**THE WEATHER** on Monday was a good example of this area's longstanding reputation about "If you don't like the weather, just stick around, because it will change."

The only thing a little different about Monday was the swiftness with which the weather changed--and changed--and changed.

Early risers were greeted by a beautiful morning. There was hardly any wind, and temperatures were mild for that time of day.

However, by sunup, the wind began to howl out of the north, and the snow began to fly.

At first, the white stuff only accumulated on the yards, and it melted on streets and highways, but very soon, with all of the drifting, the roads became perilous.

We heard a couple of stories about motorists travelling between Bovina and Friona, requiring an hour to make the trip. This was mainly due to the blowing snow which reduced the visibility so drastically.

A number of schools in the northern Texas Panhandle had called off classes, and those which did not soon began putting out the word for parents to come pick up their children, if possible.

The forecast earlier had been for the moisture to be ending by noon. But the weather specialists revised that estimate early in the day, calling for several inches of snow and blizzard-like conditions to continue throughout the day.

This particular forecast turned out to be accurate in the northeastern Panhandle area, but in our area, a strange thing happened.

The sun suddenly came out, and warmed things up considerably. Within an hour or so, the snow and ice was completely gone from the highways. Water was running down the streets in town, much as though we had simply had a spring thundershower.

Before the afternoon was over, things were virtually back to normal, and it was hard to believe that a few hours earlier we had had at least two multi-vehicle pile-ups due to the blizzard conditions.

Prior to noontime, Friona school officials decided to end their school day at 2 p.m., and those students who went home for lunch were allowed (and encouraged) to stay, since the forecast had indicated the storm might worsen.

As you know, by 2 p.m. Monday, the sky was completely clear, and you could not believe it was the same day that you were trying to get home for lunch in the swirling snow.

Once again, Parmer County was spared the brunt of the blizzard, which struck the upper Panhandle a pretty good lick.

The latest blow by Mother Nature was a reminder to residents of our area that in early spring you never know just what to expect, as we commented in this space only last week.

## Area Hit By Late Blizzard

The area was hit by an early-spring blizzard on Monday, making travel difficult for a time Tuesday morning.

Some two to three inches of snow was received in the local area, which was accompanied by winds of up to 30 miles per hour.

It was hard to get a "read" on the moisture content of the snow, although it was very wet.

Several incidents were reported of vehicles which slid into the ditches, off U.S. Highway 60 as well as Highway 86. However, there were no wrecks that required motorists to be taken to the hospital.

By 2 p.m., the sun was out, and the melting was well underway.

The way the blizzard began on Monday reminded longtime residents of the 1957 blizzard, one of the worst on record here. That one was said to have started on the same calendar date, March 23rd.

The area continued to have a touch of winter, with snow flurries on the mornings of March 25 and 26. Friday was the first day all week that the sun was out, but forecasters say we are in for another cold blow on Saturday.

## Services Held Here For Dr. Lee Spring

Funeral services for Dr. Lee Spring, 67, were held Thursday afternoon at Friona's First United Methodist Church, with Rev. Archie Echols, pastor, officiating.

Burial was in Friona Cemetery, under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

"Dr. Lee," as he is known throughout Parmer County, died suddenly at his home in Friona at 1:05 a.m. Tuesday, March 24, of an apparent heart attack.

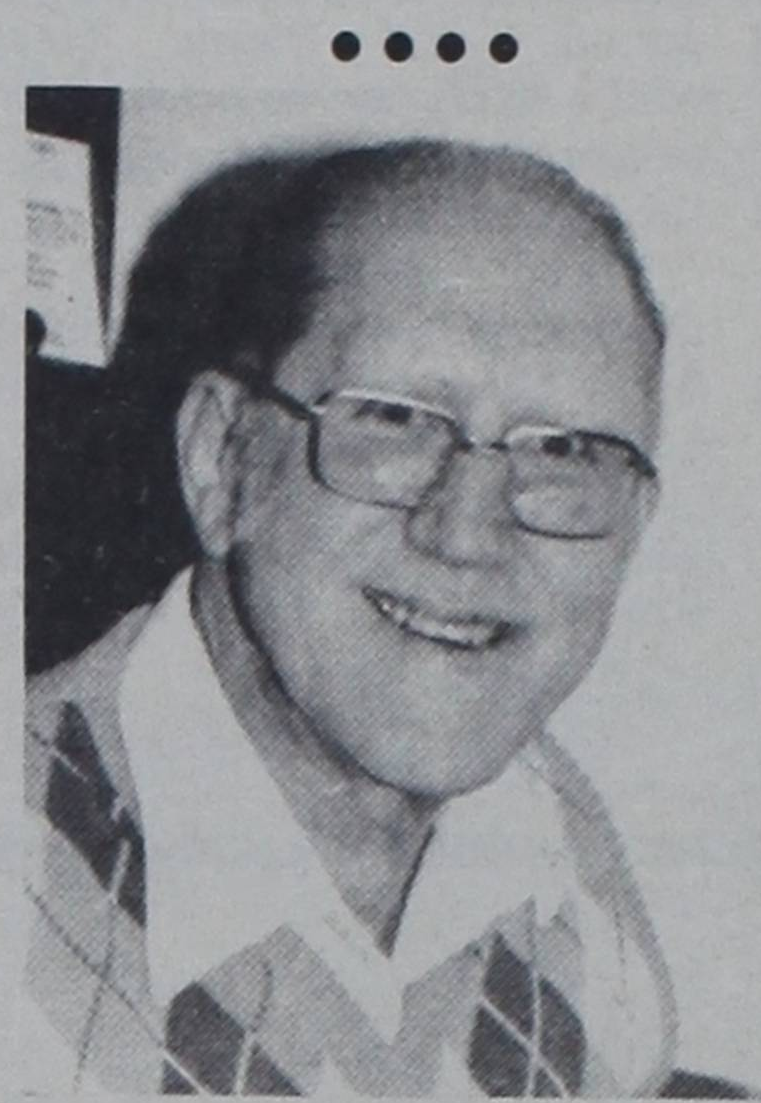
Lee Spring was born June 16, 1919, in Bovina. He was the youngest son of F.L. and Ocie Spring, pioneer settlers who farmed and operated a country store.

In 1926, the Springs moved to Friona. Lee was valedictorian of both his eighth grade and senior classes at Friona.

He received his BA degree at Texas Tech, but left prior to graduation exercises for the U.S. Army as World War II had broken out.

He served three years and four months in the U.S. Army Air Corps, attaining the rank of staff sergeant. He spent two years overseas, mainly in England. He was discharged in 1945.

After the war, Lee worked a year in his father's general store, then completed a course in premed at the University of Houston. He received his MD degree from the University of Texas Medical Branch at Galveston.

Other UIL literary events are also being held this week.

## Chiefs Sweep To Third Meet Title

The Friona Chieftains' track and field team scored their third straight team championship of the spring season at Tulia last Saturday, running away with the team title with 136 points.

And the team would have had a whopping 156 points except for a disqualification of the winning mile relay team, which was termed a "very close call."

Friona had five wins that counted, including a sweep for the second straight week in the pole vault. Rod Britting, Sam Montoya and Albert Trevino went 14-0, 12-6 and 12-0, to capture first, second and third.

Britting's 14-foot vault tied the school record he established in the event in 1986.

It was almost a sweep--22 points--in the high jump. Shy Burney continued his winning ways by clearing 6-6. Younger brother Cody Burney took second place with a leap of 6-2. Daniel Echols placed fourth with a 6-0 mark.

Echols won his specialty, the 400-meter dash, with a time of 52.8. He had placed second in the long jump, with his season best of 20-2. But he strained a hamstring while competing in the long jump, and his action the rest of the day was limited.

Daniel Padilla hurled the discus 142-10 to win his event. The Chieftains went 1-2 in the 300-meter hurdles race. Stephen Thornton was the winner at 40.8, and Peter Malouf was second at 41.6.

The 1600-meter relay team had clocked a 3:27 in their event, but were called for cutting in too soon after the first exchange. Friona had a 15-yard lead at the time. "We may have run 1599 meters instead of 1600," said Coach Steve Williams, who was very upset about the call.

Toby Gibson had a good day for the Chieftains. He was second in the 200-meter dash with a clocking of 23.1. Cody Bracken was third in the 100-meter dash at 11.3, and fourth in the 200-meters at 23.6.

Friona's 400-meter relay team placed fourth at 45.7. Members of the foursome were Glen Trimmell, Gibson, Thornton and Malouf.

Jerry Lafurte placed fourth in the 3200-meter run with a time of

11:12. Jeff Chaney was fourth in the discus with a throw of 137-5 and fifth in the shot put at 44-3. Shy Burney was third in the long jump at 20-0 and Thornton was sixth at 19-1.

Mickey Pena was sixth in the 800-meter run at 2:08.

The good showing was accomplished with one varsity member, Lance Gatlin, absent. Malouf substituted for Echols on the 1600-meter team after Echols had his pulled muscle.

All of the district teams except Muleshoe took part in the meet, so it was a pretty fair preview for the upcoming district meet.

Survivors include his wife, Anne, of the home; two daughters, Sylvia Anne (Gigi) Spring of San Antonio and Sandra Lee (Sandy) Spring of Canyon; two sisters, Mary Spring of Amarillo and Lydia Sylvester of Pine Top, Arizona; two brothers, Frank A. Spring and Dr. Paul L. Spring, both of Friona; and one granddaughter, Amanda Lee Spring of Canyon.

He was preceded in death by one brother, Edward Spring, on July 17, 1981.

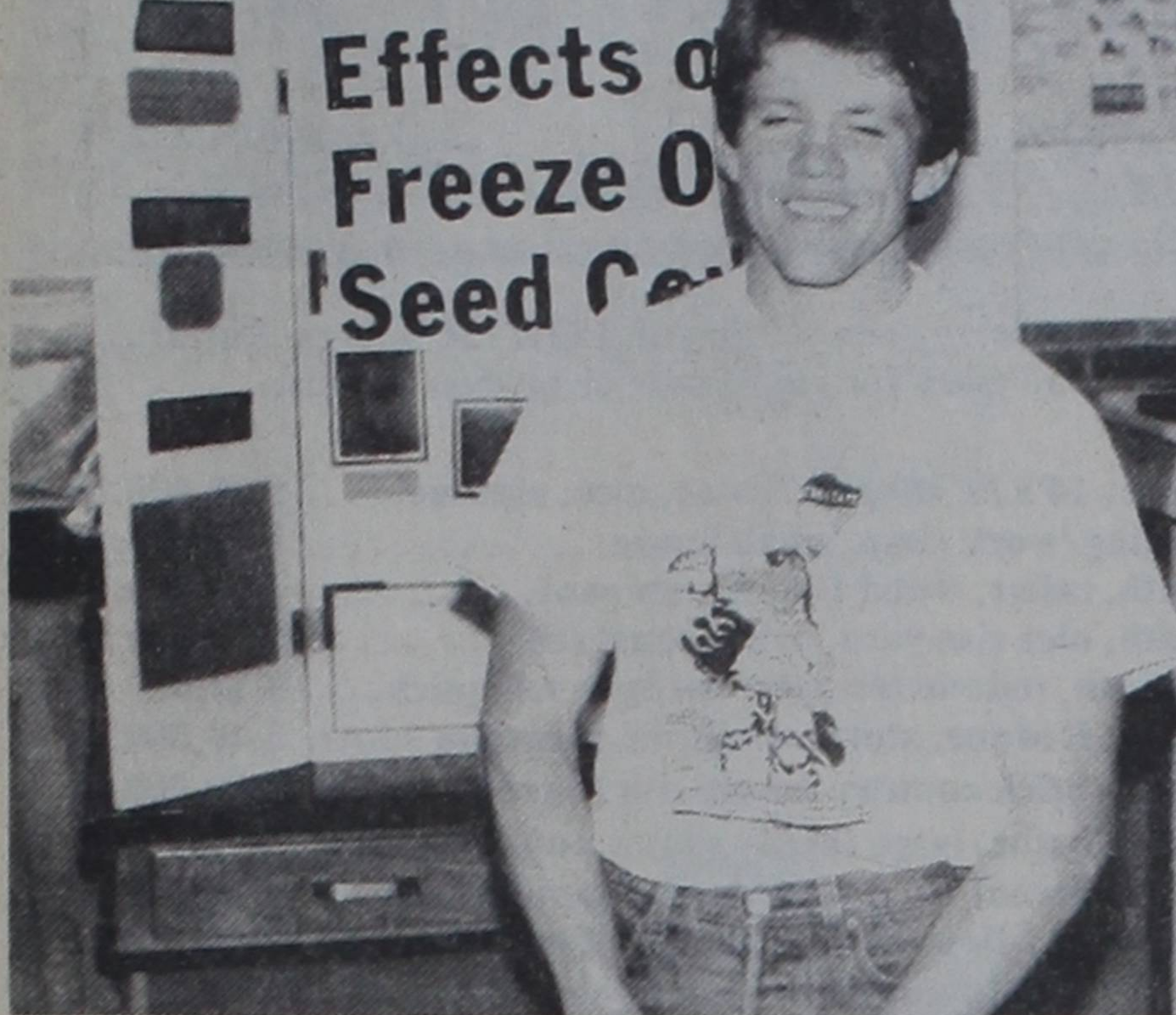

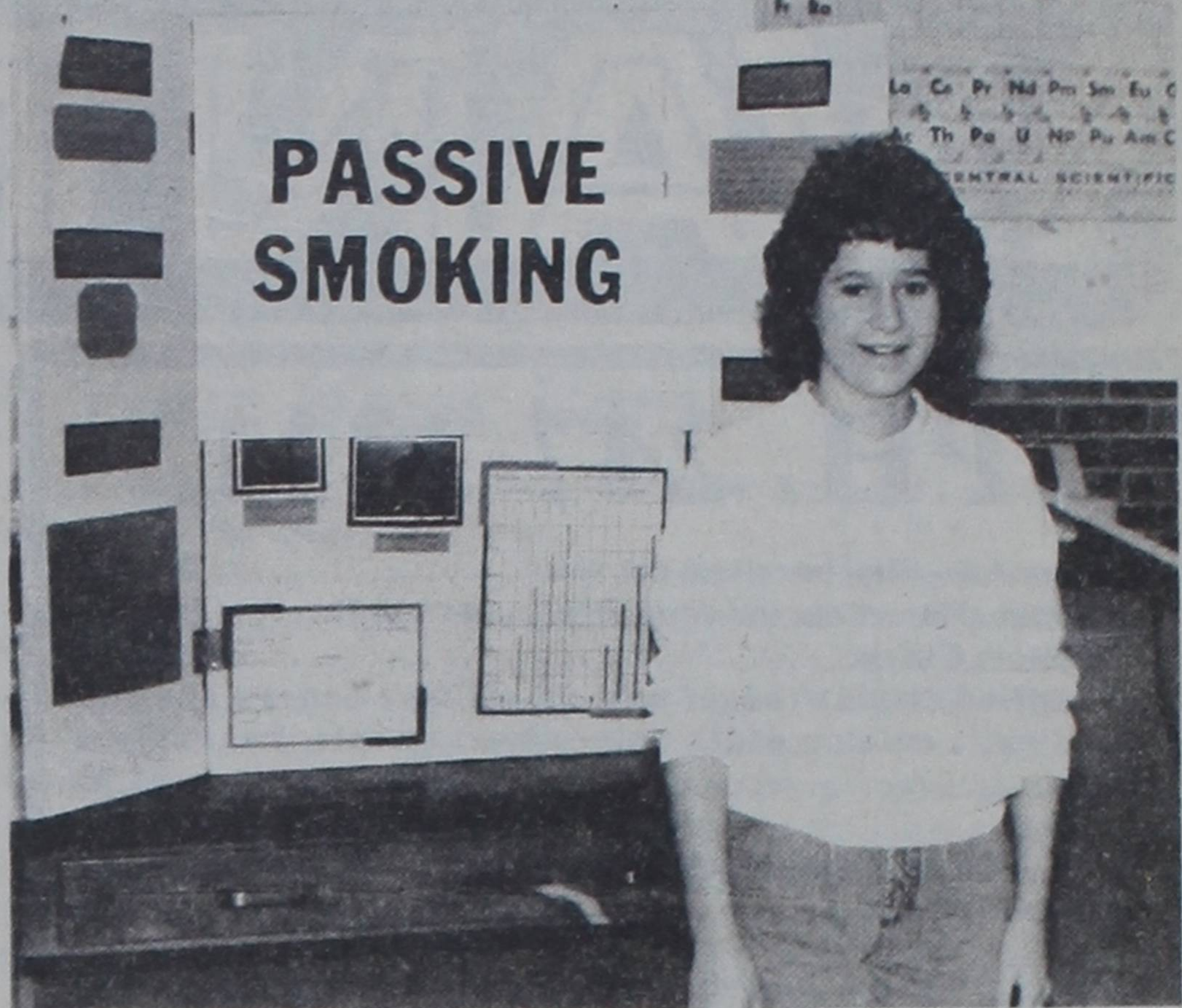

Warren earned the right to represent Parmer County in the Amarillo Globe-News Spelling Bee in Canyon April 11.

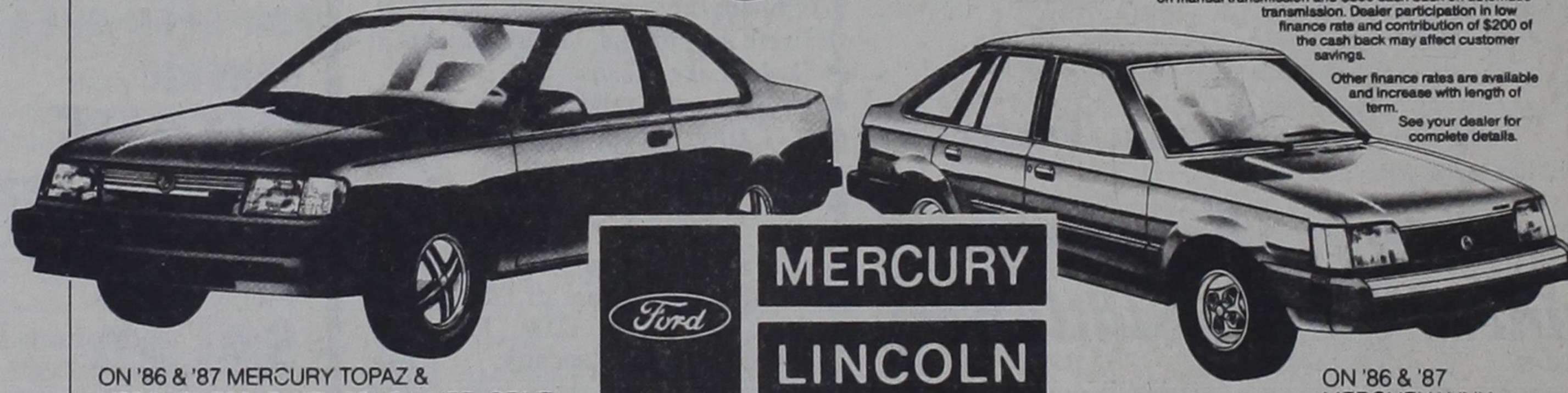

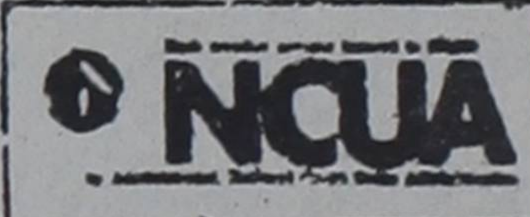

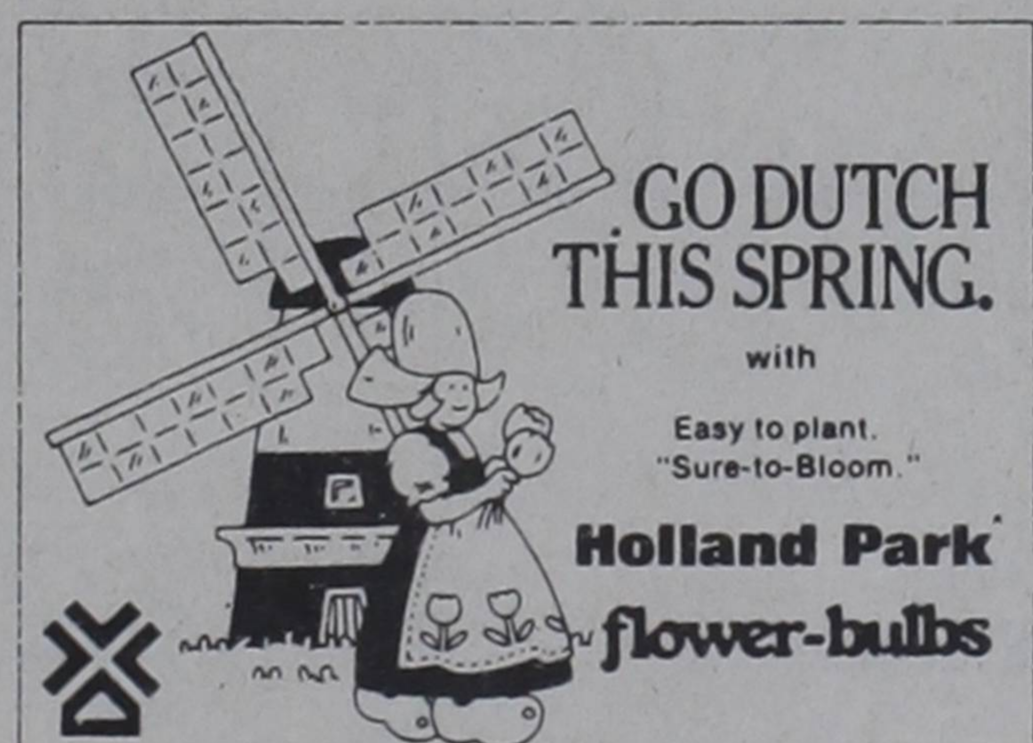

Six offenses were reported--two thefts; one unauthorized use of motor vehicle (vehicle recovered); two recovered property; and one hit and run.

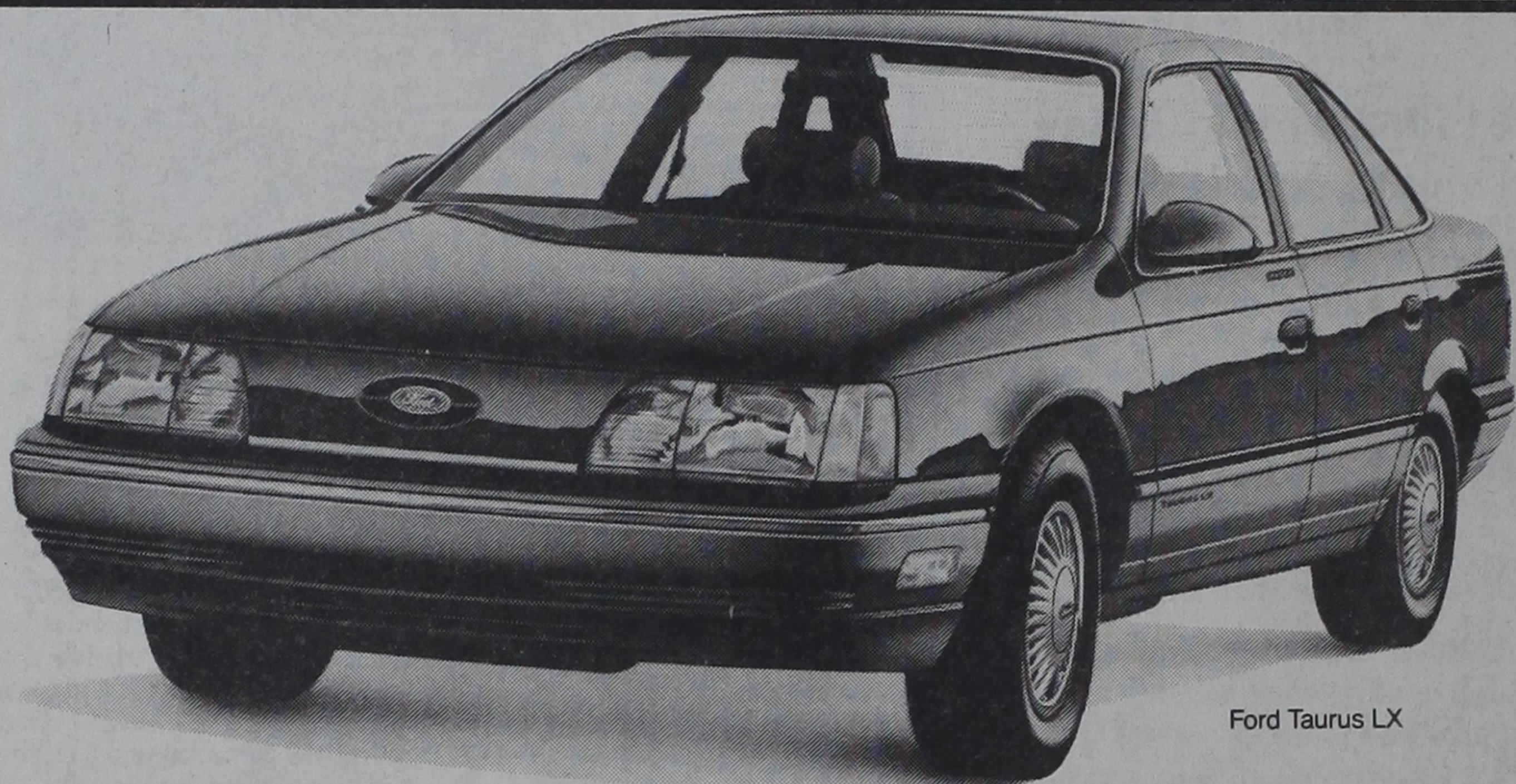
Four new vacation requests were made. Twenty-six security checks were made and six citations were issued.

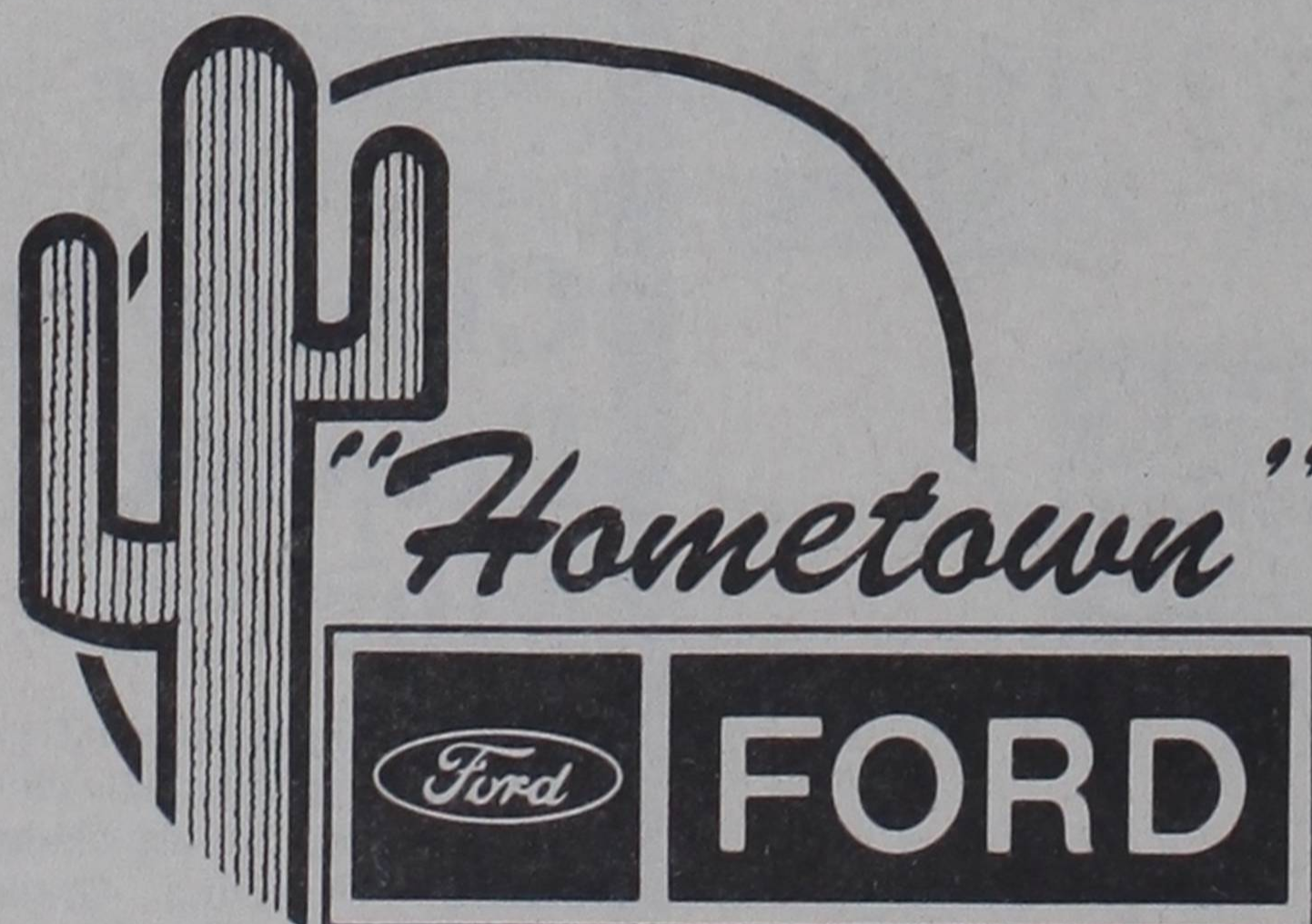
