also be cutting down on crime and improving our over-crowded prison populations. You may remember that Dr. Cavazos was appointed to the Reagan Cabinet
as Secretary of Education last summer and was then re-appointed by the new Bush administration. Cavazos is the first HispanicAmerican to ever serve in a Cabinet post and he is the former
President of Texas Tech President of Texas Tech
University. In fact, one of the last public acts which he performed in the capacity of Tech President was at graduation ceremonies last May.
Several Parmer County young people received degrees at thos ceremonies, including my oldes
son, Stanley. So this person ha already touched our lives to a small extent.
"Currently about one in fou
students across the nation drop out of school," Cavazos says. His next highenst priority is the 13
percent illiteracy rate in the United percent illiteracy rate in the United
States. Personally, I do not think either the dropout rate or illiteracy can be
wiped out without nirst instuling a desire for learning among the nation's children. Some children
