support to Belle Plaine as the The Star Saloon had opened to take care of the overflow from the Double O and Cheat-ham's while genial Hog Jackson and his mother-in-law, Mrs. Roberts, were catering to the appetites of the hungry crowds that filled the benches around their table. The Rice Hotel was booked to capacity, the overflow slept outside on blankets. The few houses in town were filled with friends or relatives of the occupants who were hospitably making room for "one more".

Commissioners waited for the expected proclamation from the Governor, then sent another letter hoping that this time they would have their request granted before October 13th which they had set as the date for the election.

D. T. Russell, Frank McLaurey, James Randals, Doctor J. D. Windham and A. L. Gatewood were appointed to preside at the precincts in the county. After the ballots had been marked by the voters, these men would see that the ballot boxes would be sealed and brought into Belle Plaine for the final talley.

On October 12, Jasper McCoy rode into Belle Plaine and filed a copy of the town plat with Isaac Shaw so that the sale of the town lots could begin, legally, after the election returns were in.

Early on the morning of the 13th, a large American flag was raised upon the flag pole which

had been erected in the square to further designate Belle Plaine as the center of the county which they hoped would emphasize the fact that it was more ideally located than its rival a few miles east across the trail.

The double doors of Merchant McCoy & Co., were opened early so that Mrs. T. J. Austin, her daughter Josephine Blakley and Mrs. Lizzie Phillips could start setting the tables which had been placed on the first floor of the store. At John Merchant's request they had baked pies, cakes and fine white bread to supplement the barbeque that he was providing for the celebration. The second story of the building would be the scene of the dance that would begin that night after the returns were in.

Rebel yells probably filled the air when the "General returns of an election begun and held persuant to the Proclamation of the Governor of the State of Texas in and for the County of Callahan and the State of Texas, on the 13th day of October 1877, for the Permanent Location of a County Seat for Callahan County.

The second proclamation sent by the Governor ordering the election still had not arrived and the date mentioned in the wire was growing close without the official document arriving, so to legalize the next election, the officials gathered once more at Belle Plaine to work out a solution.

The United States Mails had let them down not once, but twice, they couldn't wait forever for the letter authorizing another vote.


