Mr. Boyd, who is a local wholesale grocery drummer, went up with Aviator Hinds, and as they were preparing to alight on the landing field nearby and while about 800 feet in the air, something got the matter with the engine and as the plane was so near the earth the aviator could not adjust the plane in time to save it. The plane came down head foremost, striking a tree, which broke the force of the fall, and landed in J. K. Millwee's pard.


