## Moran National Announces The Addition Of New Savings Dept.

The Moran National Bank has announced that it is adding a savings department to its banking facilities effective January 1, and will pay interest of 4 per cent compounded quarterly on savings. The new department will be set up and will be operated in strict compliance with regulations governing such activities in National Banks. All deposits to the savings department will be insured up to \$10,000 by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.

Vice President D. L. Ellis and B. A. Elliott, chairman of the bank's board, said, "It is of particular concern to us that our customers understand the rather confusing regulations that govern bank saving," their joint statement said. "The announcement that Moran National will pay 4 per cent interest on savings can be misleading since a bank cannot pay 4

per cent until such funds have been on deposit for a full year. Only after this period will Federal Banking regulations permit the payment of 4 per cent."

The two bankers also said, however, that "we wish to assure our customers that in the fourth quarter an adjustment will be made in calculating interest to adjust for the previous three quarters so that the effective yield for a 12-month period actually amounts to 4 per cent compounded quarterly."

"On funds deposited and withdrawn in any period less than a year, the maximum rate is 3 1/2 per cent. This, like the 4 per cent, may be compounded quarterly. Moran National is eager to serve its customers in the vital field of savings but is equally concerned that its customers know the full picture of savings earnings."

Profits from the supper will be used to make improvements on the building, Commander Lunsford said. Everyone in the area was invited to attend the supper and to stay for the program which will follow.

## Post Office Department Plans New Post Office Building Here

Baird is to have a new post office building during the year of 1964, it was revealed in a letter received by the Baird Star from Congressman Omar Burleson Wednesday.

According to the letter from Congressman Burleson, the Post Office Department was to post bids on Thursday, December 5 for construction of a new post office building in Baird.

The preferred location is within two blocks radius of the center of the business section. Plans call for a 1900 square foot interior with an 80 square foot platform and adequate facilities.

It is to be built on a lease plan with the initial lease to run for 10 years with a 4-5 renewal option.

Bids are to be opened January 6, 1964 at Lubbock. Bids should be sent to Mr. V. E. Bell, Real Estate, Box 1386, Lubbock.

had been erected in the square to further designate Belle Plaine as the center of the county which they hoped would emphasize the fact that it was more ideally located than its rival a few miles east across the trail.

The double doors of Merchant McCoy & Co., were opened early so that Mrs. T. J. Austin, her daughter Josephine Blakley and Mrs. Lizzie Phillips could start setting the tables which had been placed on the first floor of the store. At John Merchant's request they had baked pies, cakes and fine white bread to supplement the barbeque that he was providing for the celebration. The second story of the building would be the scene of the dance that would begin that night after the returns were in. Rebel yells probably filled the air when the "General returns of an election begun and held pursuant to the Proclamation of the Governor of the State of Texas in and for the County of Callahan and the State of Texas, on the 13th day of October 1877, for the Permanent Location of a County Seat for Callahan County.

Marjority for Belle Plaine 51 votes were announced that night in Belle Plaine and most likely kept resounding through the night as the founding fathers of the town swung their ladies round and round to the tunes the fiddler played in the "ballroom" of the Merchant McCoy store.

A few days later the air of jubilation became one of complete frustration when Judge J. R. Brown piked up his mail and learned to his dismay that the proclamation sent by Governor Hubbard on the 14th of September had arrived. According to law, notice for an election had to be posted twenty days before the election could be held. The county seat election had been

held without having first received the proclamation in hope that when the official notice was received, the right amount of time would have elapsed to make it legal, but this had taken place only eighteen days instead of the twenty prescribed by law, thus the election was null and void.

An emergency meeting of the Commissioners Court was called and the officials decided that Judge Brown should wire the Secretary of State in Austin and find out if something could be done to make the election legal after all.

Judge Brown made use of the Army Telegraph line since this was a dire emergency, the reply he received made things even more confusing when he learned that when the Governor had received the second request from the Commissioners Court for the election, he had issued another document rescheduling the election for November 12th.

"Hubbard, Sir:  
Your proclamation issued September 14, ordering election for a permanent location of County Seat, reached me 24th inst. after night fall. By telegram from Hon. Sec. of State, I learned you issued 2nd proclamation ordering election for 12th November, which has not yet reached me. By an order of Hon. Com. Court of Callahan County in session today (October 31st) Mr. J. B. Douglass visits you to ask of you an order for an election for location Co. Seat. We do this in view of the fact that under the present mail facilities we will not be able to get your order in time to make it legal.

This was approved, given to Douglas who mounted his fast horse "Old Admiration" the next morning and started his arduous journey to Austin to secure the coveted proclamation. After four days of hard and fast riding he arrived at the Capitol where he presented the letter to the Governor without delay, explaining of course, the necessity for his ride as well as the mess the county was in due to the inefficiency of the Post Office in delivery of mail.

The Governor gave Douglass the requested proclamation and four days later "Old Admiration" brought his rider back to Belle Plaine with the document which would make the next election legal.

As far as can be determined by the records of the court, the

second election was held in Belle Plaine on the 8th of December where the returns once again proclaimed Belle Plaine the county seat.

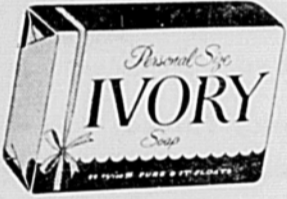
