Daylight Time To Debut On Sunday

If you have been enjoying those last few minutes of sleep these spring mornings, we have a bit of bad news.

Daylight Savings Time will begin its run on Sunday, April 4, this year, instead of the last Sunday in April. So you're going to have to retire earlier, in order to get the same amount of sleep Saturday night.

At 2 a.m. local time Sunday, residents will observe the "spring forward, fall back" rule, which will give everyone except residents of Arizona, Hawaii, most of Indiana and Puerto Rico an extra hour of daylight in the evening.

Daylight Savings Time has been virtually a national phenomenon since 1966, when Congress passed a law setting Daylight Savings Time from the last Sunday in April to the last Sunday in October.

In order to register and try out, players will need to bring their glove, a parent or guardian to sign them up, and a \$10 registration fee.


Any player from last year who has not turned in their uniform is asked to bring it on April 11 or return it to their coach.

FHS students qualified for twenty positions in the regional UIL meet by placing first, second or third in their events.

Friona scored 256 overall points, to 204 for Tulia and 118 for third-

place Muleshoe. FHS had a running start by virtue of having the first-place one-act play.



Child Abuse Is Scored By Group

April is National Child Abuse Prevention month. The Parmer County Child Welfare Board asks you to take time to listen to "A Cry for Help."

Some children can't or won't cry for help when they need it...even when their lives may be in danger. They are the thousands of victims of child abuse and neglect whose suffering may go unchecked for years, often permanently impairing their health and development and sometimes costing their lives. Such children may be too young, too terrified, or simply too confused to tell anyone about it.

But even without being told, you can spot the symptoms of abuse and neglect if you know what to look for in a child's behavior. When you think you've seen evidence of abuse or neglect, it is essential that you report it. The law requires that you make a report to the Texas Department of Human Services (364-1266) or a law enforcement agency.

Your phone may be that child's only cry for help. Persons making reports are protected by law from liability and identities are kept confidential. The Abuse Hotline number is 1-800-252-5400 and may be called 24 hours a day from anywhere in the state. The number is listed in the phone book.

There are three kinds of child abuse: physical, sexual and emotional. There are also several kinds of CHILD NEGLECT. Physical neglect is failure to provide enough food, clothing, shelter or medical care. Failing to provide adequate education, guidance or supervision is also neglect. Emotional neglect is failure to give children the love and affection they need.

In 1985, investigations confirmed that 59,863 children were abused or neglected. Victims of child abuse and neglect range in age from infants to adolescents. More than half are under seven years old. These figures reflect only REPORTED cases. Figures also show 409,196 of the state's children are in danger of being abused and neglected. A comparison of these figures shows

few children are being brought to the department's attention.

People who abuse and neglect children can be found at every social or economic level and in all ethnic and religious groups. Their victims are mostly their own children or those of a close friend or relative. Some abusers were abused by their own parents.

There are many signs of child abuse and neglect. Some are obvious while others are not as obvious. When subtle clues recur or appear in combination with other signs you should suspect and report it.

Another very important issue concerning the abused and neglected child is the two budget proposals being considered in Austin. The Governor's budget would reduce Department of Human Services by 65 per cent. The House and Senate budget would result in a reduction of 27 per cent of funding. When asked, DHS made a 13 per cent budget cut just last year.

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
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

Chieftains Shine In San Angelo Relays

The Friona Chieftain track and field team had some outstanding marks at the San Angelo Relays last Friday and Saturday.

In a 15-team field featuring the toughest competition Friona has faced all season, the Chieftains placed third with 79 points. They were edged for second by Dalhart with 80 points.

Always tough Breckenridge won the meet with 90 points.

"The fact that we were in the running to win the meet was exciting. These kids always feel like they're going to win their event, regardless--and that's what it takes," said Coach Steve Williams.

The Chieftains' 1600-meter relay team clipped five seconds off their best time of the season, winning that event with a time of 3:28.38. Members of the team are Toby Gibson, Stephen Thornton, Cody Bracken and Daniel Echols.

Echols had a time of 49.3 on his anchor leg of the mile relay, to give Friona the win by .27 of a second over Breckenridge.

Echols won the 400-meter dash with a time of 50.62. "I think Daniel will break the 50-second mark in the 400-meter race before long. He could do it this weekend at Amarillo, if the weather is good," Williams said.

Daniel Padilla, who has been improving as the season has progressed, won the discus throw with a toss of 145 feet, ten inches.

High jumper Shy Burney lost his event for the first time this spring, being pushed for the first time. Burney had quite a duel with Brit Pursley of Merkel. The Merkel jumper cleared 6-10 for the win, and Burney had to settle for second place with a jump of 6-8.

"Shy had cleared 6-10, but knicked the bar with his heel. He had cleared the bar with some to spare," Williams commented.

Rod Britting continued to be consistent in the pole vault, clearing 13 feet, but had to settle for second place as the same Merkel kid--Pursley, had a vault of 14-6. Albert Trevino was third in the event with a jump of 12-6.

Jerry Lafuente, a sophomore, not only came up with his best

off stride, so it was a double-mark of the season in the 3200-meters, but also set a new school record of 10:37.83. He had to settle for fourth place.

In the 300-meter hurdles race, Peter Malouf clocked his best time of the season in the preliminaries, but had some rough luck in the finals.

Malouf fell down while running the finals, and finished last. The winning time was slower than Malouf's preliminary time. When Malouf fell, he also hit teammate Stephen Thornton, knocking him


whammy. Thornton recovered to place third with a time of 41.47.

Jeff Chaney got his best discus throw of the year, 138-0, to place fourth in that event.

Friona's 400-meter relay team placed fifth with a time of 45.1. Team members are Glen Trimmell, Gibson, Thornton and Malouf.

Cody Burney placed sixth in the high jump, clearing 6-2.

The meet was held in nice weather on Friday. However, on Saturday, the temperature was 50 degrees, with a 20-25 miles-per-hour wind.

Court Approves Space For MH/MR

A motion was passed to pay the boarding care bills on the county foster children, in the amount of \$3,108. This amount will be reimbursed to the county.

Motion was passed to pay a bill from the Denver, Colorado, sheriff's office, for attempted service of a citation from the District Court for an indigent.

The Modern Study Club met Tuesday, March 31 at the Friona Woman's Club House.


The meeting was opened with a devotional by Allo Reeve. She also recognized the club's guests.
