Accidents Take Toll Here During Week

Accidents took their toll in the Friona area this week, as three people were hospitalized in Amarillo and Lubbock.

Walton Howard may have been the most seriously injured, after falling from a tall tree he was pruning at his residence at 501 10th Street last Friday.

Howard is in Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo, with a cracked hip joint, broken ribs and a bruised pelvic bone. He is expected to be hospitalized for some time.

On Monday morning of this week, Wayne Rhodes and Coy Walker were involved in a two vehicle wreck at a dirt road intersection about two miles west of Friona.

Walker is a driver for U.P.S., and had just left Excel, and was headed to FM 1731 on the dirt road when he collided with Rhodes' vehicle, which was headed west.

A spokesman said that weeds at the intersection were much taller than the U.P.S. van, and that neither driver probably saw the other one approaching.

Rhodes was hospitalized at Amarillo's Northwest Texas Hospital after sustaining a laceration to his arm, and having surgery on his ear.

Walker sustained a broken collarbone, lacerations and bruises. He has been at Lubbock Methodist Hospital, and was expected to be out of intensive care by Friday. Walker has been an UPS representative in this area for several years and is well thought of by citizens of Parmer County.

Challenge Issued For Parade

On Saturday, August 22 at 9 a.m. the Parmer County Memorial VFW Auxiliary #1413 will be at the American Legion Building, Sixth and Euclid, to place reflecting tape on local children's bicycles.

The program is called "Lite-A-Bike," and is meant to help keep children safe while riding their bicycles by allowing motorists to see them better.

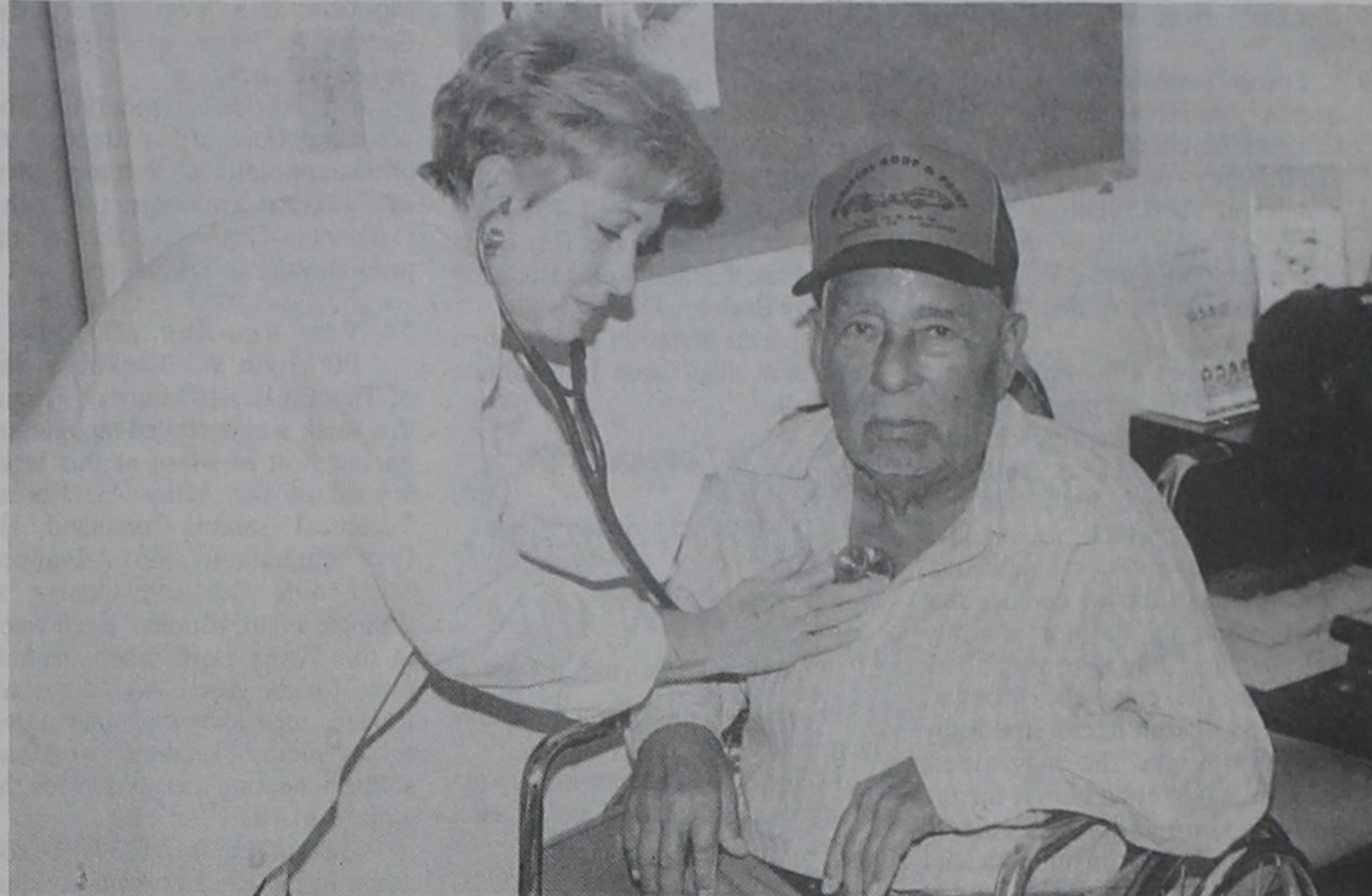

When Friona Medical Clinic opened for business Monday morning, there were two staff members on duty even though Dr. Natasha Shah was beginning her maternity leave.

Linda Conlee, a licensed Physician's Assistant, is assisting her supervising physician, Dr. Robert Alexander. She will be seeing patients on a regular basis and will be rotating with Dr. Alexander on after office hours duty.

She's a graduate of Fort Worth's Paschal High School, and Texas Christian University, from which she holds a Bachelor of Science degree in education. She was the business manager of a private

school in Fort Worth several years.

P.A. Conlee is a recent graduate of the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center, where she completed a two and one-half year program. This program is comparable to the second and third year of medical school and all graduates are required to do the same rotations as medical students.

She did her family practice rotation with Dr. Bill Lee of Dimmitt earlier this year.

The first two years, Mrs. Conlee attended Texas Christian University, she was a pre-med major then changed to education. About five years ago, she decided she wanted to get into the health care field and chose the Physician's

Assistant route.

O.L. McMurtrey of Hub Grain reported 2.2 inches in that area. He

said "In spite of some earlier damage by hail, the crops look real promising at this time."

N.C. White, Jr. of Sherley Grain in the Lakeview Community reported an inch of rain. He said that corn and maize in that community looked real good and that beans and sunflowers, which were planted after earlier cotton plantings were destroyed, looked real good.

He further reported, "I've been here a long time and have never seen better prospects for a good crop."

10 Yrs. Ago-Aug. 22, 1982

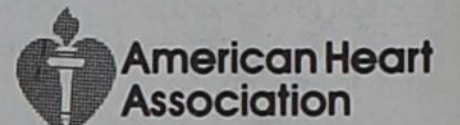
Work continues on the new Allsup's store on East Highway 60. The building's foundation was laid this week, and other concrete was being poured.

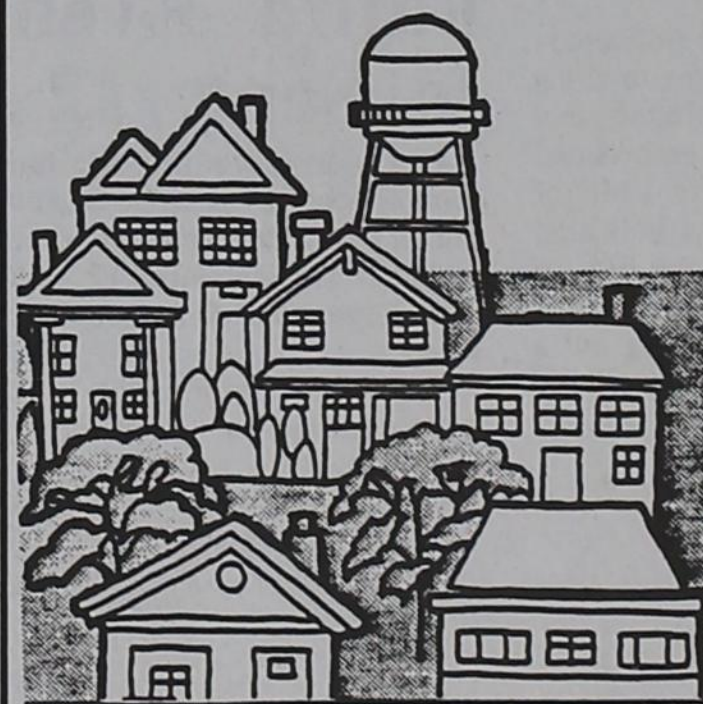

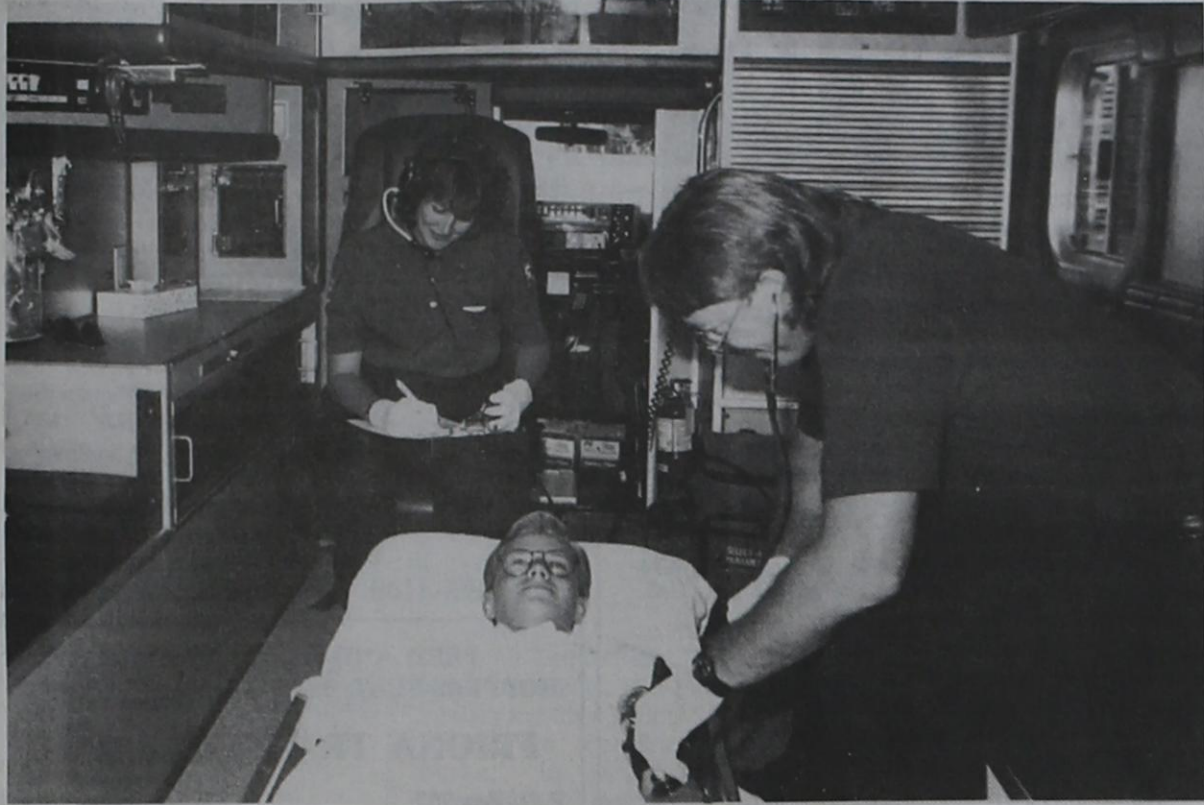

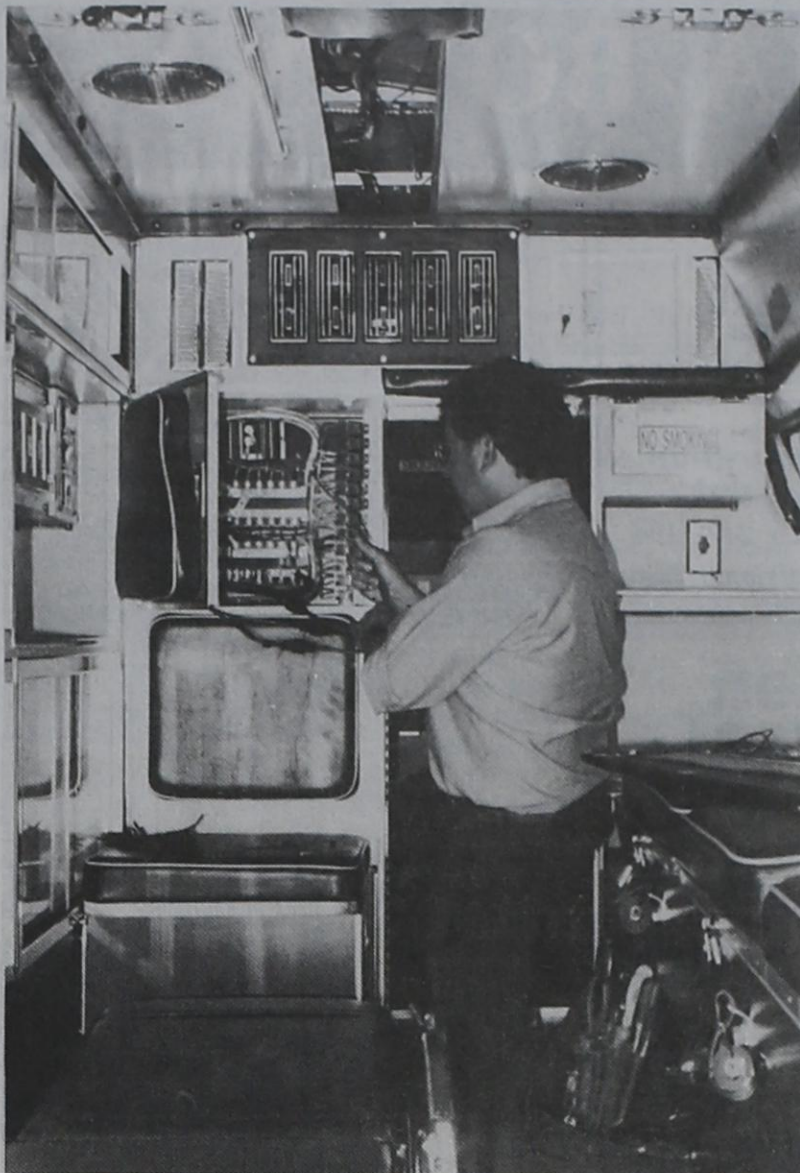

Radio Contact Can Be A Life-Saver

It can be a long drive by ambulance from an accident site in Parmer County to the area's sole emergency receiving center at Northwest Texas Hospital (NWT) in Amarillo. Radio communication bridges time and distance for emergency medical crews on these prolonged runs.

A local firm is at least figuratively riding along each time an ambulance rolls in Parmer County. WT Services, Inc., a subsidiary of West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative of Hereford, helps to maintain the Panhandle Emergency Medical Services System (PEMSS) a network of 17 radio repeaters scattered over the Panhandle. The repeaters connect a communications center at NWT with ambulances operating in rural areas.

WT Services sales staff, radio shops and technicians in Hereford, Amarillo and Borger work closely with NWT to upgrade and improve the system.

Radio communication is a vital link between ambulance service in communities such as Friona, Bovina and Farwell, their local hospitals, and hospitals in

Amarillo, says Kenneth Jones, PEMSS:

"Two hours or more is a long time for a paramedic to be managing a trauma victim. If paramedics have to administer medication enroute to NWT, they have to get physician clearance. Paramedics aboard ambulances can communicate with NWT via the PEMSS radio system to get such clearance, and instructions on patient care. Communication from St. Anthony's Hospital and High Plains Baptist Hospital in Amarillo can also be patched into PEMSS radio.

"The remote location of many Panhandle communities and the need for a standard of care where all emergency services are operating under the same protocol make good radio service essential. Radio contact with the doctor while a victim is enroute to NWT can make the difference in someone living or dying," says Jones.

The Amarillo Emergency Receiving Center is also staffed with two crisis and trauma physicians. Jones says emergency ser-

vices in Friona, Bovina and Farwell can communicate with these physicians.

"We've seen a lot of rural hospitals closing, and there's a great deficit in physicians in these rural areas as well. The PEMSS communications network allows access to crisis and trauma care physicians 24 hours a day," says Jones.

While several Panhandle communities handle their own ambulance dispatching through the local police or fire department, 15 rely on the communications center at NWT for 9-1-1 service and ambulance dispatching.

Dispatchers handling 9-1-1 calls at NWT take information and get an ambulance rolling. An EMS dispatcher remains on the line with the caller to offer assistance, such as instructions on how to clear an obstructed airway, or how to perform CPR.

Among communities that count on the NWT communications center for ambulance dispatching are Amarillo, Canyon, Borger, Texline, Pampa, White Deer, Panhandle, Claude, Lake Tanglewood, Wayside and Fritch. Dispatching in Parmer County is handled through local emergency agencies.

Radio equipment is currently being replaced or upgraded in some Panhandle locations to improve PEMSS.

Jay Green, WT Services sales representative in Amarillo, says that WT Services has replaced PEMSS channels to improve the emergency network.

"We have relocated towers from Hereford to Summerfield, and from Tulia to Silverton to make the radio signals more powerful. The Summerfield site gives more coverage in the Dimmitt, Bovina and Farwell area, and the Silverton site will cover the Tulia area and reach into isolated locations in the Rolling Plains such as Quitaque," Green explains.

Other PEMSS tower sites are located at Dalhart, Stratford, Spearman, Glazier, Dumas, Borger, Miami, White Deer, Vega, Canyon, Claude, Clarendon, near Palo Duro Canyon, and at Amarillo.

The PEMSS originated in the 1970s when the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission saw the need for a uniform EMS system in the Panhandle. PRPC received a federal grant to help put EMS in place. Participating communities received ambulances fitted with the necessary radio equipment.

Some ambulance services are still using essentially the same equipment nearly 20 years later.

Green says that if federal grants are provided, PEMSS might replace its present radios with a new, high-band system—a potential \$3 million project.

"This would give PEMSS clear channels. They could transmit data, and use microwave links that would allow running video. Such capability could put a doctor in Amarillo right in the emergency room of local hospitals, through a video hook-up," says Green.

WT Services also maintains paging systems for NWT, St. Anthony's and High Plains Baptist hospitals in Amarillo, and for Deaf Smith General Hospital in Hereford.

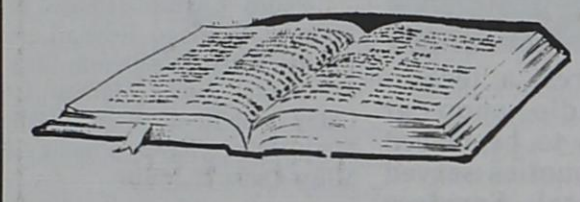

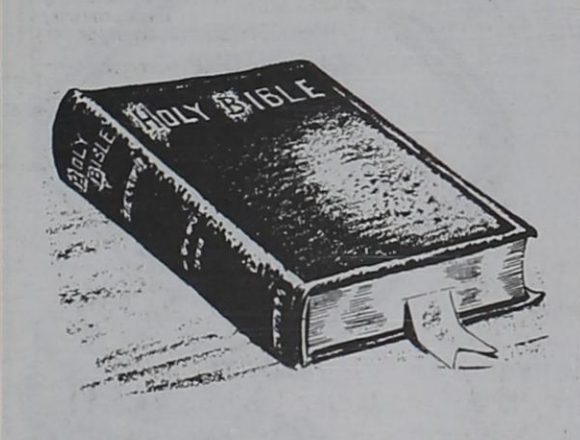

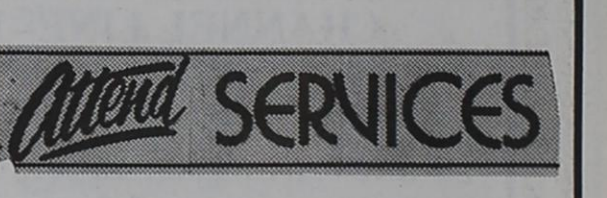

Moisture Can Cause Irritation

Swimmers aren't the only candidates for swimmer's ear, a potentially dangerous condition caused by moisture in the ear canal.

"Swimmer's ear is not really a sports-related condition," says Dr. Dan Franklin, an otolaryngologist at The Methodist Hospital. "Anyone who takes a shower, perspires when exercising, or, for that matter, lives in the humidity of Houston can get it."

Swimmer's ear is a layman's term for inflammation and infection in the external ear canal. It happens when water breaks down natural skin barriers, allowing bacteria to infect the ear's soft tissues.

Pain in the ear is the most common symptom of the condition. Other, less common symptoms can include fever and hearing loss.

Franklin says swimmer's ear is usually preventable by keeping the ear dry. "Over-the-counter ear drops containing acid and alcohol can help keep the ear dry," he says. "But once an infection sets in, you should see a physician."

Treatment is two-pronged: keeping the ear canal clean, and applying antibiotic ear drops.

Franklin issues a special warning for people with immune system deficiencies, such as diabetics, leukemia patients, and organ transplant recipients. "If these people have symptoms of swimmer's ear, they should see a physician immediately and receive aggressive treatment," he advises. "Otherwise, the infection can spread to the bones of the ear and become very difficult to get rid of."

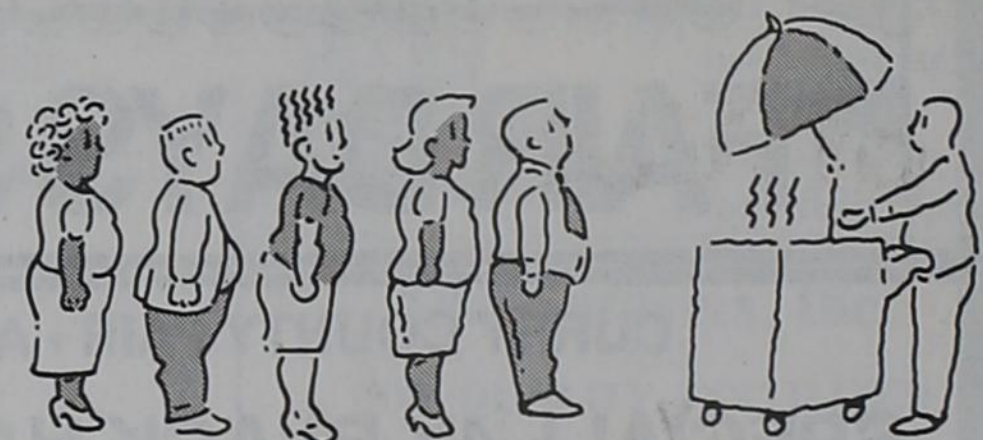

Screening Clinic Is Scheduled In Friona

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Department of Health for screening mammography for Texas residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self-examination and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recom-

mended by the American Cancer Society for breast screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer.

The guidelines are: (1) Learn and perform breast self-examination; (2) Have a physical examination every year; (3) Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age. Age 35-40, one baseline mammogram; 40-50, a mammogram every 1-2 years; over 50, yearly mammograms.

A clinic will be held in Friona on Wednesday, September 23, from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at Parmer County Community Hospital, 1307 Cleveland. Exams are done by appointment only.

Notice of Vote on Tax Rate

The Parmer County Education District conducted a public hearing on a proposal to increase your property taxes by 12 percent on August 20, 1992.

The Parmer County Education District is scheduled to vote on the tax rate at a public meeting to be held on August 25, 1992 at 7:30 P.M. at the Board Room of the Friona ISD Building.

NOTICE OF COMPARABLE TAX RATES AND REVENUES

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state constitution. Under prior statutes (SB 1) the tax rate for last year provides \$3970 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute (SB 351) that same rate now provides \$4382 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$.82 for county education districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

The board of trustees of the Friona Independent School District hereby gives notice that it is considering the adoption of a tax rate of \$.16 that will provide \$4382 per student in state and local revenues.

Green Beans Baked In Sour Cream

1/2 teaspoon lemon pepper

1 cup Cheddar cheese

1/2 cup oil

Add to the combined mixture:
1 16-ounce can cream style corn
6 jalapeno pepper, chopped
2 cups grated sharp Cheddar cheese
2 cups grated sweet onion
Pour the mixture into a 9-inch-by-13-inch pan. Bake at 425 degrees for 35 minutes or until golden brown.

2 pounds shrimp, cooked and cleaned

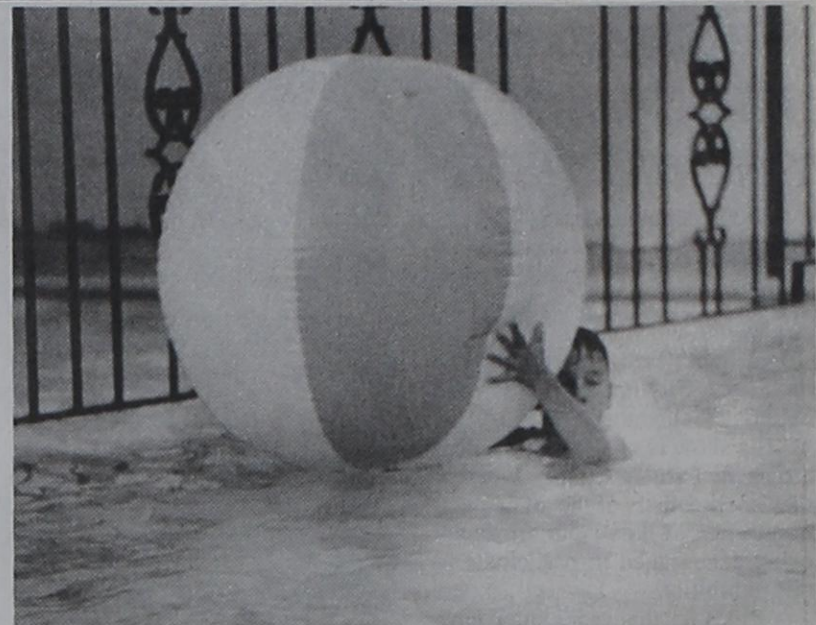

Luce. He is the son of Tim and Donna Glenn of Arlington.

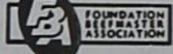
The bride presented each mother with a rose.

The Magic Of Compounding

Ann Landers may not be famous for financial advice, but one of her recent columns about good money sense is worth repeating.

One of Ann's readers had secretly socked away \$35,000 during a 46-year marriage. Now, afraid to tell her spouse, she implored Ann's counsel. "Put it in the bank," Ann said.

A Chicago banker agreed with Ann and wrote that if the lady had saved about \$760 a year (\$35,000 roughly divided by 46 years) while earning a 5 per cent after-tax or tax-deferred interest rate, her investment would have grown to nearly \$130,000.

The banker further calculated that if the secret saver had deposited the entire \$35,000 46 years ago, rather than making smaller, annual investments, the magic of compounding would have increased her savings to more than \$300,000 today.

This story is impressive, however, it assumes that the saver had a large sum at her disposal and a constant 5 per cent interest rate over the past 46 years. We know, of course, that interest rates fluctuate with the economy. At different times during the past 46 years, rates have exceeded 15 per cent and have fallen below 5 per cent.

Although the magic of compounding is a convincing story, the

real power of our saver's investment could be better illustrated by the historical results of dollar-cost averaging into the U.S. economy.

The stock market, as measured by the Dow Jones Industrial Average (DJIA), ended 1945 at 169 with interest rates at 2.4 per cent. Forty-six years later, the DJIA was above 3000 with interest rates above 6 per cent. Combining the benefits of systematic investing and compounding, what would the secret saver's investments be worth today?

As Chart A illustrates, her initial \$761 investment, made Jan. 1, 1945, would have grown to \$981 by Dec. 13, 1945. Moving in 10-year periods, the total investment could have been worth \$22,497 by Dec. 31, 1955. At the end of 1965, the investment would have been worth \$89,279; \$165,587 in 1975 and \$819,691. By Dec. 31, 1990, after the entire \$35,000 would have been systematically invested at \$761 each year, the total value of the account would have been \$1,559,051.

Compare that to the \$128,347 that would have resulted from the stable 5 per cent compounding, and you see the value of compounding and dollar-cost-averaging into an investment that offers the opportunity to grow with the economy.

This is a simple hypothetical illustration any mutual fund should be able to run for you. Most mutual funds can do this for you using their historical performance figures. All you need to do is (1) select a fund with a history at least as long as your example (in our case 46 years) and (2) give the date and amount of each contribution. The computer then goes to work reconstructing "what if" you actually made investments into the fund on those specific dates. You might be surprised to learn how much your investments can grow when you choose opportunity over guarantee.
