
It was quite a task for him to  
hunt up these cases as he had never  
been in the Big Bend country be-  
fore, and only those who live here  
can appreciate the hardships he  
must have experienced going from  
place to place over this rough  
country. The Red Cross is indeed  
fortunate in having such a man  
who is so faithful and sincere in his  
work as we have found Maj. Coop  
to be.

## SOUTHERN PACIFIC TO TAKE OVER THE ORIENT RAILWAY

Austin, Texas.—What may be the next large railroad sale in the Southwest and one of the largest in the country, is said to be tentatively considered in the acquisition of the Kansas City, Mexico & Orient by the Southern Pacific system.

It transpires that the engineering department of the Southern Pacific made a copy of the profiles of the Orient, which are among the records of the engineering division of the Railroad Commission of Texas in this city. The obtaining of these copies has created much interest and led to the belief that the Southern Pacific contemplates buying the Orient.

Transportation officials aver that the Orient is a logical line for the Southern Pacific; that it would fit into its system perfectly and would, in fact, fill a long felt want. At this time the Orient extends from Kansas City to Alpine on the Southern Pacific, which is 500 miles

East of Tucson, where the Southern Pacific line extends down the West coast of Mexico. The Orient intersects this line at San Bias, it coming up from Port Topolobampo. When the Orient is completed into Alpine from Mexico, it would save at least 1,000 miles in hauling freight to and from the Western part of Mexico. The Orient would be a direct line from that section of Mexico to Kansas City, St. Louis and Eastern connections.

In addition to that the Southern Pacific at this time gives a large volume of California fruit business to the Rock Island at El Paso for transportation to St. Louis, Chicago and the East. If the Southern Pacific carried it to Houston, 800 miles further East, it still would be no nearer St. Louis. If it buys the Orient, it would have a direct line for all California business via Alpine.

It would save the Southern Pacific large amounts, it now pays out in division on freight moving via the Rock Island and El Paso junction.

If the Orient is bought the Southern Pacific would have to build something more than 200 miles to connect it up and make a continuous line from Kansas City to Topolobampo. There is a gap of a little over 100 miles from Alpine to the Northern terminus in Mexico. A second gap is above San Bias, and it is about 100 miles. Thus the Orient is in three sections between its present extreme terminal. It has close to 500 miles of trackage in Texas.—San Antonio Express.

## The Wonderful Red Star Oil Burner

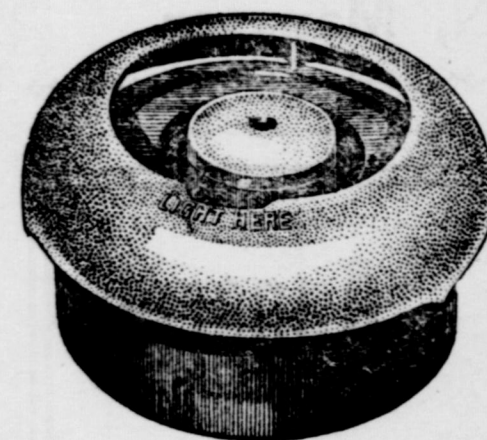
Red Star Burners have no wicks or wick substitutes. Fuel is vaporized into gas, giving a clear, blue flame.

Heat condenser is an inverted cone-shaped casting which holds the heat and forces it to strike utensil squarely.

Burners are made from solid grey iron castings annealed to withstand heating and cooling; last a lifetime.

This is an illustration of the Red Star Burner. It is made entirely of grey iron castings, there being no wicks or wick substitutes. The fuel flows directly into a double ringed channel or vaporizer and the slotted burner parts rest directly upon it. As soon as the fuel strikes the vaporizer it is immediately mixed with air, forming a gas which produces a very hot, steady flame, the same as a city gas range and may be regulated at will.

The fuel in this stove is piped directly into each burner through heavy iron pipes, therefore there is no possible chance of fuel leaking anywhere in the stove. The burners, being made of solid grey annealed iron, simply rest in place,



Double ring flame of intense heat directly under cooking. Burns all the fuel without smoke or smell.

Castings fit in place without fastenings. Easily taken apart for cleaning. Seldom needs any attention.

Fuel flows directly into the double vaporized rings and is mixed with the air to give perfect blue flame.

and should they become dirty by spilling anything into them, they can be readily lifted off and cleaned.

### THE HEAT CONDENSER

Is a shallow cone-shaped casting that rests on the burner—see illustration. You can readily see how it holds and forces the heat to strike the cooking utensil squarely, allowing none to escape without doing full service.
