The city is the distributing center One agency, that of the Hupmobile, has a territory comprising twenty-four counties, all distributed from this section. In the case of the Ford there are branch houses maintained in this section from the main house in Plainview, and Plainview is the prinicpal distributing center. This is true of many of the other cars. Sub-agencies are being established in the other cities, but as a whole the city of Plainview is considered the automobile distributing center. The same condition holds true of the tractor business and hundreds of tractors are first shipped to Plainview and distributed from here over the Plains county as the necessity demands. The same condition holds true of automobile trucks. In fact, it is safe to say that automobiles, accessories and supplies, including tires, must all first come through Plainview before

the consumer has a chance at them.

Paris, Jan. 16.—Representatives of France, Great Britain, Italy, Greece, Belgium, Spain, Japan and Brazil, members of the council of the League of Nations, met in the "clockroom" of the French Foreign Office at 10 o'clock this morning for the first

meeting in the history of the league. The council organized at 10:30 o'clock by electing Leon Bourgeois chairman and confirming the choice of Sir Eric Drummond of Great Britain, as general secretary.

The wholesale grain and seed houses maintained in the city. There enough wheat brought in to Plain- Hereford Brand. view through these wholesale grain dealers to supply twelve mills and it is recognized by those who are familiar with the wheat raised in this section that aside from the Kansas wheat there is no better grades raised in the West. There is a flour mill here and two feed mills, which do an extensive manufacturing and wholesale business but the capacity of these three plants is not sufficient to handle the immense amounts of produce that comes to them and their distributing territory is only limited

by their capacity of production.

Plainview is the shipping point for all the cattle, hogs and produce raised in this section of the Plains and the amount of shipping along this line every year is very extensive. Thirtyfive cans of cream are handled by one
produce house every week which is
in the neighborhood of 140 gallons handle grain at the switch.

It is further order per week. Eggs, poultry and butter-fat makes up the bulk of these shipments. Hundreds of car loads of cattle and hogs are shipped out ev-

ery year.


