## Top Citizen To Be Chosen

Baird's outstanding citizen will be named at the next regular meeting of the Baird Junior Chamber of Commerce. A committee composed of Claude Flores, Homer Driskill, R. L. Elliott and B. H. Freeland has been appointed to present names of persons to be selected by the club and make recommendations.

The Jay-Cees also voted to invite the West Texas Historical Association to hold its next regular meeting in Baird. The association conventions usually attract approximately a hundred persons from various parts of the state for the one-day meeting. Judge R. C. Crane of Sweetwater is the association's president. Will Jobe of Sweetwater presented the idea to the Jay-Cees when they met last Friday.

Street markers are in the making under guidance of the Jay-Cees. Realizing the need for the streets to be marked, the club will probably purchase the markers and request the city to place them at the proper street locations. This is one step toward getting mail delivery in the residential sections of Baird.

An election to fill some vacancies took place and Roy Gilbreath became first vice-president, Bill Young, second vice-president, Randall C. Jackson and Billie Mae Jobe directors, Bill Lofland presided.

## REGULATIONS ON PEDDLERS PASSED IN ABILENE

Some of the Abilene folks must have heard talk going around in Baird recently in regard to an ordinance to regulate peddlers. Abilene city council passed the regulation, and Baird is still talking the matter over. The ordinance at Abilene placed an assessment on itinerant merchants who move from town to town. The law also provides that anybody who wishes to canvass the town house-to-house by calling in person or telephone to sell wares shall make written application to the city tax-assessor-collector for a permit. The canvasser must post bond signed by a surety company. The ordinance does not apply to commercial travelers selling to dealers or sales agents in the usual course of business. In other words, Abilene is getting rid of a lot of trouble makers, cheap-skates, and deadbeats. Baird being situated on one of the largest highways across the nation, would do well to head off the throng of peddlers that work this city on an average of once or twice a week. Such stalls as the "Gypsy" fortune tellers that set up their business on the main street for the past two weeks could be regulated, or kept on moving down the road.

## ATTEND CONVENTION

Mr. and Mrs. Fred Heysler, Claude Flores, and Clyde White were delegates from Eugene Belle Post No. 82 attending the 17th district convention of American Legion and American Legion Auxiliary held at Stephenville February 15 and 16. Six hundred members attended the convention, with 28 posts out of 32 present. Fifteen hundred danced to the music of a fourteen-piece band Saturday night, and two thousand were served barbecue at noon Sunday.

## March 5 Deadline For City Candidates

Persons wishing to be candidates in the city election to be held Tuesday, April 1, have until March 5 at 5 p. m. to file their names with the city secretary. Names of candidates submitted to be printed on the election ballot must be accompanied by a petition with 5 per cent of the number of voters in the city election a year ago. There were 162 votes cast in last election.

Offices to be filled in the election are three alderman. The terms of E. L. Woodley, C. W. Sutphen and W. L. Ray are expiring.

The state law on city elections holds that candidates' names must be submitted to the City Clerk or Secretary at least 30 days before election day. The city secretary has a mandatory duty to have ballots printed not later than 20 days before election day so that absentee voting may commence 20 days before election day.

If no primary election is held, which is true in Baird's election, the only remaining method in which candidates may get their names on the ballot is for them to file as independent candidates. Independent candidates' names are filed through nomination petitions signed by legally qualified voters equal in number to five per cent of the votes cast in the last general city election.

Gibson was inducted into the Army February 21, 1946, and after eight weeks basic training at Fort McClellan, Ala., was shipped overseas in June, 1946.

He was assigned to the Public Relations Section of the Eighth Army's Headquarters. There he writes news stories for release to Pacific Stars and Stripes and to newspapers and radio stations throughout the United States. The Texas boy also handles long-distance telephone calls from other Public Relations Offices scattered throughout Japan.

Gibson has probably done more than any other G. I. to advertise Texas and Nocona to the Japs and his less fortunate buddies from other parts of the country."

## A PLEASANT VISIT

The Star editor and wife left Baird Saturday after working hours and took a trip, returning Sunday night. We told Aunt Lettie Shackelford that she could play mama and papa both and left her in charge of Carlie Sue, Jack and Dolores while we took time out to play. We headed our '37 Chevy east and our first stop was at Putnam where we visited with the folks on the street a few minutes, then on to Eastland, Carbon and Gorman. We peeked in at newspaper plants in every town and at Gorman our friend, Gene Baker, was still on the job that Saturday when dark found him. We will say that his shop is one of the cleanest, best equipped of any we saw for the size town. His wife operates a baby's dress shop next door to the printing office, and makes the little things by hand. We enjoyed a look-in on the work shops of these enthusiastic young people. We had some difficulty seeing through the windows of some of the print shops, for there was evidence that they had been so busy that they had found no time to wash their windows. DeLeon was reached and there we spent the night in the Travelers Hotel. This must be the neatest spot in the town and the hospitality was super.

On to Dublin, Hico, Meridian and Clifton. Now that is the thriest little city we visited. Arriving about church time we attended services at the Church of Christ and heard a good sermon and met some fine people there. At the noon hour we went to Charley's Cafe where we had one of the best turkey dinners we have eaten in a long time for only 60c each. The home of the Clifton Record was just across the street and it literally glittered like a diamond in the sun it was so clean. The plant is small, but evidently the folks who operate the paper have good taste and plenty of ambition.

That afternoon we reached our destination — the Chas. M. Isenhower ranch, six miles on down the Bosque river from Clifton. The Isenhowers were not expecting us, so we did not make it there until after lunch on purpose. They had settled back in easy chairs, C. M.'s wife and little Wanda Jean, to spend the Sunday afternoon reading and resting. Well, we fixed that. We made them take us all over the ranch, and we'll say it is one of the best in that section. The lands in the ranch start high on the rolling hill country and run to the Bosque river, with permanent springs, creeks and waterfalls. Various types of grass and many kinds of trees grow over the land, and low in the Bosque valley, wide black fields are spread out as level as a floor. Looking down from a bluff into the clear waters of the Bosque, we could see fish in large numbers playing and feeding at the bottom of the deep places. Huge burr oaks lined the river banks, a spot where a fellow could really rest in the shade on a summer's day. Late in the afternoon we turned homeward, reaching home about 10 p. m. with a pleasant trip and a pleasant visit with good friends to linger in our thoughts.

## DIRECTOR OF INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT APPOINTED

J. A. McCaul, Fort Worth, has been appointed to the newly-created position of Director of Industrial Development for the Texas and Pacific Railway Company. It was announced today by W. G. Vollmer, president of the Texas and Pacific. McCaul will assume his new duties on March 1st.

He joined the Texas and Pacific as a clerk on the Fort Worth Division in February, 1918. From early in 1921 until June, 1938, he served as general agent or traveling freight agent in Paris, Oklahoma City, Amarillo and Fort Worth. On July 1, 1938, he was granted a leave of absence to become general manager of the Texas and Pacific Terminal Warehouse Company in Fort Worth, the position he held until his appointment announced today.

"Our railroad created the position to which Mr. McCaul has been appointed in order to take an even more active part in the fast-growing industrial development of Texas and the Southwest," Vollmer explained. "Mr. McCaul will coordinate our railroad's activities in bringing new industries into the territory, and will continue our policy of working with and assisting in every way possible the establishment of new industries or the expansion of present facilities by Texas, Louisiana and other Southwestern firms." Texas and Pacific chief executive continued.

McCaul will make his headquarters in the general offices of the Texas and Pacific in Dallas.

## Price of School Lunches Advanced

A. H. Pritchard, superintendent of Baird schools, has been recently notified that Federal reimbursement on school lunches will be discontinued March 1st, because of lack of funds.

The report that the lunch room would close is erroneous, but it will be necessary to boost the price of lunch from 15c to 20c.

Baird school children have been benefitting from the very low cost of 15c all of this year, and with the 7c reimbursement it has been possible to serve a very good hot meal. However, we will not be able to purchase food and pay the workers on the 15c rate. Hence the raise to 20c.

We are all hopeful that an additional appropriation will be made so that the increase in the cost of lunches to students will not be necessary. Our representatives, both State and National, have been contacted by school officials urging that such a measure be supported by them.

The lunch room has been operated at the unusually low rate during the past because there has been an average of 310 meals served daily.

### CIVIL SERVICE EXAMS

A civil service examination was announced today for Correctional Officer according to a statement made by the Executive Secretary, Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, Federal Correctional Institution, Seagoville, Texas. The salary for this position which will be filled in the Federal Correctional Institutions at Dallas, El Paso and Texarkana, Texas, is \$2,694.96 per year.

A written test is required for this examination. Competition in this examination is restricted to persons entitled to military preference. Non-veterans now serving under appointments not limited to one year or less in the position of Correctional Officer may also apply in order to be considered for a classified civil service status. Applicants must have reached their twenty-first birthday but must not have passed their forty-fifth birthday. Because of the arduous duties and the strenuous training connected with these positions, these age limits will not be waived in any case.

### County Women Ask For Home Agent

Mrs. A. L. Barnes, Mrs. R. A. Farmer, Mrs. George Crook, Mrs. Grayson Miller and Mrs. N. H. Stephenson represented the Eula Home Demonstration Club Monday afternoon, when members of the clubs all over the county met with the Commissioners Court for the presentation of the quarterly report of the work of the clubs in the county. They also requested a raise in the salary of the Home Demonstration Agent. The club women of this county seek this raise in salary, so that Callahan County will not have to be the proving ground for agents assigned to the county in the near future.

It isn't that home demonstration women object to the fact that we have to break in a new hand each time (which has been the case in five times out of seven.) It is the fact that after they learn the nature of the work, after a year's experience they can get a job most anywhere at higher pay, and they do it. Callahan County is the lowest salaried county for home demonstration agents in this district. The last census taken of this county there were over eleven thousand residents in the county. Most of these people are farm and ranch people; that within itself justifies the need of someone capable of leading and training the people of our county in better farm and homemaking practices.

Home Demonstration work enlarges the knowledges of the people in common things and thus lays the foundation of common sense. It is not an elaborate program. Some of the main principles of our work is to teach thriftiness and to ever be alert to the new and proven methods of farming and home making, so that the farmer and his family can raise and produce food and raw materials enough for themselves and some for the use of others, whose living comes directly, or indirectly from the farm or ranch products.

Our greatest need is a wider knowledge of common things, a teacher who will really enter into country life and seize the opportunity of developing the resources of our county, of increasing the yield of our crops, improving landscapes and general appearances of the farm and its buildings, brightening the homes and having never ending source of helpful information. It has been said that there are communities where not to be dyseptic was to be out of fashion. If we could have some lessons on how to live royally on a little; how to nourish the body without poisoning the stomach; and how to balance a ration for economic and healthful results, there would be a hopeful gain in lessening the number of bankrupts by the kitchen route.

### County Agriculture Agent's Column

By A. R. Grote, Jr.

#### LET'S GET THE MOST FROM OUR GARDENS

For those who are looking forward to getting those fresh vegetables from home gardens will be interested in fertilizers and varieties.

After you have selected your garden site and prepared your ground, how are you going to get the most from it? Use fertilizers and select proper varieties.

What kind of fertilizers are you going to use? Barnyard fertilizer will show results at 50 pounds per 100 sq. feet of area and commercial fertilizer 4-12-4 is good for vegetable production. Commercial fertilizers may be sown broadcast and thoroughly harrowed or raked into the upper 3 or 4 inches of soil. When the fertilizer is used in drills beneath the rows, it should be placed about 2 inches to one side and slightly below where the seeds are to be planted. Apply 3 to 6 pounds per 100 feet of row and mix it with the soil a week or 10 days before planting the seed, or you may dissolve 1 pound of 4-12-4 commercial fertilizer in five gallons of water. Place about a pint of this "starter solution" around each plant. It will take about 5 to 10 gallons for 100 feet of row.

Here are some of the varieties of vegetables suitable for our county with approximate planting dates: Mary Washington Asparagus, Feb. 15-22; Chas. Wakefield cabbage, Feb. 22-March 1; Grand Rapids leaf lettuce and New York No. 12 head lettuce, Feb. 15-22; Bermuda or Sweet Spanish onion sets, Feb. 15-22; Everbearing English peas or Lexington Progress from Feb. 15-22. Other vegetables suitable to plant after Feb. 15 are: potatoes and spinach; those suitable to plant between Feb. 22 to March 1 are: beets, mustard, parsley, and radishes, and those to plant after the frost free date of March 15 are: beans, sweet corn, squash, tomato plants, and from 2 to 6 weeks after frost plant snap beans, cucumbers, field peas, okra, peppers, and sweet potatoes.

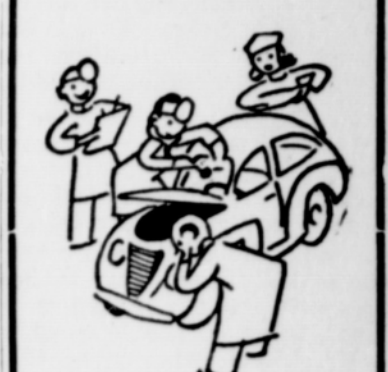

## SPENDABLE FUNDS MEAN PROSPERITY

Representative Albert J. Engel, of Michigan, in a recent speech in the House of Representatives, advocating an increase in the tax exemptions of low-income groups, declared:

"There are many people in both the Republican and Democratic parties, in fact, I believe they constitute a majority of both parties, who believe that if you will only give tax relief to the man on top, the benefits will trickle or percolate down to the little fellow below. This is based upon the theory that by creating new investment capital, the workers will obtain jobs."

Mr. Engel says that he cannot "agree fully with this theory of government." He says, "The depression of 1929-1940 should satisfy the most skeptical that those benefits do not adequately trickle or percolate down to the little fellow below." He then states his theory, that to have permanent prosperity, the purchasing power of the great mass of people must be increased.

Mr. Engel, who urged that tax exemptions of low-income groups be increased in

1945 and in 1946, says that figures from the Treasury Department show, in 1944, 53,230,000 individuals with incomes of \$2,500 or under. Since 32,630,000 of these persons were heads of families, the supposition is that at least 85,860,000 people, or sixty-one per cent of the population, depend on individual or family incomes of \$2,500 a year, or under.

The Michigan legislator points out that if the spending money of this group is increased, the man above is bound to obtain his share of the profit. Certainly, the low-income group is anxious to increase its standard of living and, usually, it does so whenever spendable funds become available.

We thoroughly agree with Mr. Engel in his contention that a reduction in income taxes, if extended equally to all income groups, would not result in increasing the purchasing power of the people as much as if the reduction applied to those in the low income group. Along this line, we call attention to his statement, in 1946, on the floor of the House:

"Taking money we call taxes from the low income groups, which should be spent for bread, for butter, milk and food to fill the stomachs of hungry children, will not avert inflation. Such a policy can only bring about suffering, crime, immorality and poor citizenship. No policy of making every one pay to tax to make people tax-conscious can be justified when the tax dollar collected forces the living standard of the taxpayer below a decent level."

## SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS

District Supervisors for the Lower Clear Fork of the Brazos Soil Conservation District in their regular monthly meeting last week at Albany compiled annual report for the District for 1946.

A great deal of interest was taken by farmers and ranchers cooperating in the District program in seeding winter legumes cover crops, especially Vetch, which was mostly due to the success of vetch seed harvest in the District the past summer. This year District cooperators have planted 1297 acres compared to 300 planted the year before. 25,000 pounds of vetch and rye were harvested the past year by farmers near Moran, Harpersville and Baird. All of this seed has been retained for local use and an additional 10,000 pounds was purchased by the AAA office at Breckenridge and distributed to farmers.

The District Board purchased a drill with fertilizer attachment which is being leased to cooperators. Two additional drills, privately owned, were used and have been a big help in getting fertilizer put down with the vetch. Austrian Winter Peas, Dixie Wonder Peas, Hubam Clover, Madrid Clover, are also being tried and probably will be successful as a soil improving crop as well as for limited grazing.

1090 acres of contour planting have been added by farmers and ranchers; crop residue management or stubble mulching, a rather new method of tillage leaving stubble or straw on or near the surface of the ground, is steadily increasing. Some 12,474 acres were stubble mulched. New improved stubble mulch plows are being brought into the District by farmers and ranchers. 20 miles and 21,470 linear feet of Diversion Terraces were built this year. The District Board believes more terracing will be done this year. Machinery to build terraces has not been available. Most of the terraces were built by ordinary farm machinery. District Board has helped by making a whirlwind terracer available to farmers.

Ranch conservation program in the District has shown much increase over previous year. To date, there are 122,520 acres of ranch land properly stocked. Ranch grass stands are improving, resulting in better ground cover, thereby increasing intake of water. 30 stock tanks were built for better distribution of grazing. A considerable acreage of mesquite was treated during 1946, mostly by applying kerosene at the base of trees. Additional acreage was removed by

bulldozers. One of the largest problems in the District is the eradication of mesquite from range land.

The District Board of Supervisors have requested and received additional technical assistance from the Soil Conservation Service. Two new work units were set up, one at Breckenridge and one at Baird. These two units, together with the Albany unit, will greatly facilitate the soil conservation program in this district. The District Board of Supervisors for the Lower Clear Fork of the Brazos District are: J. H. Nail, Albany, Chairman; C. M. Gay, Moran, Vice-Chairman; N. M. George, Baird; J. R. Smith, Breckenridge; and Albert Gentry of Harpersville.

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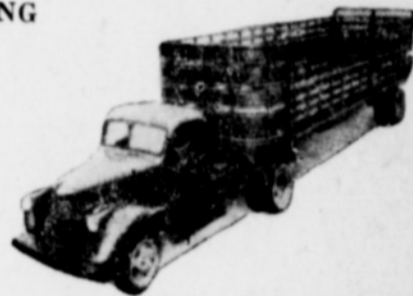

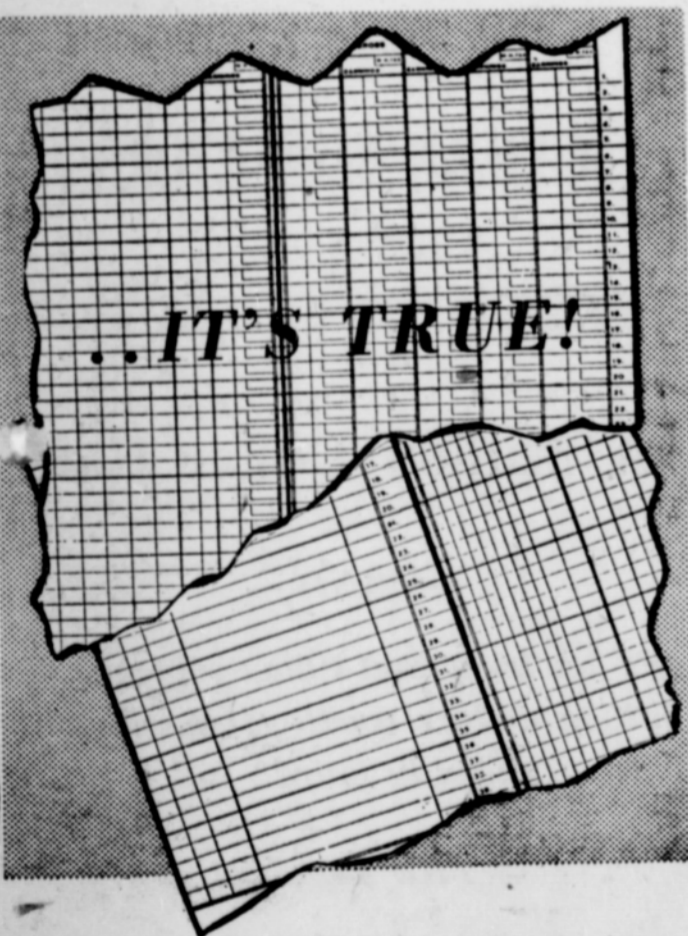
