

## <u>}</u> An Open Letter To Omar Burkett

If I had known in advance what an irresponin this campaign for State Representative, I answer them all—that I have no axes to grind would probably have notice of the office of would probably have naver entered it. However, Mr. Burkett, I am in it now and intend to see it through to the very end-until the very last vote is counted. And if I am honored by the people of this District with a seat in the State Legislature, I will devote my efforts to service-first, to the people of this District in particular; and, second, to the people of the State of Texas in generalto the end of making our State a better place in which to live. I will not grind my own axes and use my position to fight my personal feuds at the expense of my constituents.

I have never understood your purpose in circulating copies of my service I was no highly decorated war hero-but I went when they called me, made the army a hand while they wanted me and came home with an honorable discharge when they released me. How can you blacken me with that? I am proud of my service record.

And then you have circulated some statements from some clerks in Austin tending to brand me as a slacker in my duties as an employee of the Legislature. 




