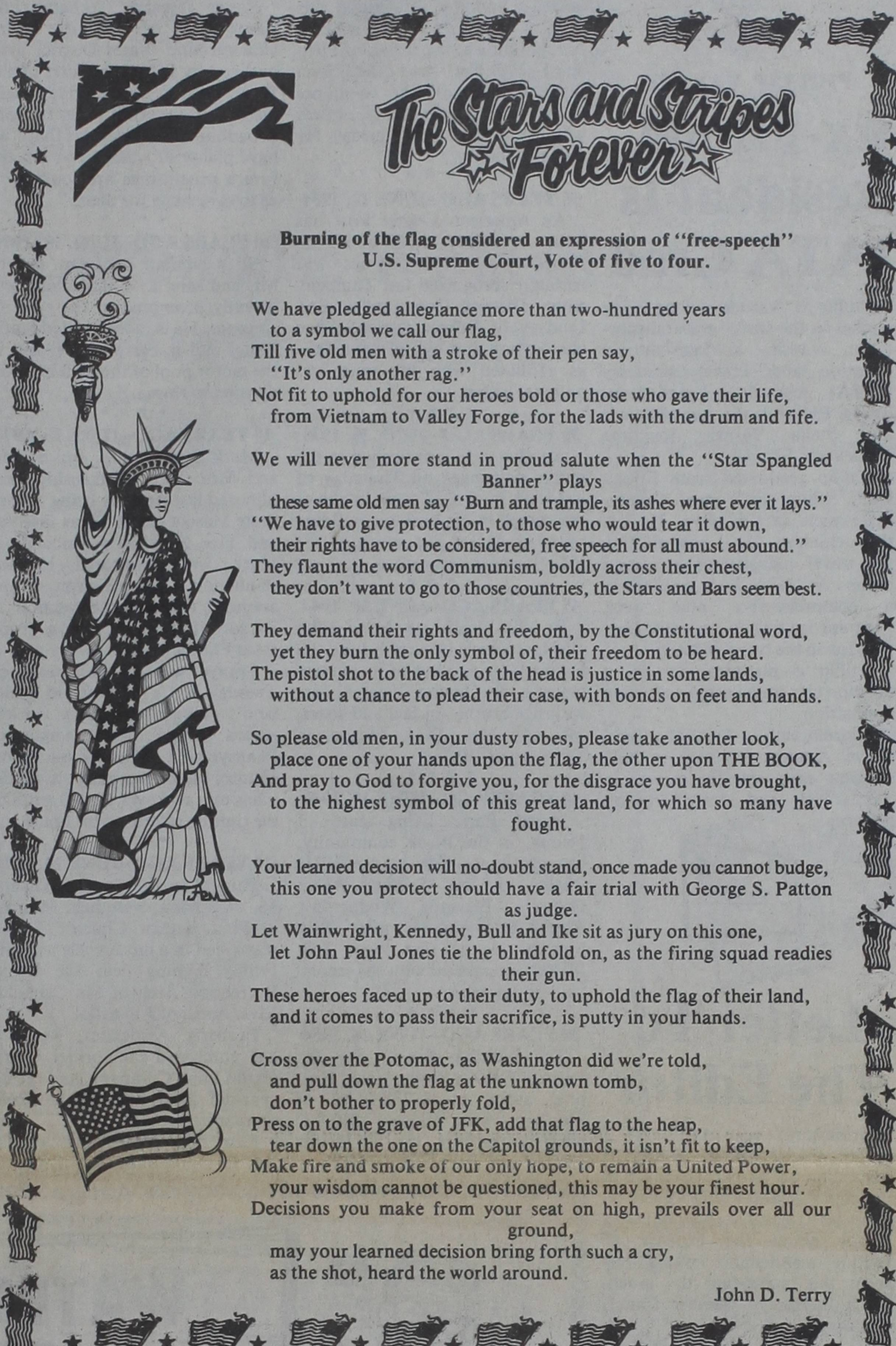

**OUR STATE LEGISLATURE** has passed a law that would require the conversion of school buses in many of the school districts in the states to compressed natural gas.

This particular piece of legislation must have gone through with very little fanfare, and Governor Clements signed the bill.

As we understand it, the buses will have to use the compressed natural gas in certain sized districts beginning in 1991.

John D. Terry called this to our attention, and also gave ye editor a short course on compressed natural gas. The way he explains things, the children who end up riding on the experimental school buses running on the CNG could be riding on potential "time bombs."

Terry says that at the temperature that the CNG is handled, if there happened to be a spill, the result could be equivalent to an atomic bomb.

The question, then, is posed: Why subject our Texas school children to an experiment involving such risks???

To give you an idea of how much pressure is involved in the compressed natural gas, Terry points out that the fuel propane contains from 150 to 200 pounds of pressure per square inch at 100 degree temperature. In CNG, the comparative pressure would run over 3,000 pounds.

Compressed natural gas has to be refrigerated at its place of storage, which creates another problem, and expense to those using the fuel.

It was stated that in order to convert school buses from their present fuel to CNG, it would cost approximately \$1500 per vehicle. However, those people familiar with the process figure that the actual cost will probably be at least double this estimate.

Taxpayers will undoubtedly be called upon to shoulder the cost of this uncanny experiment, but at this point it isn't known if the cost would be borne at the local level, or on a statewide basis.

Terry pointed out that in San Diego, California, the city has experimented in the use of alternate fuel on city-owned vehicles.

The San Diego Gas and Electric Company has expressed an interest in promoting the use of CNG as a vehicle fuel and has provided some preliminary information to the City in this regard.

Before any testing could take place, however, several important points need to be addressed concerning fueling facilities, weight and size of fuel tanks in vehicles, and safety of operation.

For use in a vehicle, the natural gas is compressed and liquified under high pressure. This requires special fueling facilities and large, heavy storage tanks.

It was reported that before the program could even begin in San Diego, a consumer group brought up the safety factor, and brought about the moving of the proposed distribution facility.

To try out CNG on municipal vehicles, trucks, etc., would be one thing.

But on our school buses?? We have the addresses of your state representative and senator, if interested.

## Area Receives Good Rainfall Celebration

The Friona area received a nice rainshower Wednesday evening, when an unstable system moved across the area.

While Friona has been in the position of "just being on the edge" of rain systems most of the summer, this time the Friona measurement was the most for any city in the region.

The official measurement in Friona was .86 inches. The rain began to fall at about 9:10 p.m., and continued fairly heavy until 10 p.m., tapering off to a light shower until around 11 p.m.

Most of the immediate area was able to get some rain. It was reported that the rain just west of town was much heavier. Keith Black said he received almost two inches three miles west (the former W.D. Buske place), and understood that farmers in the area had received about that amount generally.

The cloud seemed to "stall out" just west of Friona, being a very slow-mover, and dumped a lot of rain in places.

It was reported that Clyde Woodard had received around an inch of rain.

The rains during June, while none of them measuring over an inch, have been spaced nicely. In Woodard's case, it was said that he had a patch of corn that had to be "watered up," but since the crop has come up, it has not had to be irrigated, thanks to the rain.

Friona officially received 3.39 inches of rain during the month of June, and that helped considerably to get the moisture back "on track." The moisture was measured on 11 different dates and was for the most part good, soaking rainfall.

Other rainfall amounts reported to the Friona Star Friday morning include .9 inch by Hub Grain; .4 inch by Black Grain; and .95 inch by Joe Allen at Sherley-Anderson's Rhea elevator. Allen said the measurement was .75 inch on Wednesday and .20 on Thursday afternoon.

Here is a re-cap on the month's rainfall locally:

June 2: .30; June 3: .14; June 4: .08; June 5: .08; June 9: .58; June 10: .01; June 11: .03; June 13: .61; June 22: .66; June 23: .04; June 29: .86; June 30: trace.

Temperatures for the month ranged from a low of 46 degrees the morning of June 5 to a high of 97 June 22.

## Senator Gramm Reports Here On "War On Drugs"

U.S. Senator Phil Gramm visited Friona Thursday evening to praise local law enforcement officers for their efforts in fighting drug abuse and to brief them on congressional efforts targeting our nation's drug problem.

"I am here to pay tribute to the brave men and women who are serving on the front-line in our battle against drug abuse," the senator said.

Senator Gramm is meeting with the leadership of rural Texas communities this week seeking their evaluation as to the extent of the drug problem in their area. In addition, Senator Gramm is providing these officials details on the "Anti-Drug Act of 1988" which President Ronald Reagan signed into law on November 18.

In describing how the legislation will better equip our nation to wage and win the "Drug War" the senator said, "For too long law enforcement officials have had to fight a big battle with a small stick. I am pleased to say that the federal government is finally wading in and giving you a bigger stick."

The recently enacted drug bill is aimed at "beefing-up" law enforcement efforts in dealing with drug abuse. The bill sets mandatory sentences for anyone convicted of selling drugs to minors and mandates the death penalty for those guilty of drug-related police officer murders. The bill also provides additional federal funding to fight the flow of illegal drugs.

Senator Gramm has made the fight against drugs a top legislative priority item with his work in the U.S. Senate. Although the senator co-authored the drug bill adopted by Congress, he is convinced that additional action by Congress will be required if we are to achieve a drug-free America. Senator Gramm believes steps must be taken to deal not only with the supply of drugs, but also with the demand for them.

"Twenty-three million Americans are regular drug users. They are not drug addicts. They are people like you and me, they go to work, pay taxes, but they buy drugs," said the Senator. "In doing so, they provide the high-stake incentive for the drug-peddling thugs who swarm our neighborhoods and school campuses. To win the "drug war" we must ultimately cut-off the demand for drugs," he said.

The senator, joined by DPS Trooper Trey Ellis, and Friona Chief of Police Lloyd Niece, as well as other law enforcement and civic officials, participated in a question and answer session.

County Sheriff Rex Williams was scheduled to participate, but was in the process of transferring a prisoner to Huntsville.

Senator Gramm holds a Ph.D. in economics, a subject he taught at Texas A&M University, and serves as a member of the Senate Budget, Appropriations and the Senate Banking Committees.

Gramm, a national leader in budget matters, co-authored the Gramm-Latta I and II federal budgets in the House and the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings balanced budget legislation in the Senate.

## The Continuing Conflict Of Freedom

In 1962, fresh out of high school, brimming with spirit and endurance, I determined to hitchhike to the World's Fair in Seattle. With my liberal family's blessing, my uncle deposited me on Highway 87 just north of Lubbock and there I stood for ten minutes, hesitant thumb in the air, a suitcase labeled with the handwritten sign, "Seattle or Bust" and \$120.00 in traveler's checks in my pocket.

Within ten minutes a young man, a year my senior, driving a black and white 1957 Chevrolet Impala stopped and picked me up. He was going to join his Army unit in Tacoma, Washington and would be happy to take me all the way to Seattle. Fortune blessed my whole trip that way.

Throughout, there was a buoyant crispness of youthful expectation that only freedom of the road can give. The majestic sweep of the land and the exuberance and good cheer of all those with whom I rode and met left a Norman Rockwellian imprint of America on my soul.

Life seemed simpler then. Our country still rode the crest of World War II prosperity. John F. Kennedy and Martin Luther King were still alive. No one had heard of Vietnam. The country, through my trusting eyes, appeared as naive and innocent as I.

We know better now, of course. America has always been a boisterously complicated place, struggling over such incessant contradictions as control and permissiveness, liberal visions and conservative expediencies, the boundlessness of freedom and the barbarity of power.

Recognizing that conflict can forge national character, Franklin Delano Roosevelt made these celebrated remarks in his 1941 address to Congress:

"In the future days which we seek to make secure, we look forward to a world founded upon four essential human freedoms. The first is freedom of speech and expression--everywhere in the world.

"The second is freedom of every person to worship God in his own way--everywhere in the world.

"The third is freedom from want--which, translated into world

terms, means economic understanding which will secure to every nation a healthy peacetime life for its inhabitants--everywhere in the world.

"The fourth is freedom from fear--which, translated into world terms, means a worldwide education of armaments to such a point and in such a thorough fashion that no nation will be in a position to commit an act of physical aggression against any neighbor--anywhere in the world.

The task in our country of conflict rests in assuring that these freedoms are enjoyed by all. With freedom there's no place for bigotry, no place for greed or over-consumption or excessive litigation; there's no place for abuse--of children, of women, of our individual bodies or of our souls. Freedom demands sacrifices and self-discipline.

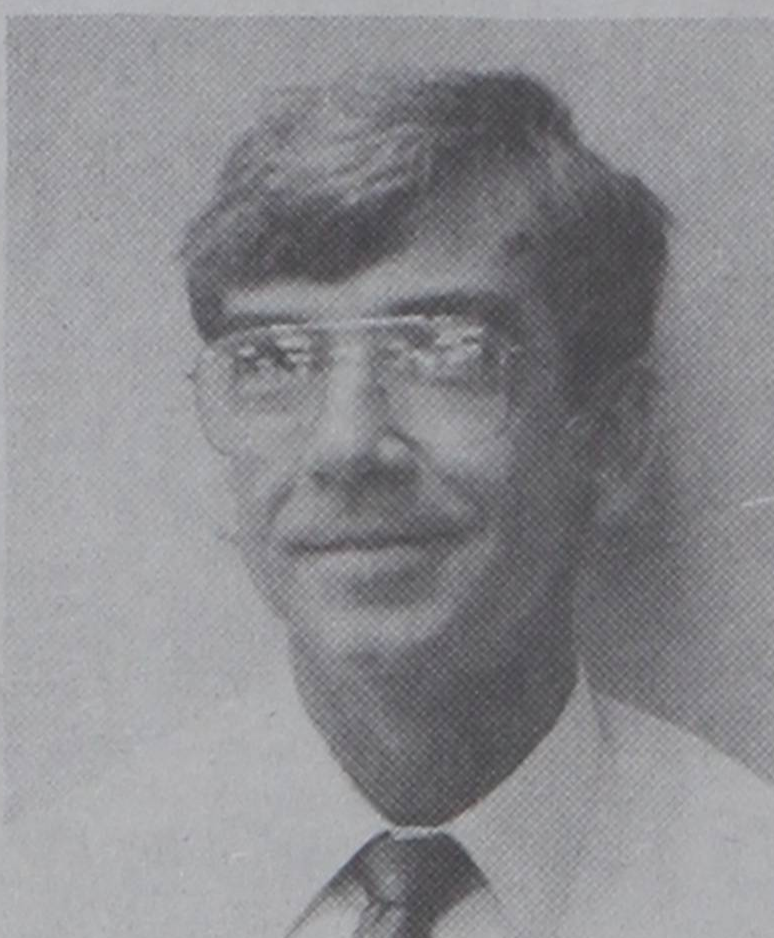
If our country is to promote freedom, we need to stop murdering and hurting each other. We must stop the graphic violence in movies, television and magazines that subtly influences us to treat each other unkindly. We must stop killing each other with pollution.

If our country is to be free from want we must give up greed. We must stop suing each other. We must stop wanting more than is good for us.

If our country is to remain free we must advocate freedom for the world. We don't make other countries free by inflicting our policies on them. We make others free by living the example, by showing others the advantages of freedom, by making virtue admirable, by first healing ourselves.

Some will say I'm the same naive hitchhiker I was 27 years ago. Yes, I believe that each of us can sacrifice for the common good, for freedom. I believe in you and me and our willingness to do the right thing. But, that's not naivete--that's faith. Faith in our country and our people. Faith that if you hold your thumb out there long enough, a car will always come along, and that good will find those who dream of it.

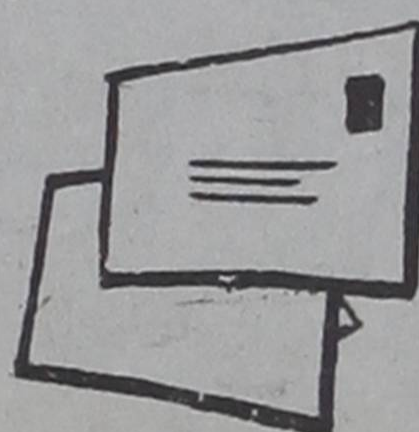
### PHILLIP VARNER Ex-Friona Resident Is IATA Grad

# Friona Flashbacks

#### 60 YEARS AGO--JUNE 28, 1929

A contract was let and ground broken this week for another business building for Friona this week. J.W. Parr will build a 75x90 foot building at the corner of Fifth and Euclid, just west of the Friona State Bank building, to house Friona Motor Company, which will handle the Ford agency for Parmer County.

#### 55 YEARS AGO--JUNE 22, 1934

An American Legion Post has been organized at Friona. A charter list of 26 names was formally recognized last Thursday when District Commander Bob Lindsay of Borger presented the charter and approved Friona Post as affiliated with the state and national legion.

#### 50 YEARS AGO--JUNE 30, 1939

Another cafe was opened to the public patronage on Thursday of last week by O.G. Turner in one of the rooms in his business building on Main Street just south of the F.L. Spring grocery store.

#### 45 YEARS AGO--JUNE 30, 1944

By the death of Mrs. John Gishler, which occurred June 24, Friona loses another of its pioneer citizens, she having located here with her brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. D.H. Meade, in February of 1910.

#### 40 YEARS AGO--JUNE 17, 1949

Bruce Parr, living east of Friona, in the Black community, brought in the first load of 1949 wheat to the Friona Wheat Growers Elevator Wednesday. About five minutes after Parr brought in the first load, J.G. McFarland arrived with the second load of new wheat.

#### 35 YEARS AGO--JUNE 24, 1954

The building fund drive for Parmer County Community Hospital stood at \$17,253 as of Monday, with another \$10,000 pledged, making the drive for \$50,000 at a little past the halfway

mark.

#### 30 YEARS AGO--JUNE 24, 1959

Water research, recharge and future plans of the High Plains Underground Water District were outlined by Bill Broadhurst of the Water District at the Friday night meeting of the Rhea Farm Bureau. Broadhurst told members that "we have plenty of water now, but the future generations are looking to us to save some for them."

#### 20 YEARS AGO--JUNE 19, 1969

SP/4 Numan Loafman, son of Mr. and Mrs. L.W. Loafman, was recently promoted to the rank of sergeant. He is in the United States Army and is currently serving in the motor pool of the 38th infantry division in Korea.

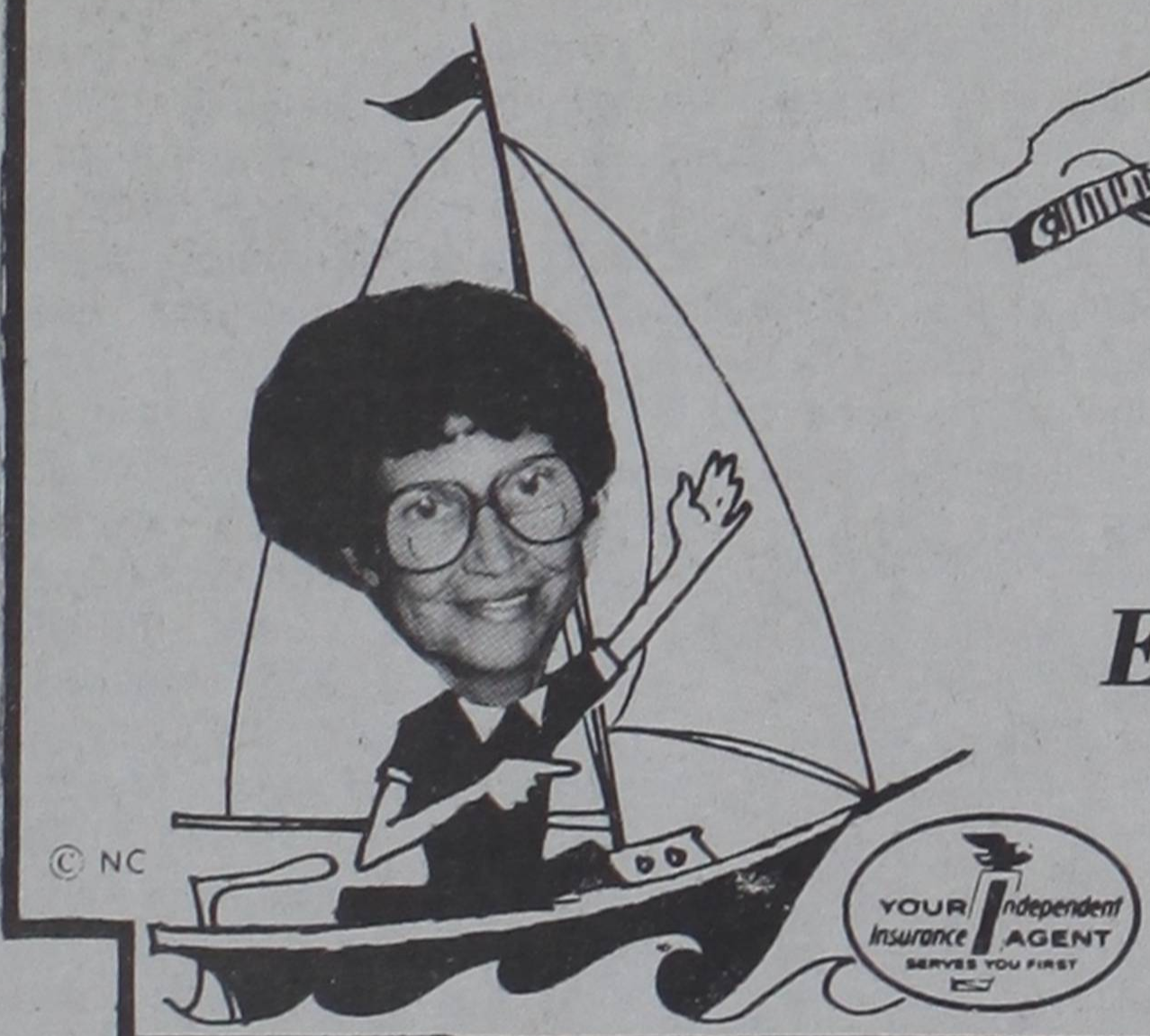

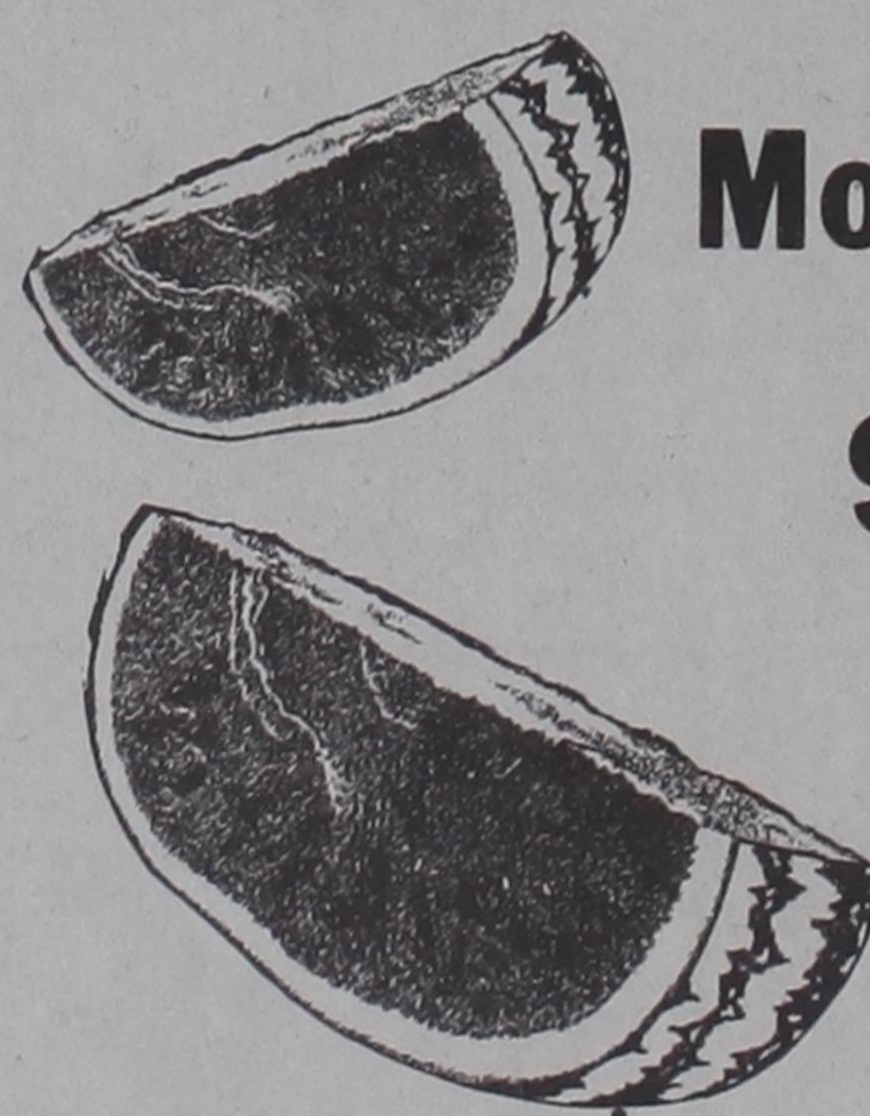

Authorities said a 1985 GMC Blazer was southbound when it collided with a 1975 Ford pickup, westbound on another road.

The Blazer struck the pickup on the passenger side, the DPS spokesman said.

The occupants of the vehicles were not wearing safety belts.

Benge married Jane Wiley on December 20, 1952 at Post. She preceded him in death September

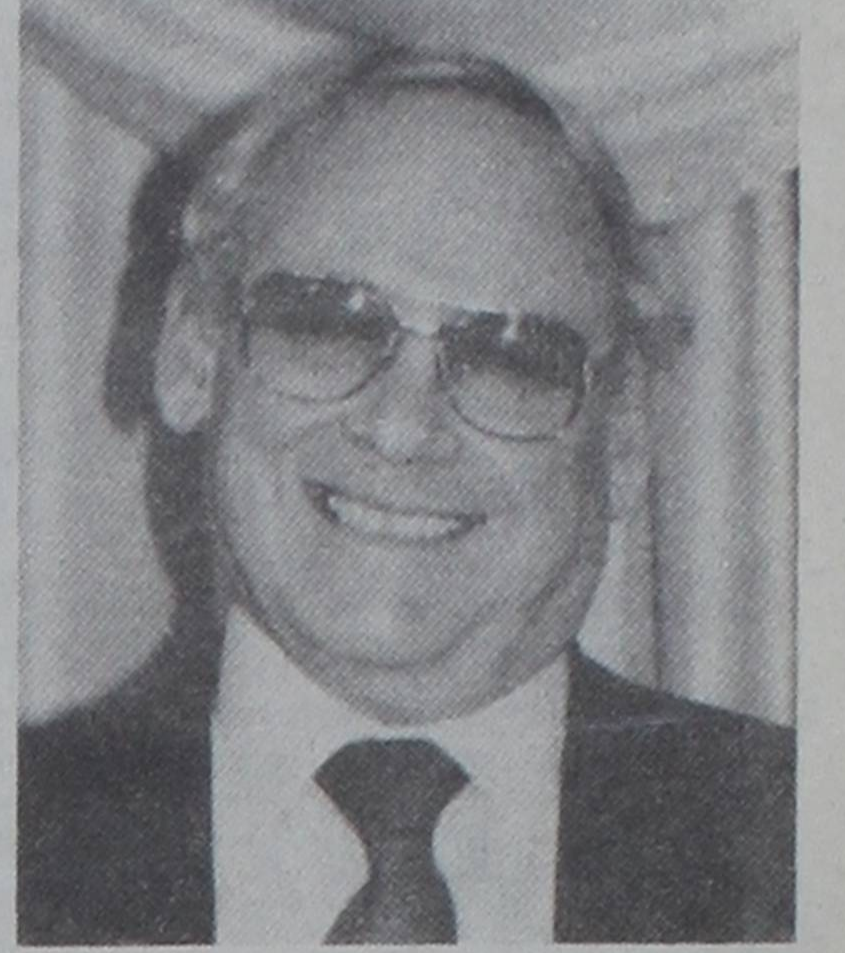
10, 1984. He married Nelda May Miller December 26, 1986 in Friona.

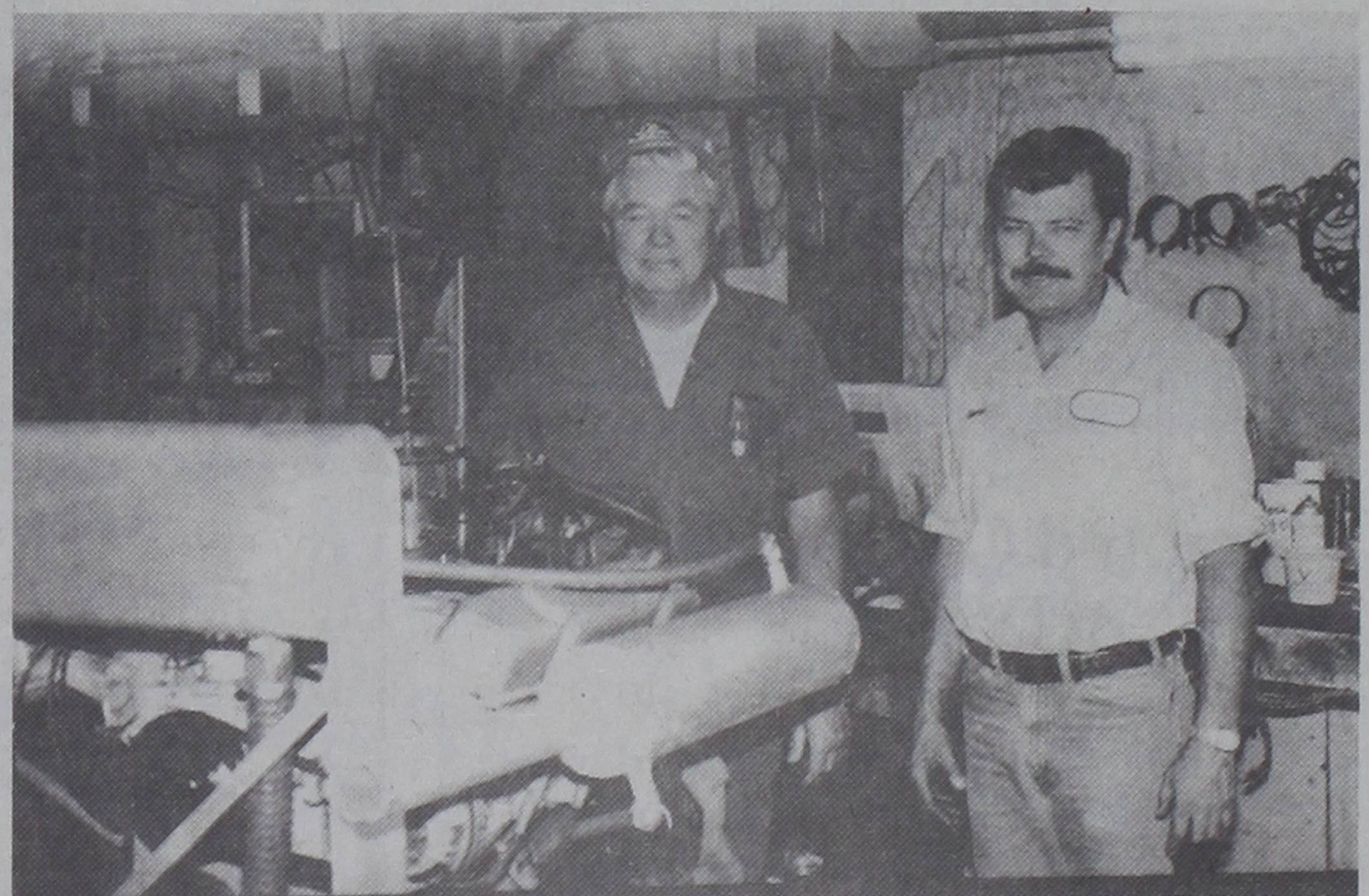

# Friona Children Attend Special Summer Camp

There are thousands of diseases in the world which, unfortunately, plague many children. Sometimes a "cure" is available, sometimes a pacifying treatment exists, and sometimes nothing can be done.

These children often feel lost and lonely in their own worlds, and it takes some very special people to change these feelings and show the kids that life can and will go on almost as it does for children without such diseases.

Fortunately, diabetes has a treatment; fortunately, there is a place for children with diabetes to meet others like themselves; fortunately, those special people have reached out to touch these children's lives.

The treatment is a balance of exercise, insulin and diet. The place is a special camp for children with diabetes, and the special people are those who make it possible for these kids to have such a camp.

Since the summer of 1981, the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center and District 573 of the Rotary International have sponsored a camp for children with diabetes. Local West Texas Rotary Clubs donate the funds needed to operate the camp, and they provide tuition for many of the campers.

The Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center provides the specialized staff who works the camp, and several medical supply companies donate much of the equipment used by the campers.

The first year the camp was held at Plains Baptist Assembly near Floydada, Texas. From 1982 through 1987, the camp was conducted at Butman Methodist Encampment near Merkel, Texas.

In 1988, the camp was moved back to Plains Baptist Assembly. This year, sixty-one campers

attended the camp which was held at the same location, and four Friona young people had the opportunity to attend the week long camp which lasted from June 17 through June 24.

Julie Brown and Holly Snead served as senior counselors while Michael Chad Wilkins enjoyed his fourth summer as a camper. Daniel Blackburn, who is not yet old enough to be a camper, visited the camp for a day.

The camp is directed by Dr. Michael J. Bourgeois of the Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center. Resident doctors and nurses from Lubbock General Hospital are present for the entire camp session. Counselors consist of medical students, nursing students and people with diabetes.

A nutritionist is on hand to direct the meals and snacks and to educate the children about their meal patterns and nutritional needs. A psychologist or social worker is on staff to help the kids understand the problems they will encounter concerning their diabetes.

The camp is for children with diabetes between the ages of six and 16. The campers are divided into several groups according to age, and throughout the week they receive instruction on several recreational activities. These include hiking, games, archery, BB shooting, crafts and swimming. Not only do the children spend time with their activities, but they also attend short classes every afternoon concerning their diabetes management, care and attitudes.

"Hiking was my favorite thing to do," said Michael Wilkins. While at camp, Michael learned to prepare his own insulin injections. In the three years which Michael attended camp previously, he learned to do his own blood glucose testing and to give his own

insulin injections.

"What's helped us the most is that he (Michael) has learned to take care of himself. He's no longer totally dependent on us with his diabetes," said Charles Wilkins, Michael's father.

Five-year-old Daniel Blackburn visited the camp for one day, during which he enjoyed swimming and playing with the other kids. During his short visit, he gave his counselor an injection and then turned around and gave his own insulin injection for the first time.

The children who attend the camp certainly learn a great deal about their diabetes and how to manage it. However, one of the most important things they discover while at camp is that there are many kids just like them, and they can all learn from each other.

Daniel Blackburn's father, David, felt that Daniel benefitted from his one-day visit in this way. "The camp shows kids that others have the same problems they do. Sometimes a diabetic kid feels that he is the only one in the world with this disease, but the camp lets kids know that there are others in the same boat."

The camp is a place to meet other children with diabetes; it is a place to learn more about controlling the disease and dealing with all that goes with it. For some, though, it has also been a place which has helped determine a part of their futures.

Julie Brown, a 1989 graduate of Friona High School, is a nine-year "veteran" of the camp. "Working with kids who have diabetes and dealing with my own diabetes has made me decide on nursing as a career," Julie says.

Hopefully the camp will grow and build with the help and gifts of special people like the Rotary Club members and the Texas Tech medical staff. It will continue to be

a place of learning, a place of friendship and a place full of special people and special children who have the courage and determination to accept a disease and not let it beat them.

## CRP Signup Approaches

As a result of the Food Security Act (FSA) passed in 1985, farms which contain land that is classified as highly erodible must have a conservation plan in order to remain eligible for any of the U.S. Government farm programs. The goal of writing and following these plans is to protect the land from both wind and water erosion.

According to Howard Sprague, Soil Conservationist in Friona, one of the best options for land protection offered in these plans is the planting of highly erodible land to grass. The planting of the land to grass can be done under the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP).

Under the CRP program, the land owner agrees to establish his land to grass and to control any problems which may arise during the life of the contract. The length of the contract is ten years. The landowner receives cost share for costs associated with establishing the grass.

The landowner also receives a rental payment for land enrolled in the CRP program.

The next CRP sign-up will be from July 17 through August 4. If you are a landowner interested in enrolling your land in the CRP program, you will need to call the ASCS office in Farwell

### Module XVI: World Financial Markets Offer Opportunities

Although Japan has received much attention for its international investments and affect on the global economy in the past two decades, it's not alone in the expanding world economy. Today the gross national product of the United States alone is twice the 1970 GNP of the entire world and the GNP of the world has increased sixfold in the past 19 years. The pace of GNP growth in other major industrialized countries has been faster than that of our nation. This isn't altogether surprising considering some countries have just recently begun to enter world equity markets.

According to the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development, world GNP was \$12.4 trillion in 1987, up from \$2.1 trillion in 1970. At the same time, the United States' share of world GNP dropped from 47 percent to 36 percent.

This is not intended to suggest that the United States has become a second-rate industrial nation, but it does show that the entire world economy is growing and offering investors more opportunity than ever.

The world equity markets have also expanded with the growing economy and increasing world GNP. Investors who ignore this growing world economy eliminate two-thirds of the world's investment opportunities.

Although international investing presents excellent opportunities, most individual investors lack the expertise to effectively participate in this expanding market. However, more and more individual investors are placing dollars in overseas markets—markets that have been primarily

restricted to institutions and professional investors. Even as recently as ten years ago, U.S. institutional commitment in foreign securities was minimal. Intersec Research Corp. shows only 1.7 billion U.S. institutional dollars invested abroad in 1979. Through 1987 that figure increased to nearly \$50 billion, and Pensions & Investment Age, a corporate and institutional investor publication, predicts foreign investment will grow to \$1.3 trillion by the year 2000.

International investing is not without risk, but its rewards are quite good. Average annual returns of world equity markets between 1970 and 1987, as measured by Morgan Stanley Capital International, show that 15 of 17 nations in the world market outperformed the American Stock Market as measured by Standard & Poor's 500.

A portion of total return on global investments, however, is derived from currency fluctuations. Unlike investing U.S. dollars in U.S. markets, global investing depends both on the market return of the overseas nation and the currency gain or loss. Should both of these be negative, the investment risk could be substantial.

If you're interested in sampling global investing, you can look to a variety of mutual funds. International funds demand particular attention. Not only is the management success of the fund's group in the United States important but their international affiliation and in-house expertise is vital.

As with any mutual fund, a global fund with a record of success will let you rest easier at night.

His statement was backed by recent Consumer Data Service reports that indicated grocery store ads triple volume on discounted items and double volume on regularly priced items. It also revealed grocery ads are read by well over 70% of newspaper readers.

Grocery store representatives unanimously agreed that newspaper advertising was the only way to get immediate consumer response. One grocer remarked, "Most people read the paper, and a bunch of those readers clip our coupons. It's that simple." His comments reflect the well known Manufacturer's Coupon Center report which stated that over 80% of all families use coupons.
