Democratic Party conventions will be held at the polling places 15 minutes after the polls close on election day. You must have voted in the primary to attend the conventions.

Cotton Bale Estimate Is Projected

Parmer County's cotton crop for 1991 should wind up a little more than 72,000 bales, according to a survey of county gins this week.

This would put the crop in third place in the all-time standings, behind the record year of 1981, and the 1990 crop, if the estimate holds up.

Most of the gins were about finished with the long, draw-out harvest when the poll was made on Wednesday of this week, but four gins were still operating.


The exact number of bales won't be known until the final figures are compiled by the county ASCS office. It varies from the number secured from the gins, due to the fact that numbers of bales are usually taken to gins outside the county.

County, Precinct Race Highlight Demo Primary

The presidential primary, one countywide race, and a commissioner's race in the Friona precinct will highlight the Democratic primary on Tuesday, March 10.

The county race has the incumbent, Doris Herington, facing challenger Bob Stafford of Bovina.

Longtime commissioner Ernest Anthony of Friona is opposed by challenger John Mars.

Eleven candidates are on the Democratic ballot in the presidential nomination. These are led by Arkansas Governor Bill Clinton and Massachusetts native Paul Tsongas, along with former California governor Edmund G. (Jerry) Brown.

Statewide officeholders also face some challengers in the primaries.

Morris Overstreet of Amarillo, judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, place 2, is opposed by a candidate with a famous-sounding name, Gene Kelly (see separate article), and Railroad Commissioner Lena Guerrero is challenged by David Young.

Postmaster Larry Rogers announced this week that beginning March 9, the Post Office will offer a wide-range of new mailing products.


"We are excited about these new products because they will allow our customers to purchase the container for shipping as well as the postage, it's truly one-stop shopping," he said.

25 Yrs. Ago--March 9, 1967


Date Set For Sausage Meal

Republican Voters Cast Ballots For President, Term Limits

Voters who cast ballots in the Texas Republican Primary March 10 have the opportunity to send a message to Austin and Washington by voting on a non-binding referendum to limit the terms of elected officials.

"Republican primary voters will not only shape the course of elections by deciding which Republicans will run for office, but also have an opportunity to set the agenda for Republican conventions and upcoming legislative sessions," Republican Party of Texas Chairman Fred Meyer said. Republicans will vote in a referendum calling for a limit on the terms of state officials listed in the Texas constitution, members of Congress, the U.S. Senate and the state legislature.

The Democratic party adopted rules to prevent the term limit referendum from appearing on the Democratic primary ballot. "Democrat voters will not be able to voice their concerns because the State Democrat Executive Committee blocked efforts to place the same referendum before their voters," Meyer said. "Good ol' boy Democrat incumbents have chosen to ignore the message voters are sending."

Republicans also have power in the Presidential election. "Unlike the Democrats, we use election returns to determine the number of delegate votes a Presidential candidate will receive," Meyer said. "Voters in the

Democratic primary don't have much influence in the election because the Democratic caucus, not the vote of the people, decides how many delegate votes each candidate will receive."

At their precinct convention, Republicans will select delegates to their county or senatorial district convention and pass resolutions that may ultimately become part of the Republican platform. "It may seem confusing," Meyer said, "but a county that lies solely in one senatorial district will hold a county convention. If a county is divided into two or more senatorial districts, each district will hold its own convention."

At county or senatorial conventions held statewide two weeks after the primary, resolutions are considered and delegates are selected to attend the state convention in June.

"Delegates to the state convention ultimately shape the direction of the Republican Party of Texas," Meyer said. At the state convention, Republicans elect a State Chairman, Vice Chairman and members of the State Republican Executive Committee (SREC), each for two-year terms. The SREC, composed of one man and one woman from each of the 31 senatorial districts in Texas, is the governing body of the state party.

State convention delegates also select delegates and pass resolutions to go to the Republican National Convention in Houston in August. Presidential electors are selected and

a National Committeeman and a National Committeewoman are elected at the state convention to represent Texas on the Republican National Committee.

"Through the various steps on the way to the national level, Republican voters can truly influence the future of the Republican Party," Meyer said. "But it is crucial that all Republicans participate in the primary and let their voices be heard. The opportunity to vote on a term limit gives voters a chance to express their dissatisfaction with career politicians. This is the first best step toward regaining control of government."

The non-binding referendum results from the Republican primary will be used as a tool to pressure lawmakers to put a constitutional amendment for term limitations on the ballot for all Texans to decide.

Weed Control Seminar Set In Dimmitt

Agricultural producers, consultants, and others in Castro, Lamb, Parmer and Bailey counties will have an opportunity to learn more about weeds and their control at the Weed Management Seminar on Wednesday, March 25 in Dimmitt.

The first two sessions will focus on weed identification, reproduction, seedbank properties, weed/crop interactions, and direct-indirect losses from weeds. The last two sessions will concern controlling weeds by mechanical, cultural, biological, and chemical means. Also new advances in weed control and a panel discussion on specific problems growers are encountering will be discussed.

The seminar will begin at 8 a.m. at the Castro County Expo Building. The morning will begin with coffee and doughnuts, then explanation for receiving three continuing education units (CEU) toward a private and commercial applicators license.

Those planning to attend can pre-register at the Castro County Extension Office or at the door the day of the seminar. The cost of the seminar will be \$10, which includes lunch.

The seminar is being sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Speakers at the seminar include Brent Bean, Wayne Keeling, J.D. Ragland, Clay Salisbury and Kerry Siders with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.



WHAT "LEGALLY BLIND" MEANS

A person doesn't have to be totally blind to be considered "legally blind." The designated indicates severely limited vision that can not be corrected better than 20/200.

Certification as legally blind entitles the individual to state and/or federal assistance for vision services that make the most of the remaining ability to see. Unfortunately, some people with restricted vision have difficulty accepting the designation and so miss out on valuable treatment and benefits. There's a lot of help available: hand-held magnifiers and prisms plus telescopic lenses or microscopic segments for regular lenses. These aids improve visual acuity so that many legally blind people can read and take care of themselves. The optometrist is an eye professional who can certify the condition, prescribe and provide the needed low-vision aids and also provide support to help the patient adjust.

Socially Responsible Investing Gains Popularity

In the early 1970s, investors began to voice objections to a number of "socially unacceptable" securities. They started avoiding the stocks of companies that manufactured items such as tobacco, liquor or pharmaceuticals used for purposes they considered morally objectionable. Then they moved from simple environmental and social issues to avoiding companies doing business in South Africa and other alleged violators of human rights.

It was simple to avoid individual stocks, but the diversified and often-changing portfolios of mutual funds presented a challenge. So, some socially acceptable mutual funds began to emerge. It was an attempt at guilt-free investing. Undaunted by skepticism from the investing establishment, the idea of "socially responsible" investing has taken hold.

Several years ago, *Changing Times* (now *Kiplinger's Personal Finance Magazine*) reported that it is "tough to assay social funds in general against the fund universe--they're too new." At the time, only two socially responsible funds had existed through a complete cycle of up and down stock markets.

Today, however, the amount of assets managed with an eye to so-

cial concerns, including pension funds, mutual funds and individual portfolios, is estimated at \$650 billion, up \$200 billion from just two years ago, according to *Financial Services Week*.

One reason for this increase is the entry of variable annuities into the responsible-investing sector. Several major insurance companies now offer social-awareness funds for their variable annuities. More will be available soon.

As you can imagine, some of these socially responsible funds are unique in their investment philosophies. For example, one fund will only invest in companies that do not comply with the Arab Nations' economic boycott of Israel.

A socially aware municipal bond fund recently offered a state tax-free bond fund that only included socially acceptable education, housing and environmental bonds. 
