ARE WE INVISIBLE here or what? Living in the middle of Parmer County is sort of like being in "no-man's land."

The fellow who checks our office machines once a year lives in Midland. He wanted to call us for an appointment the other day, but had lost our phone number. Since it costs a bunch now to call information for a phone number, he decided to hunt for us in the Lubbock regional "Feist" phone directory. Nope. It comes up to the northwest of Lubbock and takes in Lariat and Lazbuddie but not Bovina and Friona.

Then he tried the Amarillo area directory which only goes west as far as Hereford, Dimmitt and Summerfield. No Friona or Bovina!

Next he tried the Clovis/Portales area directory which takes in Farwell and Oklahoma Lane on the Texas side of the border, but no Friona and Bovina.

I didn't realize that we live in the middle of a desert wilderness, but if you're trying to find those of us in Friona, Bovina, Hub & Parmer without the benefit of the Muleshoe GTE phone book, you're out of luck.

Apparently, the South Plains doesn't want us and the Panhandle is reluctant to claim us.

Even mailing a letter from here gets to be quite an operation. If Gladys Spring in Bovina wanted to mail a birthday card to her daughter, Pam Kendrick, in Friona just 14 miles away, the card would travel on the mail truck right through Friona, on up to Amarillo and then back again... a 165 mile trip.

Here's one that's even worse than that. If Rose McCain, of HCR 1, Bovina, wanted to mail a birthday card to her neighbor Maxine Hart who lives about one mile down the road from her, it would take two or three days to make a trip of about 300 miles. Maxine is on a Farwell mail route. The card would leave Bovina, travel northeast to Amarillo, then south to Lubbock, then northwest back to Farwell.

Now, to top it all off, the clueless, amoeba-brained UIL people have placed Friona, Dimmitt and Muleshoe in a district which competes with Perryton. Good gosh! That's practically in Kansas! We've complained for years about our school kids having to compete in Dalhart, 117 miles to the north, which makes a round trip of 234 miles. Now we get to travel to Perryton, 192 miles to the northeast, in the farthest north-eastern tip-top edge of the entire state... a round trip of 384 miles. For the Muleshoe kids, that's a 442 mile round trip.

## OVER DIMMITT, 52-31

# Squaws' Impressive Win Propels Team To Playoffs

Friona High School's Squaws were riding a 7-1 district record, having won 11 of their previous 13 games, when they went to Dimmitt Tuesday.

Longtime Squaw basketball fans were holding their breath for the 1996 team, knowing that Friona's record at Kenneth Cleveland Fieldhouse has to be the school's worst anywhere.

Only twice in the past ten years had the Squaws scored a win at Dimmitt. The Chiefs haven't won there in 22 years.

And it looked for awhile there on Tuesday that this "jinx" might come back to haunt Friona, but it didn't. The Squaws turned in one of their better performances of the season in a 52-31 win, almost knocking the Bobbies out of the playoffs, while clinching their first district championship in nine years.

Both teams were somewhat tentative in the first half, as their defenses provided most of the action.

Mary Cass put Friona on the boards first, zapping a three-point basket a minute into the game, for a quick 3-0 lead. It was to be Friona's only points until the last minute of the quarter.

Fortunately, the Squaws' defense was holding the Bobbies, who struggled to take a 6-3 lead, hitting two baskets and only one of six free throws in the quarter.

Kristi Meyer's jump shot made it a 6-5 game with 40 seconds remaining in the quarter, and Amber Martin's long shot put Friona back into the lead at 7-6. As it turned out, the Squaws wouldn't be headed again, but there were some tense minutes ahead for the team.

Courtney Carthel was whistled for two quick fouls, in the first three minutes of play. Miss Carthel connected on a jump shot to open scoring in the second quarter, hiking Friona's lead to 9-6, and Miss Meyer was one of two at the line for a 10-6 lead.

However, the Squaws couldn't really get their offense rolling. Miss Carthel's follow shot brought a 13-8 score three minutes before halftime, and Britny White's free throw made it a 14-10 lead with 1:30 left.

It appeared that Friona might take this four-point lead to the locker room, when Dimmitt misfired on a shot in the last five seconds. But the ball was last touched by Friona, and Dimmitt got to throw it in with three seconds showing.

The Bobbies' playmaker, Carrie

Bradley, took the inbounds pass and got off a three-point attempt. The home crowd got to cheer, when the shot went in the basket. And Dimmitt was right back--trailing by just a point at 14-13 at the end of a low-scoring half.

The Bobbies, thanks to Friona being whistled for eight first-quarter fouls, were in the 1-1 free throw

shooting situation early-on, but managed to hit only six of 17 from the line in the half. Friona only got eight shots from the line, hitting three.

Britny White received her third foul with 1:15 left before halftime, and three other Squaws had two fouls each at the intermission.

## Squaws Will Face River Rd./ Eagles

The Squaws close out their regular season by hosting Muleshoe on Friday. Friona (23-6, 8-1) have clinched the district title in their last year in District 2-3A.

Friona will meet the winner of the River Road-Perryton game, being played at River Road Friday. Whoever wins will be the district's second playoff team behind Childress.

If Perryton should win, school officials are hoping for an Amarillo neutral site. If the Lady Wildcats win, a Canyon or Plainview site is the local choice.

The Squaws met River Road twice early in the season, winning 56-35 in the third game of the season, and 61-33 in the finals of the Friona Tournament. The Friona girls also beat Perryton, 44-32 in the second round of the Caprock tournament.

Coach Richard North said he really didn't have a preference of who his team plays in bi-district. Friona officials are leaning toward a Thursday, February 15 playoff date. The game will be played either on Thursday, Friday or Saturday.

## School Sets Legislative 'Ski Break' Committee Functions

The Friona Chamber of Commerce Legislative Affairs Committee held its first meeting of the year on Thursday, February 1. Committee members are Becky Riethmayer, chairman; B.K. Buske, Kitty Gallman, Clint Mears, Feller Hughs and Teena Hughs.

A primary goal of keeping the public aware of the workings of both local and county governmental agencies has been set by the committee. They plan to post an agenda of the County Commissioners Court semi-monthly meetings at the Chamber office before the meetings. This will enable the citizens of Friona to be more aware of their county government.

They plan to continue the voter information forums for all public offices. This will allow voters to meet and question the candidates prior to elections.

The Chamber of Commerce will continue its efforts to keep contact with state and federal officials and will continue to plan symposiums on government programs that directly affect Friona.

A major priority of the Legislative Affairs Committee will be encouraging the citizens of Friona to be more involved in, and aware of, the governmental decisions that affect each resident.

## City To Close Landfill Once Again

Following the June 2 tornado, the City of Friona was granted permission to open its landfill to receive tornado debris.

The city's landfill had been closed since the spring of 1994. Some tornado debris is still being brought in.

The Texas Natural Resource and Conservation Commission has given the city until April 1, 1996 to continue receiving debris.

After that date, the landfill will once again be closed to the public. The city urges all residents who will have any large amounts of trash or debris that will need to be hauled to the landfill to do so as soon as possible before the April 1 deadline.

## Cancer Center Sets Clinic February 21

The Women's Center of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Health Systems will again conduct a Breast Cancer Screening Clinic at Parmer County Hospital, 1307 Cleveland Avenue, on February 21.

Each participant at our screening will receive a breast exam and one-to-one instruction in breast self-examination by a Registered Nurse specially trained in breast cancer detection, and a mammogram by a mammography technician. Our program is certified by the FDA, American College of Radiology and the State Health Departments of Texas, Oklahoma and New Mexico.

Breast cancer affects one in eight women. The key to winning the battle against cancer is early detection by having an annual breast exam, mammogram and performing breast self-exam each month.

The American Cancer Society urges all women to have their first mammogram by age 40. Those who have a close relative with

breast cancer or other risk factors may be asked by their doctor to have a mammogram at an earlier age.

The total cost of the screening is \$70. Financial aid is available for breast screening and mammograms to individuals who qualify.

A few years back, when we lived in Tulsa, Reverend Gary Harber, pastor of the Trinity United Methodist Church, walked to the pulpit one Sunday morning and opened his sermon by asking, "What's wrong with our world?"

He held up the Sunday edition of the Tulsa World. "What's happened to our world?" he asked again and spent the next few minutes reading the headlines and excerpts from that Sunday paper.

I don't recall the specific events, but he recounted them after item of terror, atrocity, senseless crimes, and natural disasters that had made news that Sunday.

His theme, "something is wrong with our world", did not fall on deaf ears.

I often think of Reverend Harber's sermon. He has since left Tulsa, and the last I knew he was in Elk City, Oklahoma.

"What's wrong with our world?"

We live in an instant world now. Instant information, instant replay, drive-thru lanes, fast-foods,

frivolous lawsuits, and a general distrust of mankind.

When our U.S. troops arrived in Haiti a few years ago, the television cameras were on the beach when they landed. Instant war coverage.

Now we have troops in a place called Bosnia, where so-called civilized people have slaughtered thousands of innocent people and buried them in mass graves.

We are unearthing the bodies, but no one seems to have a reasonable explanation about why they were murdered.

During the World Wars, Korea, and Vietnam, thousands of American soldiers were killed, and are missing.

Yet today, one soldier dies in Bosnia, and we see the instant replay, interviews with the family, military leaders describing the circumstances.

Not to be disrespectful, but one soldier dies and it makes world news. Instantly. Wonder how that makes the families of the thousands of soldiers in other wars feel.

First, they said he stepped on a mine. Then they said he didn't. Now they say he was handling some live ammunition in an area that he was not supposed to be in. It was his own fault he got killed?

Somewhere the madness has to

stop. But will it? I don't think so.

Can we legislate morality? Not in your lifetime. Is there an answer to abortion? Never will be.

The United States cannot make the rest of the world over to be like the United States. Doesn't matter how many troops we send, how many places we go, or how few lives we lose.

We don't even do a very good job of handling things in the U. S. of A. We have taken a fairly simple life and made it so complex that no one can control it.

For instance, why will it take seven years to balance the federal budget? "Hello, Friona Bank. Just wanted to let you know that I should have my checkbook balanced in seven years."

Another downside to instant information--think what it would be like if Phil Gramm was elected President and we had to listen to his monotone twang for four years.

Then of course O.J. is at my house day and night trying to get someone to listen. He's talking, we're listening, but we're not buying it. Instant O.J.

I predict that, in fact, the federal budget will be balanced at about the same time O.J. finds the real killers.

In sparsely populated Farmer County, the atrocities in Bosnia,

and North Korea, and Thailand, are light years removed. Maybe that is good.

But we still should ponder the question Reverend Harber asked: "What's wrong with our world?"

We had some major vandalism at the high school a few days back. As Superintendent Hal Ratcliff told the Noon Lions Club, "I don't understand vandalism." Neither do I, Hal.

What is life to be like 25-50 years from now for our kids and grandkids? Will they be asking "what's wrong with our world?", or will they know.

Look into the eyes of a child and ask yourself "what's going to be wrong with their world?"

Does prayer work? Maybe. Consider this.

Jack Patterson says that ever since Texas got the lottery, his wife has been praying to win it. She prays to win every time they have the drawing, and has for several years.

Finally he told her that he knew she wanted to win, and that she was praying for it, but, "Honey", he said, "don't you think you would have a better chance if you bought a ticket?"

That's the way life in our world is. You can either pray about it, or buy a ticket and try to win it. Both wouldn't be bad.

# Squaws Savor Rare Win As Clincher...

Miss Carthel opened with a pair of free throws in the third quarter, and then hit a jump shot at the 6:15 mark to give Friona a 20-13 lead.

But Dimmitt's Amy Ethridge made a goal, and the Bobbies' full-court press forced Friona's ninth turnover. Jamie Stokes fouled Dimmitt's Josselet, and she made both shots to trim Friona's lead to 20-17 with 5:00 to go in the quarter.

Twenty seconds later, Miss Stokes received her fourth personal foul, and went to the bench.

Halfway through the quarter, with 4:04 on the clock, Britny White grabbed a rebound and put it back up for a goal.

The Bobbies turned the ball over, and junior sharp-shooter Amber Martin found her spot outside the circle, and nailed a three-point shot with 2:50 left in the quarter, giving Friona its longest lead of eight points, 25-17.

Dimmitt again couldn't score, and the Squaws raced back upcourt, where Miss White took her opportunity to sink a three-pointer, making the score 28-17, and Tammy Spencer made it nine points in three shots for Friona, with her own "trey" with 30 seconds left, and an eye-popping 31-17 Friona lead.

The Squaws had gone on an 11-point binge in just over three minutes, which included the three baskets from "bonus land." Friona had outscored the Bobbies, 17-4 in their big offensive quarter.

Amber Matthews of Dimmitt finally broke her team's scoreless spell with a pair of free throws off Kristi Meyer's third personal foul with seven minutes left in the game, for a 31-19 score.

But on Friona's next trip downcourt, Miss White launched another rainbow, that hit nothing but net, giving the Squaws a 34-19 edge (15 points).

A three-point "splurge" by Dimmitt's Bradley (a basket plus a free throw) may have given Dimmitt hope in a 34-22 score at the 5:20 mark, but Miss Meyer answered with a pair from the line for a 36-22 score.

In the last four minutes, the Squaws were able to work the ball, wait for Dimmitt to foul, and collect at the line. Friona hit nine of their last ten attempts from the free throw line to make the final margin the biggest over the Bobbies in their own court in recent history.

In the last 1:20 of play, Julie Goddard, Heather Martin and Mary Cass were all two for two on foul shots, and Miss Carthel was three

of four. The Squaws were 15 of 19 on foul-shooting in the final quarter.

We asked Coach Richard North if he told his players anything special at halftime. Did you change your strategy, or make any particular adjustments?

"No, we just told the girls to go back and do what they had done all season to win. We did tell them to watch for their perimeter shots (such as the three-pointers), as Dimmitt seemed to be sagging on our inside players," North said.

It worked like a charm. While the Squaws had hit only 25 per cent of their shots in the first half (five of 20), they improved to 40 per cent in the second half (nine of 42, including five of 14 three-pointers).

The Squaws' swarming defense did a number on the Bobbies for the second time in a month. Having held Dimmitt to just 25 points when they visited Friona, they virtually equalled that on Tuesday, allowing a usually high-scoring team only seven field goals.

Bradley, who had scored 33 points at Muleshoe in Dimmitt's 66-48 win last Friday, managed only nine points against the Squaws. "It seemed like there were eight Friona players on defense," commented one Dimmitt observer.

The pressure defense caused numerous turnovers by the Bobbies. Miss White fouled out in the latter stages of the game, a tribute to her tight defensive effort which included a number of steals. Miss Carthel and Miss Stokes each ended with four fouls. Courtney's 12 points led the balanced scoring attack which saw eight of the team's ten-member squad contribute to the scoring.

The Squaws led the Bobbies in rebounds, 29-26. Misses Carthel and Goddard had eight rebounds each.

Miss Meyer left the game momentarily in the third quarter after being hit squarely in the nose with the ball. But she came back in shortly. "I don't think it has completely soaked in yet," she commented Wednesday when asked about how it felt to be on a district-winner.

# Ag Center Will Be Located In Farwell

The Parmer County U.S. Department of Agriculture Service Center will be located in Farwell as originally planned, in spite of a plea by the Friona Chamber of Commerce, said Harold Bob Bennett, Farm Service Agency state director.

The decision of the State Food and Agriculture Committee was made at a January 9 meeting, said Bennett, the state FAC chairman.

The meeting was attended by a Friona Chamber of Commerce representative, he said, but the Parmer County FAC is the entity that must make a unanimous request for change and it did not.

Both the local and state FAC are made up of representatives of the Farm Service Agency (FSA), the Rural Economic Community Development (RECD) service and the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS).

"The county FAC sent us a letter stating they would prefer as little disruption as possible, leaving things as they are now," Bennett said. Currently, Parmer County does not have an RECD office; the FSA offices are in Farwell and the NRCS office is in Friona.

Under the new U.S. Department of Agriculture reorganization plan, Bennett said all the offices must be housed in one Parmer County service center by September 1997.

"The decision is that the USDA Service Center will be in Farwell," he said.

Teresa Buske, Friona Chamber

of Commerce executive director, said the chamber asked the FAC to reconsider its decision and allow for a competitive bidding process.

"The only way they would consider that is if we had a unanimous vote from the local FAC committee," Buske said.

But Mrs. Buske said she has not given up.

"We're not sure what our next step will be. The state FAC gave us a deadline of April 9 to get the local FAC committee to make that request. We have met with the local FAC and explained the situation and they were receptive and understood the reason for putting it up for competitive bid," she said.

Curt Miller, Parmer County Farm Service Agency executive director, said he has met with his county committee and the local FSA is not considering opening the service center up for bid process. He said the committee met January 18 and concluded it had not changed its position.

Mrs. Buske said the chamber is looking to see what alternative action it can take on the matter.

"The main thing that concerns us now is the lease of the building they are in now," she said. "They are paying \$9.55 a square foot, or \$3,908.34 per month, \$46,900 a year. We feel like they are not offering the taxpayers a fair shot at this when there is an alternative available."

Mrs. Buske said the Friona Chamber of Commerce is still working on its bid package, "it looks like we can come in at about half of that price."

On Friday, February 2, friends and relatives gathered at Prairie Acres to celebrate Oma Looney's 100th birthday.

She was born to Albert and Elizabeth Dorsey on February 2, 1896, in a small town in Arkansas.

The family soon moved to Lingleville, Texas. The lure of cheap land moved them to Concho County, Texas, but a severe drought over seven years made another move, this time to Silver City, New Mexico.

But the trip took the family, two wagons and horses, to Roswell where they were convinced to homestead on the north side of the Capitan Mountains about 20 miles from the town of Capitan.

It was here she met J. J. Hammonds and they were married on October 12, 1915.

They moved to Hardeman County, Texas and had four children: Otha (now deceased), J. T. of Bovina, Loyce McCleskey of Las Lunas, New Mexico, and E. G. Hammonds of Waterford, California.

When the marriage dissolved, Mrs. Looney moved with her four children to Bovina in late 1922 where she worked as a cook in a hotel and restaurant.

On May 24, 1924, she married Rush Looney. They farmed at Bovina until 1944 when they moved to Hot Springs, New Mexico.

There they both worked at Carrie Tingley Crippled Children's Hospital.

After Rush Looney passed away, she retired and moved back to Bovina in early 1960.

She bought a small house and for several years she kept children until health and failing eyesight forced her to quit.

According to son, J. T., she was always active, enjoying traveling, camping, and fishing.

She liked cooking, quilting, and all kinds of needle work.

She lived alone until November of 1993, when, at the age of 97, she moved to Prairie Acres in Friona.

Now she likes to hear from her ten grandchildren, nineteen great grandchildren, and nine great-great grandchildren.

# Lester Roth Writes Newsletter Article

Lester Roth, a resident at Prairie Acres, wrote his story for the February Prairie Acres newsletter, the *Prairie Times*. His story is featured below.

**By LESTER ROTH**  
I was born in Haycenter, Nebraska on June 29, 1909. My father, "Kelvin," was killed by a shotgun that went off when I was four years old.

Later my mother, "Ella," remarried. I have a sister and two brothers. I am the oldest.

I lived with my uncle for a year. Then my folks came down from Silverton, Colorado and took me with them.

When I was eleven years old, we worked on a farm with six head of mules for farming. Milked a hundred cows a day, for five years.

I only went up to the fifth grade. But, am glad that I was able to put my sister through high school and my brothers through the ninth and tenth grade.

At the age of nineteen, I met "Sylvia Kirk" in Greeley, Colorado. I didn't own a car, "I had a horse."

I worked for a farmer and learned how to drive an International tractor. I was making \$10.00 a month, and worked about four years for him. Sylvia used to go by and take me some water, and at times she would drive the tractor while I sat on the disc to eat my lunch.

We married on August 26, 1935. Right on my mother-in-law's birthday! I was twenty-five years old and Sylvia was nineteen.

Our first home was a boxcar. It was so small that our table was made into a bed at night!

Later, I worked for Paul Morgan at a feedlot in Denver, Colorado. He picked four men and myself to come to Lubbock, Texas to work for him.

We started Luther's Feedlot, one of the biggest feedlots around at the time.

Sylvia and I brought our furniture and my two horses from Colorado.

Then, we moved to Friona in the late 1960s where we started High Plains Feedlot. It also was one of the biggest feedlots. I worked for them until I retired.

Sylvia and I have two daughters and two sons. We lived on three acres north of town.

"One day, I got up to make some coffee and then I passed out." My neighbors had to go pick me up on their four wheel drive on account that it was real muddy and they took me to the hospital. "The doctor said I had a heart attack."

Shortly after, we moved to town so I could be near the hospital. I had to be put on oxygen

and also on breathing treatments. Plus lots of medications.

It was hard for Sylvia to continue to take care of me, so she brought me to live at Prairie Acres in August of 1992. Even though I

hated to be separated from her, I knew she had to do what was best for me.

Sylvia has lost most of her hearing and lives with my daughter now.

**Did You Know?**

A quote I read this past week, "I can divorce my wife of 26 years with less difficulty than I can fire a secretary I hired last week." I always let my wife read the articles I write to get her opinion on what I've said. She told me that this quote had nothing to do with the rest of the article. I said this is true, but I found it to be an interesting quote. She said, "You're fired."

Did you know that Karl Barth was born in 1886 and is one of the world's best known Protestant theologians? He became a minister of the Swiss Reformed Church in Geneva in 1909, then served as minister in the town of Safenwil, Switzerland, from 1911 to 1921. During these years, he was deeply committed to the liberal theology of the day.

The events of World War I caused Barth to question severely all his previous ideas and turned him to an earnest study of the New Testament and Martin Luther and John Calvin.

In 1919, Barth published a commentary on Paul's letter to the Romans. He attacked the character of the liberal theology and the impractical idealism of the social Gospel.

He stressed the reality of God, and of man's littleness and sinfulness before the majesty of God. At first he was attacked for his position, but later others began to admit that Christianity had become more concerned with pleasing man than with pleasing God.

Barth taught in German universities from 1921 until Hitler had him discharged in 1934.

He was asked once to sum up in a few words all he had written in the field of theology. This was the sum: "Jesus loves me, this I know, for the Bible tells me so."

John 3:16 is still one of the most known and loved verses in the Bible. "For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life."

"Jesus loves me this I know...."

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During their working years, future retirees typically have a single retirement fund. This may be an employer-sponsored pension plan, an annuity, an individual retirement account (IRA) or a savings account earmarked for retirement. When they eventually retire, they use this fund to supplement Social Security benefits. This method may be acceptable, but a more well-rounded plan can provide a more comfortable retirement.

A better approach might be to use the "three-basket" plan, which is designed to maximize the use of tax deferral. The longer you can defer paying taxes on your investments, the smaller your tax bill is likely to be, and you get to keep more dollars for retirement.

With this approach, basket No. 1 consists of taxable savings and investments that can be easily tapped for immediate income. This

should be the first source of income in the beginning years of retirement. The income is taxable whether you leave it in your account or withdraw it. There's no tax benefit to letting the income compound, so you might as well use this income first.

Basket No. 2 contains qualified retirement plans such as IRAs, simplified employee pensions (SEPs), 401(k) plans and more. Assets in these plans grow tax-deferred until you withdraw them, and you're not required to take distributions until age 70-1/2. Leaving these accounts undisturbed for those extra years can result in substantial tax-deferred growth.

Basket No. 3 includes non-qualified tax-deferred investments such as fixed or variable annuities. These investments provide tax-deferred growth and compounding as long as you hold them. Annuities also feature a death benefit, providing built-in protection for your family. The values of variable annuities fluctuate, but in the event of the annuitant's death, beneficiaries are guaranteed to receive at least the net deposits or the full market value, whichever is higher.

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
