Wednesday evening at 7:30 p. m., the members of the Retail Merchants Association met at the Long Horn Cafe and partook of a most delicious luncheon.

The eatables were served in courses and comprised of everything usually served at a first-class luncheon, topped off with delicious ice cream and cake.

Ed Nevill, the proprietor, spared no trouble to give the members of the Association the very best of service and personally supervised the whole affair to see that it was well done.

An almost 100 per cent attendance were present to enjoy the spread, after which a business meeting was held and the election of officers followed.

Frank Anderson was elected by a unanimous vote, to succeed Buck Casner as president for the coming year.

Much other important business was discussed at this meeting, among which might be mentioned the fact that the merchants voiced their sentiment to give the New Era, their home town paper, a better support by advertising, realizing that only through such a course could the paper be improved and put on a paying basis.

Up until recently the New Era has been called upon to do quite a bit of free publicity advertising and had not received the full co-operation of some of the largest business firms in the city, while some of the local firms have done more than their share towards supporting the home paper.

The whole meeting of the business men was full of pep and enthusiasm and determination to do good and to co-operate among themselves for the best of the whole community.

It is remarkable how much good has already been accomplished by this body of business men, and from the program outlined for the ensuing year, we feel confident the organization will bear fruit and do things that could not be accomplished any other way than thru an organization such as they have perfected.

BASE BALL PARK

Marfa is to have a real, genuine base ball park, one that would do credit to any city.

This park will be approximately 600 feet square, with a high board fence all around it, and will be located in the east end of the city, just beyond the Model dairy, near the H. E. Middleton home.

John Humphris has been kind enough to procure this piece of land for a term of years and John Malone, the manager of the Marfa team, is now out getting subscriptions to the fund with which to erect the park fence. We understand he has already procured five hundred dollars from public subscription.

Each person interested in this movement is requested to subscribe a certain number of park fence, whereupon the donor can place his advertisement, and this proposition is meeting favorably with the business men as a whole, for it not only helps the base ball enthusiasts in erecting their ball park fence but gives the merchants a very good medium through which to advertise their business.

Marfa has been in need of such a park for years and when completed, with its grand-stand, it will be a pleasure to go out and enjoy a good, clean game of base ball without basking in the hot boiling sun for hours, as has been the case heretofore.

MARFA'S BAND

We are glad to inform the people of our city that we are to have a Marfa band and that real soon.

This band will be organized by all local talent and will comprise twelve members.

The organization of this band is under the leadership of the Mexican consul, J. C. Bustamente and Frank Quiroz. In fact, we hear that the organization has already been perfected and all that is necessary is the raising of a small fund by public subscription with which to maintain the organization.

It is the desire to raise about \$100 per month with which to buy music and instruments and to pay other expenses with.

The band will play in the railroad park every Sunday afternoon for three hours, provided the railroad will give permission; otherwise they will play in the Court House grounds or at the City Hall.

That the band will play is a sure thing, for the men in back of it are very enthusiastic and say they will perfect their plans in the next few weeks.

Such a band would be a big asset to our already prosperous city and the New Era, for one, will back them up with a liberal monthly subscription and we know that nearly every business house in Marfa will do likewise.

KILL BLACK BEAR

Last Sunday afternoon the R. S. Bynum ranch, southwest of Marfa, was the scene of quite a bit of excitement and it was not a Mexican bandit raid either, but only a big black bear.

From what we can gather, one of the ranch hands, while on his way to Marfa in an automobile, ran across what he thought a large black lobo wolf, so he returned to the headquarters ranch and got the assistance of Walter S. Skinner to help him kill the beast.

However when they returned to the spot where the animal had been seen, they were much surprised to find what they thought a large lobo wolf, to be a 400 pound black bear.

As the two men approached in their car the beast showed a fighting spirit and made for them, whereupon Mr. Skinner emptied his pistol into the animal, hitting him five times, but the bullet wounds did not seem to phase the animal in the least, only to enrage it more.

Then the two men decided to rope the bear. So one of them straddled the hood of their automobile, with a lariat, while the other drove past the animal.

This performance was continued for some time, until finally the lariat was successfully thrown over its head, after which they had to drag the bear for about four miles over the range before they had worn it out sufficient to kill it.

From what we can learn, the bear was traveling north, making his way for the Davis mountains, and probably came out of Old Mexico or the Chinatti mountains. Mr. Skinner had the bear skinned

and will have the hide tanned so as to make a rug out of same.

We recall that about fifteen years ago, Ed Myers, while coming in from the James Walker ranch, also ran across a large black bear and had quite an experience before he finally drug the brute to death on horseback. His horse was terribly lacerated by the enraged animal before it was finally killed. Ed killed the bear with rocks but not until he had drug him for several miles and had him completely worn out.

The Wonderful Red Star Oil Burner

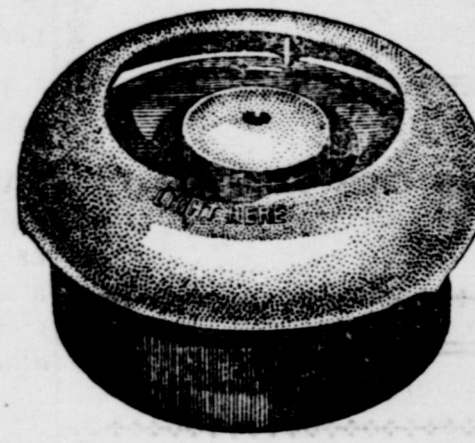
Red Star Burners have no wicks or wick substitutes. Fuel is vaporized into gas, giving a clear, blue flame.

Heat condenser is an inverted cone-shaped casting which holds the heat and forces it to strike utensil squarely.

Burners are made from solid grey iron castings annealed to withstand heating and cooling; last a lifetime.

This is an illustration of the Red Star Burner. It is made entirely of grey iron castings, there being no wicks or wick substitutes. The fuel flows directly into a double ringed channel or vaporizer and the slotted burner parts rest directly upon it. As soon as the fuel strikes the vaporizer it is immediately mixed with air, forming a gas which produces a very hot, steady flame, the same as a city gas range and may be regulated at will.

The fuel in this stove is piped directly into each burner through heavy iron pipes, therefore there is no possible chance of fuel leaking anywhere in the stove. The burners, being made of solid grey annealed iron, simply rest in place,

and should they become dirty by spilling anything into them, they can be readily lifted off and cleaned.

THE HEAT CONDENSER

Is a shallow cone-shaped casting that rests on the burner—see illustration. You can readily see how it holds, and forces the heat to strike the cooking utensil squarely, allowing none to escape without doing full service. This method of intensifying the heat gives a much hotter and steadier fire with a great saving of fuel. It also tends to prevent anything boiling over into the burner.

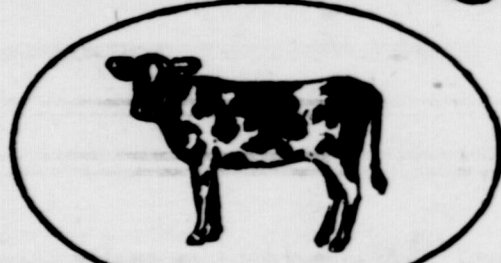

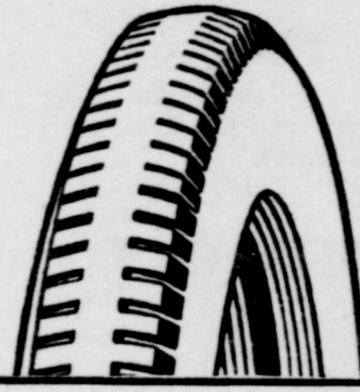
