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## News Highlights From 1991 Given From Star Headlines

Creation of a Parmer County Hospital district as a means of providing funding for the local hospital was one of the highlights of the calendar year 1991 in the Friona area. Other top events were provided by the weather and local residents.

A sampling of the 1991 news as recorded in the pages of the Friona Star is as follows:

### JANUARY

The Friona Squaws won three games and lost one at the Sudan Tournament during the Christmas break, to run their season record to a sparkling 16-3.

According to a final survey of gins in Parmer County, the number of bales of cotton produced in Parmer County in 1990 was at least 79,067. This would make the 1990 crop second only to the 1981 crop in terms of bales, but the current crop should challenge the all-time yield-per-acre record.

One of the best snowstorms in a number of years hit the Friona area on January 9. A total of eight inches was measured, and the "melt" came to .84 inches. "It fell just right and didn't move around any. The wheat was sure needing some moisture," said Joe Allen, a resident of the Rhea community.

A Friona officer in the U.S. Army, 1SG Vicki Knight, gave her impressions on the early part of Operation Desert Storm. 1SG Knight was home on a furlough to attend the funeral of her father, J.E. Knight. She missed the first days of the conflict, but returned to active duty after her furlough.

### FEBRUARY

A Friona High School athlete, Blue Field, received the Dee Henry Memorial Award at the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame February 2 at Amarillo College. Since 1962, the award has gone to an area athlete who's overcome a physical hardship to excel in athletics.

Young showmen from the Lazbuddie community borrowed a page from the past at the 44th annual Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show last weekend. Lazbuddie showmen won two grand champion banners, two reserve champion banners, plus three other breed championships in the sheep division and another in the barrow show. In addition, three of their showmen were tapped for showmanship honors.

Clay Hurst of Friona entered the Grand Champion Steer, an exotic breed. It was the 26th steer title for a Friona showman at the PCJLS, and their 11th consecutive win.

F. G. Crofford, who served as head coach of the Friona High School Squaws from 1967-75, and had an all-time coaching record of 721 wins in 32 years, including a state title in girls basketball at Claude, was one of three men inducted into the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame.

Friona Excel plant manager Terry Wilkerson lauded the progress of Excel's workers in learning the "Four Absolute Qualities" in their job, in an effort to produce defect-free products and services. Recently the plant won three out of five awards presented by their parent corporation for safety achievements.

Twenty-one employees of Hi-Pro Feeds were recognized for working one year without a lost-time accident. In addition to these, 20 production workers not employed the entire year, plus five production supervisors, recorded no lost-time accidents.

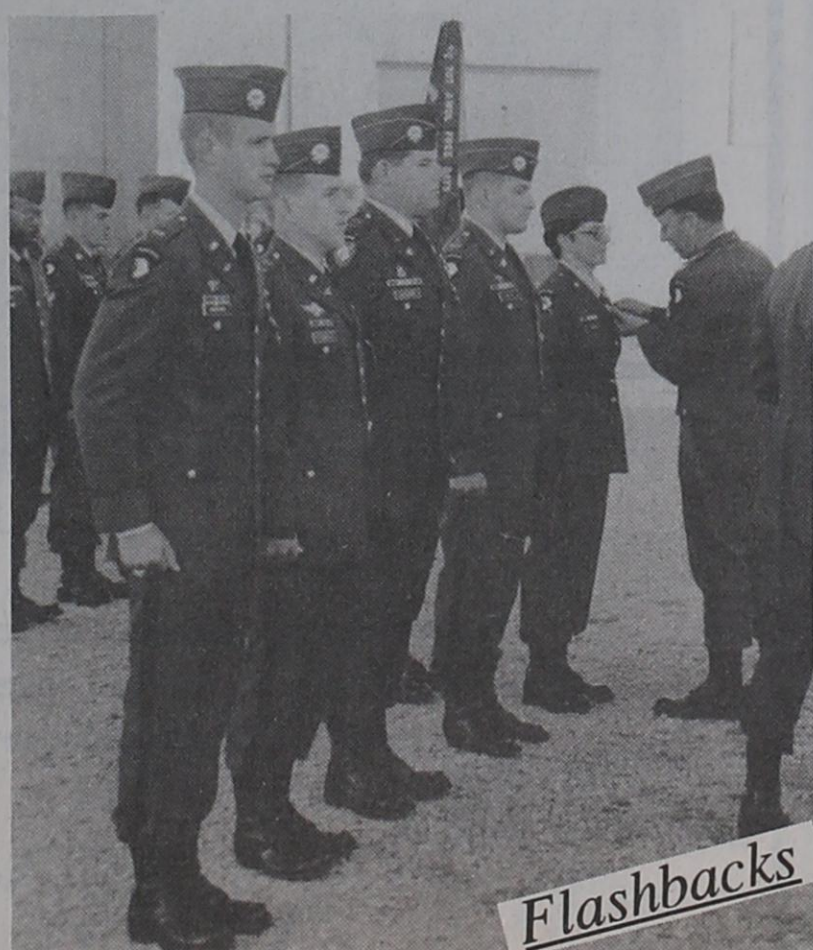

### MARCH

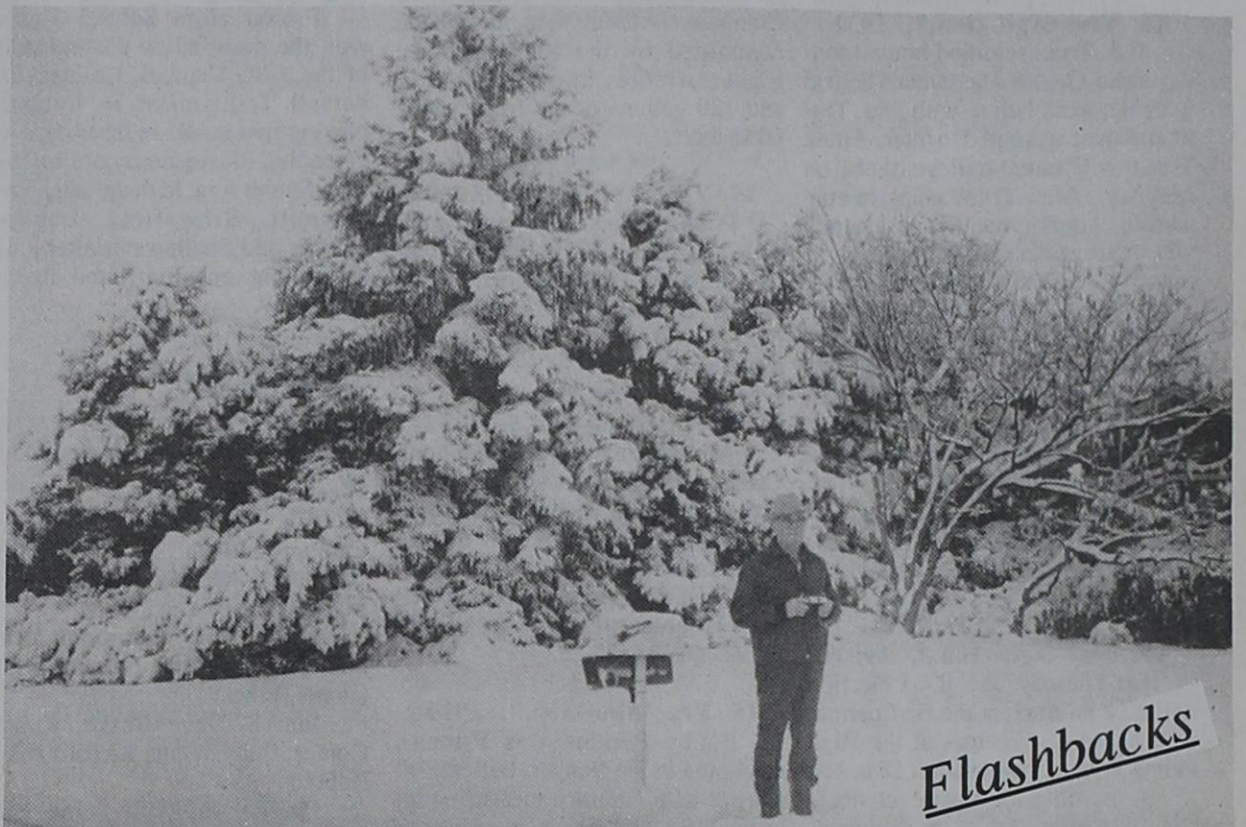
Benny Pryor, vo-ag instructor at FHS for 29 years, plans to retire at the end of the current school year, it was announced.

## '91 Rainfall 33% Above Average

The Friona area continued to receive unusually heavy winter rainfall toward the end of December, with 1.49 inches measured on December 22 for the heaviest single day reading.

The month of December turned up with 3.12 inches, which probably is an all-time record for the month. November and December yielded 4.88 inches of rainfall. If the temperature had been just three or four degrees lower at the time the moisture was falling, the area could have had approximately 50 inches of snowfall instead!

For the calendar year 1991, Friona's official gauge recorded 24.73 inches of rain, which is 33% more than the local average, which is just over 18 inches. Amarillo's total for 1991 was 15.92 inches, so Friona's yearly total was almost nine inches more than Amarillo's recording. Amarillo was considerably below their annual average.

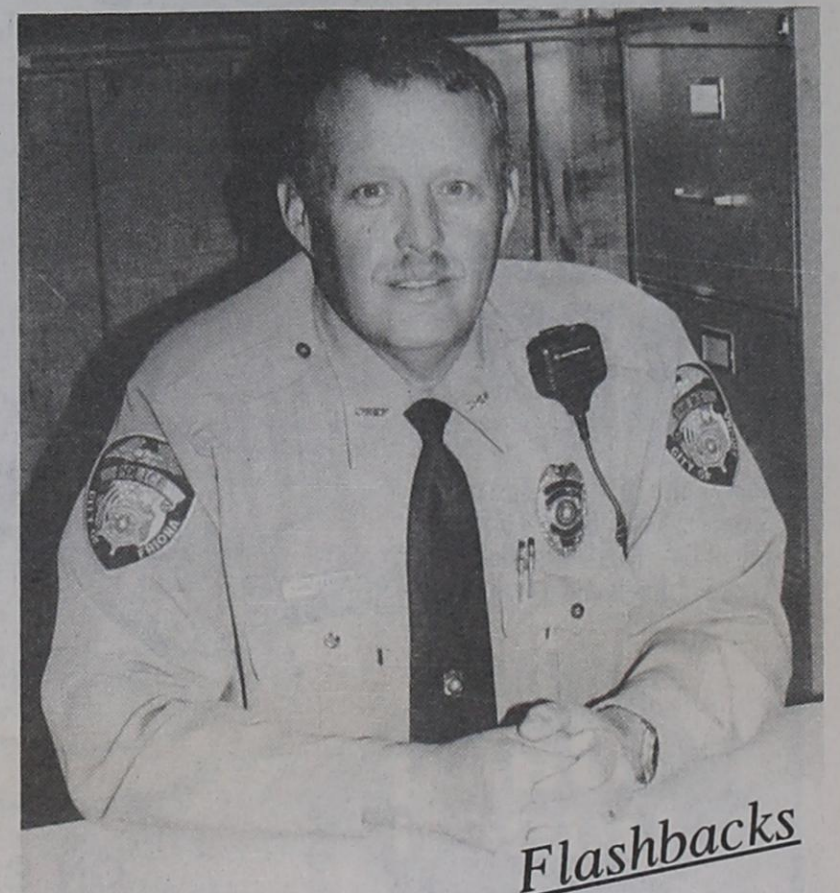
The trial of capital murder defendant Diana L. Lumbrera, originally scheduled to start April 15, was delayed until June 3, on a motion by the defendant's attorney.

They will handle the John Deere line of tractors and implements and the Willys-Knight and Overland line of cars, including the Whippet.

**60 Yrs. Ago--Jan.8, 1932**  
F.S. Truitt returned home Monday from Gainesville, where he had gone the week before with Mrs. Truitt and their son and daughter. Frank Truitt will enter college there on Monday. Mrs. Truitt plans to stay awhile, hoping the lower altitude will improve her health.

**50 Yrs. Ago--Jan.2, 1942**  
Friona's fourth annual Homecoming Banquet, held the night of Dec. 18, was pronounced a success. Nelson Welch was chairman of the banquet. Miss Charlene McFarland entertained with a piano solo. Pvt. ## Rains Caused Problems For Texas Farmers in 1991

When Texas farmers look back on 1991, many will recall it as a year in which the rain was too abundant.

Statistics from the National Weather Service's Southwest Agricultural Weather Service indicate that much of Texas will finish 1991 with 25% to 64% more rain than in a normal year.

While that benefitted some crops in some areas, the rain brought problems to producers of rice, wheat and cotton, three of Texas' five major crops, according to the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the weather service.

"The rice growers were really late in planting because of large amounts of rain, which led to problems with diseases," said Richard Wynne, a weather service meteorologist.

State rice yields totaled 18.8 million hundredweight in 1991, compared to 21.2 million hundredweight in 1990, said Mark Waller, an economist with the Extension Service.

Cotton was affected in the Panhandle area, where crops were planted late and then harmed by early freezes. That resulted in losses of 25% or more of the area's yield, originally estimated at 3 million bales.

Earlier predictions for a state-record yield of 6.1 million bales were revised downward to 5.4 million bales following freezes and heavy rains. The rains harmed cotton yield and quality throughout much of the rest of the state during critical late-summer or early-fall growth and harvest periods.

Heavy spring rains delayed planting of wheat crops and cut

yields in the Panhandle, the state's primary wheat region. Fall rains also delayed planting in scattered portions of the region, which could adversely affect the crop, Waller said.

The latest wheat-yield figures showed a drop from 130 million bushels harvested in 1990 to 84 million in 1991, he said.

Not all crops fared poorly. Because rain varies widely in quantity and timing from region to region, some did well.

"In South Central Texas they had a real good corn crop this year simply because they got the rain at the right time," Wynne said. "It was so wet early that there was just enough moisture to carry it through, so they had a pretty good year."

Waller said Texas corn yields for 1991 are estimated at 179.2 million bushels, up from 130.5 million in 1990. The state's grain sorghum production should total 99.1 million hundredweight, up from 75.7 million hundredweight in 1990, he said.

Meteorologist George Bomar of the Texas Water Commission, who tracks historical trends in Texas weather, has estimated that 1991 will finish as one of the five wettest since 1951.

Of the 31 Texas stations comprising the weather service's weekly precipitation report, 23 have received 120 percent or more of their normal rainfall through Dec. 11, led by the Dallas-Fort Worth Airport at 46.7 inches, or 164%.

Beaumont had reported the greatest total rainfall -- 72.42 inches (145% of normal).

Only three of the 31 stations have reported amounts below normal for the year. Zapata, in Zapata County in far Southwest Texas, had received 15.04 inches, or 64% of normal.

"For the most part, there are only a few areas along the southwest border behind by any significant amount," Wynne said.

Amarillo, at 13.68 inches was the only other station reporting below-normal rainfall (73%). However, other Panhandle and High Plains weather stations have reported much larger amounts. Dalhart had received 22.76 inches (140% of normal) and Childress had 29.29 inches (151%).



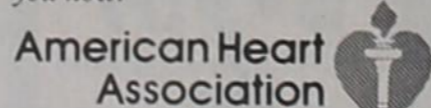

### Tax-Exempt Municipal Bonds -- Are They Right For You?

Despite their attractive tax-free status, municipal bonds aren't for everyone. The promise of a regular income that isn't shared with the Internal Revenue Service has lured many people in low tax brackets into buying municipal bonds even though investments paying better interest rates may be available. For example, similar corporate or government bonds, the interest of which is taxed, offer more income than municipal bonds. There is a simple method to help determine if tax-exempt bonds are for you.

Begin by looking at your last year's tax return to determine your tax bracket. If you are in a 28 percent marginal tax bracket, for example, subtract that from 1, which gives you .72.

Now, assume you are offered a municipal bond paying 6 percent. Is this a wise investment when there are corporate bonds of comparable quality and maturity offering 9.5 percent? To figure the advantage or

disadvantage of the tax-free income over the taxable, divide 6 percent (.060) by .72, which gives you 8.33 percent. This is the interest rate you must earn on your taxable income to equal a 6 percent return that is tax free.

The following chart illustrates the tax-equivalent yields necessary to equal tax-exempt yields for the three major tax brackets. For example, for someone in the 31 percent bracket, a 7 percent tax-free yield is equivalent to a 10.14 percent taxable yield.

As with any investment, the quality of the bonds is also important. Tax considerations of an investment should never outweigh its overall quality. When comparing tax-free and taxable yields, make certain the quality of the two investments are comparable; otherwise your analysis is worthless.

For many taxpayers, tax-free income can mean a better standard of living. For others, it offers little or no advantage. To see how tax-free income might benefit you, sharpen your pencil and figure it out.

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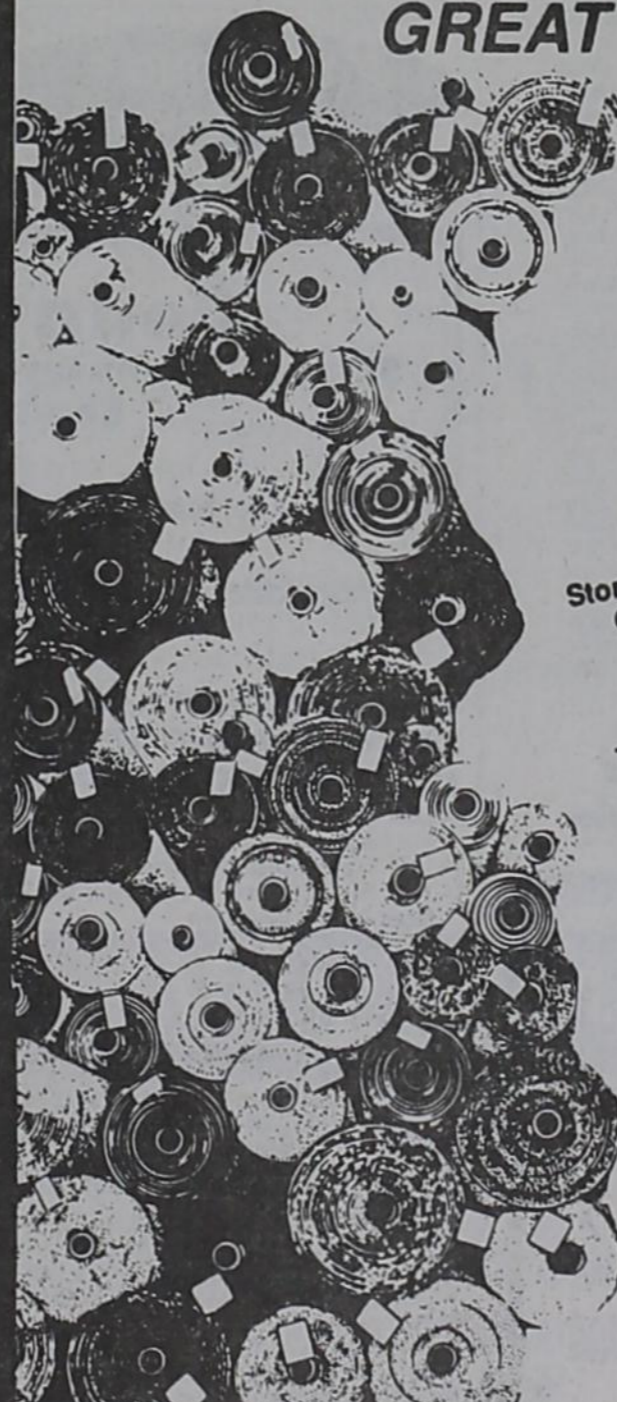

Honor graduates for Friona High School's class of 1991 were announced. Elaine White is the valedictorian with a four-year average of 4.57. Dan Neelley is salutatorian, at 4.477, and Steven Dickson was third at 4.476.

Friona High School won a new "Sweepstakes" award from the district, presented to the school scoring the most points in the UIL spring competition, including literary and sports events.

A Lazbuddie community family's dwelling and most of their belongings were completely destroyed by a mammoth tornado May 10. The twister destroyed the home of Roger and Debbie Johnson, four miles north, 1-3/4 miles west of Lazbuddie, and did considerable damage on the Marvin Mimms farm, where the Johnson home was located.

Parmer County Community Hospital has announced the appointment of Don Spring, RPH, as the new staff pharmacist effective June 17. Spring has owned and operated his own pharmacy in Bovina for several years...

Prairie Acres Nursing Home announced the opening of a newly designed area to provide special care for residents afflicted with Alzheimer's and related disorders.

Groundbreaking was held at the Excel plant for an \$11 million expansion program. The expansion will more than double the company's cooler capacity, from 4,000 head per day to 8,000 head.

Parmer County's 1990 cotton crop definitely was one of the best on record, according to final harvest figures given this week by Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. of Lubbock. In fact, the 796-pounds per harvested acre ranked it tops in the 25-county area served by the PCG in terms of yield per acre. The county produced 83,100 bales of cotton, almost 4,000 more than the figure estimated in January in a gin poll by the Friona Star and Bovina Blade.

## AUGUST

The population at Prairie Acres Nursing Home dropped to 32 residents the first week of August, causing alarm to its supporters. The local facility's population had remained steady at 62 to 63 in mid-1989, when a new wing was added.

Phil Langston, who had served as local administrator for Parmer County Community Hospital for Preferred Management Corp. for about a year, is being transferred to Oklahoma, it was announced. Bill Neely will be the new local manager for Preferred Management.

Local resident E.M. (Ed) Bailey owes his life to the fact that Friona has a local hospital, it was pointed out in a page one feature on August 24, written by Laura Gutschke, editor of Health Today magazine. Bailey suffered an abdominal aneurysm on May 1. He was stabilized at the local hospital, then flown to Lubbock Methodist Hospital by air ambulance. When the article appeared, he was back at work at his print shop on Main Street in Friona.

Enrollment in Friona schools showed an increase of 37 students over the first week in 1990, according to school officials.

## SEPTEMBER

Friona's 35th annual Maize Days celebration was held September 7-14. Events included a sidewalk sale, a variety show, a reception at Prairie Acres, Gospel in the Park, a Red & White Day, a bed race, the annual parade, carnival, and community dance.

City and county officials took part September 11 in a ceremony to send a sampling of dirt from Parmer County to be used at a new theme park in San Antonio, Fiesta Texas, which will open in 1992. Mayor Clarence Monroe, city manager Beelee Goodwin and County Judge Bonnie Clayton took part in the ceremony.

Kenneth Hall was the winner of the 1991 Ford pickup given away during Maize Days by the Friona Volunteer Fire Department.

Maize Days, 1991 was a huge success, said Terri Outland, executive vice president of the Friona Chamber of Commerce. Mrs. Outland handed out thanks to several local businesses and industries, and to all who participated in the events during the special week.

Five young ladies were nominees for FHS Homecoming Queen: Shawn Cole, Jennifer Smith, Tamara Hand, Amy Reeb and Kris Hamilton. Miss Hamilton was named queen prior to the Dalhart game.

## OCTOBER

Terry Wilcox won the Friona Star's football contest for the second time in three weeks, with a score of 16.

Parmer County Commissioners Court approved a redistricting plan for the county's precincts. Included in the changes will be eliminating two longtime polling places, at Black and at the Lakeview Community. Polling places were also re-numbered. The changes were detailed in a special two-page legal notice by the county, published in the Star.

Approximately 3,000 employees of Excel Corp. in Friona and Plainview received checks of up to \$350 each this week. The gifts were a one-time payment recognizing each employee's contribution to Excel and to overall safety and safety costs.

Construction is well underway on the \$11 million expansion project at Excel. Presently, the plant uses a 24-hour chill for its carcasses, but according to Curt Jones, this will be increased to 48 hours with the doubled cooling space available.

The Friona ISD, Chamber of Commerce, local businesses and organizations integrated efforts for the annual Red Ribbon Week, a drug-awareness event.

Richard and Janette Collard are selling their law practice and will be moving to Waco, they announced in late October. Jerry Matthews of Dimmitt and Byron Boyd of Lubbock will be the new partners in the local law firm. The Collards had been business and civic leaders in Friona for the past 26 years.

## NOVEMBER

Friona Elementary School had quite an accomplishment on October 25 when all 414 of their pupils were at school, for a perfect attendance record.

Ernest Anthony, who is serving his fourth term as County Commissioner for Precinct 1 has authorized the Friona Star to announce his candidacy for re-election.

Parmer County voters went against the trend of those statewide on November 5, when they opposed creation of a state lottery by a margin of 829-611. Statewide, the vote carried, 64 per cent in favor, to 36 per cent opposed.

The Friona Chieftains avoided a winless season when they downed Muleshoe, 14-6 in their final game of the season.

The Friona Chamber of Commerce held a ribbon-cutting for the new law partnership on November 14.

John Taylor is the new Chief of Police in Friona, having been promoted in the local department following the dismissal of former Chief Loyd Niece.

The contract for widening the Friona to Bovina portion of U.S. Highway 60 was to be awarded on December 5, 1991. The highway department advertised for bids after about a month's delay from the original date.

First Sergeant Vicki D. Knight has been awarded the Bronze Star medal for "exceptionally meritorious achievement while engaged in combat operations against an enemy of the United States during 'Operation Desert Storm.'"

## DECEMBER

Jackie Morgan, a regular entrant in the Friona Star's Football Contest for the past 26 years, finally added the one thing that had eluded him--the contest's grand prize. Morgan edged out Scott Brown of Lazbuddie, 132-131 after the final week of the competition. Morgan was in the lead or tied for it after 11 of the contest's 13 weeks.

According to a Page 1 article on December 14, the Friona area was in the midst of a flu epidemic. "This particular type of flu has been seen mostly in our children," said Dr. Robert Alexander. The flu outbreak played havoc with the school's attendance records the last few weeks of the year. On December 12, there were 144 absentees in the school system, or 11 per cent.

Project Christmas Card was sponsored for the 36th consecutive Christmas season, under the sponsorship of Modern Study Club and the Friona Star, with proceeds from the project to be donated to Parmer County Community Hospital. This year's proceeds will go toward the cost of two defibrulators for the hospital's heart monitors.

Unusual winter rain fell throughout the month. A record 3.12 inches were logged in December, virtually all in the form of rain, and the year's total of 24.73 inches amounted to a 33.3 per cent increase from the area's average, which is just over 18 inches per year.
