MUCH HAS BEEN SAID about the current political campaigns, and their emphasis on negativism, or mud-slinging, rather than the positive approach, where each candidate runs on his own merits.

According to all that we read and hear from the news media, it seems that the new style of politics leans toward this type of campaigning—not just in Texas, but nationwide.

"If your opponent engages in mud-slinging, and you don't answer the charge, and make a little counter-offensive, then it is assumed by those voters who heard the original charge that it was correct," said one political observer.

The current governor's campaign in Texas, then, is right in step with the times. We can't remember another campaign which was so full of attacks and counter-attacks.

Ye editor watched with interest the televised debate between incumbent Governor Mark White, and challenger, former governor Bill Clements.

The debate turned out just to be a televised forum for each candidate to launch attacks against the other. Those in charge of the debate, including the members of the press who were asking questions of each one, tried their best to get each candidate to answer with positive statements, telling what he would do to correct certain factions of government, but they just could not stem the tide.

For the life of me, I can't remember a single positive statement from the confrontation. It was filled mostly with remarks such as "You'll recall that when my opponent was in office, this is what he did..." or "Governor White has allowed the state's finances to go completely to pot."

Clements has used the present state of the economy to level many charges against White, and also has attacked the governor's early prisoner release policy, which has led to a number of present crimes.

White comes back and says that he was having to continue programs started by Clements while he was in office.

Young voters may be completely turned off by this type of campaign. Our son Stan, for example, who is a college student, says after hearing the debate and the various political commercials, that he doesn't believe he will vote for either candidate.

Governor White has made a lot of enemies in the school and teaching field, due to the implementation of House Bill 72 and all of its ramifications, including the TECAT test. When he was first elected, TSTA, the state's teacher organization, was one of White's biggest supporters, but not this time around.

It will be an interesting race, and one that may not be decided until a late hour on election night. It's just a shame that the candidates haven't held up a little more positive material about themselves to help woo the voters.

IN THE RACE FOR the U.S. Congressional seat, this has been a rather low-key race, with challenger Gerald McCathern of Hereford trying to unseat Larry Combest.

McCathern is one of several farmers across the farm belt who have decided that if agriculture gets a fair shake in congress, then there are going to have to be some candidates from the farm step forward and offer themselves to the voters.

Unfortunately for McCathern, there are large metropolitan areas in the district, who even though their economy is affected by the farming district, may not realize it on election day. Hopefully, his neighbors in this area will give McCathern a good turnout of votes. We agree that his campaign is the best way to turn attention to the plight of farmers.

Lamesa Resident Wins Grid Contest

Trimm's misses were Perryton-River Road, Alabama-Penn State, Buffalo-New England and Seattle-Denver.

White missed Dimmitt-Floydada, Perryton-River Road, Memphis-Canadian, Cincinnati-Pittsburgh and Minnesota-Cleveland.

Castillo's misses were Perryton-River Road, Memphis-Canadian, Stanford-Southern Cal, Cincinnati-Pittsburgh and the Giants-Redskins.

With his score of 18, Fleming added a point to his lead. After eight weeks, Fleming has a score of 135. Vicky Moss is in second place with a score of 133. Phillip Johnson is third with a score of 132, followed by Danny Stevens, with a score of 131.

Jim Beard, Jo Blackwell and Jack Clark are in a three-way tie for fifth place with 130s. Scores of all leading contestants may be found elsewhere in this issue.

Contestants are vying for the grand prize of \$100, to be awarded at the close of the 13-week contest period.

General Election Slated On Tuesday

Area voters will go to the polls Tuesday, November 4 in the general election voting, to elect a governor and congressman, along with a number of other state and local officials.

Voting will be from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. Polling places and judges are as follows:

Friona 2: Fire Station, Linda Black, judge; Friona 2-1: Calvary Baptist Church, Valoris Osborn, judge; Friona 2-2: Friona Community Center, Danny Kendrick, judge; Black: Tri-County Elevator, Martha Hamilton, judge; Rhea: Community Center, Raymond Schueler, judge; Lakeview: Dee Willard residence, Connie Willard, judge; and Lazbuddie: School, Marvin Mimms, judge.

Friday morning, County Clerk Bonnie Warren said there had been 70 or 75 absentee ballots cast, which she termed a "fair turnout."

The governor's race has been the race of most interest to voters, with former governor Bill Clements challenging incumbent Mark White. Theresa Doyle, a Libertarian candidate, will no doubt get a few votes statewide.

In this area, the race for U.S. Representative should also draw a lot of interest. Republican incumbent Larry Combest is opposed by Democrat Gerald McCathern of Hereford.

For a change, the Republicans have fielded candidates for most of the state offices, with the exception of State Comptroller, where Bob

Bullock is up for re-election, and State Treasurer, where Ann Richards is unopposed.

However, none of the state offices have generated the interest of the governor's race, where for the first time in generations a former governor is trying to unseat the incumbent. Most political

observers expect the race to be a close one, with Clements expecting to get the edge in this area.

There are four proposed constitutional amendments on the ballot.

A sample ballot is being printed in this issue for the convenience of voters.

Work To Begin On New Church Bldg.

Calvary Baptist Church announces the plans to build a new sanctuary building at their present location at Fifteenth and Cleveland. Groundbreaking was held Sunday, October 26, initiating the start of the project.

Construction will begin in the first week of November and should be completed in March.

The sanctuary will seat 300 in the auditorium with a sloped floor to allow excellent visual contact with the pulpit and baptistry. The

pulpit and choir loft are elevated above the main auditorium floor for visual as well as acoustical response.

The central attraction is the baptistry with a glass front above the choir loft and a six foot by twelve foot crimson red cross encased in a leaded art colored glass window behind the baptistry. This window is backlighted during evening services to accent its beauty.

The front lobby will be a fellowship meeting area for members with six foot by ten foot windows and double ten foot tall doors. The lobby doubles as an auditorium overflow with windows into the auditorium and a sound system to bring the speaker's message to you.

Harvest Is Aided By Open Week

Area farmers have been favored with a week of warm, dry weather, which has helped them proceed with their harvest operations.

Temperatures have been at or above the 70-degree mark for highs every day the past week, and skies have been clear. Both Thursday and Friday mornings started off with fog in the local area, which later burned off.

But residents were warned that the nice "Indian Summer" weather is about to be interrupted by a cold front expected to push into the area Friday night or Saturday, bringing lower temperatures and the threat of rain.

"We hope to see everyone there on election day," said a spokesperson for the organization.

Chiefs To Visit 'Winds

The Friona High School Chieftains will close out their regular season next Friday when they travel to Floydada.

The Chieftains, trying to remain in the thick of the playoff picture, must get past the Whirlwinds in order to do so.

And Floydada has had a "second half spurt." The Whirlwinds were 2-1, 4-3-1 going into their game at Littlefield on Friday. They have already drastically improved on their 1-9 record of last year.

If the Chieftains lose to Floydada, and Littlefield beat Tulia, that would create a three-way tie for second place, necessitating a coin flip for the second playoff spot.

The Whirlwinds are led by senior runningback Leif Younger (5-10, 180 pounds).

Quarterback Shannon Barbee, and backs Clay Lowrance and Hector Flores round out Floydada's experienced backfield.

Friona will be without linebacker Peter Malouf, who re-injured his knee in the Tulia game. Malouf was to undergo surgery on his damaged knee.

In district play, Floydada has defeated Muleshoe and Dimmitt. They lost to Tulia, and were playing Littlefield on Friday.

The two teams have met in football only ten times. Floydada holds a 7-3 lead in the series. Coach Tommy Moss is 1-0 in his only head-to-head meeting with the Whirlwinds.

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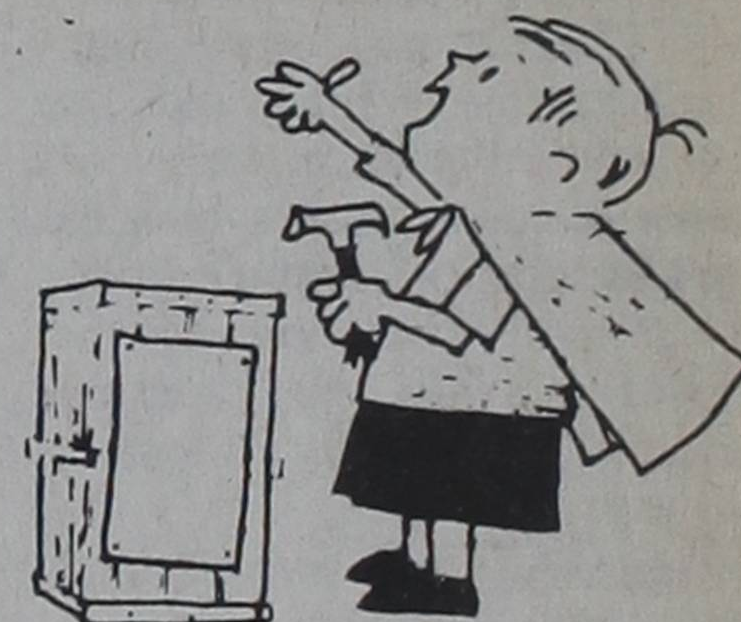
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Ex-Teacher's Rites Held In Denton

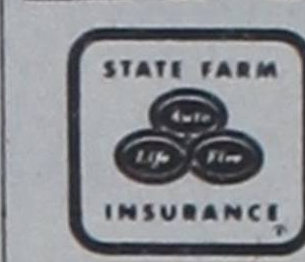
I hope my record as your congressman during the past two years is one that

Proposition Four has disguised branch banking as "full service banking" whatever they call it - Branch Banking is a bad idea for Texas, and Texans will end up footing the bill for the big Texas bank holding companies to get bigger.

You especially don't want this to happen now since the Texas Legislature just passed a law permitting the large banks of New York City to purchase some or all of the large Texas bank holding companies. Not only can this legally happen now, but is almost certain to take place in the immediate future.

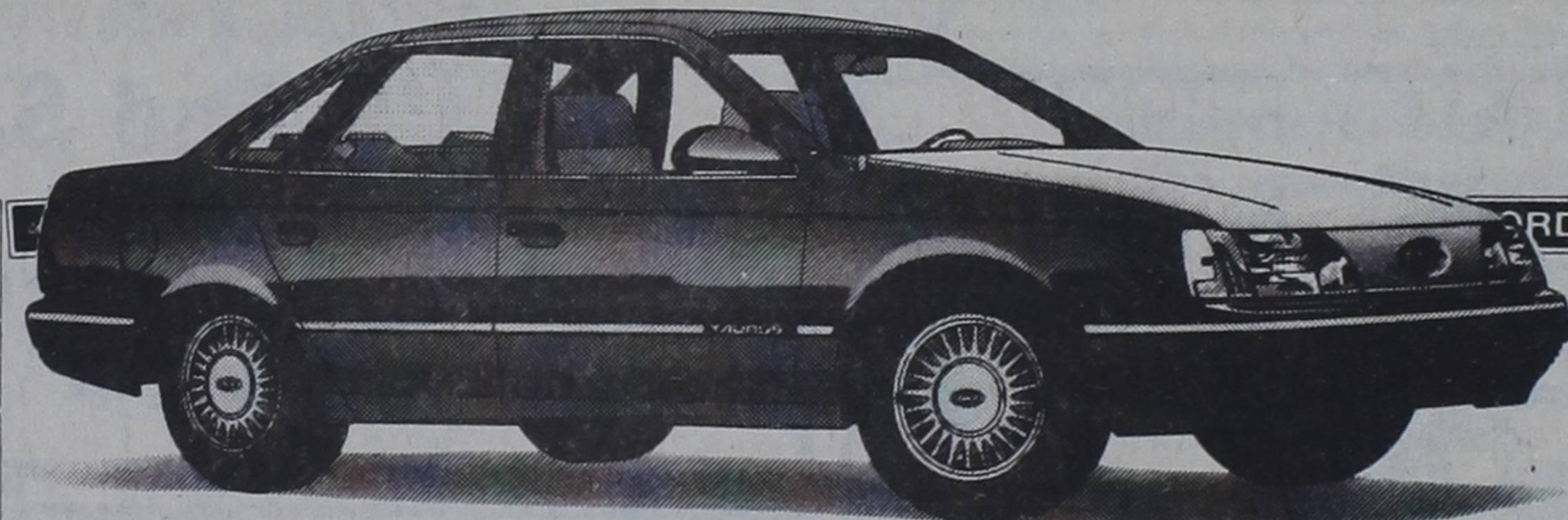

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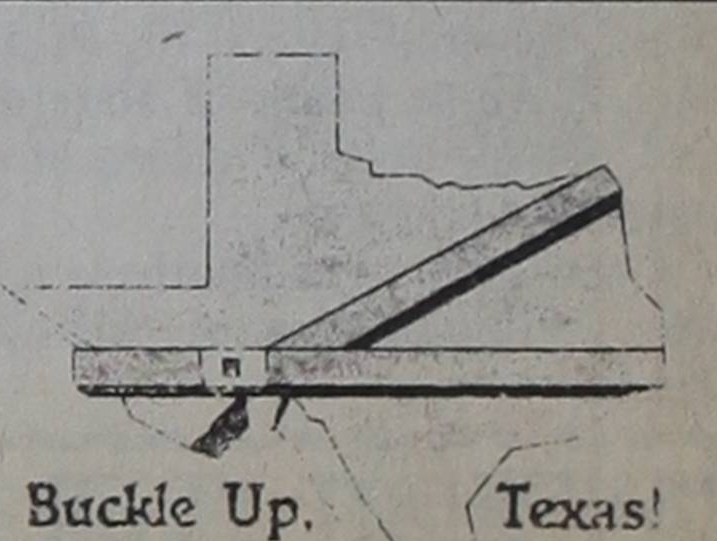
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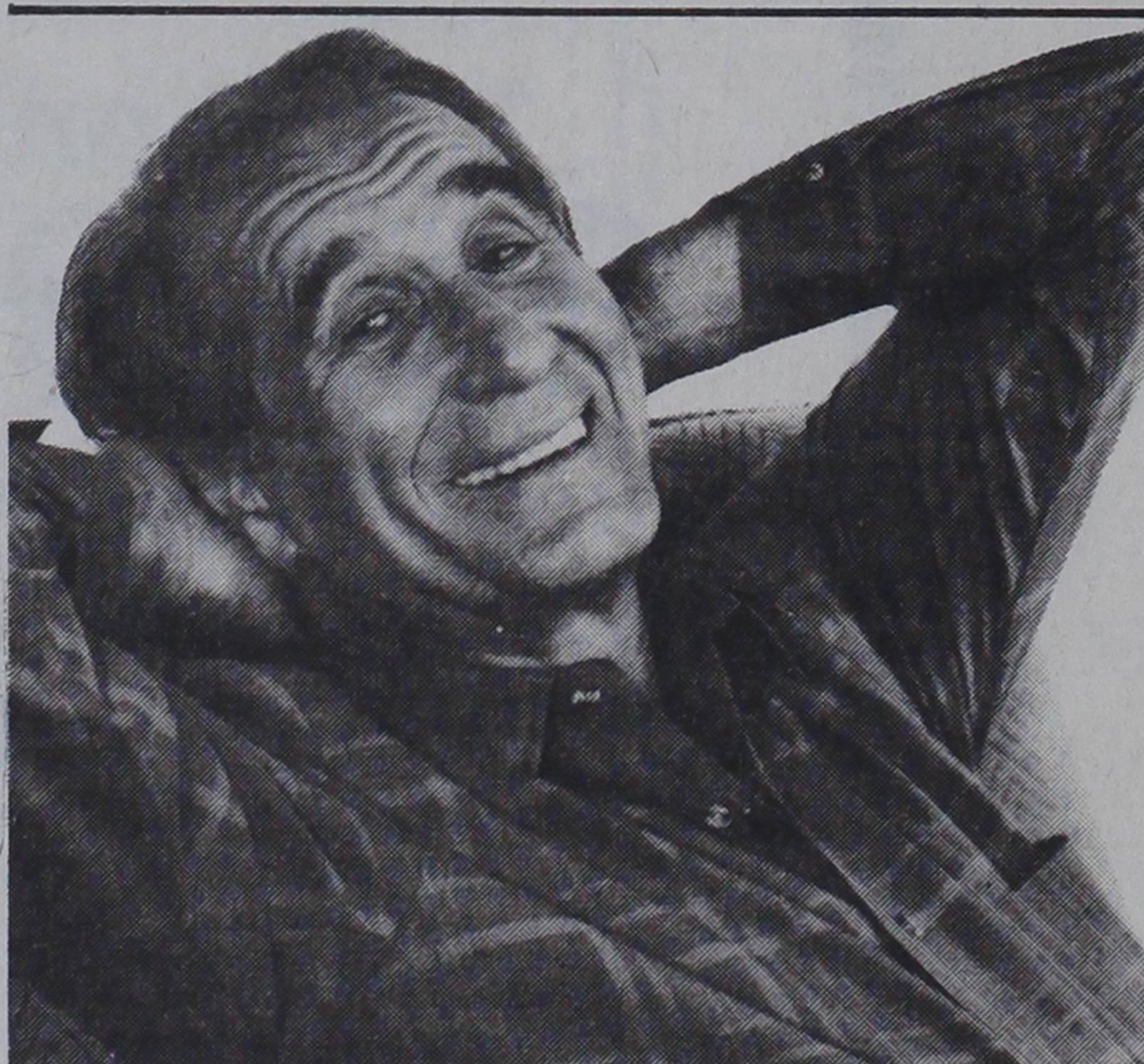

The loss left the team with a 1-7 season record. They were 0-3 in district play.

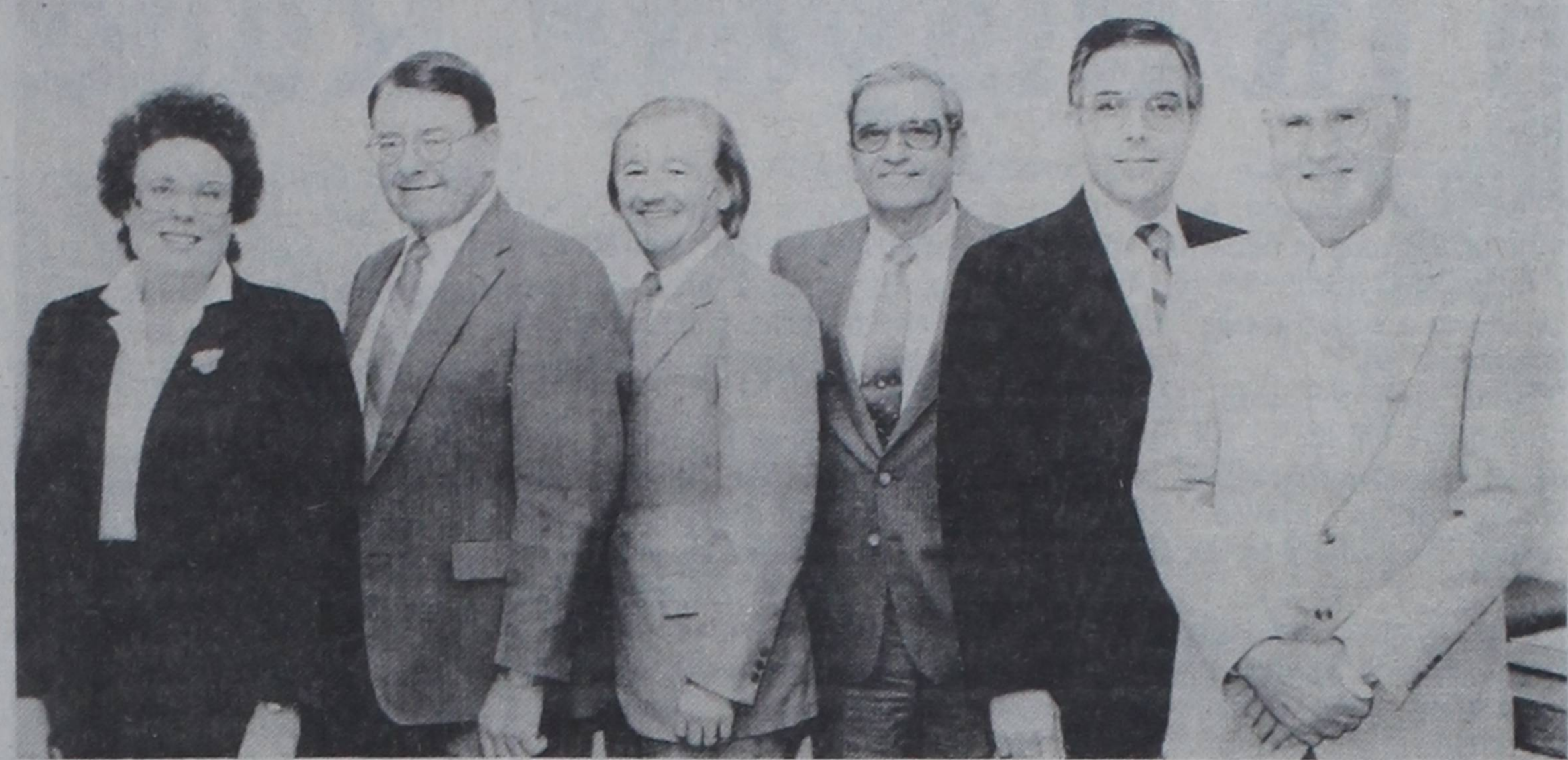
Freshmen Edge Tulia

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Chiefs Topple Tulia To Remain In Playoff Race

The Friona Chieftains scored one of their biggest football wins in history last Friday at Chieftain Field, upsetting the state-ranked Tulia Hornets, 28-21, and thrusting themselves back in the middle of the playoff picture.

The Chieftains stunned the state's 15th ranked team (Harris Rating System) with a pair of fourth-quarter touchdowns to take an eye-popping 28-7 lead, and then had to hang on for dear life as the Hornets' talented Todd Lacy threatened to overtake the Chieftains with his passing arm.

Finally, with 2:23 left in the game, Friona faced a fourth down, needing a yard, from their own 46-yard line. The Chieftains held their seven-point lead, but the fans had seen the Hornets score a pair of touchdowns in a two-minute span to wipe out Friona's 21-point lead.

Tulia took a time out to plot strategy. "We could tell they were going to go for the block if we punted. They have done that before. I told the kids 'It's your team, do you want to go for it?' and they all wanted to go for it," said Coach Tommy Moss.

While the Hornets deployed, expecting a punt, the Chieftains came out in running formation. Lonnie Phillips ran behind the block of Jeff Chaney, and made 15 yards up the right side, and that was the ball game. Friona was able to run out the clock and preserve

Moss Moves To Second For Wins

Friona's exciting 28-21 win over the Tulia Hornets made Coach Tommy Moss the second-winningest head coach in Friona High School's history.

The win gives Moss a record of 34-24-1 (.585 per cent) and moved him ahead of Don Light, who coached here from 1963-67, and finished with a 33-17-1 record (.658).

Bob Owen, who was head coach for seven years (1968-74), has the most all-time wins, 41.

The win over the Hornets also evened Moss' personal record against the tough Tulians at 3-3. That's the best an individual coach has done in more than one meeting against the Hornets.

Tulia leads the all-time series, 20-7, thanks to winning 14 out of 15 games in one stretch. The series dates back to 1933, but has a lot of gaps, including a 12-year hiatus from 1962 through 1973.

When the rivalry was resumed in 1974, Friona won, 6-0. Then, the Hornets went on the second of their seven-year win streaks against the Chiefs, before Moss' 1982 team scored a 16-7 win to halt the domination.

Moss' record might be 4-2 against Tulia, except that a come-from-behind effort at Chieftain Field by the 1984 team fell a point shy at 13-12. Both Todd Lacy and Steven Powell were starters as sophomores for Tulia in that 1984 game.

the pressure-packed win. "The kids showed a lot of character, bouncing back like they did (after the Littlefield loss). They just played a super game," Coach Moss remarked.

Friona won the coin toss but deferred the choice to the second half. It almost backfired when Tulia's speedy Steven Powell returned the kickoff to the Friona 48.

Tulia racked up three first downs, moving to the Friona 12, before their drive stalled. A 35-yard field goal attempt by the Hornet kicker fell short.

The Chieftains then made one of their most impressive drives of the season. They got an 11-yard run by Daniel Echols on the quarterback draw.

Phillips ran nine yards, and then Tulia was hit with a personal foul penalty when a Hornet tackler was called for spearing. That moved the ball to the Tulia 41. However, a holding penalty against Friona evened out the penalty yardage.

Phillips got loose on a sweep play to the right side and almost broke it all the way. He was stopped at the Tulia 14, after a nifty 31-yard gain.

From there, the Chieftains scored in seven plays. Phillips made a big run on a fourth and goal from the five, down to the Hornet one, and from there, big Jimmy Williams crashed over when Echols faked the ball to Phillips, giving Friona the lead.

Sam Montoya's kick made the score Friona 7, Tulia 0 with 1:19 left in the opening quarter.

Tulia made a pair of first downs, before a good defensive play by Chaney helped bring on their only punting situation of the game.

Friona only gained nine and punted back, with Montoya booming a 57-yarder from the Friona 15 to the Tulia 24.

The Hornets then put together a scoring drive capped when Powell scooted in from eight yards out with a pitchout. The score became 7-all with 3:55 left in the half.

The Chiefs were equal to the challenge. Echols made a first down out to the 38-yard line, and then Phillips darted 12 yards to the Tulia 40, as the clock wound down to 1:20 left in the half.

Echols gained 16 yards to the 22-yard line with 47 seconds left, setting up the score.

Phillips headed to the left. He was hit as he turned the corner, but managed to keep his balance, and then raced up the left sideline for the touchdown. Montoya's kick was perfect, and Friona regained the lead, 14-7 at the half. Only 27 seconds were on the clock when Phillips crossed the goal-line.

The Chiefs ran three yards and punted after the second half kickoff.

Tulia then controlled the ball for more than eight minutes in a 21-play drive that went from their own 34 to the Chiefs' four.

Rod Britting made a stellar defensive play against a Hornet receiver on a third down play from the Friona 14, but on fourth down the officials called pass interference, giving Tulia the ball and four new downs at the

Chieftains' four. Friona refused to give in. Two passes fell incomplete. Powell was stopped for a yard loss, and on fourth down, John Cass wrapped up Merwyn Parker for a loss and Friona took over.

The Chiefs couldn't move, and again Montoya had to punt the team out from the shadows of their own goal post, with a 46-yard kick.

The next time Friona had the ball, however, they made it count. The team got another break when the officials again flagged the Hornets for a personal foul.

Phillips made a first down to the Hornet 38. Then Williams got the call. He was hit at the line of scrimmage, but bounced off the tackler and found himself in the Tulia secondary. Williams outraced his defenders to the goal-line, and suddenly Friona had a 21-7 lead with 9:43 left in the game.

Lacey cranked up his passing arm, completing two in a row for 14 and 11 yards.

At this point, sophomore Paul Trimmell darted in front of Tulia's intended receiver and picked off a pass at the Friona 20-yard line, running it back 26 yards to the Friona 46.

Lacey, who has completed 72 of 133 passes this season for a whopping 1104 yards, had suffered only three other interceptions in his eight games this season.

Phillips gave the team a first down to the Tulia 43. Echols dropped back as if to pass, found the Hornet defense spread out, and sprinted up the middle, 43 yards untouched. Montoya again split the uprights, and Tulia had a right to feel shell-shocked, as they trailed, 28-7 with just 6:29 left in the game.

But the Hornets didn't roll over and play dead.

Lacey hit Trampus Goodwin on a 52-yard pass play (the pass was in the air for almost 70 yards), down to the Friona three. Powell ran it in for the TD. Tulia elected to go for two points, but Powell was stopped behind the line. The game was now 28-13, with 5:36 left on the clock.

Tulia went for the onside kick and it worked like a charm, when Brent Riethmayer couldn't corral the line-drive, sideways kick.

Ten plays later the Hornets once again were in the end zone with Powell getting the score. Lacey tossed a two-pointer to Todd Barbour, and the score became 28-21 with 3:36 to play.

The scoring drive had used exactly two minutes, and it didn't take a mathematics genius to realize that Tulia still had plenty of time to catch up and maybe win the game.

This time the attempted onside kick went out of bounds, and Friona had the ball at their own 37.

Phillips gained three, five and one, and this brought up the fourth down and one situation for the Chiefs at their own 46, when Friona fooled the Hornets and ran for a big first down to keep the ball.

"We didn't want them to have

the ball again," Moss explained. Lacey had proven that he could move his team rapidly in the two quick touchdown strikes.

After Phillips' run, the team moved to the Tulia 30, where they again had fourth and one. This time, Williams crashed for four yards, with just 30 seconds left on the clock, and that was the ball game.

The big-play Hornets had scored over 50 points in two of their previous games this season, and had beaten a pair of class 4A teams, Snyder and Frenship along the way. But although Tulia was able to gain a lot of yardage, the Chieftain defense, fifth best in the region, bent but did not break.

The Chieftain offense came up with one of its better games, when they really needed it. Phillips tallied 137 yards on 19 carries. Williams gained 90 yards on 16 tries, and Echols had 88 yards on 14 attempts.

The Chiefs were three for three in going for yardage on fourth down plays in the game.

Moss had praise for the play of Jeff Chaney on both offense and defense, and said the return of linebacker Albert Trevino made a lot of difference. "He was in on a number of big plays," the Chieftain mentor said.

Moss added Shane Hand, John Cass and Will Eddins to his list for good games. "The offensive line controlled the line of scrimmage and enabled us to hang onto the football. When you're playing someone like Tulia, you don't want to have to throw the ball and stop the clock. You want it to keep running," he concluded.

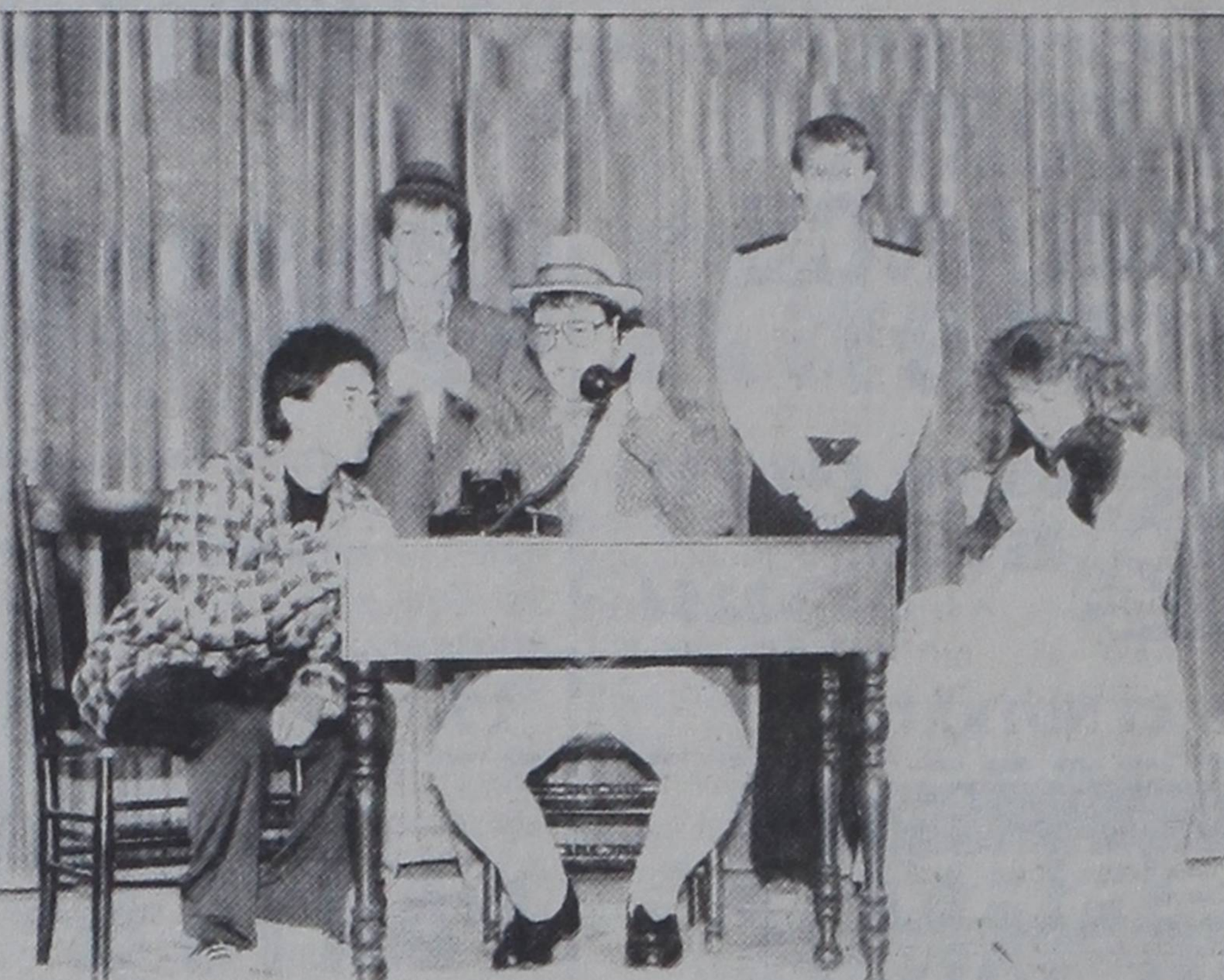
