**BETTER LATE THAN never**, we made our annual visit to the "TEXAS" production in Palo Duro Canyon this week.

We have hardly missed a year since "TEXAS" was first produced in 1966, and the show always seems to get better every year.

As most of you know, the Ellis family thought the production was especially good during the summer of 1979, when daughter Laura was in the cast, and we made more than just a couple of "token" appearances that year.

Laura and husband Tim accompanied us to the production this week, and it served as her 10th anniversary since serving as a dancer on the "TEXAS" stage.

She was somewhat surprised to find that there were several members of the cast from 1979 who still are appearing in the production.

Of course there is Jerry (Tucker Yeldell) Williams, who is in his 22nd season as the crusty prospector, and Lois Kirkpatrick Hull, in her 14th season as "Aunt Anna" in the production.

In addition to these, along with a couple of other members of the dance troupe, Laura met two other former members of "TEXAS" who, like herself were attending in the audience last Tuesday.

One was Royal Brantley, who played Calvin Armstrong the year Laura was in the show, and the other was Kevin Knapp, who was a dancer in the show prior to becoming legislative assistant to Bill Sarpalus and is now an Amarillo businessman.

Then there is Raymond Raillard, executive vice president of the "TEXAS" production, who still greets audiences as one of the ticket-takers as you enter the amphitheatre.

Besides the always-changing costumes, it seemed that one of the major improvements for 1989 has been in the sound area. The audio and visual aspects of the show have always been superb, but it seems that there have been major improvements in this area in the past few years.

At every performance, there are those who are seeing the "TEXAS" production for the first time, and no doubt a number like ourselves, who have probably seen it 50 times. And it's hard to tell who is enjoying the production the most.

One thing for sure: the "TEXAS" production has more than equalled the expectations that Margaret Harper and her cohorts had for the project when they began to dream about it in the early 1960s.

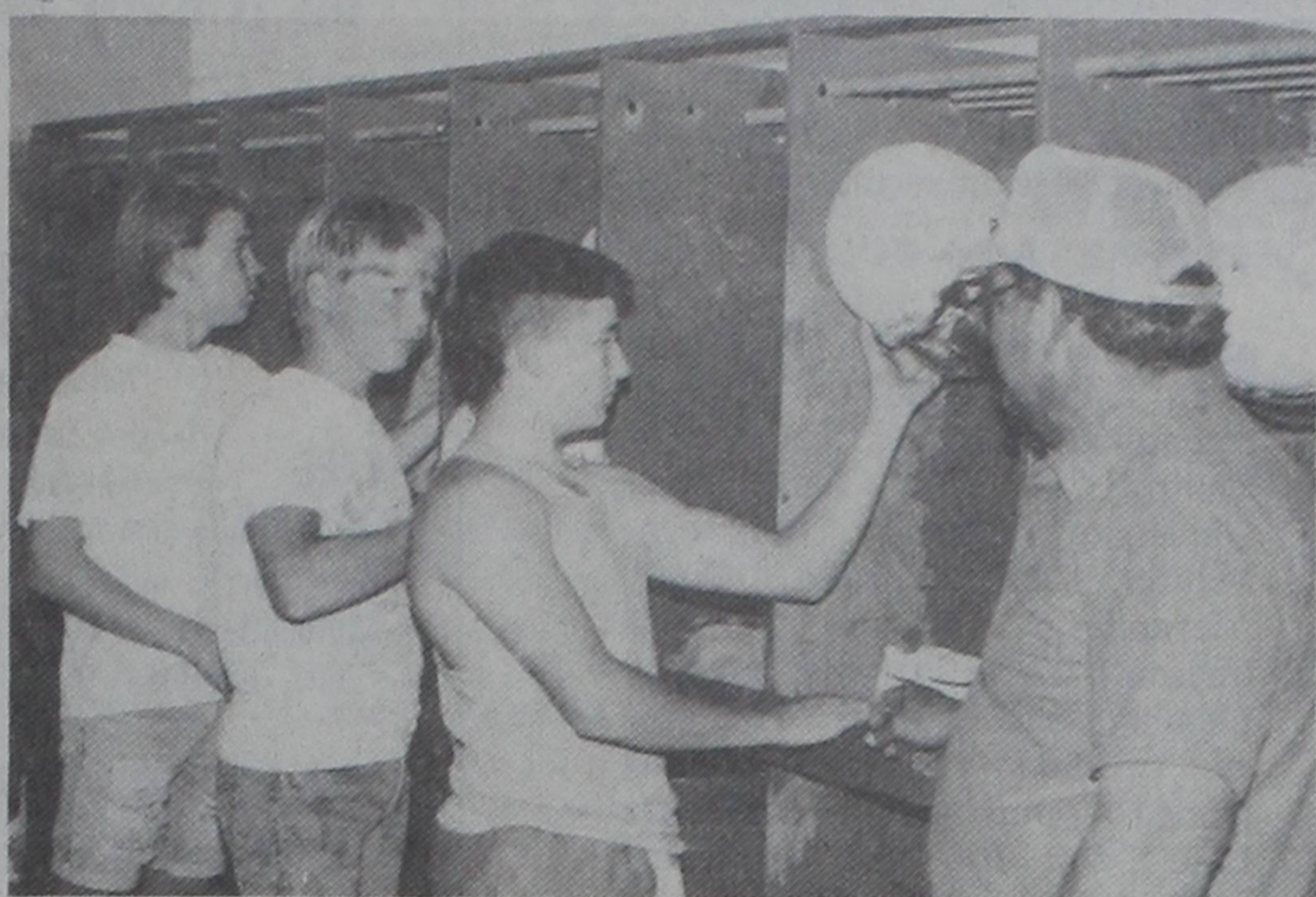
The registration schedule for students new to the Friona Independent School District has been released by Superintendent Hal Ratcliff.

## Area Receives .99" Rain During Week

The Friona area received some nice moisture during the past week, with a total of .99 inches of rain being measured at the official Friona gauge.

In addition, the area was buffeted by high winds last Sunday evening. The fast-moving cold front from the north brought some rain to parts of the region, but added only .03 inches of moisture at Friona.

Last Friday night produced the best showers, when a total of .78 inches were measured locally. Another .08 inches were measured the following day, for a two-day total of .86 inches.

The morning after the "big blow," the .03 inch measurement was logged, with a trace received the following morning, August 8.

Then on Thursday evening, gentle rain began falling at about 10:30 p.m., and another tenth of an inch was registered, bringing the week's (and month's) total to .99 inches.

Last Friday's rain was not a totally general rain, as some folks reported receiving a half-inch, and

Bovina's official measurement was only .2 inches.

At the end of the week, farmers were still hoping for some additional moisture to help their crops.

During the Sunday evening windstorm, Star publisher Bill Ellis, who also is the official weather observer in Friona, spotted a fledgling funnel cloud while returning to Friona on State Highway 214.

The Ellises were driving east on Highway 214 at about 9:15 p.m. Sunday when they watched the funnel dip slightly and really churn up the dirt, in open country about 13 miles northwest of Friona. Luckily, the funnel never was completely formed.

Also reporting to the group were Harold Alderson, Cliff

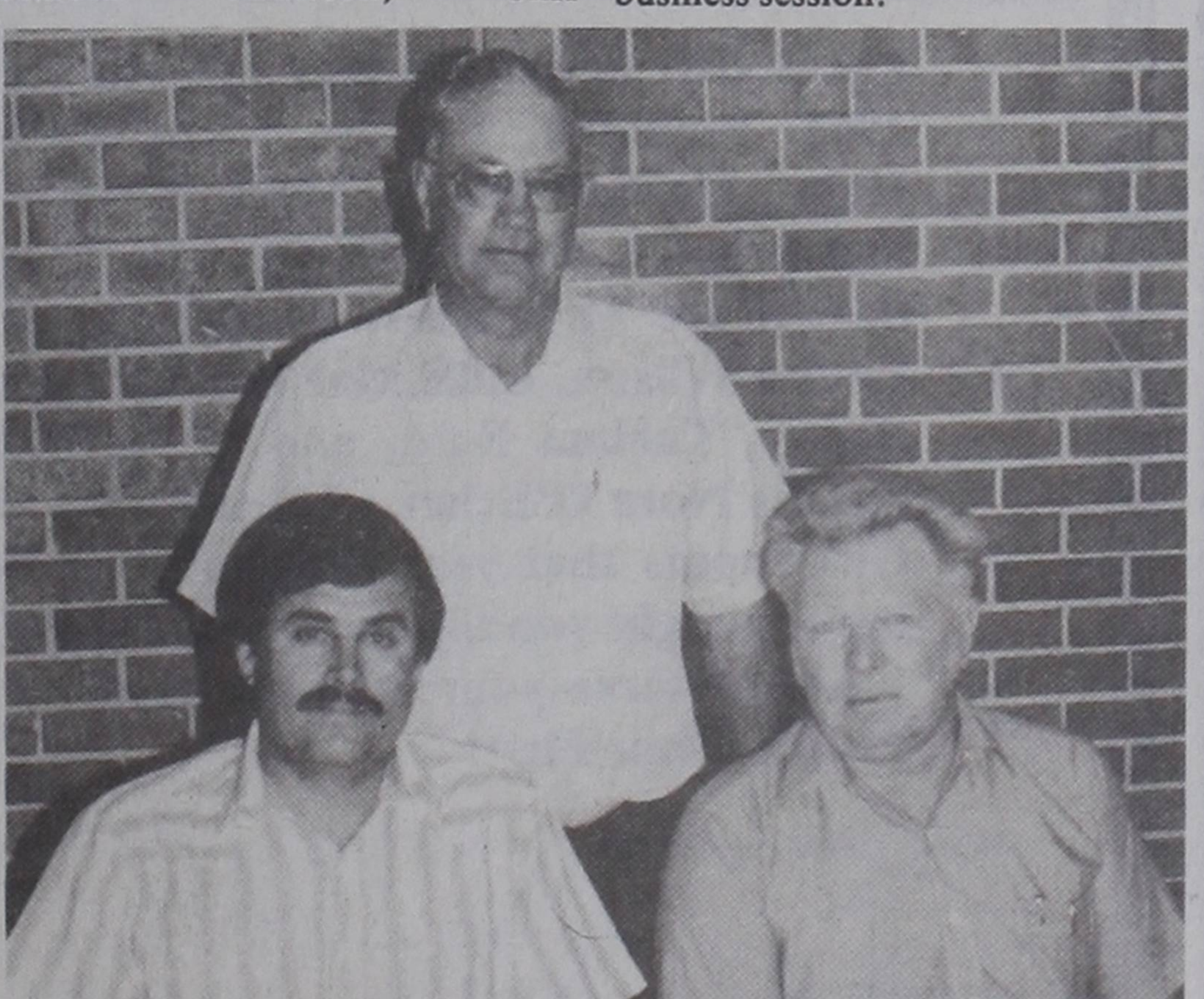
Bloodworth and Jim Adams of Lubbock, representing the Plains Co-op Gin Assn.

# Bivins Gives Update At Meeting Here

Senator Teel Bivins, who represents the 31st District in the Texas Legislature, was in Friona on Friday, August 11, to report on the 71st Legislature. Bivins met with several local people at Cora's Kitchen for a breakfast that was followed by his report.

Senator Bivins highlighted several legislative actions taken during the session, discussing both what he saw, as positive and negative. Bivins stressed the success of the Legislature in terms of taxes, criminal justice, agriculture, and rural health care. He pointed out that the Legislature "failed" in terms of public education and workers' compensation.

"The most important item, in my view, was that for the first time in four sessions, no new taxes were imposed. In fact, we allowed the existing temporary taxes to expire," said Senator Bivins.

In the area of criminal justice, Bivins reported that the Legislature approved the increase of 20,000 new beds in Texas prisons. This is a 100% increase over the present 40,000 beds.

Also, a bill was passed which will allow law enforcement officers to seize not only personal property derived from the commission of a felony, but now officers may seize any personal property or real estate used in or derived from the commission of any felony.

Senator Bivins was pleased with the gains made for District 31. He reported that funds were restored to the Panhandle Plains Historical Society, to four junior colleges in the district that had been vetoed by the government in the past, to the Ag Extension Service in Amarillo, and to the Texas Tech Medical School. Bivins felt that the West Texas State University/Texas A&M merge was the "pinnacle" of the work done by the legislative members from this area.

Bivins also explained his "strategy" for this legislative session. "My goal was to limit my legislative activity to a narrow scope of issues," said the senator. Instead of trying to gain a little bit of knowledge on every subject, Bivins focused on some "areas of public policy that I knew something about, and tried to develop as much or more

knowledge as any of my colleagues in the Senate." Bivins said that he tried to focus on issues concerning the people of this district such as agriculture and education.

Senator Bivins told of his involvement in a "team approach" to best serve the interests and needs of the Panhandle people. He explained that he and the five representatives from this same area met every Thursday morning to discuss and review the bills that were coming up for debate in both the House and the Senate. "We needed to get together and develop strategies of how to pass bills, or often more important, how to kill bills (that were affecting the people

of this area)," said Bivins.

Senator Teel Bivins felt that his first session in the Senate was a successful one in light of the fact that it was the first time he has held a public office. "It is my feeling that the people of Senate District 31 and our institutions did not suffer too greatly to the fact that their senator was a freshman," said Bivins.

# Friona Flashbacks

## 60 YEARS AGO--JULY 26, 1929

Evidence of the activities of the Texas Utilities Company in building the high line into Friona is shown by the arrival here of three car loads of poles and other materials for the building of the line. This work has been in contemplation by the company for the past several weeks and it is proposed to begin the erection of the line at once, building the line from Dimmitt to Bovina, with a spur line from Hereford north into Friona.

## 55 YEARS AGO--AUG. 3, 1934

During the past week, quite a showing has been made on the Friona school's new athletic field in the way of bringing it into suitable condition for use. The city water mains have been laid across

11th Street and north along Cleveland Avenue to a point opposite the north end of the field, and work has begun on the construction of the stadium.

## 50 YEARS AGO--JULY 21, 1939

Under the direction of Mr. Harley Bulls, band director of Friona Schools, a three-day band clinic will be sponsored Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday, July 24-26. Mr. Paul Coe, representative of the White Music Co. of Abilene, will be at the band room of the high school with a display of band instruments of all types for band work.

## 45 YEARS AGO--JULY 28, 1944

With prospects looming for a grain sorghum harvest exceeding the 1943 crop, it is not too early

for farmers in Parmer County to take all possible precautions to have in sight storage room for their grain. It appears unlikely that the strain on local and terminal elevators brought about by the bumper wheat harvest can be relieved in time to cope with a big grain sorghum crop, not to mention a sizeable sudan storage problem.

## 35 YEARS AGO--JULY 29, 1954

Extended area service between local Friona phone subscribers and rural connections on the West Texas Cooperative lines finally has reached the announcement stage, with the tie-in scheduled for August 1. This service, enabling communication from town to country and vice versa (for the Hub and Parmer exchanges) comes after two years of negotiations between the Co-op and the General Telephone Company of the Southwest, formerly General Associated.

## 30 YEARS AGO--JULY 30, 1959

Plainview Production Credit Association's Friona branch has announced that they will have open house on Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Manager of the Friona branch will be Martell LeVeque. LeVeque has recently been assistant manager of the Muleshoe branch of the same association.

## 20 YEARS AGO--JULY 24, 1969

A new business connected with the cattle industry was announced for Friona this week. Pioneer Cattle Order Buyers, Inc. has been organized by some of the top cattle buyers, to offer a bigger and better service to people interested in the cattle industry.

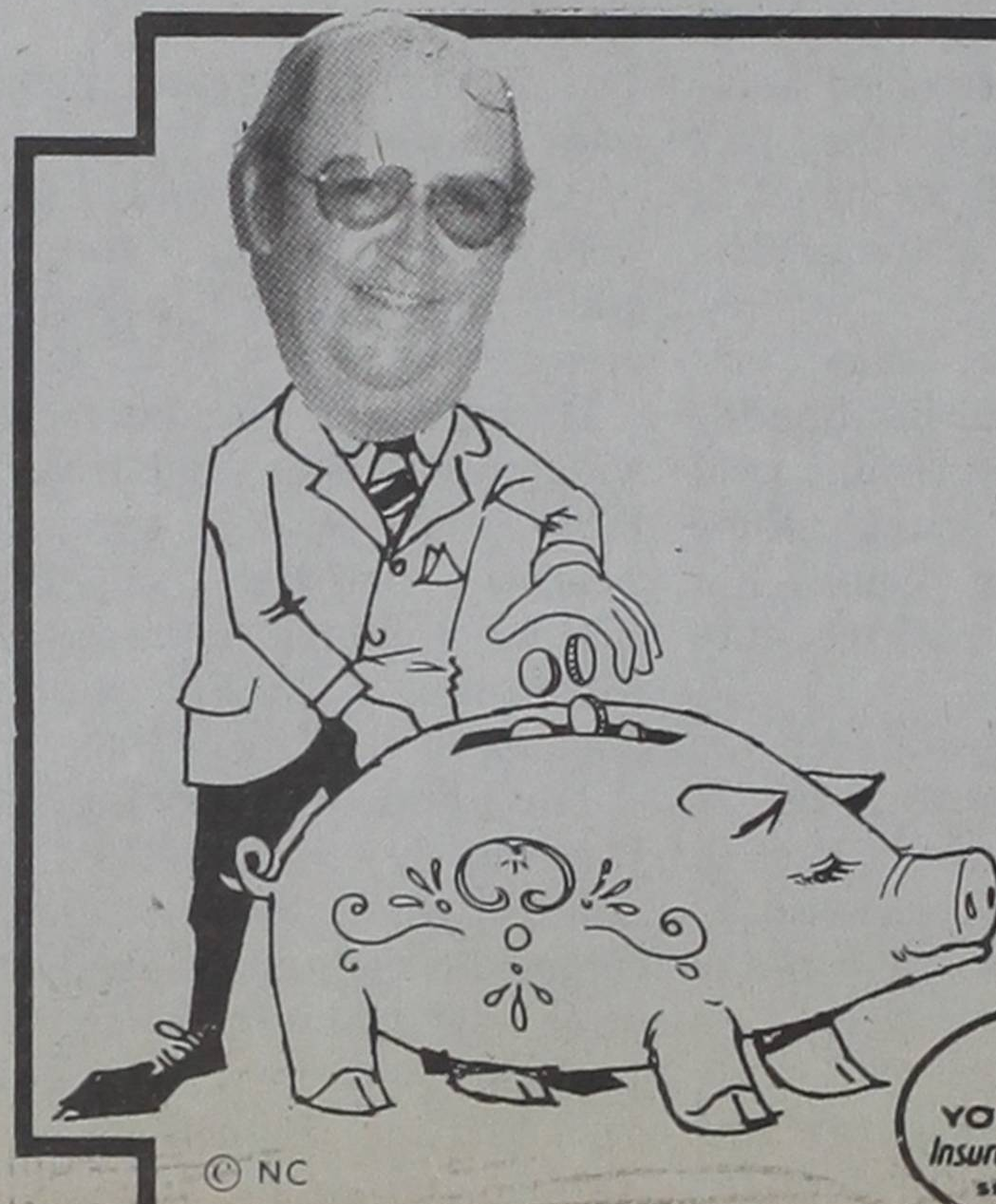

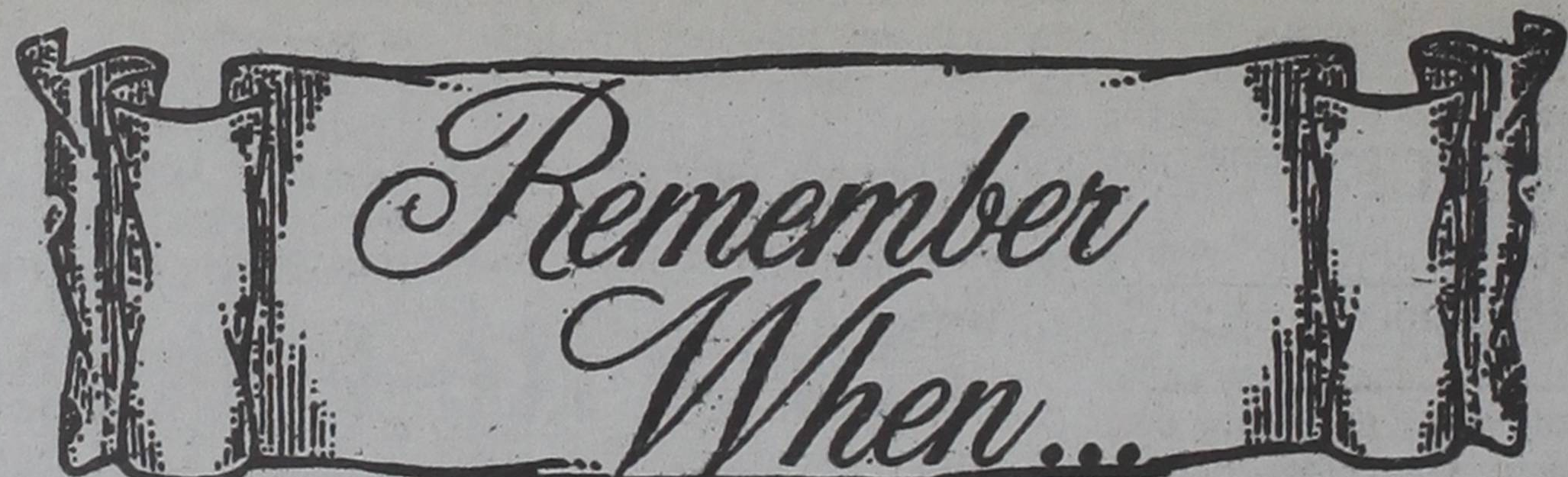

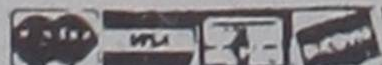

**Ex-Resident Dies At 104**

Funeral services for a former longtime Friona resident, Dovie Wilkerson, 104, were conducted July 27 at the Bill Merritt Chapel in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

Mrs. Wilkerson passed away July 25, 1989 at the South Park Health Center in Oklahoma City. For a number of years, she was known as Friona's oldest citizen, and observed her 100th birthday locally with a special reception at Friona's United Pentecostal Church.

Burial was at Tipton, Oklahoma. Rev. R.D. Wayland, Pentecostal preacher, officiated.

Mrs. Wilkerson was born Ella Mae Hatcher, and was born on a farm near Grapevine, Texas on September 23, 1984. She was the middle child in a family of seven children born to Martha (Evans) and James Hatcher.

She married W.C. Wilkerson in the spring of 1914. In the 1920s the Wilkersons moved to the Hub community, where they were engaged in farming. In 1925, she became the first manager of the Syndicate Hotel, which was

After the death of her husband, Mrs. Wilkerson lived for a time in South Texas, but returned to Friona to live. She had lived in Oklahoma City for the past two years.

Survivors include a son, Clarence Wilkerson of Oklahoma City, a daughter-in-law, Avis Wilkerson of Temple, two grandchildren, four great-grandchildren and three great-great-grandchildren. Several nieces also survive, including Doris Knapp of Friona and Bertha Rule of Amarillo.

She was preceded in death by her husband, a son Billy, and all of her brothers and sisters.

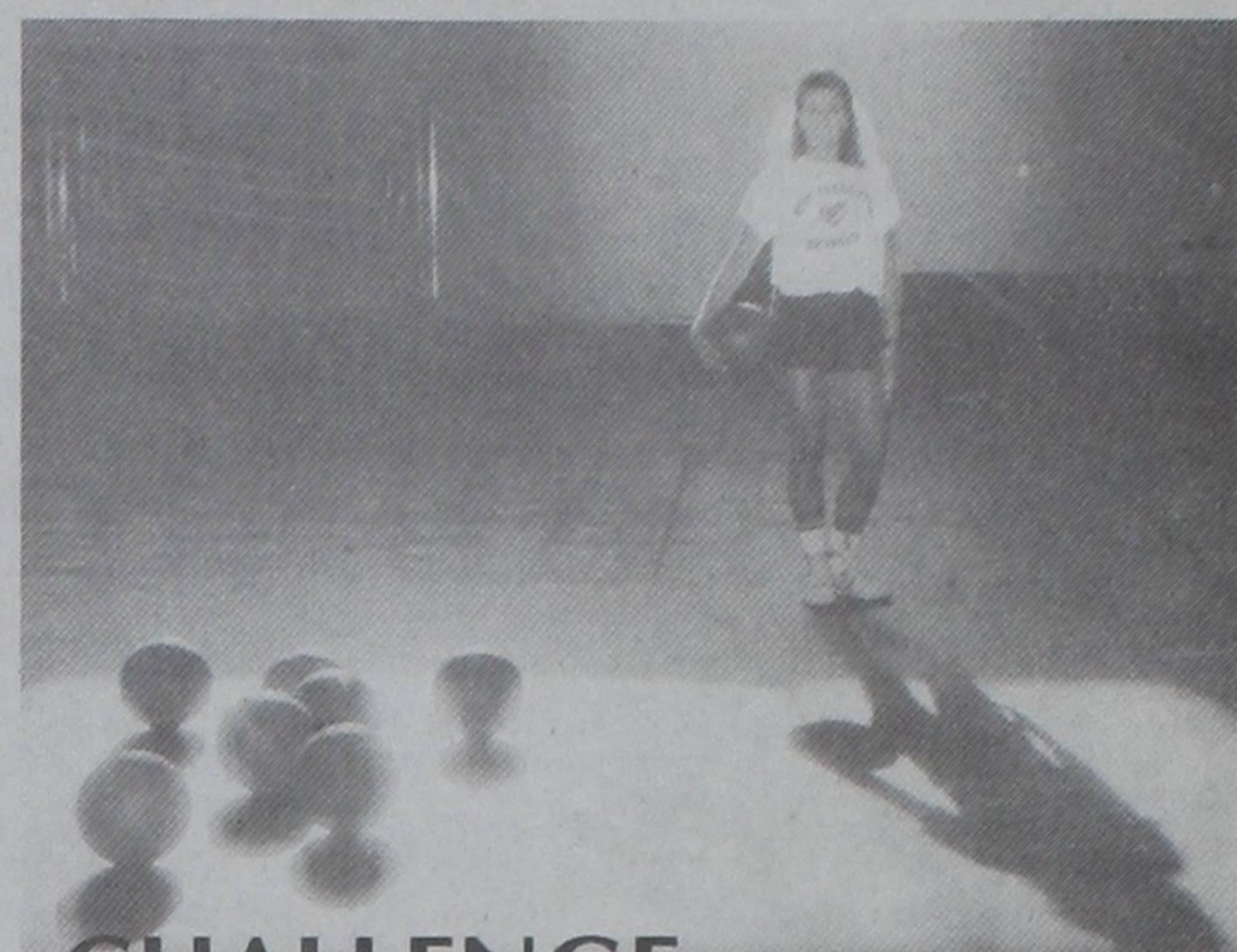
They also visit Kings Island amusement park, the Cincinnati Zoo and attend performances at Miami University Summer Theatre.

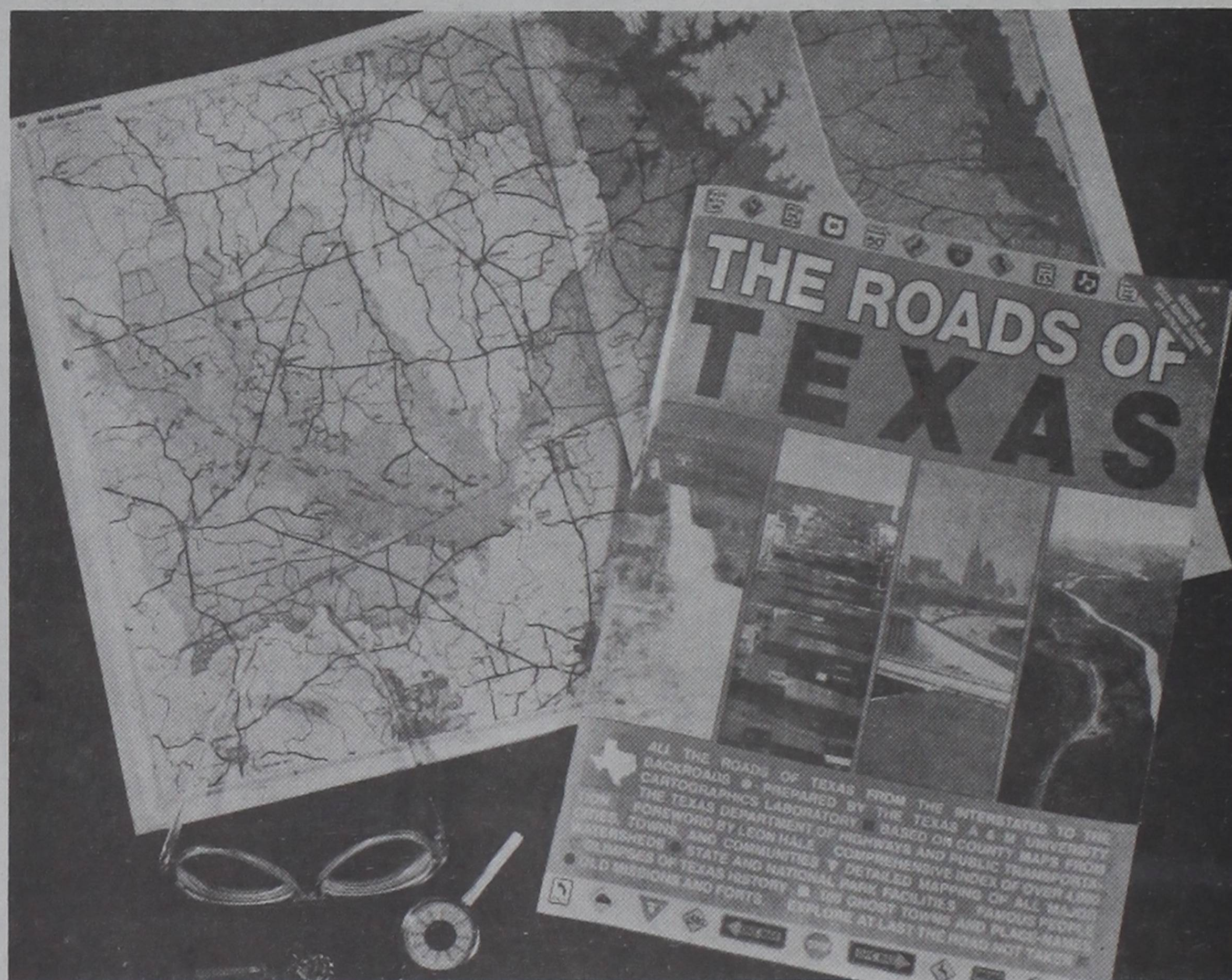

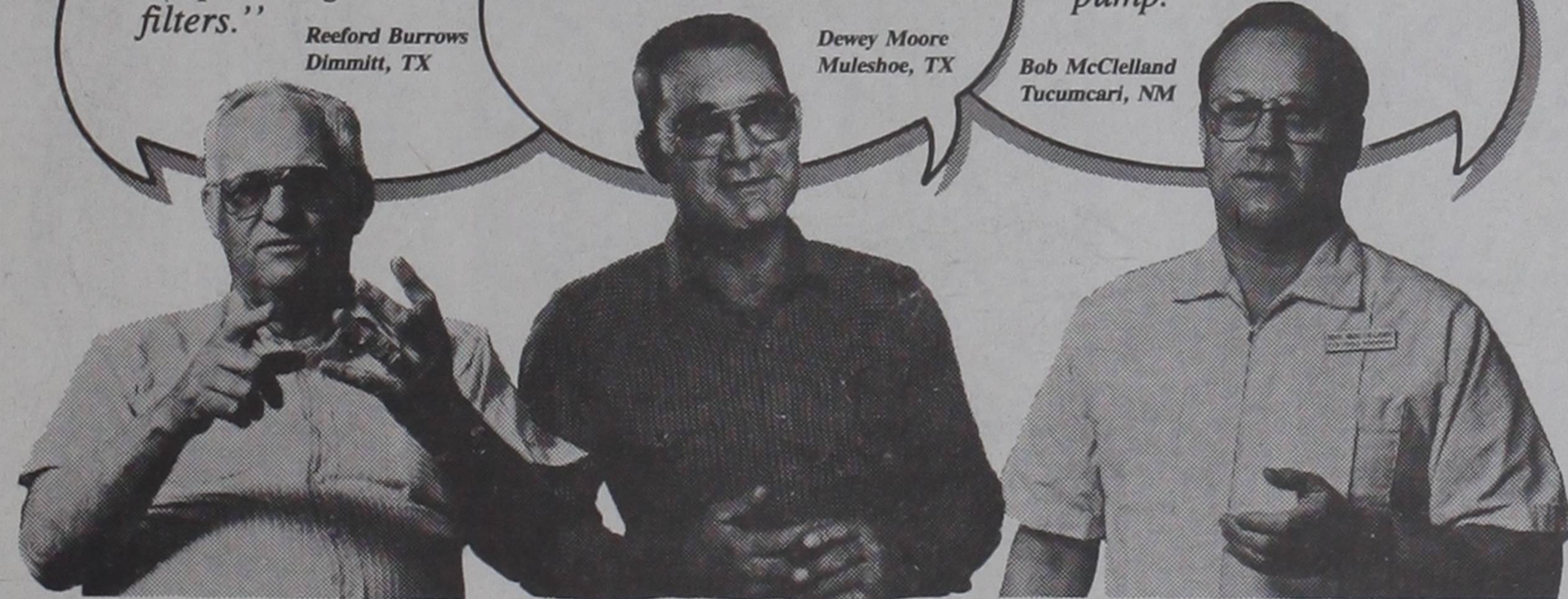

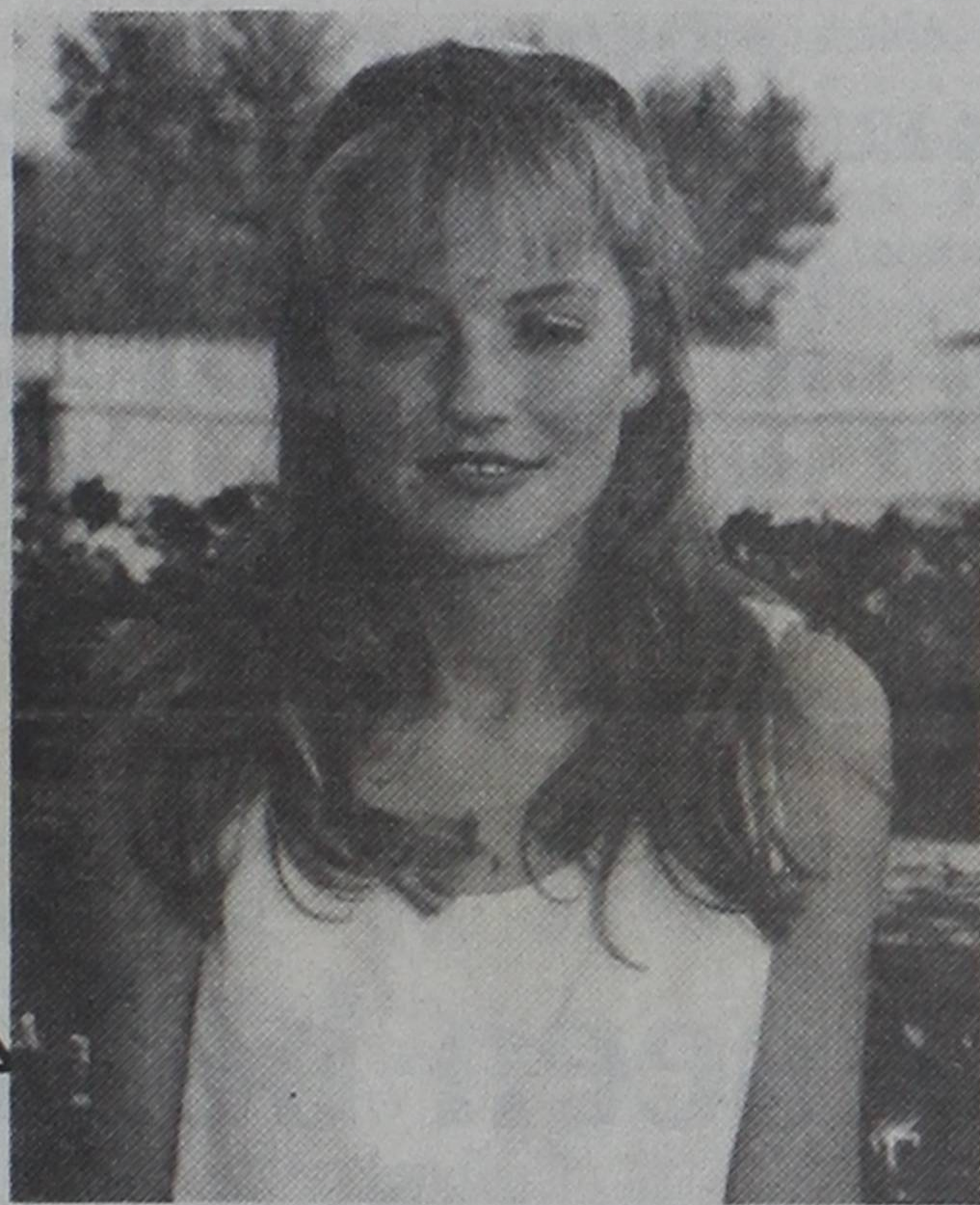
