## FHS In Speech Tourney

SEN. BILL SARPALIUS, state senator for the 31st district, has spent most of the past month hospitalized in Amarillo.

News releases from the senator, as well as a news article in Sunday's Amarillo News-Globe, give more details on the accident in which the senator was critically injured.

For a time after the accident doctors wondered if Sarpalius would ever be able to walk again. If he had been moved as much as 30 degrees after the accident, there was a chance he would have been paralyzed.

So, Sarpalius considers himself fairly lucky.

The state senator, along with his 13-year-old son David, were riding off-road vehicles on the day after Christmas, along the Canadian River in Oldham County.

On their return trip, they were racing down a sandy, open stretch when suddenly the four-wheeler that Sarpalius was riding flipped over—twice. On the first revolution, Sarpalius, who was wearing a helmet, hit his head on the ground. On the final revolution, he landed on his side, and the four-wheeler landed on top, leaving tracks on his backside, according to the senator.

The 13-year-old son moved the vehicle off his father, then went to Sarpalius' pickup, unhooked the trailer and drove to Boys Ranch for help. It took two hours to get Sarpalius to the hospital, but luckily for him, his rescuers were careful.

The senator underwent two rounds of surgery. In one surgery, doctors took a piece of hip bone to fuse to his spine, to help keep two stabilizing rods in place.

The second surgery borrowed from his other hip bone to get another bone which they fused to the front of the damaged vertebra with those above and below it.

With both sides of the spine braced, Sarpalius' back could ultimately be even stronger than it was.

His main concern at the present time is when he will be able to go down to Austin, to join his colleagues in the state legislature. His goal has been the third week of February, but since he was released from the hospital last weekend a full week ahead of the original estimate, this is encouraging.

Sarpalius started work on some of his bills six months ago, and has been in close contact with his staff in Austin since the current session began. Overall, he's not too worried about the effect his missing a month or so will have.

The senator says that 80 per cent of all the bills handled by the legislature come up for debate during the second half of the session.

He has maintained a sense of humor during his pain and convalescing, telling a friend that after he got to his home north of Canyon, "If I need to go to the barn, I can just ride my four-wheeler."

Michael Griffin and Lory Tannahill placed second in duet acting. Griffin also won the "Best Actor" award and was second in record pantomime.

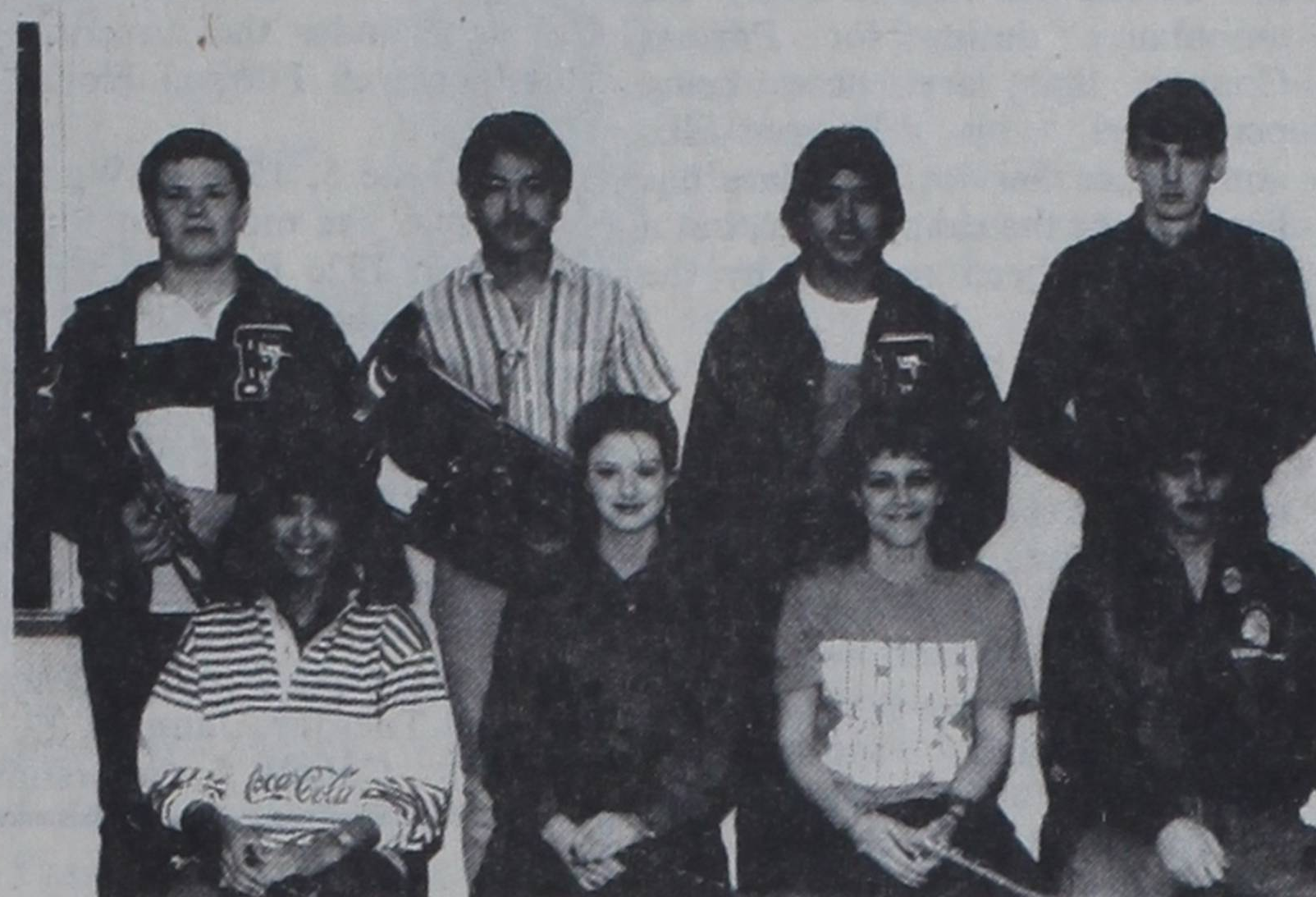

## Sloan H. Osborn Rites Held Friday

Funeral services for Sloan H. Osborn, 85, were held Friday, January 30, at 2 p.m. in the First United Methodist Church of Friona, with Rev. Archie Echols, pastor, and Rev. Geary Brogden, associate pastor of First Baptist Church, officiating.

Osborn died Monday, January 26 in Deaf Smith General Hospital in Hereford.

Burial was in the Friona Cemetery under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

Osborn was born January 18, 1902 near Okolona, Arkansas. His parents were Edgar and Laura Osborn. He first came to Parmer County in the summer of 1921, to make the wheat harvest with his older brothers Jesse and Claude, who were farming near the New Mexico line.

In 1924, he finished Tyler Business College and in the fall of 1924 he bought cotton in Friona.

In 1926, Osborn first purchased land in Parmer County. In 1927 he

and his father bought 320 acres four miles west of Friona and he moved onto it. He raised his first crop of wheat in the summer of 1927. His 60th crop was planted in 1986.

Osborn married Ilene McFarland on November 24, 1927.

In 1933, President Roosevelt appointed Osborn as Friona Postmaster, a position he held until the end of the Truman Administration in 1953.

In the late 1930s acquiring some grassland near Rhea, Osborn diversified his farming with livestock; running cattle first, then sheep from 1935 until 1945. Then he returned to a cow-calf operation and later to stocker cattle, using winter wheat and row crop grazing to supplement the grass.

Sometimes he would feed these cattle at his farm for the grazing season, shipping them as far as Kansas City to market. After 1967, he fattened his stocker cattle and

other cattle at the Hi-Plains Feed Yard.

The most dramatic changes Osborn recalled in Parmer County were the coming of rural electricity and the widespread use of irrigation. The Deaf Smith REA was organized in 1937 and Parmer

## 40th Annual Show Slated

The 40th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show will be held February 4-7 at the Community Center-Showbarn.

Between 500 and 600 animals are expected for the show, which draws entries from all over the county. Judging will be held for steers, barrows, lambs and heifers.

Weigh-in will be on Wednesday from 3-7 p.m. Classification of lambs and steers will begin at 7 p.m. Wednesday.

Lambs will be judged Thursday beginning at 5 p.m. The barrow show will be held on Friday starting at 8 a.m. The steers will be judged starting at 7 p.m., followed by the heifers.

The premium sale will be held on Saturday, February 7, beginning at 2 p.m.

Terry Copley of Friona is the general superintendent of the 1987 show. Mack Heald of Farwell is assistant general superintendent. Rick Seaton of Lazbuddie is swine superintendent. Noel White of Friona is in charge of the lamb show, and Roddy Berend of Friona is head of the cattle department.

Once again Friona State Bank will be hosts for a free breakfast for exhibitors, buyers and workers on Friday morning, February 6, from 6:30-8 a.m.

## Progress Noted On Widening Hwy. 60

Some progress was noted on the prospects of widening Highway 60 through Parmer County to four lanes this week with the signing of a contract asking the state to purchase right-of-way from the Castro County line west to Friona.

The Parmer County Commissioners, meeting in regular session January 26, approved the contract, which calls for Parmer County to furnish 10 per cent of the estimated cost for the right-of-way, and the state to pay the rest. The county's portion of this cost will be \$103,600, which will come out of its Right of Way Fund.

In other business, the court approved helping two citizens with their utility bills, but denied help to a third, who was employed at a full-time job.

The county's bill to Panhandle Community Services, for handling fees for commodities given away by the county, was approved in the amount of \$495. This amounts to two cents per pound on the items distributed.

Sheriff Bill Morgan was given approval to seek bids for a new vehicle for the sheriff's department. The bids are to be opened at 10 a.m. February 9.

A new County Historical Commission was named to serve for 1987-88. They are Hugh Moseley, chairman; Ida Jesko, Orma Flippin, Paula McBroom, Harold and Avis Carpenter, June Floyd, Allo Reeve, Grace Whitefield, Wana Brewer, Joyce

Coffman and Frances King.

Two bills were approved for work done in the Sheriff's office in connection with the renovation. They were in the amounts of \$396 and \$325, for electrical and ceiling work, both to Sherrill Lumber Co. of Bovina.

Friona State Bank was granted permission to substitute securities pledged to cover county deposits.

## Program Threatened

Parmer County Judge Porter Roberts and the Parmer County Commissioners have received notification that the USDA has held up funding to the states for the commodity program, because of a presidential order.

The Department of Human Services is going to borrow enough funds for distribution of commodities to continue through March, 1987. If Federal funds remain frozen the commodity program will be discontinued after March.

Persons that are interested in the distribution of the food commodities should write their Congressmen and encourage their support in getting funds for this valuable and needed program.

There will be a food commodity distribution for Parmer County in February, to be announced at a later date.

Osborn and a group of other Friona men bought the Friona State Bank from its out-of-town owners in 1944. He served as president from that time until 1954 and as chairman of the board of directors from 1954 until 1968.

He was active in the organization of the Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona where he served a two-year term on its first board of directors. Later he served an additional 15-year term on its board.

Long an advocate of expanded grain storage facilities, he served on the board of directors of the Friona Wheat Growers Cooperative from 1948 to 1960, during which time it expanded its capacity from 200,000 bushels to 3,170,000 bushels.

One of the organizers of the Hi Plains Savings & Loan Association

in 1957, he served on its board of directors until 1983.

Osborn was also one of the organizers of Hi Plains Feed Yard, Inc. in 1967. He was chairman of the board of directors for a number of years. He was also a member of the board of directors of West Friona Grain, Inc. for years.

He was a charter member of the Friona Evening Lions Club, was a 50-year member of the Masonic Lodge, served on the first Planning and Zoning Board of the City of Friona, and has been a member of the Friona Methodist Church since 1928. In 1974, he was named by the Friona Chamber of Commerce as the co-recipient of the Man of the Year for his community service.

Osborn was preceded in death by two sons, Jack D. Osborn, May 18, 1932 and Robert H. Osborn, January 8, 1978.

Survivors include his wife, Ilene

## 20 YEARS AGO--JAN. 26, 1967

The Friona United Fund distributed checks to its various components this week, with all of the participating units getting more than they requested. Steve Messenger, chairman, stated that the United Fund drive totalled \$6251.52, which represented 109 per cent of its goal of \$5733.00. The total was raised in only nine days, a possible state record this year.

## 15 YEARS AGO--JAN. 27, 1972

Several hundred residents of Parmer County attended a meeting in Bovina Monday sponsored by Water, Inc. The meeting was called to bring the local residents up to date on plans to bring a supply of water into the county.

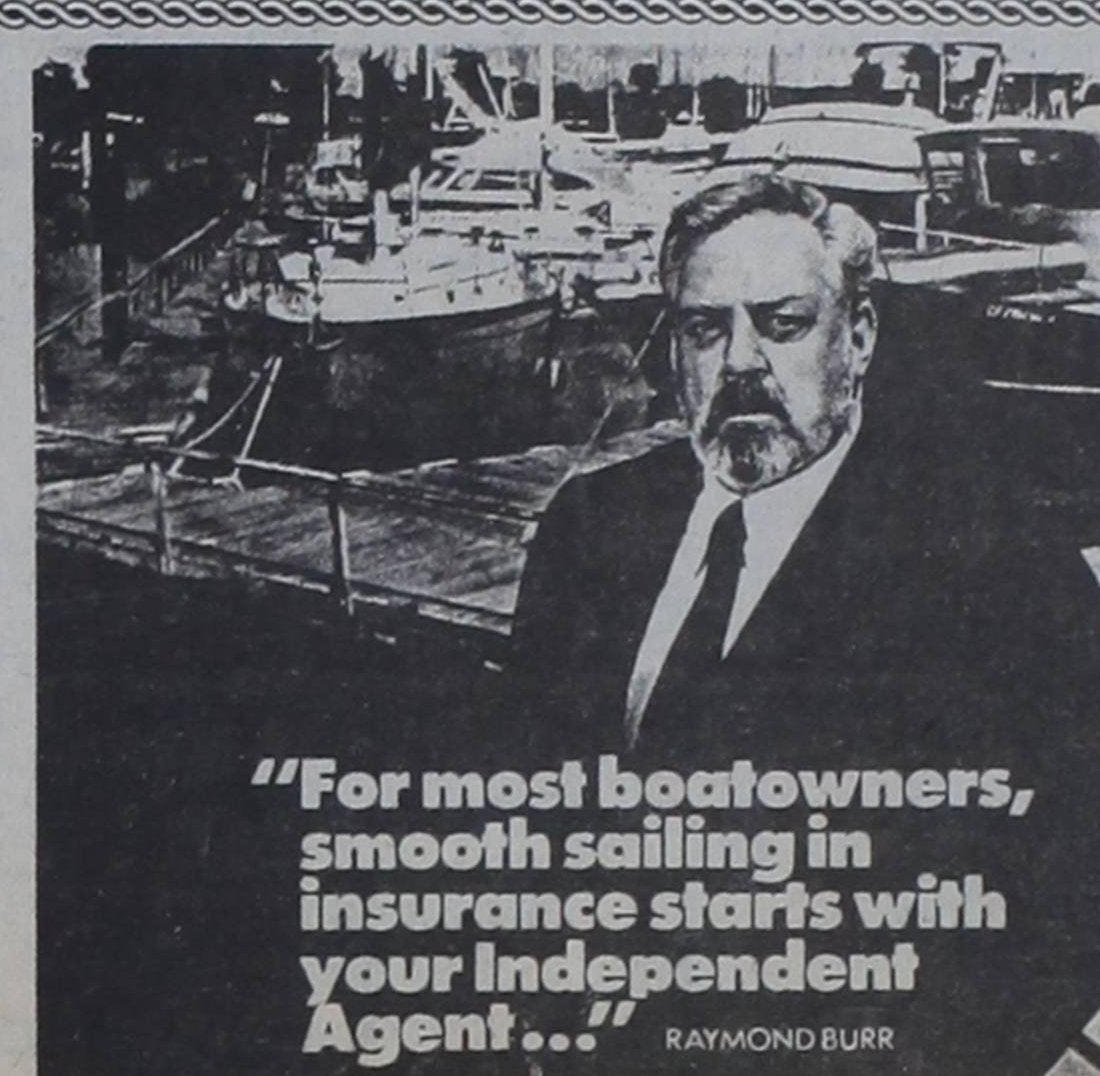

# 40th Annual Junior Livestock Show Set

The 40th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show will be held February 4-7 at the Community Center-Showbarn in Friona.

For the fourth time in five years, there will be a difference in the number of divisions, although this year it's a reduction.

The goat show has been eliminated after a three-year trial, and the turkey show, tried for the first time last year, has been abandoned. That leaves four show divisions: sheep, barrows, steers and heifers.

## Gospel Group To Sing Here Sunday

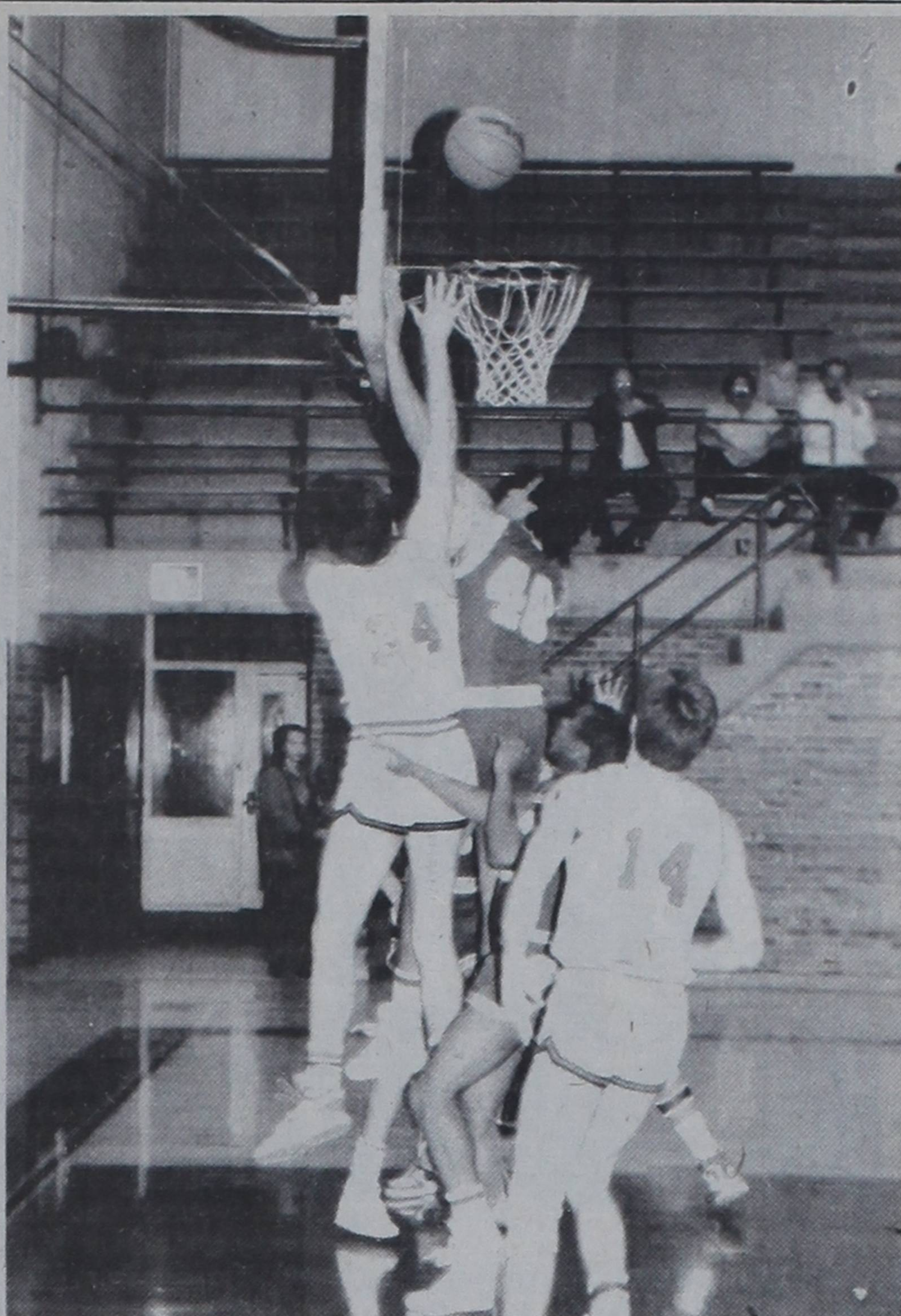
The residents of Friona are warmly invited to attend a Gospel music presentation at the First Baptist Church on Sunday, February 1, at 6:30 p.m.

Amarillo-based Friona Industries, one of the largest agribusiness operations headquartered in West Texas, has been liquidated into a master limited partnership, Friona Industries, L.P. The Partnership's General Partner is Cattle Resources, Inc., a corporation controlled by Frederick B. Hegi, Jr. and William L. Graham. The liquidation was undertaken in order to realize benefits from the 1986 Tax Reform Act.

Significant interests in Friona, which has revenues of some \$400 million, are held by Frederick B. Hegi, Jr., Cattle Resources' Chairman, a Dallas resident and native of Tahoka, Texas; William L. Graham of Amarillo, Chairman of the corporation's Executive Committee; and its operating management, including President and Chief Executive Officer Dennis Farley and Vice Chairman Ron Davenport.

In a separate transaction, Friona Industries, L.P., has acquired Randall County Feedyards, making it the third largest cattle feeding operation in the U.S.

## Your ATV Can Be A Waiting Accident

The day started like any other during the busy early spring season for Jayson Grimsley. The Friona farmer and cattleman hopped aboard his all-terrain vehicle (ATV) and headed across a field to move some cattle that were grazing wheat pasture.

As Grimsley sped along through the lush wheat pasture, he couldn't see the deep tractor tire rut that had been carved in the soil months earlier. Then the front tire of Grimsley's three-wheeled ATV hit the large rut squarely.

"That front tire planted firmly, stopping in place," Grimsley recalls. "Unfortunately, I kept on going with the rest of the rig."

The ATV flipped over forward, its front wheel acting as a pivot. The machine slammed Grimsley's body to the ground beneath the vehicle.

Even though he suffered a broken collar bone and numerous scrapes and bruises, Grimsley was lucky. Similar ATV accidents have killed or permanently injured other victims.

ATV safety has become a major issue as the popularity of these three and four-wheeled vehicles has skyrocketed. Industry sources estimate that more than one-third of the 1.5 million ATV's owned today are used in agriculture.

Some manufacturers are promoting four-wheeled ATV's as safer than three-wheelers. "The ATV market is rapidly shifting to the more stable four-wheeler models," says Hall Wendel, president of Polaris Industries. "We are now concentrating almost exclusively on marketing four-

wheeled units."

Whether three-wheelers or four-wheelers, ATV's--like any other equipment--are only as safe as the operators who use them.

"ATV sales have really taken off since 1982, and so have ATV-related injuries," points out Bob Tyson, a Georgia Extension safety engineer.

Most safety measures are simply a matter of common sense," Tyson points out. On farms and ranches, ATV's are most dangerous when used as working vehicles. When you're chasing cattle or doing other chores, it's easy to forget about operating your ATV safely.

Regardless of how they're used, ATV's should be respected as motorized vehicles and operated with caution.

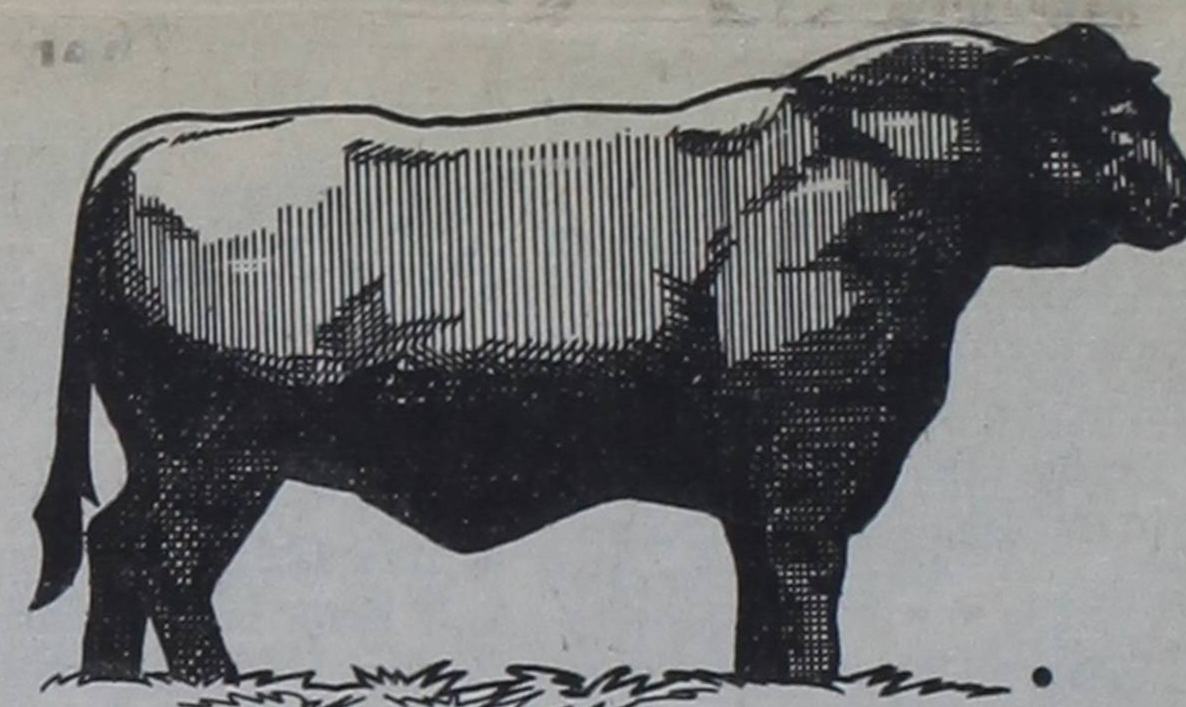

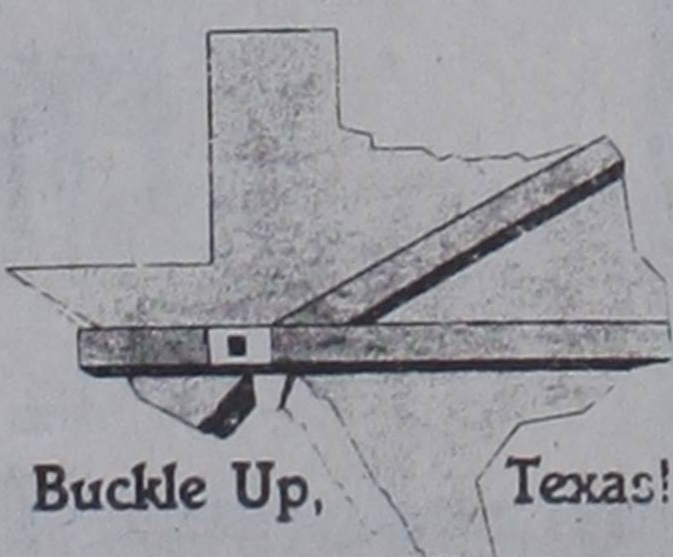

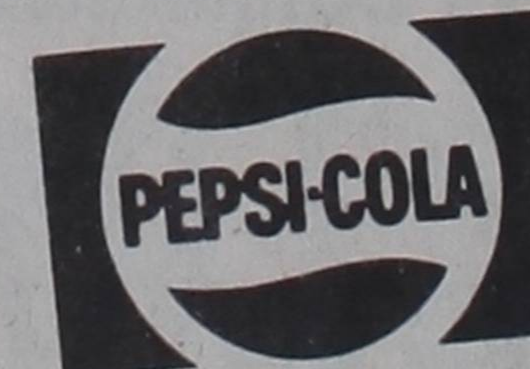

# Post Office Warns Against Fraud

Have you ever been asked to participate in a chain letter which is guaranteed to earn you lots of money with one small investment? Don't waste your money—chain letters are a form of lottery and

## Farm Loan Applications Are Accepted

Application for emergency farm loans for losses caused by hail and rain are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Farwell, Texas, FmHA County Supervisor Weldon Rainey said recently.

Farmer County is one of thirty-three in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the hail and rain.

Weldon Rainey said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 per cent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less at 4 1/2 per cent interest.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 per cent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Rainey said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until August 12, 1987 but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Rainey said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Farwell is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

may violate federal mail fraud laws.

The same three elements that apply to lotteries (*payment, prize, and chance*) also make chain letters illegal. The *payment* may be money or any other item of value. The *prize* is the large amount of money you are led to believe you will receive in the end if you participate. The *chance* is that the chain will break, and it must, because the chance that all participants in a chain letter will receive mail is mathematically impossible.

For example, a typical chain letter may require participants to mail letters, containing money to six new participants, each of whom must mail six letters to six more individuals and so on. By the eleventh level of mailing, the entire population of the United States (almost three-hundred million) would be exhausted. By the 13th level, the population of the world (over four billion) would be exhausted. And remember, even if the chain letter itself is not mailed, as long as the payment or prize is sent through the mail, the entire scheme is illegal.

Some chain letters masquerade as Multi-Level Marketing (MLM) Plans. These require an original promoter to sell a product and enlist several other people to become sellers, who in turn recruit others. Most Multi-Level Marketing Plans are schemes to sell the plan rather than the product, and the fact that selling a product is involved, instead of winning money, or statements saying the plan do not violate federal law, do not ensure legality.

Do not confuse regular chain letters or Multi-Level Marketing Plan chains with prayer chains that promise good luck but require no investment. These are not illegal—they're just a nuisance. You should not be intimidated by implied threats of bad luck, personal injury, or disaster for breaking the chain. Feel free to throw the chain letter away.

Remember, you are under no obligation to participate if you receive a chain letter, and to do so may be a violation of federal law. Turn the letter in to the local post office or send it to the Postal Inspector in Charge, P.O. Box 162929, Fort Worth, TX 76161-2929.

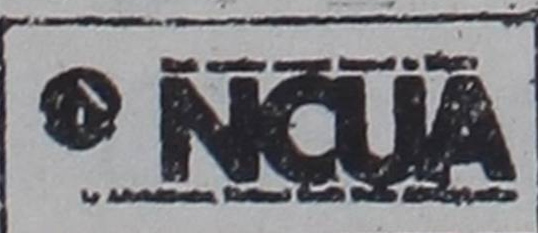
