A RECENT ARTICLE in Parade Magazine by David Wallechinsky points out where the United States ranks in a number of areas, which makes for interesting study.

The U.S., he points out, is the fourth-largest nation in the world, both in size behind the USSR, Canada and China, and in population, behind China, India and the USSR. Hence, it could be expected that the U.S. might rank fourth in many categories, which it does.

Wallechinsky says that the U.S. ranks fourth in the production of sugar, potatoes, onions, cucumbers and cement. We also have the fourth-most chickens, turkeys and milk cows. We are also number four in public libraries and in the number of tourists from other countries. The U.S. has the fourth-highest divorce rate in the world.

However, the U.S. ranks number one in many categories. For example, the U.S. is the leading source of Nobel Prize-winners in every category except literature, where we are second to France.

The U.S. also is the number one source of Olympic champions, as well as total Olympic medals won. We have the largest population of both Christians and Jews. The U.S. is the leading consumer of items of great diversity, such as gasoline, steel, rubber, paper, and yes, cocaine.

what was called the strongest Caprock tournament in recent years.

Playing five games in three days (actually about a 50-hour span), the team extended its season record to 13-3. Their win over Lubbock Dunbar Wednesday morning meant that the team now has beaten teams from all five classifications (1A, 2A, 3A, 4A and 5A) in their season so far.

The game against Brownfield late Tuesday was a re-match of last February's area championship teams, as Friona and the Cubs met just a few blocks down the road in the state playoffs. The Squaws gained a measure of revenge with an impressive 47-42 win.

Friona got off to an early lead, as they had last February, but this time they held on. Brownfield was ahead just one time in the ball game. Ronda Ratcliff put on a good free throw exhibition--hitting 13 of 20 from the line and had game scoring honors with 19 points.

In fact, the team, which has been lethargic at the foul line, hit 21 of 32 for the game, and that was the difference.

The Squaws had a great game out of their two 5-11 post girls, Miss Ratcliff and Lacey Osborn. Lacey scored ten points and hauled down eight rebounds for the second time in a day. She also had eight in the team's 2 p.m. win over Dimmitt.

The game was the second of the day for the Squaws, and Brownfield had just the one game. Brownfield had scored an opening win over Lubbock Estacado before losing to tournament champion Canyon. The Cubs, also seeking the playoffs a second straight year, dropped to 10-5 on their season.

The Squaws followed up their late Tuesday game by meeting Lubbock Dunbar at 10 a.m. on Wednesday. It was the team's first-ever meeting with the class 4A Lady Panthers, who came in with an 8-9 record.

The Squaws jumped out to a 10-6 lead at the end of the first quarter, but the Lady Panthers rallied with 10 points in the second quarter, including two on a half-court shot by Tammie Dillard at the buzzer, trimming Friona's lead to 18-16 at the intermission.

Summary Of Year's News Is Given

JANUARY

A formal request from the Friona Independent School District for re-imbursement of \$284,466.88 from the county's Permanent School Funds was denied at the last meeting of the Parmer County Commissioner's Court on December 20.

William W. "Bill" Wells, who served as Friona postmaster since June of 1982, has announced his retirement from the U.S. Postal Service and as Friona postmaster with the close of business on January 3, 1986.

Price Brookfield, who starred for the Friona Chieftains in three sports in the late 1930s, was honored with a reception at Friona State Bank's Community Room Saturday, January 18. Brookfield was one of three inducted into the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame January 19. Brookfield was an All-American basketball player at West Texas State, and made all-conference for two different leagues. He held the WT scoring record of 1,406 points for 34 years. His single-game scoring mark of 44 points still stands.

Ken McLellan, longtime racing enthusiast, was inducted into the National Hot Rod Association's Hall of Fame at a banquet at Austin Ranch near Dallas. McLellan won the NHRA Super Stock World Finals in 1971.

Twenty-eight Friona band students participated in the T.M.E.A. Region 16 All-Region Bands program at Lubbock. They included ten members of the high school band and 18 members of the junior high band.

Jerry Hinkle, senior vice-president and cashier at Friona State Bank, was named to the bank's board of directors on January 14.

A Friona teenager, Lisa DeWeese, 13, was hospitalized in Amarillo following an early-morning fire which trapped her in her bedroom for a time January 27. Members of the Friona Fire Department rescued Miss DeWeese from the house. She suffered second-degree burns over 20 per cent of her body, and also suffered smoke inhalation.

FEBRUARY

Dana Berend, Friona High School senior, exhibited the Grand Champion steer at the Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show a record third consecutive time. Miss Berend capped her final appearance at the county show by also showing the reserve champion animal and the Grand Champion heifer. Vandi Tarter of Lazbuddie entered the Grand Champion Barrow. Donnell Garner of Bovina had the Grand Champion sheep. Mindy Rhodes of Bovina entered the Grand Champion turkey. Blake Kelley exhibited the grand champion goat.

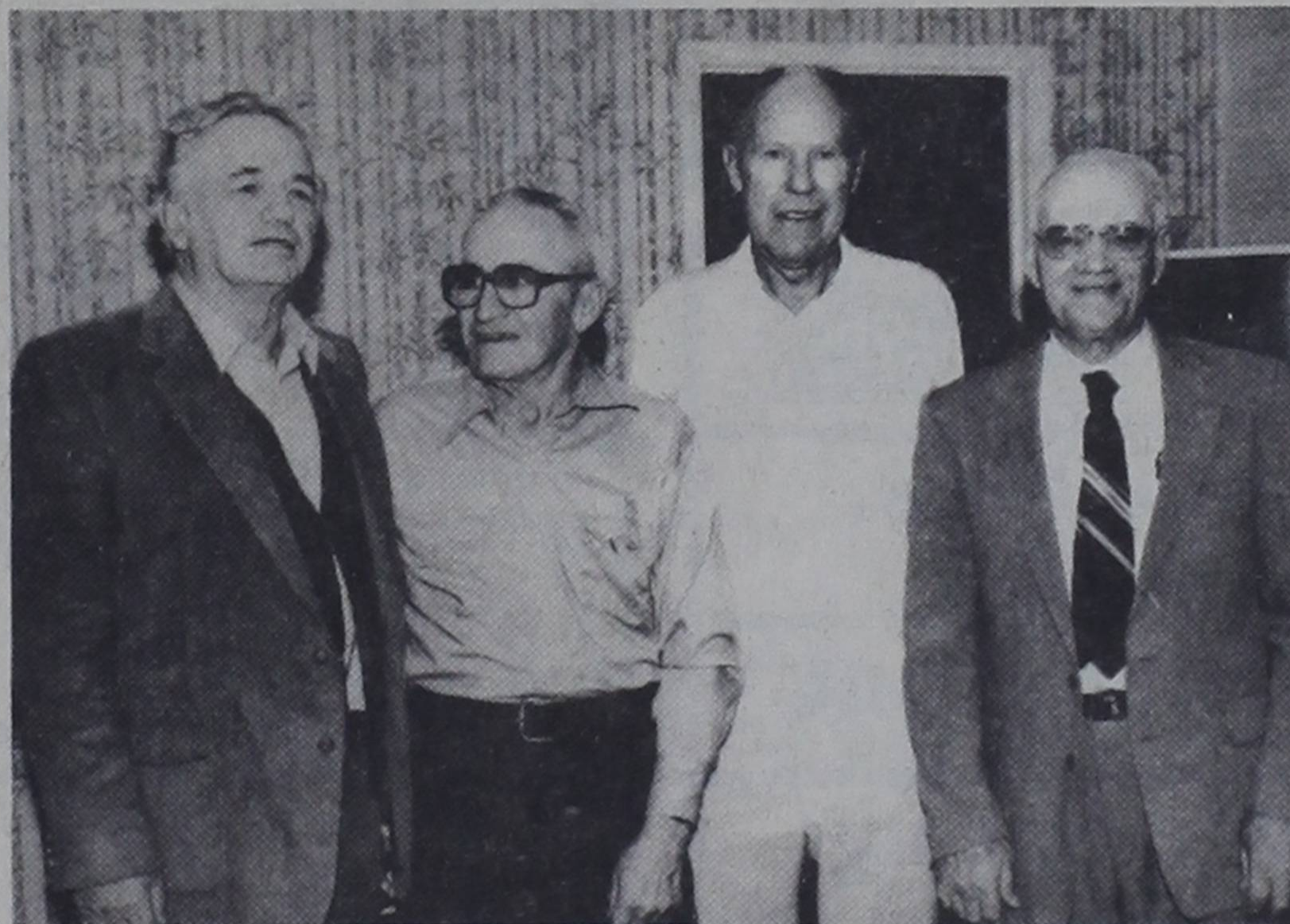
The Friona area logged 12 inches of snow during a 10-day period in February, which brought moisture during the period of 2.51 inches.

The FHS Squaws won the second half title, then blitzed Dimmitt, 58-41 for the district's number one seed in the playoffs. The Squaws made the playoffs after a 13-year absence.

Kelly Wied's shot from about 15 feet with five seconds left on the clock gave the Squaws a come-from-behind 36-35 win over Canadian at the Amarillo Civic Center on February 14, in Friona's first playoff appearance in 14 years. The Squaws held only three leads in the game.

The Squaws came up with one of their coldest shooting nights of the season, and saw the Brownfield Cubs come from behind for a 40-36 win in an area playoff in Lubbock February 17. The Squaws had an early lead of 12-2, but a two-for-eleven performance at the line and only hitting 30 per cent from the field cost the team.

Seniors Kerry Cain and Kelly Wied were on the ten-member all-district basketball team announced by Coach Vicki Hatton. The Squaws were bi-district champions in Miss Hatton's first year at FHS.

Friona's New Dairy Queen, owned by Mildred Landrum, held a Grand Opening at its new facility on West Highway 60 during the week of March 9.

The Friona Chamber of Commerce held its salute to the Texas Sesquicentennial banquet March 13. Honored were Patricia Fleming as Woman of the Year, Jim Johnston as Man of the Year, Rick Tullis as Teacher of the Year, Margaret Wilshire as Most Courteous Employee and Susan Bailey and Daniel Gowens, Outstanding Young People.

Mr. and Mrs. Dan Koelzer are the new owners of Gib's Cleaners. The Chamber of Commerce hosted a ribbon-cutting March 10.

Friona has been approved for participation in the new Texas Cities for Economic Leadership (TEXCEL) program, it was announced by Chamber of Commerce president Bill Stovell.

Mark Madrid, Friona Junior High School student, won the Parmer County Spelling Bee at Farwell on March 25.

APRIL

A grand opening was held April 5 for Wilhelm's nursery division. The Chamber held a ribbon-cutting for this new local facility.

Friona High School swept the District UIL literary sweepstakes trophy with a total of 203 points, winning the one-act play and qualifying for the regional meet in 12 other events.

Friona students captured a total of 21 awards during the 30th annual South Plains Regional Science Fair at Wayland College.

Friona took the Sweepstakes Award. Brad Moyer was the major winner with four awards.

FHS tracksters assaulted the school record books in early meets. High jumper Shy Burney cleared 6-6 for a new record, and pole vaulter Rod Britting cleared 14-0 for a new school mark. Girls' high jumper Ronda Ratcliff went over the 5-4 mark for a new record.

First-year boys' basketball coach Paul Laywell's contract was not renewed by the Friona School Board at its April meeting. Some of Laywell's supporters attended a public hearing on April 14, but the decision was not changed after a lengthy discussion by the board.

Friona Junior High School's MathCounts team participated in the state MathCounts competition in Austin the weekend of April 5. Team members were Julia Warren, Mark Madrid, David Reed, David Rejino and Krista Renner.

The Friona High School band received a First Division rating in both sightreading and concert competition at the UIL contests and received a handsome trophy.

MAY

Chuck Ellis was Friona High School's lone qualifier to the state literary meet. The FHS senior competed in prose reading.

A record was set in the local Republican primary on May 3, when 183 voters turned out, lured by the governor's race. In addition, another 59 residents of the Bovina precinct cast votes in Friona, making 242 Republican voters. Kent Hance had the lead in the governor's race here, 129 votes to 48 for Bill Clements.

Cecil Maddox, Friona Junior High School principal, tendered his resignation to the school board on May 12, effective at the end of the current term, to enter private business. Maddox is finishing his 20th year with the Friona school system, and 13th as principal.

60 YEARS AGO--JAN. 7, 1927
Messrs. O.G. Turner and J.W. Parr, who for the past few months have been doing business under the firm name of Turner and Parr Land Company, have changed their name to Turner & Parr Trading Company. They have also expanded their line of business from land only to include tractors, farm implements, coal and grain. They will handle the John Deere line of tractors and implements and the Willys-Knight and Overland line of cars, including the Whippet.

55 YEARS AGO--JAN. 8, 1932
F.S. Truitt returned home Monday from Gainesville, where he had gone the week before with Mrs. Truitt and their son and daughter. Frank Truitt will enter college there on Monday. Mrs. Truitt plans to stay awhile, hoping the lower altitude will improve her health.

45 YEARS AGO--JAN. 2, 1942
Friona's fourth annual Homecoming Banquet, held the night of December 28, was pronounced a success. Nelson Welch was chairman of the banquet. Miss Charlene McFarland entertained with a piano solo. Pvt. Wilbut Meade spoke, and Forrest Osborn played a harmonica solo. Miss Floy Goodwine was elected 1942 chairman.

35 YEARS AGO--JAN. 3, 1952
On Tuesday, January 8, an election will be held to elect the first permanent board of directors of the High Plains Water Conservation District No. 1.

A number of postal changes went into effect January 1, most noticeable of which has been the abandonment of the 1 cent postal card, Friona postmaster Sloan H. Osborn reminds the public. Drop letters, for delivery in the local post office, will require 2 cents postage, and rural routes will require 3 cents.

30 YEARS AGO--JAN. 3, 1957
The recent completion of the "gaps" in Farm to Market Road 299, which runs north and south out of Friona has resulted in the designation of this road as a state highway by the Texas Highway Department. This road is expected to gain more use by truckers and tourists.

Raymond Adams and Floyd Brookfield, doing business as Adams and Brookfield Drilling Co., announced this week the dissolution of their partnership. Brookfield revealed his plans to open a well repair and domestic well drilling business. Adams will continue to operate at the firm's location on Highway 60.

25 YEARS AGO--JAN. 4, 1962
Burglars struck at Grady Dodd's Texaco warehouse last Thursday night for the second time in seven months, and made off with 67 tires. A second burglary at Kendrick Oil Company is thought to have been committed by the same persons. Eight truck tires, two smaller tires, and 120 gallons of antifreeze were taken there.

20 YEARS AGO--JAN. 5, 1967
Friona Volunteer Firemen were called out during the holidays to battle a fire at Friona Motors, which caused damages in the neighborhood of \$25,000 to the firm and its equipment.

8 Accidents Reported In District

Capt. Bob Russell, District Supervisor of the Amarillo Highway Patrol District comprising of 31 counties said, "For the month of November, our troopers investigated eight fatal accidents, 84 personal injury accidents, and 117 property damage accidents. There were ten persons killed and 111 persons injured in these accidents."

Sgt. Billy Don Scott of Hereford stated, "In Parmer County, our troopers investigated one fatal accident, three personal injury accidents, and four property damage accidents in the month of November. One person was killed and three persons were injured in these accidents."

15 YEARS AGO--JAN. 6, 1972
West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative announced this week that installation of equipment had been completed for the new mobile base station at Hub. For the first time, mobile telephone service will be available to residents of the Friona area.

10 YEARS AGO--JAN. 9, 1977

5 YEARS AGO--JAN. 10, 1982
Construction in Friona during 1981 was better than in some cities of the same size, mainly due to the million-dollar renovation at Friona Junior High School. According to figures compiled by City Manager A.L. (Jake) Outland, there were 40 permits issued during the year calling for construction valued at an estimated \$1,682,833.00.

suffers from the largest trade and budget deficit in the world, we also rank first in gross national product, gold reserves and in both imports and exports.

It's no surprise to our readers that U.S. farmers lead the world in production of corn, soybeans, a number of citrus fruits, sorghum and vegetables. This is despite the fact that of all nations in the world, the smallest percentage of our population works in agriculture.

We are also the leading producers of cheese, condensed milk and beer, and we are the number one exporters of corn, soybeans, fruits, nuts, wheat, cotton, sunflowers, seeds for planting, pesticides, insecticides, herbicides and disinfectants.

The U.S. is also the No. 1 producer of meat, leading the world in the slaughter of horses, chickens and other fowl, plus cows, bulls and calves. We also lead in the production and export of cattle and buffalo hides and in the export of such exotic items as sheep fat, animal grease, glands and hormones (our own Excel plant produces and exports some of these latter items).

The U.S. leads the world in the percentage of its population that attends college and goes on to graduate studies.

There are many categories in which it would be wonderful to be number one, Wallechinsky's article points out, but we're not quite there. For instance, the U.S. ranks 13th in preventing infant deaths, 15th in preventing maternal death during childbirth, and 25th in avoiding low birthweight in babies.

The U.S. ranks tenth in health expenses per capita, 21st in physicians per capita and 31st in hospital beds per capita. We do have the most dentists, which is fortunate, since we also are the leading importers of sugar, cocoa powder, spices, coffee, wine, whiskey and distilled alcoholic beverages.

For life expectancy, the U.S. female's outlook is only ninth in the world, while that of the average male is only 19th.

Although home ownership is considered the "Great American Dream," the study points out that in this category, the U.S. ranks only 52nd out of 130 countries in the percentage of people who own their own homes.

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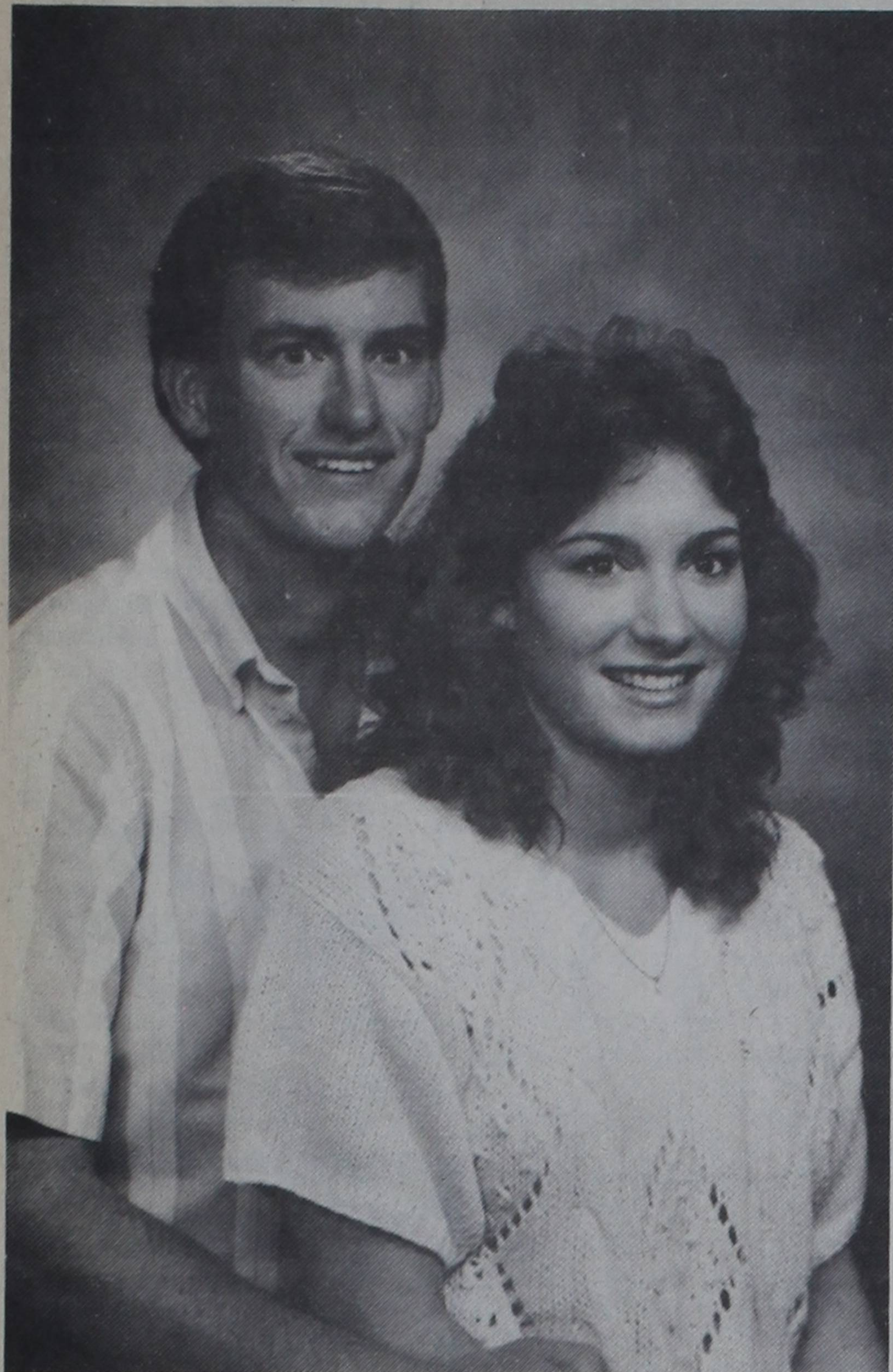

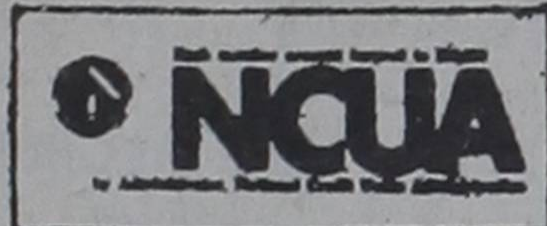

Chiefs Snap Losing Streak In Tourney

After suffering a tough defeat in the opening round, the Chieftain basketball team came back to win seventh place in the Frenship Invitational Tournament before New Years, downing Slaton on Wednesday, 73-68.

In the first round, the Chieftains had played their hearts out, only to lose, 59-53. It was a game of changing momentum, with first one team, then the other having control of the game. Unfortunately for Friona, the host Tigers had it at the end.

Frenship maintained a 17-13 lead at the end of the first quarter. Shane Hand made a tip-in shot, was fouled, and completed the three-point play to tie the game, 18-all, with 6:24 left in the half. A minute later, Jeff Dickson sank a long jump shot to give Friona its first lead at 20-19.

Daniel Echols followed with another set shot, and Friona had a 22-19 lead with 3:27 to play in the half.

Frenship reeled off eight straight points to retake the lead at 27-22, before Echols and Dickson retaliated for a 27-26 deficit. The Tigers scored for a 29-26 halftime lead.

Echols' follow shot tied the game, 33-all, with 4:09 to play in the third quarter. But at this point, the Chieftains went scoreless while Frenship scored nine points to take their longest lead, 42-33.

Lance Gatlin, Lonnie Phillips, John Cass and Rusty Rainey all scored in the last 1:10 of the quarter in a frantic rally that brought the Chiefs back within a point at 42-41.

Brent Riethmayer's free throw tied the score at 42-all to start the final quarter, and Shy Burney's follow shot tied it at 44-all.

Friona couldn't buy a break in the latter stages, and Frenship took advantages of some good breaks to forge their final lead.

"We just had to work for everything we got in that game," said Chieftain Coach T.J. Parks.

The Chieftains lost to hot-shooting Floydada in the consolation semi-finals, 73-49.

The Whirlwinds bolted to a 20-5 first quarter lead, and although the Chiefs played a good second quarter, the Whirlwinds still had a 39-19 halftime lead.

Hand's 15-point performance was the highlight for Friona.

In the Slaton game, the Chiefs outscored the Tigers, 15-9 in the second quarter to take a 25-21 lead to the halftime break.

"I told the kids at halftime to shoot the ball, and not worry so much about their shots. We came out and scored 48 points in the second half," Parks said.

With Echols and Burney hitting, the Chiefs used a 24-16 advantage

to build a 49-37 lead at the end of three quarters.

Friona had a 15-point lead at one time, but Slaton cut into that toward the end. The Tigers were pressing man to man and fouling Friona considerably, but the Chieftains hit their free throws.

"If we hadn't made the free throws, we would have been in trouble," Parks said. The team hit 21 of 34 from the line, and also shot a good 45 per cent from the floor.

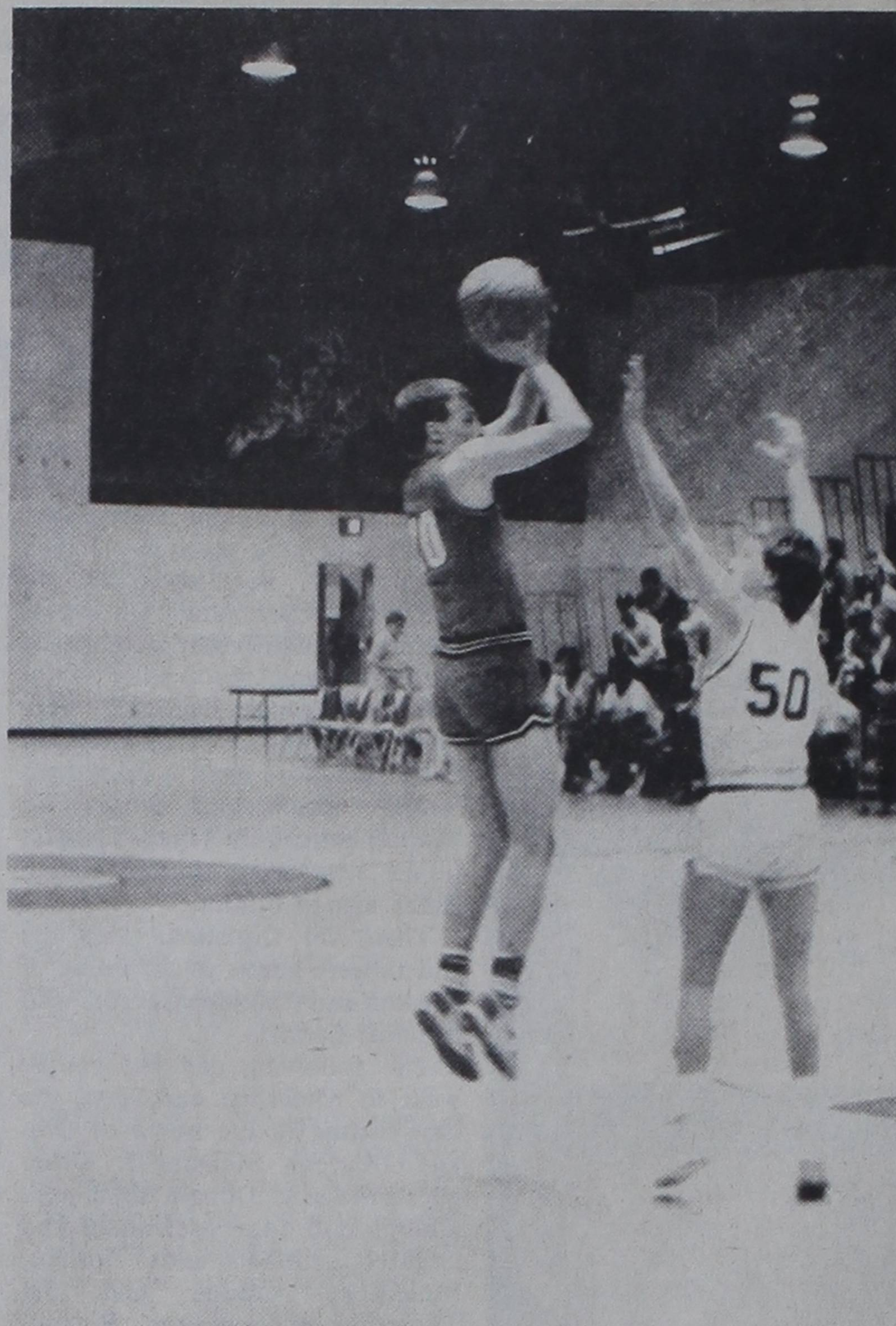
Echols led the scoring with 19 points, Burney had 18, Dickson and Hand scored 11 each.

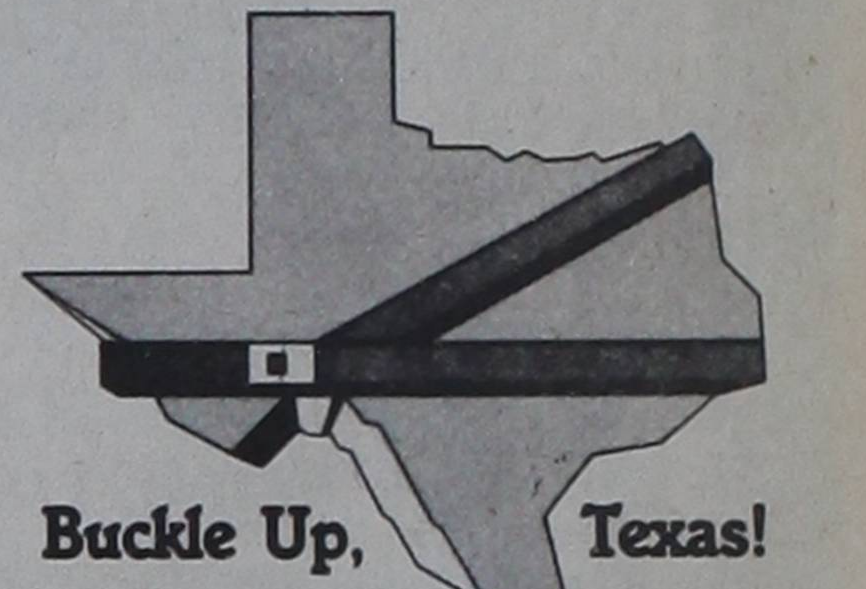


Teams End Prep Games

Starting Thursday, the teams are entered in the Abernathy tournament.

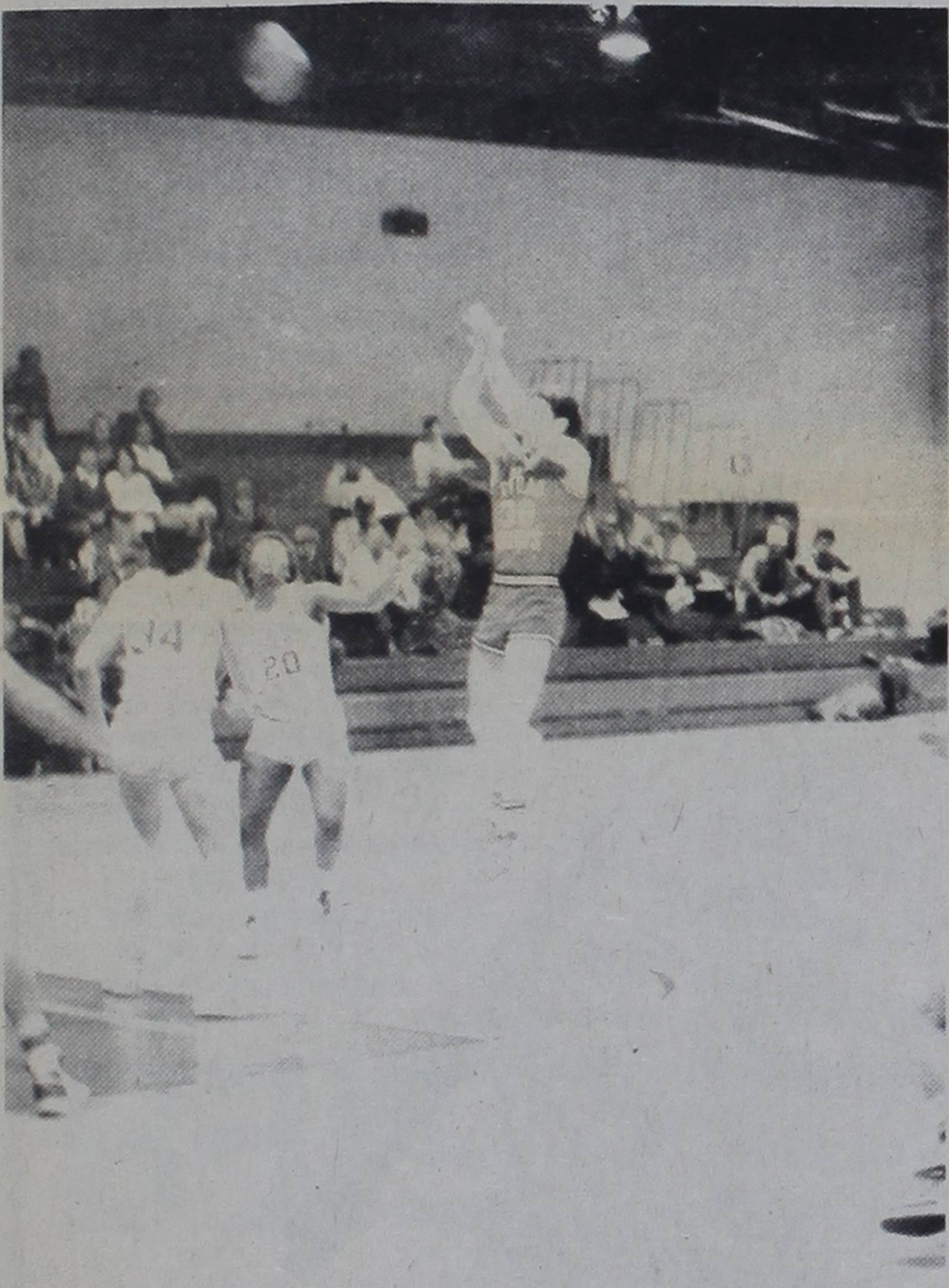


Front Seat Fatalities Down 14% in First 4 Months

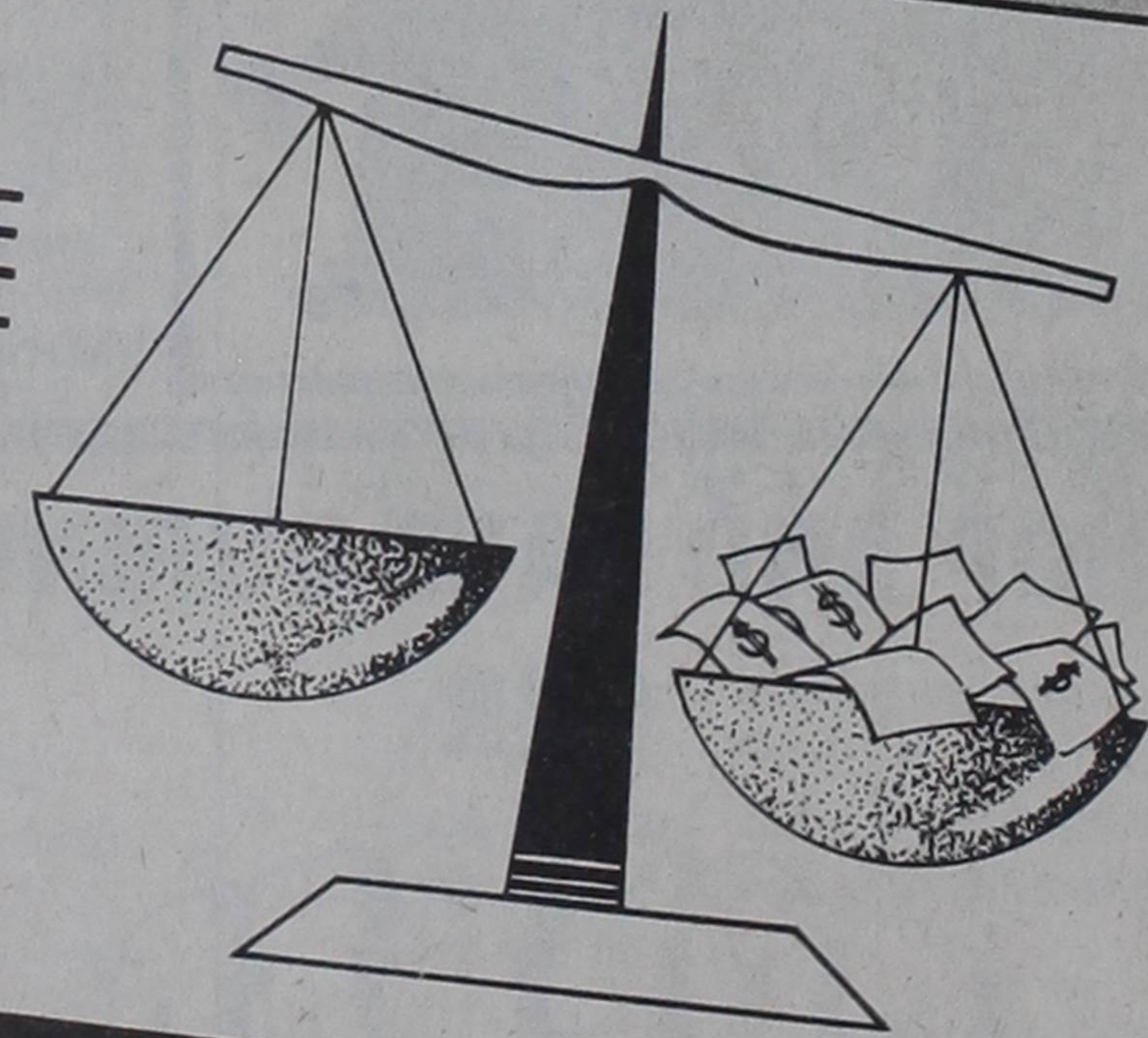

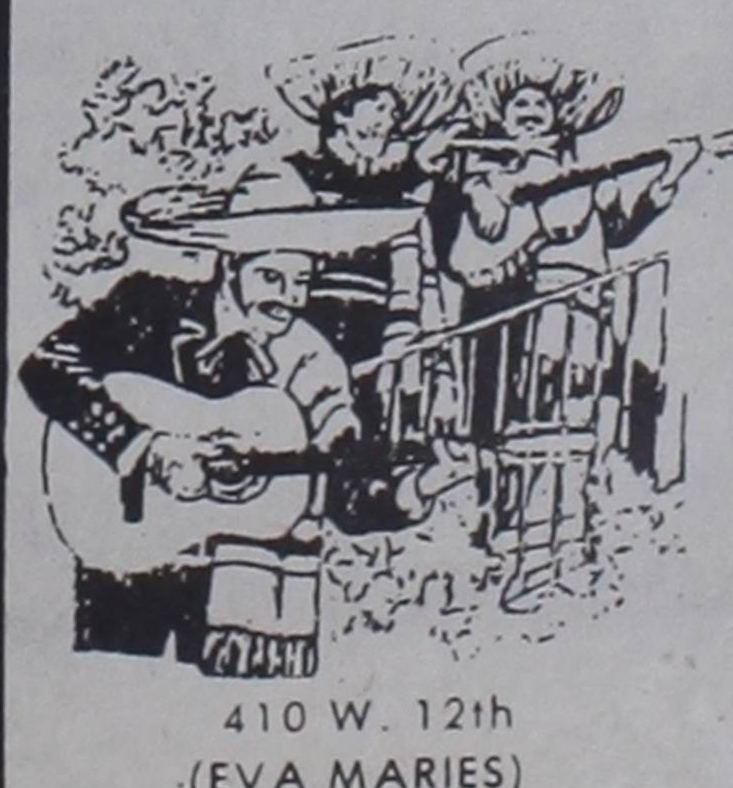

Tom Johnson was named as the new Friona Junior High principal to replace Cecil Maddox. Johnson is a former boys basketball coach here, and has been principal at Three Way Schools since 1983.

Wendy Hinkle is valedictorian, Kelly Wied is salutatorian and Susan Bailey is historian of the Friona High School graduating class of 1986. Mark Madrid is the valedictorian and Krista Renner the salutatorian, for the eighth grade graduating class.

A check of records revealed that Wendy Hinkle's grade average of 97.83 was the best at FHS in the past 40 years.

T. J. Parks, who has been head coach at Tatum, N.M. the past five years, has been named as varsity boys coach at Friona.

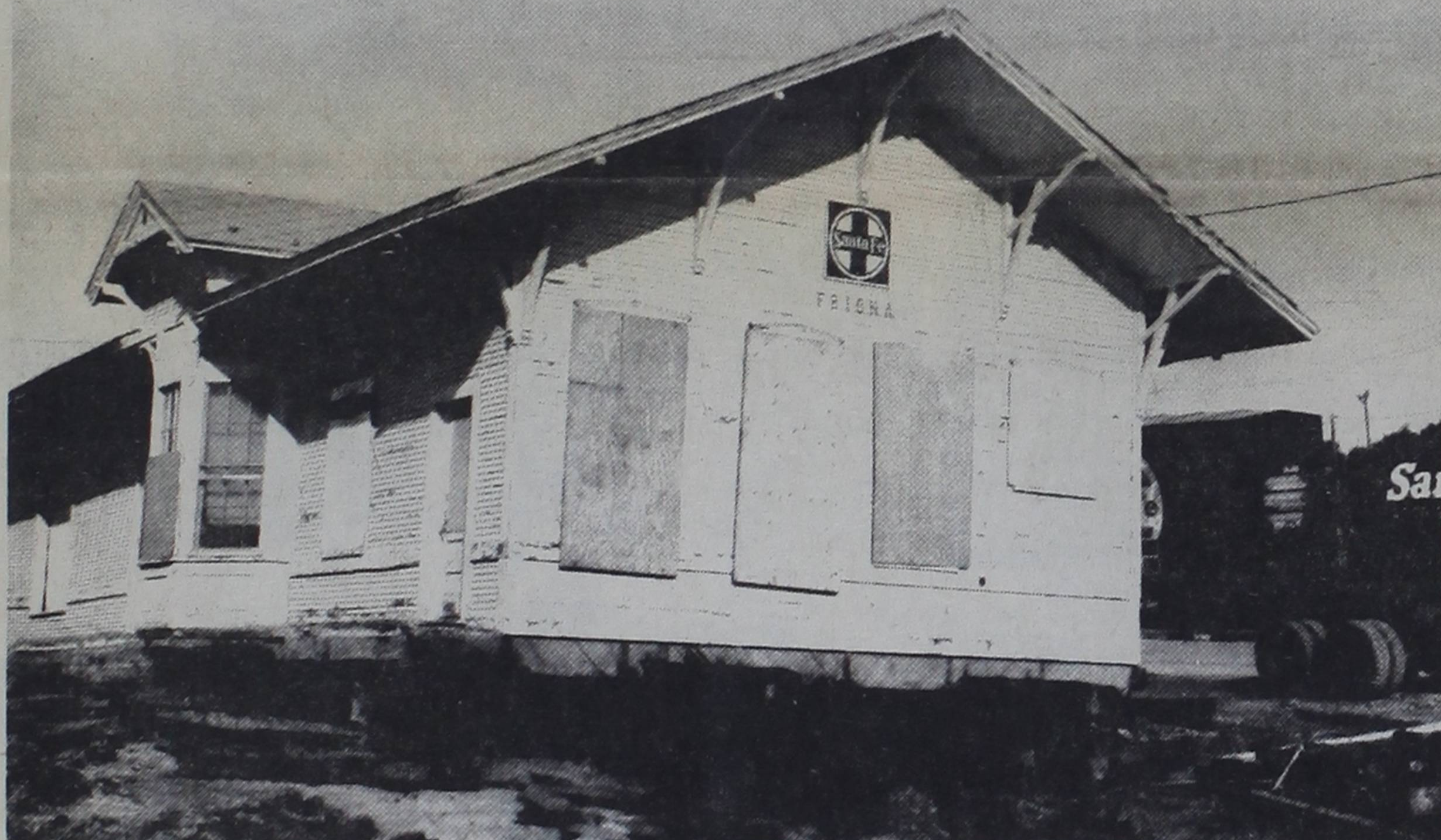
