

E. Hwy. 60 Traffic To Use New Lane

Weather permitting, the Contractor for the construction of U.S. Highway 60, from Friona to the Deaf Smith County line, will rout traffic to the new (north) roadway of this highway the first week in February.

For approximately two days, traffic will be routed over both roadways and U.S. 60 will function as a four-lane divided highway; however, after a detour is installed at the Castro-Deaf Smith County Line, all traffic will be placed on the new roadway until re-construction has been completed on the old highway.

in the opening quarter to give Bovina a 14-11 lead. Bovina held the halftime lead at 23-15, and led after three quarters, 36-19.


Reyna was the scoring leader with 19 and Sammy Rodriquez had 16. Hromas scored ten and Mark Jansen eight.





Broad-based Mutual Fund Industry Serves All **Investor Types**

The mutual fund industry's top leaders unanimously agree that despite the phenomenal growth of recent years, the industry still has not reached its full potential. Since 1974, mutual fund assets have grown at an astounding 23 percent annual compound growth rate and today total more than \$1.2 trillion.

One of the reasons for this outstanding growth rate is broad distribution of mutual fund shares. Once offered exclusively by brokers, mutual fund shares are now available from bankers, insurance agents and financial planners. Why?

Partly because bank customers who could renew a certificate of deposit (CD) for 16 percent 10 years ago now find it difficult to find a CD offering 7 percent. Banks, not wanting to lose their CD business, offer U.S. government securities and tax-exempt municipal bond funds as an alternative. According to Financial Services Week (FSW), although banks continue to stress cash products, "there is a move into equity and fixed-income products."

Of the three major mutual fund distributors participating in the FSW survey, banks contributed about 18 percent to the funds' total marketing efforts, making them the smallest mutual fund distribution ment advice.

ing funds' sales. The largest share, about 50 percent, still remains with the national and regional brokerage firms. The remaining distribution is through qualified pension plans. "No-load" funds, which typically market their shares directly or through "fee-only" financial plan-ners, did not participate in the FSW Although insurance agents,

brokers and bankers have their favorite fund types, Donald Phillips, editor of Mutual Fund Value, a Chicago-based publication that tracks fund performance, says there is now an "overwhelming trend" toward conservative, middle-of-theroad funds. The money chasing of the 1980s has been replaced by a more conservative growth-and-in-

To the investing public this is good news. There are still speculative, complex funds to satisfy more venturesome investors, but many mutual fund salespeople today are more selective, shunning many of the new concepts and trendy ideas. The focus is back on long-term investing.

If too much time is spent selling you a mutual fund, perhaps you should look elsewhere for invest-

SEEING AND SKIING

In winter, the sun is lower in the sky and starts to set much earlier. It's harder to see clearly, even with perfect vision, and any visual defect can be exaggerated by poor light. Skiers need goggles to cope

with the varying light conditions on the slopes and to protect the eyes from ultraviolet rays. Some goggles have interchangable lenses of various tints: darker ones to be worn when the sun is strong, lighter ones to let in more of the afternoon light automatically. Lenses that filter blue light are particularly effective in hazy, foggy or overcast weather conditions. That's when vision is obscured by scattered blue light caused by particles of dust. When the blue light is filtered out, the remaining colors focus more sharply on the retina. Snowy surroundings are easier to see and safer to ski.
