



C. Carthel Is Honored

Colby Carthel, Friona High School graduate and son of Mr. and Mrs. Donnie Carthel of Friona, was honored this week at Angelo State University, for his play in last Saturday's win over West Texas A&M.

Carthel, a senior middle linebacker, scooped up a fumble and returned it 27 yards for a defensive touchdown, as his team beat the Buffaloes, 28-7.

He was accorded the "Greg Stokes Big Play Award" for his performance.

This Saturday Angelo State plays ENMU at Blackwater Draw, in a game starting at 7 p.m., CDT.

Carthel played a vital role on Friona High School's 1994 district champs, who won the title for the first time at FHS 29 years.

IT'S BEEN A BIG WEEK down here at the local office of the fourth estate. October 3 through 9 is National Newspaper Week. The actual celebration consisted of having an extra doughnut with our coffee on Monday a.m., otherwise it's been pretty much business as usual: covering the local goings on, snapping pictures of folks, grading football contest entries, fixing up ads for the business firms, and sticking all of it together into a form that vaguely resembles a newspaper.

I did notice, though, that October 3 through 9 is also National Squirrel Awareness Week, which is quite fitting, because you have to be pretty squirrely to go into this business in the first place. At least squirrels know who their enemies are... basically cats and an occasional hawk.

Newspaper folks are never exactly sure who their enemies are, because they (the enemies) write nasty letters if they didn't like what was in the paper, but they never sign their names so we can know who to watch out for, so as to duck out the back door if we see them coming in the front.

After being in the business for nearly forty years (close to fifty years if you count working on papers in high school and college), you'd think "newspapering" would begin to get a bit old. Not so! The opportunity to observe and comment on the human condition is what keeps this business new and exciting week after week. Our fellow beings never cease to amaze us. For instance:

In 1992, Frank Perkins of Los Angeles made an attempt to win the world flagpole-sitting record. However, he caught the flu and had to come down eight hours short of the 400 day record, only to find that his sponsor had gone broke, his girlfriend had left him and his electricity had been cut off.

The Bureau for "At-Risk Youth" of Plainview, NY, was forced to recall an "anti-drug" promotional pencil they were passing out to local school children. The pencils were printed with the slogan "Too Cool to Do Drugs." But as the pencils wore down and had to be sharpened, the message became "Cool to Do Drugs," and then later, "Do Drugs." When brought to the attention of the sponsoring group, a spokesman said they were "actually a little embarrassed about it all."

A woman came home to find her husband in the kitchen, shaking frantically with what appeared to be a wire running from his waist towards the electric skillet. Intending to jolt him away from the deadly electrical current, she whacked him with a handy plank of wood by the back door, breaking his arm in two places. Till that moment, he had been happily listening to his Walkman.

For several months, nurses at the Pelonomi Hospital in Free State, South Africa were baffled to find a patient dead in the same bed every Friday morning. Resident Hit With Indecency Charges

On September 24 Friona Police received a report from a local parent of inappropriate behavior toward their child by a local music teacher.

Chief Randy Gerles, acting on the report, conducted a two-day investigation that resulted in the September 26 arrest of Charles Turner, 62, of Friona.

Turner is a retired teacher who spent 35 years with Parmer County school districts in Farwell, Bovina, and Friona as teacher, special education teacher and school

counselor.

He had been a private music and piano teacher for several years. On September 27 charges of indecency with a child were filed by local police. The incident, or incidents, involved more than one of his music students, according to Gerles.

Chief Gerles declined to reveal specifics of the ages or numbers of victims to protect their privacy.

Indecency with a child is a second degree felony punishable by a sentence of two to not more than 20 years in state prison and a fine of up to \$10,000.

Turner, who officials say has admitted the offenses, is free on a \$5,000 bond. The case is expected to go before the November Parmer County grand jury.

Hungry Mustangs Visit In FHS' District Opener

Shallowater's Mustangs come to Chieftain Field Friday, in the District 2-AAA opener for both teams. Kick-off time is 7:30 p.m.

The two teams have travelled separate paths to their district opener, with no common opponents, and with exact opposite season records.

But, while Friona leads in the "season record" department, 4-1 to 1-4, the team may have learned last Friday that season records can sometimes be deceptive.

"They could just as easily be 5-0. They have been 'in' every game they've played," said a cautious Coach Mike Scott this week.

A check of the Mustangs' scores backs up Scott's assertion. Shallowater's only win has come over New Deal, 14-12 in week 4. Their losses have been to tough Seagraves, 27-14, Idalou, 19-14, Floydada, 12-6, and to Abernathy, 12-7.

"They haven't scored a lot of points, but they have done some things offensively that have hurt some of their opponents. They have a tough defensive team as usual, and have played well enough defensively to have won more games," Scott continued.

Scott's opposing coach is Keith Kitchens, a Hereford native and Texas Tech

graduate who is well respected in the Panhandle-South Plains area. Kitchens has spent his entire coaching career at Shallowater, and came into this year with an overall record of 96 wins, 49 losses and six ties.

Kitchens has had his team in the playoffs both in class 3A and in 2A. Shallowater had been in 2A until being bumped up in 1994-95, was back down in 1996-97, and then back to 3A starting last fall.

The Mustang quarterback was 5-10 junior Keenan Kitchens, the coach's son, who

has been injured during the early season. Keenan's younger brother (name unavailable), a freshman, has taken his place at QB.

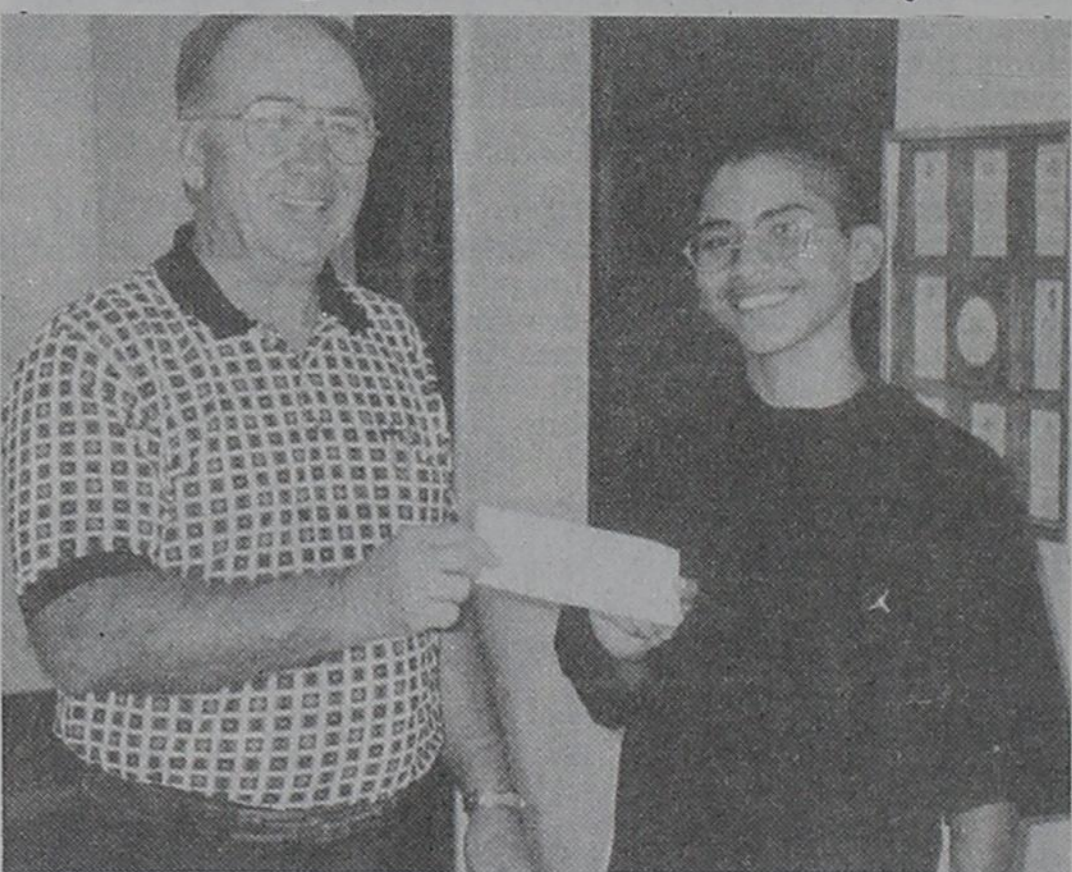
Shallowater runs a Wing-T offense. Scott said that Justin Stone, a 170-pound junior, is a hard runner, and has paced the team to this point.

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

...from the files of The Friona Star

65 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 11, 1929

Dr. A. P. McElroy has let the contract for the erection of the building that is to house the new Friona laundry, Thomas & Thompson being the contractors. The building is being erected on Main Street in the McMillan-Fergus Addition to Friona, on the north side of the city.

W. J. Coffman, living several miles south of town, was the first to bring a bale of cotton to his Friona gin this season. The bale was brought in last Thursday.

60 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 12, 1934

Those in charge of Friona Consumers company filling station and oil depot came near witnessing a serious fire in the building on Thursday morning of last week, when a heater got on fire. An over amount of distillate had gotten into the oil burning heater. It appears that two school boys who live in the country, had missed their bus the evening before and had spent the night at the company's sales room with Roy Williams, who was in charge as night man that night. About 5 o'clock Thursday morning while Mr. Williams was outside attending to his duties, the boys proceeded to light a fire in the heater and allowed too much fuel to get into the fire pot of the stove causing flames to cover the stove and fill the building with smoke.

55 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 13, 1939

The severe drought of nearly three months duration in this locality, was broken last Saturday when clouds began during the forenoon, to drop their moisture in gentle showers, covering this locality and Parmer County and extending practically to all parts of the Panhandle. The rain left from one to two inches of moisture in the Friona territory.

50 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 13, 1944

While working on a windmill tower at the Ivie farm, 15 miles southeast of Friona last Friday, Raymond Adams lost his balance and fell to the ground. No bones were broken, however, he was severely bruised and shaken.

40 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 14, 1954

Law officers are investigating the robbery of the Piggly Wiggly Store in Friona Wednesday night at which time \$257.01 was taken from a cash register by someone entering the building through a jagged hole in a rear door. The thieves pried the bars that cross the glass slightly, then broke the glass.

35 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 15, 1959

Hurshel Harding of Farwell has announced his candidacy for the office of county attorney, a position he now holds. His announcement is made subject to the Democratic Primary May 7.

Early reports of this year's grain sorghum harvest show decided signs that this year's crop may even exceed the 18,000,000 bushel proportions which was estimated earlier in the year. According to managers of several elevators in the Friona and northern Parmer County areas, the per acre yield is running quite a bit above last year's county average of 3,300 pounds per acre.

30 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 15, 1964

Preliminary dirt work began last Friday toward construction of the new \$1 million high school building in the west part of town. Contractors say the building will be ready for classes next fall.

Funeral services were conducted here Wednesday for Bert Shackelford, 81, a longtime Friona resident. Shackelford had lived in Perryton for the past two years.

15 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 21, 1979

The theft of \$21.06 worth of gas from a Bovina service station last Friday led to a high-speed chase across two counties, and an exchange of bullets which left an 18-year-old Iowa man wounded.

Vandals have been responsible for hundreds of dollars worth of damage to store windows in Friona during the past week, and as a result, a group of local merchants have moved to find the responsible parties. The merchants have posted a \$500 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of those responsible for the vandalism.

10 Yrs. Ago--Oct. 14, 1984

Milli Dixon was crowned the 1984 Homecoming Queen at Friona High School. Other candidates were Sarita Ellis, Nikki Osborn and Teresa Wilcox.

FHS SUFFERS FIRST LOSS Wildcats Make Off With 9-7 HC Win

Chieftain Field seemed to be full of "land mines" last Friday. And even though the Chiefs were the home team, the River Road Wildcats managed to tip-toe through all of the prospective "bombs" and made away with a 9-7 win over Friona.

It was Friona's first loss of the season; only the third regular-season loss since the start of the 1996 season; the first home loss since 1995, and the first homecoming loss since 1993.

Four times a Chieftain ball-carrier ran into the Wildcat end zone last Friday, but only once did the officials allow a score.

One touchdown was called back by a holding penalty, and another by illegal procedure. These two came practically back to back, early in the second quarter.

Then, early in the second

half, freshman Adam Bandy grabbed a ball in mid-air following a Chieftain punt, and raced 40 yards into the end zone. But officials called the play a "muff," rather than a Wildcat fumble, and disallowed the score.

"We had a lot of opportunities, and just didn't cash in," said Coach Mike Scott, who refused to blame the officiating.

From the stands and press box, it appeared that the same penalties which cost Friona 14 points in a one-minute span were also happening on the other side of the line. But the 'Cats were flagged just half as often, and for exactly half the yardage as Friona.

On the positive side, since the Chiefs may have been less than perfect on offense for the second week in a row, it was good that this was aired out,

before the team got into district play.

"I thought we played exceptionally well on defense, allowing just two scores in the game. Joseph Bandy had some outstanding plays--two big interceptions, and caused a fumble, and a touchdown-saving tackle," said Coach Scott. One of Bandy's INTs was turned into a touchdown and gave Friona the lead.

"I thought Cason White had one of his better games defensively, and Josh Burleson had a great second half. The defense played well overall. We just need to eliminate the penalties," the Chieftain coach said.

The Wildcats won the toss and did something no team had done this season--drove for the lead touchdown. River Road QB Adam King mixed his passing and running game well, and hit 6-3 receiver Jeff Gilmore for the touchdown. The 'Cats tried to pass for two points, but the attempt failed. The visitors took a 6-0 lead after 5:24 had expired.

Three plays gained just five yards, and Friona had to give the ball back. The Wildcats seemed to have another payoff drive going, when Bandy whacked Eric Flanders and caused a fumble. Daniel Rosales recovered for Friona at their 16. Bandy had hauled Gilmore down from behind on a 13-yard gainer prior to the fumble.

Friona seemed fired up, as Nathan King kept for eight yards and Noel Grajeda ripped off 15 for a first down as the opening quarter was ending.

King then got loose on a 22-yard ramble to the River Road 33. Grajeda slashed through, bouncing off tacklers for what appeared to be a 33-yard touchdown run. That one was called back for a holding penalty.

Two plays later, King found Joseph Bandy over the middle with a pass, and the slippery running back picked his way for an apparent 35-yard touchdown play. Another flag had fluttered, and this one came back as well.

The two flags cost Friona a total of 68 yards gained, plus 15 yards penalized. So you might say the Chieftains lost 83 yards in two plays!

Adding insult to injury,

River Road intercepted King's next pass, so we'll never know if we could've had three TDs called back on the same drive.

A little later, Friona took over on its own 15, and began a drive. Grajeda gave the Chieftains three straight first downs as the team crossed midfield. King then zapped the big tailback a 13-yard pass. Adam Bandy gained eight yards in two tries, and Grajeda bored for two yards and a first down at the Wildcat 23.

But the 'Cats dug in, and this time Grajeda was held to no gain and the visitors took over.

With time running low in the half, Bandy read Adam King's pass perfectly, intercepting the ball at about the 40 and returning it to the Wildcat 5. Two plays later Matthew Mata ran the ball in from the four. Trent Cook started a new kicking streak with a perfect boot, and Friona had quickly grabbed the lead at 7-6. Only 34 seconds remained in the half.

Joe Bandy managed another interception with the clock running down, but Friona didn't have time to convert.

Never-the-less, the team ran off the field with the momentum, which carried over to the second half.

Friona controlled the ball for virtually the entire third quarter, but had no points to show for it.

On their first possession,

the Chiefs had to punt. Adam Bandy was running down to cover the punt preceiver, who had the ball bounce out of his hands. Adam caught the ball in the air, and never missed a stride as he ran into the Wildcat EZ. But the officials ruled it a "muff," rather than a fumble and again Friona was denied.

A holding penalty caused Friona to punt again, but on River Road's second play the Wildcats fumbled and Grajeda recovered at the visitors' 25.

Four plays resulted in lost yardage and the Wildcats regained the ball.

a 12-yard gain around end by King on the option play. On fourth and two from the Wildcat five, Nathan King hit Mata right between the numbers in the end zone, but he dropped the ball. That could've given Friona a 14-6 lead, which would have loomed big in the defensively-charged second half.

With five minutes left, River Road staged their only drive of the second half, and had it first and goal on the Chieftain five. Friona's defense refused to allow the Wildcats to cross the goal-line, but Steven Land came in to kick a 19-yard field goal with 1:01 to play to give River Road the win.

me say right here, to win the Grand Prize, you not only gotta be "good", but also, plenty lucky.
I have won the "Grand" prize twice. Only one person (Mark Neill) has won three times, and the third time he won, he beat me by only one game. 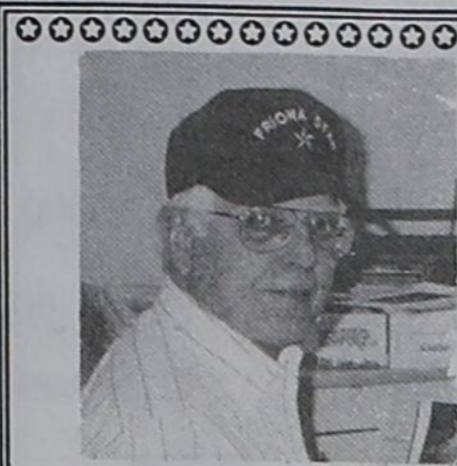

Right about now many Hallmark and book stores and office supply places pile up stacks and racks of next year's calendars. It looks strange to see calendars advertised for the year 2000 when we have been writing 19-something all our lives.

Like most folks I couldn't get along without a calendar. When I was a teen, we looked for an excuse to go out to Wes Hickey's Garage and sneak a peek at the pin-up calendar he always had up just above his work bench.

Some company that manufactured automobile hoses always made sure that Wes wouldn't forget the date. Of course when you went out to Wes' place in October, his calendar would still be reading July. Sometimes last year's calendar would be hanging right along side this year's.

It depended on how pretty Wes thought the ladies were as to how long he left them up. Seems the July pin-ups were always a blouse full. Later on when I went to

work in Dallas I had to have a calendar to plan my daily sales routine. By then calendars had become pretty fancy, with names like Day Runner and Day Timer.

They were so complicated that they had to be carried around in a zippered notebook with pages for each day and supplemental pages for other activities. They called them planning calendars.

I soon found out that it was a pain to unzip a notebook and flip through multi-pages just to find out where to be at 2 p.m. Tuesday.

Back when my life was really, really important I used a calendar with a page for each day. Later on, I was able to function quite well with a week-at-a-glance calendar.

Nowadays I carry around a month-at-a-glance book I bought over at Office Max in Clovis. The entire month is divided into little daily boxes.

I received a 2000 American Century calendar from Time-Life Books with patriotic pictures for each month. Virtually every day on the calendar has some notation.

When they put all those notes in the calendar squares, it doesn't leave much room for your daily appointments, not to mention birthdays and anniversaries.

My mother has had a calendar in the same spot on the side of her refrigerator for 30 years. Every year she fills out another calendar with birthdays of her kids, grandkids, and now great-grandkids.

She lists birthdays for friends and relatives along with the weekly and monthly doctor's appointments for her

and Harry. Mother could not function without her refrigerator calendar.

Because of our newspaper deadlines every week and our need for accuracy, a calendar is indispensable in a newspaper office. Fred Ferguson at Lakeside Parts and Machine gives his customers a calendar each year that has two months on each sheet.

It is about 18" X 24" with nice western art at the top and two months displayed side-by-side on the bottom half. No squares to write in but a great calendar for what I do.

The only way to improve Fred's calendar would be to have one of Wes Hickey's pin-ups on the July-August page.

You can get calendars today that are more works of art than ways to count the days. Cat and dog calendars are popular sellers.

There are Native American calendars, astronomy calendars and those featuring trains or storms or religious motivation.

I was wondering whether there will be calendars to hang on the wall in 2050. With technology taking over, folks will probably have all kinds of neon, digital, electronic calendar options and full-blown wall calendars might be obsolete.

As I approach 2000, basking in the glory of 60 years on earth, I need to write things down and I'm glad that people like Fred will still be giving out calendars for a while.

If I were younger I would buy a bunch of 2000 calendars and put them away until 2050. By then they should be rare, classic, valuable antiques.

Now what was it you wanted me to do next Tuesday?

Red Cross Update

The American Red Cross is on the scene providing the support necessary for the affected families of Hurricane Floyd. To date, much-needed shelter has been provided to 216,121 people. Some of these people were sheltered during the evacuation and have had to continue residing in shelters now that floodwaters have inundated their homes.

Hurricane Floyd relief effort continues to be a massive undertaking for the Red Cross. American Red Cross-National Headquarters has launched an urgent \$25 Million Hurricane fund-raising appeal. Locals Take Part In Race For Cure

October is National Breast Cancer Awareness Month. Breast cancer can touch any woman at any age in her life. Every woman is at risk. It touches one in nine women.

It ranks as the leading cause of death among women 40-55, and the second leading cause among women of all ages. Breast cancer is the most common cancer among women, other than skin cancer. Early detection is the best method for successfully treating the disease.

Four local women traveled to Amarillo on Saturday, October 2 to participate in the Komen Race for the Cure. Doris Barnett, Rose Boren, Betty Reeve and Becky Jones walked in the one mile Fun Run/Walk to raise money and awareness for breast cancer research. There were over 2,000 walkers and runners in his year's race.

The Race for the Cure is the largest series of 5K fitness runs/walks in the world. The Race has grown from a single event attended by 800 women in 1983, to a series of 85 events with nearly 600,000 runners and walkers participating in 1998.

The Race for the Cure is sponsored by The Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation, which was established in 1982 by Nancy Brinker to honor the memory of her sister, Susan G. Komen, who died from breast cancer at the age of 36. The Komen Foundation is one of the nation's largest private funders of research dedicated solely to breast cancer.

The Race for the Cure is held annually in Lubbock and Amarillo. A run/walk to benefit breast cancer research will be organized for the Friona area for the fall of 2000. If you would like to help plan the event, please call Betty Reeve at 265-3415 or Becky Jones at 250-2482.

The Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation and the American Cancer Society recommend the following screening guidelines:

*Monthly breast self-examination beginning at age 20.

*Breast examinations by a doctor or nurse every three years at age 20, and annually after 40.

*Annual screening mammography beginning at age 40. Women under 40 with either a family history of breast cancer or other concerns about their personal risk

should consult a trained medical professional about when to begin mammography.

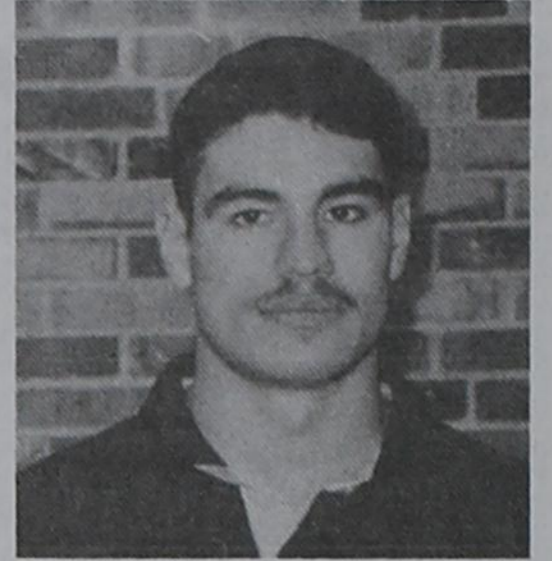



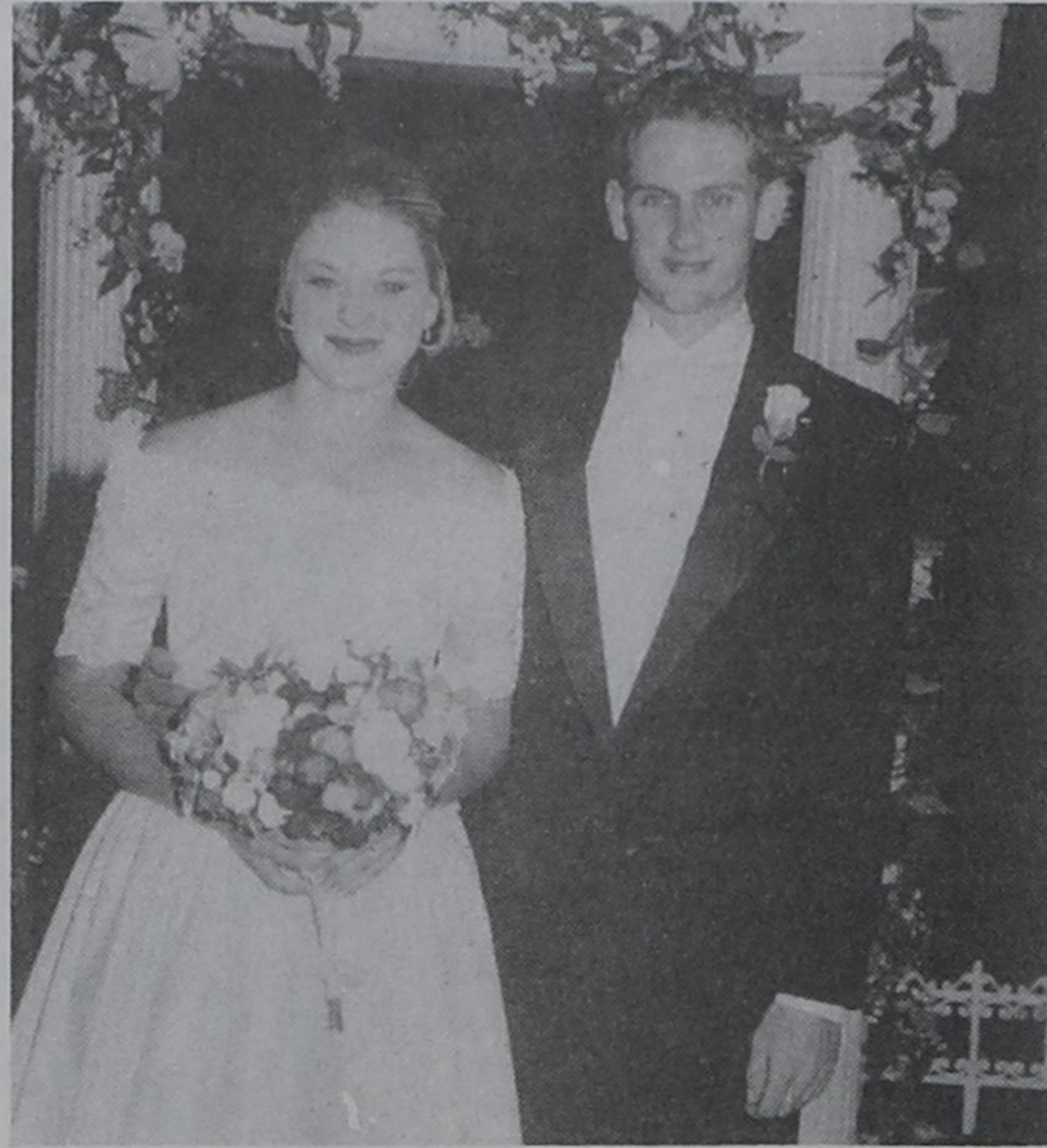

They can detect eye diseases and retinal disorders; systemic diseases like hypertension and diabetes; and vision conditions like nearsightedness and astigmatism. They prescribe glasses, contact lenses, vision therapy and medications for eye diseases. If you have a medical condition or need surgery, the optometrist can refer you to an ophthalmologist, who is licensed by a state regulatory board to practice medicine and surgery.



Opticians design, finish, fit and dispense eyeglasses and contact lenses based on an eye doctor's prescription. Which professional you see depends on your specific need. For a referral, check with family and friends, or telephone area professionals about your particular eye care requirements.

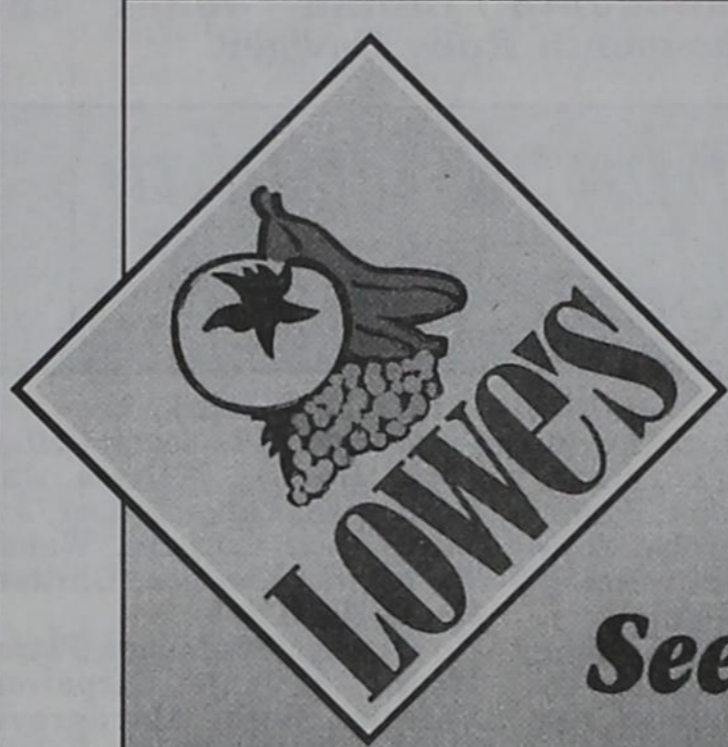

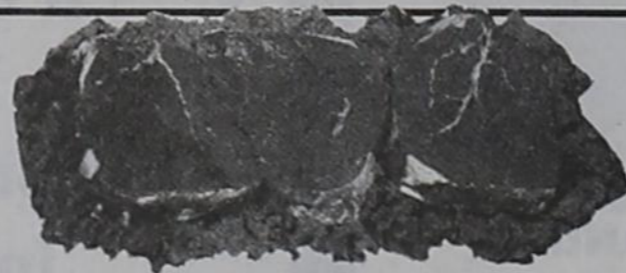
