MOCKINGBIRDS and dandelions are back, so it must be time for some Spring housecleaning.

John Q. Public is getting in the mood to do some housecleaning. He's going to sweep the cobwebs out of the corners, air out the dirty linen, dig into the dark recesses of the closets, and do away with a lot of things that don't fit anymore.

I think the Congressional check bouncing scandal was the last straw as far as the voting, tax-paying public is concerned. Many folks would like to see a clean sweep through Washington D.C. and just start over with all new political figures. We couldn't be in any worse shape than we are now.

H. Ross Perot brings a new and interesting breath of fresh air into the otherwise boring same old presidential campaign. He will run as an Independent candidate for president if he can get enough petitions signed to put his name on the ballot in all the states.

Here is a fellow who built a multi-billion dollar empire from nothing but his own ingenuity and a thousand dollars which he had borrowed from his wife. He has no axe to grind, but is willing to finance the campaign with his own ample resources.

So far all we've heard from the media folks is that this is just a flash in the pan and Perot hasn't a snowball's chance in Hell of winning the presidency. Of course, you and I know that the media, as well as the political folks in Washington, haven't got a clue as to what John Q. Public (the average voting taxpayer) has on his mind. You'll know exactly the moment that the media folks begin to take Perot seriously, because that is when they'll start digging up the dirt, hunting down Perot dissenters, and making moral judgements about his character.

Perhaps having a President who owes allegiance to neither the Democratic or Republican party would be just the thing. We all know what happens when you have a Republican President and a Democratic Congress. The President ends up as a diplomatic figurehead with no more ability to govern the country than does the Queen of England. And when we have a Democratic President with a Democratic Congress we get lots of lovely handout programs managed by an increasing beurocracy with runaway inflation sponsored by higher taxes.

Perot is a family man, lives in Dallas, married 35 years, five children, graduated from the Naval Academy in 1953 and served four years at sea. He has worked with the government on POWs in Asia, hostages in Iran, drug traffic in Texas, and educational reform in Texas. He has donated over \$100 million to charitable and civic activities to help the needy.

Perot has said that his main agenda is to get our country's economic situation back on track. We don't know yet about his views on the lesser issues. . .gun control, nuclear energy, health care, agricultural subsidies, abortion rights, crime/prisons, foreign trade, racial equality, AIDS research, the arts, ecology, endangered species, etc. etc. But remember. . . too many special interest groups are draining the life blood from our democracy.

Let's go ahead and get this fellow on the ballot. We can find out between now and November about his opinions on those specific issues which relate to each individual, and then if we don't agree with him, we sure don't have to vote for him. I have some of the petitions at my house. They have to be turned in by May 1 so he can meet the Texas May 15th filing deadline. Call me.

Friona Chieftain Band members will be in Austin June 1 for the state solo and ensemble competition.

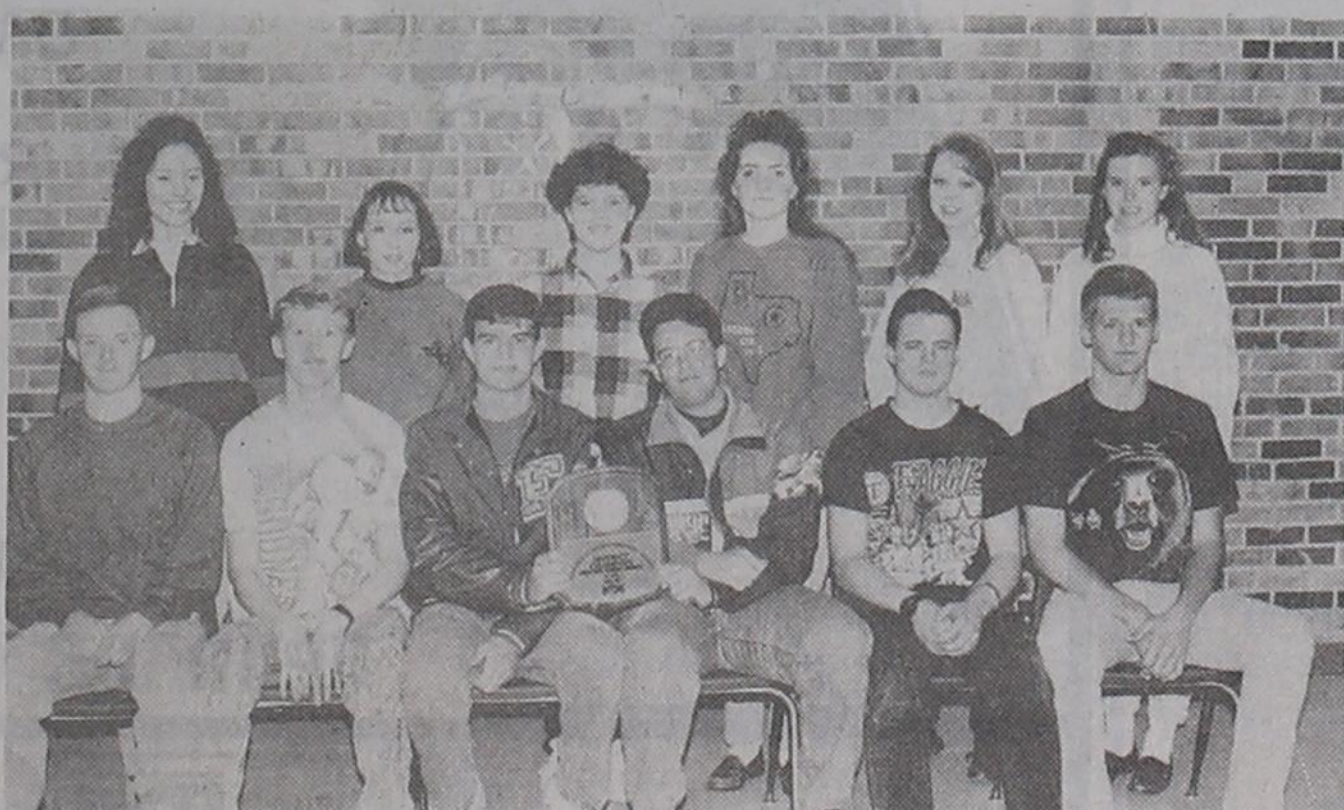

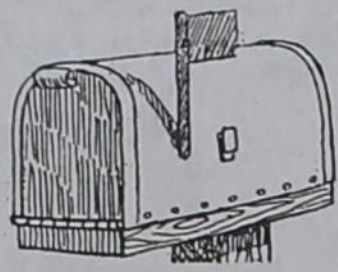

I do not have time to do this, when I say end it because of weather, that is what I mean.

Since you did not bother to sign your letter, I do not know who you are, but if you will contact me personally, the next time we have severe weather, I will call you and you can go with us and we'll see if you can do a better job.

60 Yrs. Ago--April 8, 1932

Friona's third city election passed into history Tuesday evening, when the election forces had finished the count and declared the results. Other candidates were F.W. Reeve and S. Mitchell. F.L. Spring and E.V. Rushing were elected board members. Other candidates for board members were D.H. Meade, E.B. McLellan and L.R. Dilger.

50 Yrs. Ago--April 3, 1942
Residents of Friona and surrounding territory will be privileged to take the Red Cross First Aid Course, according to announcements today. The course, as in many other communities, will be taught by State Highway patrolmen and will feature two classes each week.

Harold Lillard, son of Mr. and Mrs. L.F. Lillard, of this community, departed Wednesday morning for Lubbock, where he was called to take a final examination as a flying cadet.

40 Yrs. Ago--April 3, 1952
Friona businessmen came through this week and are posting some \$400 in awards for winning entries in the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show to be held at the local fairgrounds next weekend, Friday and Saturday, April 11 and 12. 30 Yrs. Ago--April 5, 1962
Plaques were presented to Friona's outstanding citizens at the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture annual banquet Friday. Mrs. Arvella England was chosen most courteous employee; Miss Jo

Phillips, teacher of the year; George Jones, man of the year; and Mrs. Rose Lange; woman of the year.

Voting was very light in the city election Tuesday. Of the estimated 490 qualified voters in the city, 76 cast ballots. Raymond Fleming was re-elected mayor for another term and Glenn Reeve and Ralph Taylor gained alderman positions.

20 Yrs. Ago--April 13, 1972
The Parmer County Commissioners this week issued a plea to county residents to refrain from using barrow ditches to dump trash and dead animals, or for draining sewage. At the same time, the commissioners issued a public notice that violators will be prosecuted to the full limits of the law. Fines for such violations can run from \$15 to \$200.

15 Yrs. Ago--April 10, 1977
Lonnie Mitchell, 55, died in a rural house fire early Wednesday morning, and his wife Norma was treated for minor burns at Parmer County Community Hospital. Fire Chief Ralph Shirley said Mrs. Mitchell was sitting in an automobile in front of the burning house, screaming "He's still in there,"

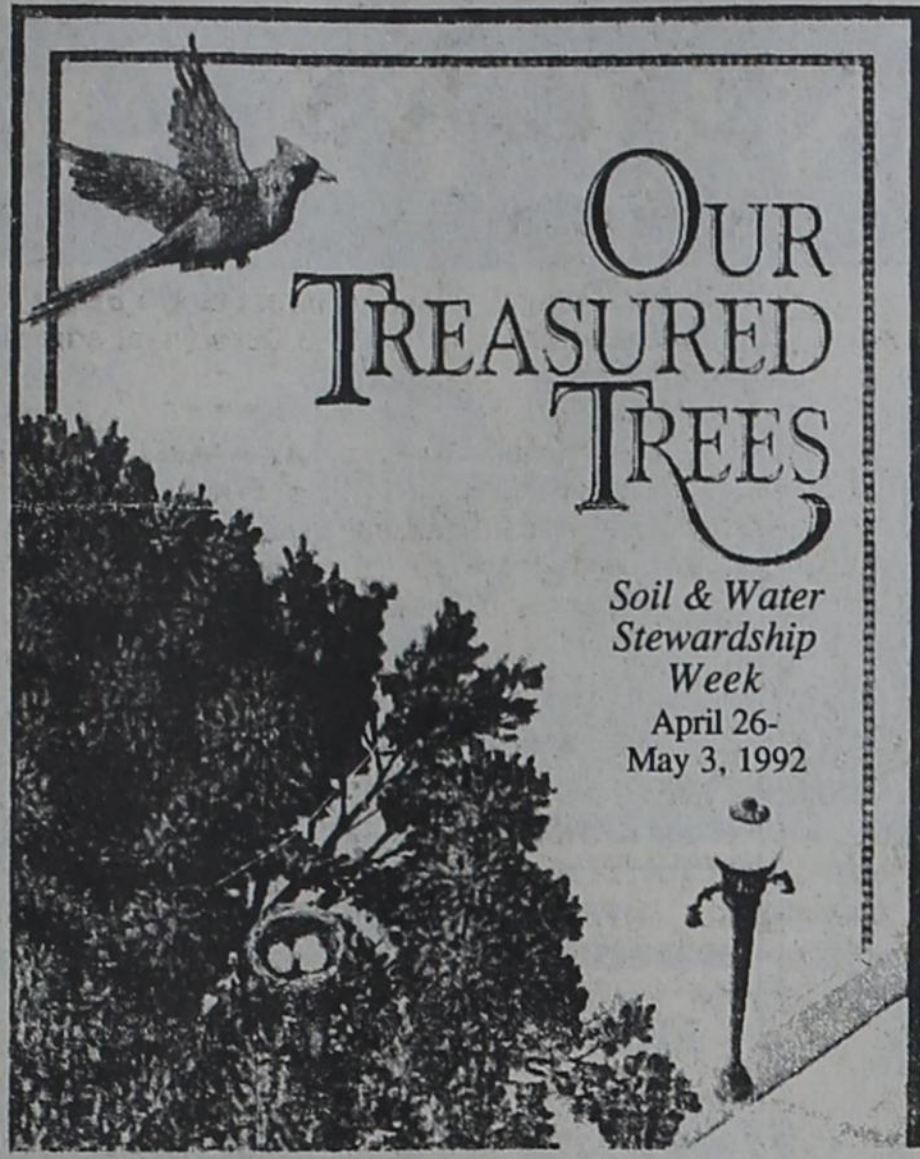

April 26 - May 3, 1992

Stewardship Week Set April 26-May 3

Featuring the vital role that trees and forests play in conserving soil and water resources, the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District is encouraging local schools, camps, churches, organizations and individuals to join the nationwide observance of Soil and Water Stewardship Week, April 26-May 3.

The local Conservation District, which works throughout the year on soil and water conservation measures, is providing literature and educational materials that describe how people are dependent upon and interact with trees. The local district is one of nearly 3,000 conservation districts nationwide that work with the National Association of Conservation Districts to encourage the wise use of

natural resources through the annual week-long observance.

M.C. Osborn, chairman of the Parmer County S.W.C.D., said he hopes Stewardship Week will encourage individuals to think about their relationship with trees and establish and care for trees in urban and rural areas. "Every citizen has the opportunity to plant a tree, care for a newly planted seedling, look after mature trees or send financial support to someone who will do those tasks," said Osborn.

Materials especially designed to convey the 1992 theme, "Our Treasured Trees," are being distributed by the Parmer County S.W.C.D. For more information, call 806-247-2220 or come by 1306 West Ninth Street in Friona.

Cancer Screening Clinic Set May 2

The Breast Cancer Screening Program of the Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will continue community outreach clinics for early detection of breast cancer.

Funding is available through the Texas Department of Health for screening mammography for Texas

residents qualifying for financial assistance.

Early detection of breast cancer is the major goal of cancer control for each woman seen in the clinic. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a Registered Nurse trained in breast cancer detection, teaching of breast self-examination and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer.

The guidelines are: (1) Learn and perform breast self-examination; (2) Have a physical examination every year; (3) Have a mammogram according to the recommendations by age. Age 35-40, one baseline mammogram; 40-50, a mammogram every 1-2 years; over 50, yearly mammograms.

A clinic will be held in Friona on Wednesday, May 20 from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at Parmer County Community Hospital, 1307 Cleveland. Exams are done by appointment only.

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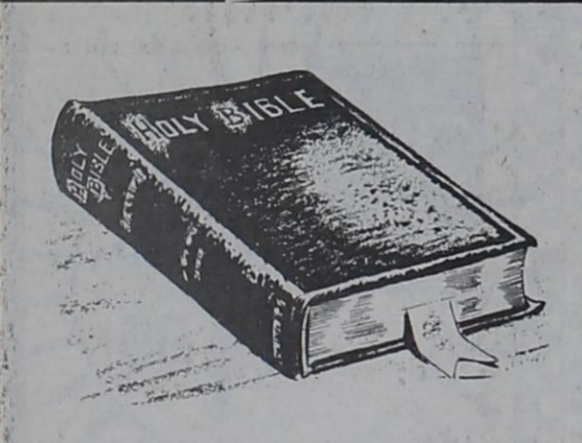

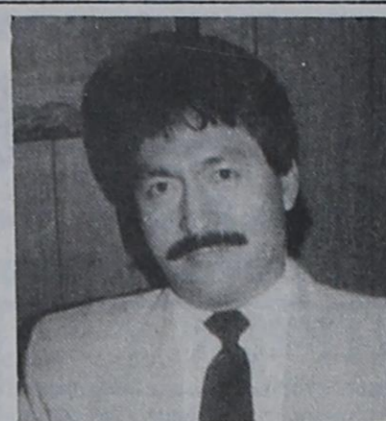

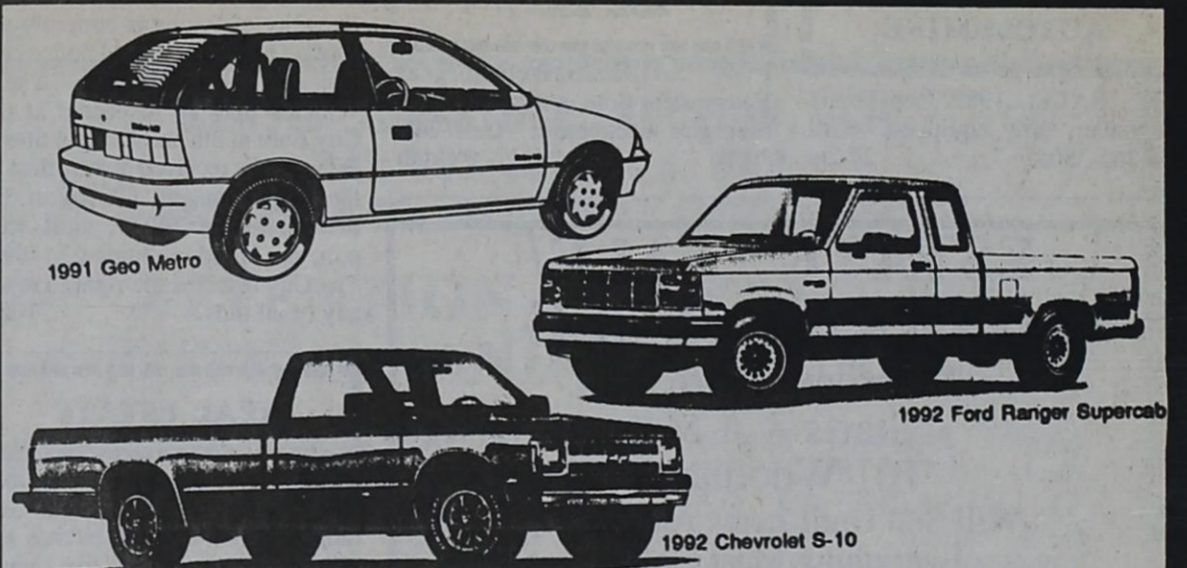

COLOR DEFICIENCIES

People aren't really color-blind. Everyone sees some color, but certain individuals are color-deficient: they have difficulty differentiating between specific colors. The most common problem: being unable to tell red from green.

A Stock Offering In Which Odds Could Be Against You

During the stock market excesses of the 1960s, it was not unusual to see a new stock offering come to market and double in price by the close of trading the same day. Glamour industries such as mobile homes, fast-food, pharmaceuticals, electronics and more turned investors into speculators. Even when there were no statistical reasons for buying, investors did so because, as part of "hot" industries, the stocks were considered fail-safe. Despite some well-publicized successes, most of these companies eventually vanished, along with stockholders' money.

Even today, studies show that prices of new stock issues are more likely to fall than rise. Peter Schliemann, portfolio manager for a major growth fund, says that the first day's performance of a new issue is generally its best. In the same report, Mutual Fund News Service cites a study showing that a new issue's price generally rises an average of 14 per cent on the first trading day. By the end of three years, however, the average price loses not only that 14 per cent but also another 15 per cent.

Schliemann's research reveals a similar trend. Sixty per cent of the 154 small companies he studied underperformed the market in the year after their initial offering. The reason for the decline was fundamental. More than half of the companies studied had a decline in earnings in that 12-month period, and one in seven actually lost money in

one of the subsequent four quarters.

Schliemann attributes much of this to the self-interest of company management. A public offering gives insiders the opportunity to diversify their assets by selling part of their holdings in the company. In some cases, insiders also anticipate a peak in earnings growth. And, as one fund manager observed, you don't sell what you think is going to get better.

Timing is another problem. New offerings typically come to market during friendly periods that have enjoyed long uptrends. For example, the first half of 1991, which was marked by an all-time high in the Dow Jones Industrial Average, saw a record number of new stock offerings. Purchasing stocks in high markets is expensive, but buyers are generally less concerned with a stock's fundamentals when everything is on the upswing. In a high-priced market, however, prices are more likely to fall than rise.

The message is, don't let the glamour of a stock or the lure of a quick profit change your fundamental rules of investing. Beware of companies with insignificant or erratic earnings. Don't buy when insiders are selling. Examine established and potential competitors. And finally, don't be in a hurry. The stock can always be bought later on the open market, often at a much lower cost.

Successful investors buy quality at reasonable prices. This is not to say they totally avoid smaller growth companies. Often, however, they wait to buy until after the initial offering period.
