CONGRESSMAN Martin Frost is co-sponsoring a bill in the U.S. Legislature which he entitles the "Taxpayers' Bill of Rights."

The congressman says that in his opinion, when congress passed the current "tax reform" it left out a major aspect of tax reform, and that is reform in the way the Internal Revenue Service goes about collecting tax dollars.

Frost says, "Anyone who has ever had a disagreement with the Internal Revenue Service knows that the I.R.S. can be the most aggressive and uncompromising of all federal agencies. And the fact is that under current law very little protection is available to those involved in tax disputes."

The Internal Revenue Service is under no obligation to provide information on tax collection procedures and is not held accountable for mistakes caused when inaccurate or misleading information is offered by I.R.S. employees. Too many times, taxpayers are left with no choice but to hire expensive lawyers and tax specialists whose fees must be paid whether the argument with the I.R.S. is won or lost.

In his weekly column, Congressman Frost lists the ten points included in his "Taxpayers' Bill of Rights." They are:

1) The Internal Revenue Service would be required to prepare a document setting forth the rights and obligations of taxpayers and the I.R.S., including the procedure appealing adverse decisions as well as the procedure for prosecuting refund claims.

2) A judgment of costs, including attorney fees, accountant fees, and clerical expenses may be awarded to taxpayers if they win a dispute in tax court.

3) Taxpayers would be allowed to take legal action against an I.R.S. employee who violates a person's rights.

4) An office of Ombudsman would be established within the Department of the Treasury, but separate from the Internal Revenue Service, to receive and investigate taxpayer complaints.

5) Individual taxpayers would be given the right to have representation during an I.R.S. interview and would be allowed to record I.R.S. interviews.

6) The General Accounting Office would be required to perform an annual audit of the I.R.S. including its collection and audit procedures.

7) The Internal Revenue Service would be prohibited from investigating tax records for purposes other than the enforcement of tax laws, except to investigate drug dealers or organized crime figures.

8) The Internal Revenue Service would be prohibited from evaluating I.R.S. personnel on the basis of the amount of money collected.

9) The Internal Revenue Service would be prohibited from renegotiating on installment payment agreements, unless the taxpayer misled the I.R.S. as to financial status or unless the taxpayer's financial status subsequently changes.

10) The burden of proof during court proceedings would be shifted to the Internal Revenue Service.

The recent fatal accident northeast of Friona on U.S. Highway 60 in which a 20-year-old woman was killed is a further reminder of the desperate need to widen the highway to four lanes.

Most people's reaction to the tragedy centered around the fact that "If the highway had been four lanes, this would not have happened."

We have mentioned previously the tremendous amount of truck traffic on Highway 60, and we have felt for a number of years that the area around the Black community, with the dangerous wind currents around the elevators at Black, was "an accident waiting to happen."

Unfortunately, the dreaded accident happened April 12 and claimed the life of Renee Annis, the 20-year-old Cannon AFB airman.

We realize that the project is being pushed by the Highway Department, and is probably moving about as quickly as possible.

But we also want to remind the TDHT not to let up on the project. We also have mentioned the large number of school buses and activity buses which use the two-lane facility.

It's Athletes' Turn At Regional Meet

Members of the Chieftain and Squaws' track and field teams were in Odessa this weekend, competing in the Region I meet, hoping to qualify for the state meet by placing either first or second in their events.

The Chieftains are paced into the regional meet by their field event competitors.

In Rod Britting, Friona has the best vaulter in the "Top of Texas." Britting has consistently cleared 15 feet during the past month, winning with that height at Amarillo and at Ruidoso, N.M.

However, at the regional meet he will be against Brit Pursley of Merkel, who has cleared 16 feet this spring. One other entrant in the regional meet has cleared 15 feet in one meet, so this bids to be a competitive event.

Shy Burney also has one of the better marks in his event, the high jump, at 6-8. However, district rival James Alexander of Dimmitt beat Burney in the district meet, also with a 6-8 leap, and Pursley has cleared 6-10, so he has his work cut out for him.

Daniel Echols will have one of the better qualifying times in the 400-meter dash. Echols has run a 49.7 for his best time in the event.

Dalhart has a 400-meter entrant who has posted a 50.0, and it was uncertain what the southern half of the region might have to offer.

Sam Montoya, who cleared 12-6 at the district meet, will also enter the pole vault for Friona, and Toby Gibson, whose qualifying time was 23.25, will enter the 200-meter dash.

Friona's 1600-meter relay team has a best time of 3:25.7. Going into the regional meet, the Chieftain foursome had the third-best time of those qualifying, according to Coach Steve Williams, so they will have to pull an upset to qualify for the state meet.

Children May Get SS Number

The Social Security representative from Clovis will be in the Friona School System on Tuesday, May 12 from 1-3:45 p.m. to take applications from parents or children for Social Security numbers.

This is strictly a voluntary program, to assist the new IRS rules which contain a requirement that all individuals at least five years of age or older and classified as a dependent for income tax purposes must have a Social Security number.

"We are doing this as a service to the parents, to save them travelling to the Social Security office," said a representative of the Clovis SS office.

"We need the parents of the child to bring in the child's original birth certificate or baptismal record. We must see the original document," the representative said.

Children under five may also get a card, also those who may have lost a card may apply for another, it was stated.

Ronda Ratcliff To Play College Ball

Ronda Ratcliff has accepted a four-year scholarship to play basketball at Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos, it was announced this week.

Miss Ratcliff becomes the first member of the Friona Squaws' team in modern times to win a college scholarship.

Vicki Hatton, Miss Ratcliff's coach, said that Kriss Ethridge, assistant coach at Southwest Texas, recruited Ronda after seeing her play in the Golden Spread Girls' All-Star games recently.

"She was impressed with her intensity, quickness and dedication to play," Coach Hatton said. Kriss Ethridge is a former all-state performer for Lubbock Monterey High School and played for the University of Texas.

Southwest Texas is a member of the Southland Athletic conference, and is a Division I NCAA member.

Other members of the conference are North Texas State, University of Texas at Arlington, Sam Houston State and Stephen F. Austin.

Ronda was the Squaws' leading scorer with a 14-point season average, and also was one of the area leaders in rebounds with 8 per

game. The 1986-87 Squaws had a 29-4 season record, winning district at 10-0 and bi-district before falling in the area playoff game.

She chose Southwest Texas over two other colleges who were interested in having her, Eastern New Mexico University and Western Texas Junior College.

Ronda is a second generation star performer for the Friona Squaws. Her mother, the former Charlotte Bock, was a starter and high-scorer for the Squaws, playing from 1957 through 1960.

Charlotte played forward on the 1960 Squaws' team that compiled a season record of 32-3, losing in the state finals to Buna, 66-63. She played on three Friona teams that made the playoffs.

Friona Flashbacks

55 YEARS AGO--APRIL 15, 1932

Through the efforts of a few of our businessmen, Friona now has a regularly organized golf club, which organization was completed last week. The new organization now has a membership of 35, with R.R. Wills as president and Howard G. Morris, secretary, F.A. Spring, treasurer, and O.F. Lange, chairman of greens committee.

Last Saturday afternoon, as Chester Sheets of the Farmers Produce Company of Friona was enroute to Lubbock with a new cargo of eggs, cream and poultry, his truck was capsized and his cargo badly scattered. The accident occurred south of Hale Center on the state highway at 3 p.m. when the truck collided with a car, coming onto the highway from a side road.

45 YEARS AGO--APRIL 10, 1942

J.A. Blackwell Tuesday was elected mayor of Friona in a quiet city election which saw no other change in the list of present city office holders. Blackwell defeated the present mayor, F.W. Reeve, by a vote of 65 to 31. For commissioner, F.A. Spring and Carl Maurer were re-elected, and Logan Symphon was again chosen city clerk. Jones was re-elected as night-watchman.

Friona citizens have always been proud of their city, and home town patriotism took a jump this week in the splendid response for a 100 per cent "close up" and "all out" for the monster Army Day Parade at Amarillo, where one of our most highly esteemed citizens was one of the guests of honor. Friona's wholehearted cooperation was prompted by the honor being done to Mrs. George M. Baker, Six-Star Mother, and one of the honor guests in Amarillo.

40 YEARS AGO-- (1947 issue missing from Star files.)

35 YEARS AGO--APRIL 10, 1952

Friona Star was one of three weekly newspapers cited for

community service at the annual meeting of the Panhandle Press Association as it met in Amarillo last Friday and Saturday. Papers receiving recognition for service were The Canadian Record, the Paducah and the Star.

Voters of the Friona School District last Saturday made their choice for three board members, selecting C.V. Potts, George Jones and Roy Clements. Trustee at large selected was W.M. Sherley. The school election was closely followed by the interest in the straw vote for presidential choice, with General Eisenhower accorded the greatest vote, followed by Taft and MacArthur.

30 YEARS AGO--APRIL 11, 1957

Sale by Bert Chitwood to Rockwell Bros. Lumber Company of the lots just south of the firm in Friona was announced this week. The location was originally occupied by the Friona Locker Plant.

With the arrival of a 180-pound meeting table--the last piece of furniture ordered to go into the building--the City of Friona will have its oft-delayed open house for the new City Hall Saturday. The hall, which cost the city in the neighborhood of \$36,000, will be officially presented to the public for the first time, although many citizens have already been in the building's offices, and some have toured the entire hall. The building joins the fire station at the corner of Eighth and Main.

25 YEARS AGO--APRIL 12, 1962

A raging fire consumed approximately two-thirds of a 16 by 100 foot barn on Eric Rushing's farm one mile west of Friona at 10:30 Friday night. Firemen arrived in time to extinguish the inferno and save part of the structure. Damage was estimated at approximately \$700 by Rushing, owner of the barn.

The April report from Friona State Bank shows that deposits have increased almost one million dollars since January 1 to set a new all-time high. Total deposits at

present are shown at \$6,307,398.91. Deposits on January 1 were reported as \$5,447,336.28 which allows an increase of \$860,062.53 in three months.

20 YEARS AGO--APRIL 13, 1967

An explosion of unknown causes destroyed the farm home of Mr. and Mrs. Billy Bates Tuesday, but the family was all out of the house at the time and escaped injury and possible death. The farm home belonged to Jack Moseley, and was located some nine miles southeast of Friona on land belonging to Ranza Boggess.

Hi-Plains Feed Yard, Inc., with a future capacity of 50,000 head of cattle, became a reality this week with the hiring of a manager and awarding of its construction contract. Located four and one-half miles northwest of Friona on land purchased from Bill Baxter, plans call for complete facilities for feeding, including mill, ensilage pits, feeding equipment and pens properly engineered for drainage and anti-pollution. Construction is slated to begin within two weeks and is scheduled to be in operation by the middle of September. The mill will be built and erected by Brown-McKee, Inc. Contractors and Engineers of Lubbock.

15 YEARS AGO--APRIL 13, 1972

The Friona Chamber of Commerce set out to coordinate a local drive for a livestock showbarn as a highlight of its monthly board meeting Tuesday morning at Earl's Parmer House Restaurant. The matter of the showbarn has been under considerable discussion since the recent Parmer County Junior Livestock Show.

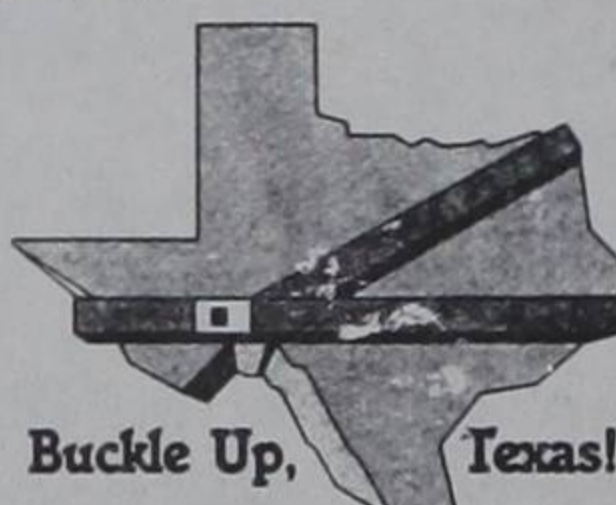

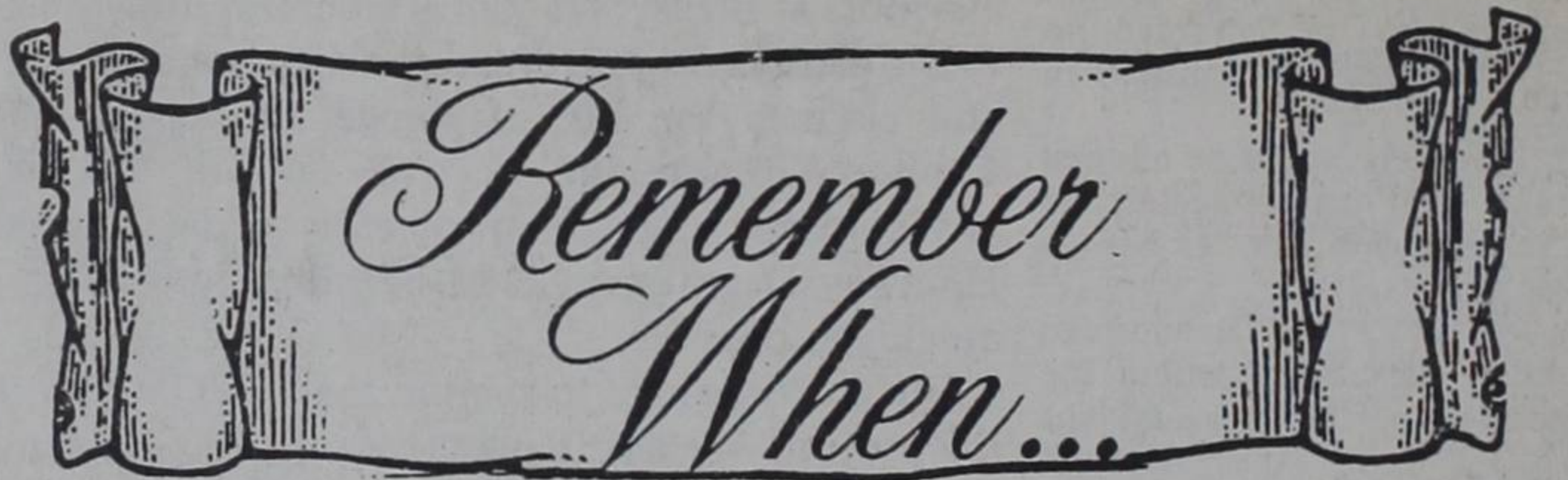

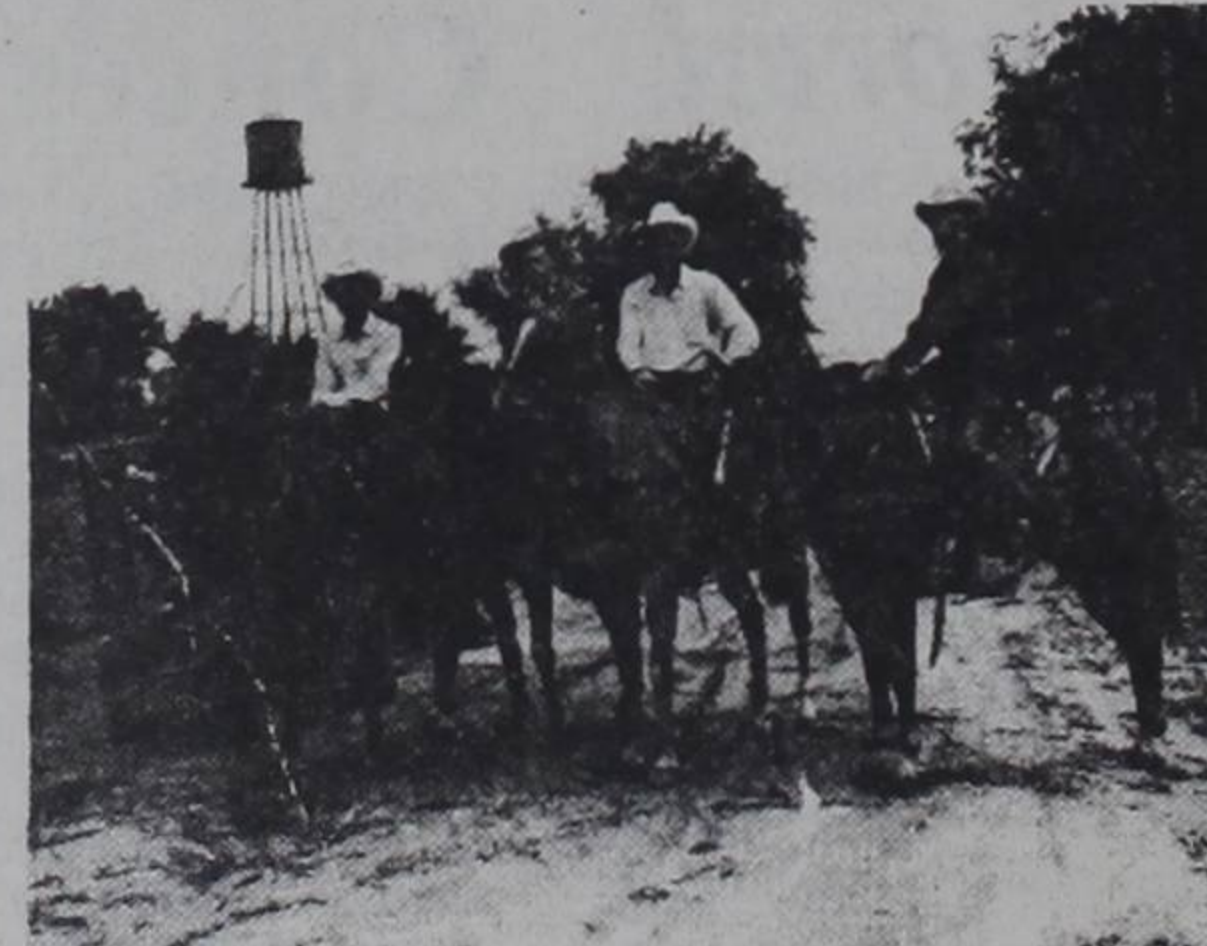

Alecia Bandy Earns National Honor

West Texas State University senior, Alecia Bandy, has been selected as one of the "100 American Women of Exceptional Promise," of the graduating class of 1987, WTSU President Dr. Ed Roach was notified this week.

Miss Bandy was selected for the honor from 3,200 nominations received from presidents of the nation's universities. The 100 women will be featured in the July issue of *Good Housekeeping*. The magazine is publishing the article as a salute to the Bicentennial anniversary of the U.S. Constitution.

The initial selection for this honor was made by the Washington Center; the final selection was made by a blue-ribbon panel of nationally known and respected educators to Mary Hill, WTSU dean of students. The first criteria required each nominee to have a grade point average of not less than 3.0, but with more emphasis placed on notable campus and community activity and a broad range of "outstanding personal endeavor."

Bandy is a 22-year-old senior journalism major with a cumulative grade point average of 3.5. She was named WTSU Woman of the Year in 1986 and was recognized as an Outstanding Young Woman of America and by Who's Who Among Students in American Colleges and Universities.

The Panhandle native has served as president of Student Senate and vice president of student government. She was president of Sigma Delta Chi, the Society of Professional Journalists and associate editor of the campus newspaper, *The Prairie*.

Miss Bandy is a member of Chi Omega Fraternity, Scribes Chapter of Mortar Board and Student Foundation. She was instrumental in creating the WTSU Student Government Memorial Scholarship Fund and the Student Government Alcohol Awareness Week. She recently developed a communications program for the division of student services, Hill said.

Hancock is the son of Tommy and Stacy Hancock.

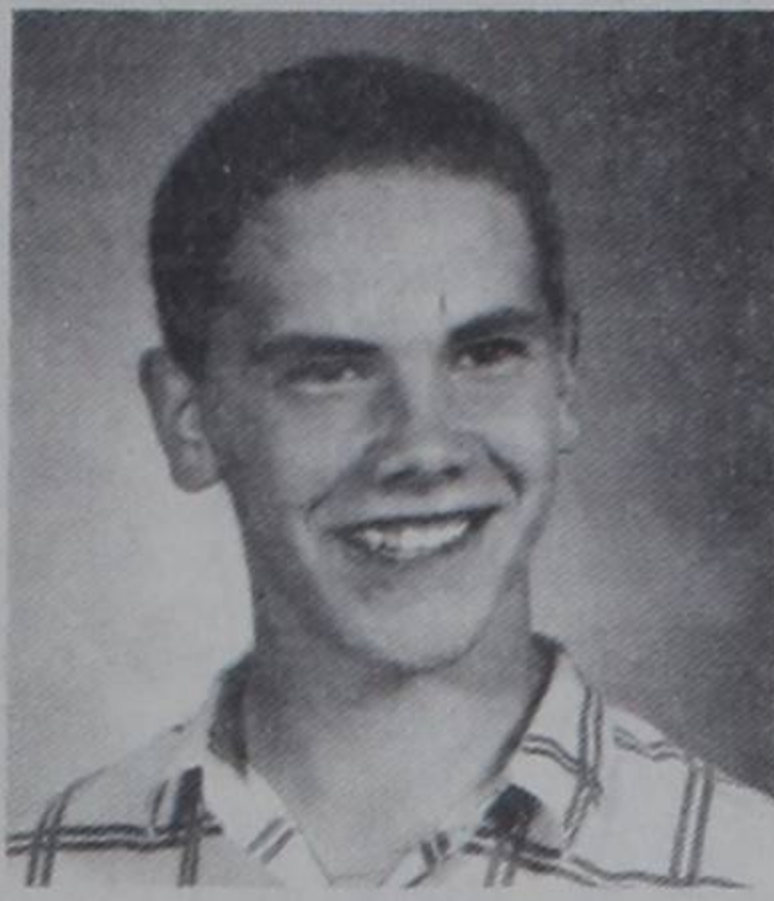
This is Hancock's third year in Friona. He has participated in varsity football and golf at FHS.

Depression Can Be Treated As Illness

For many years, it was believed to be normal for an older individual to become socially withdrawn and inactive with increased age. As our knowledge of what is "normal" and "abnormal" in aging increases, it has become apparent that these changes are not simply the result of advancing age, but in many cases, are due to an illness called depression.

In fact, depression has been identified as one of the most common disorders in America. Studies have shown that between two and five per cent of people over age 65 are depressed. It appears to affect women at even higher rates than men.

The main symptom of depression is a continuous feeling of being down-hearted, "blue," or unable to enjoy life. Depression also involves changes in behaviors and thoughts about oneself so that many depressed individuals feel worthless or guilty. Often, significant disturbance of sleep and appetite and low energy level are also present, along with a loss

of pleasure in what was previously pleasurable, decreased ability to concentrate, crying spells, and even ideas of suicide.

A geriatric psychiatrist can evaluate the type of depression, its course, and the most appropriate treatment. Fortunately, the great majority of people with depression can be effectively treated with psychotherapy and/or antidepressant medication and other somatic treatments. Older people, many of whom may have several other illnesses for which they may be taking medicines, often require special care in treatment by a doctor who is experienced in the interactions of both the illnesses and the medicines.

It is not always easy to recognize these symptoms, which may develop gradually and are often ignored. However, depression can be terribly painful, personally crippling, or even fatal. If you know an older person who has these symptoms, referral to an appropriate psychiatrist can be life saving.

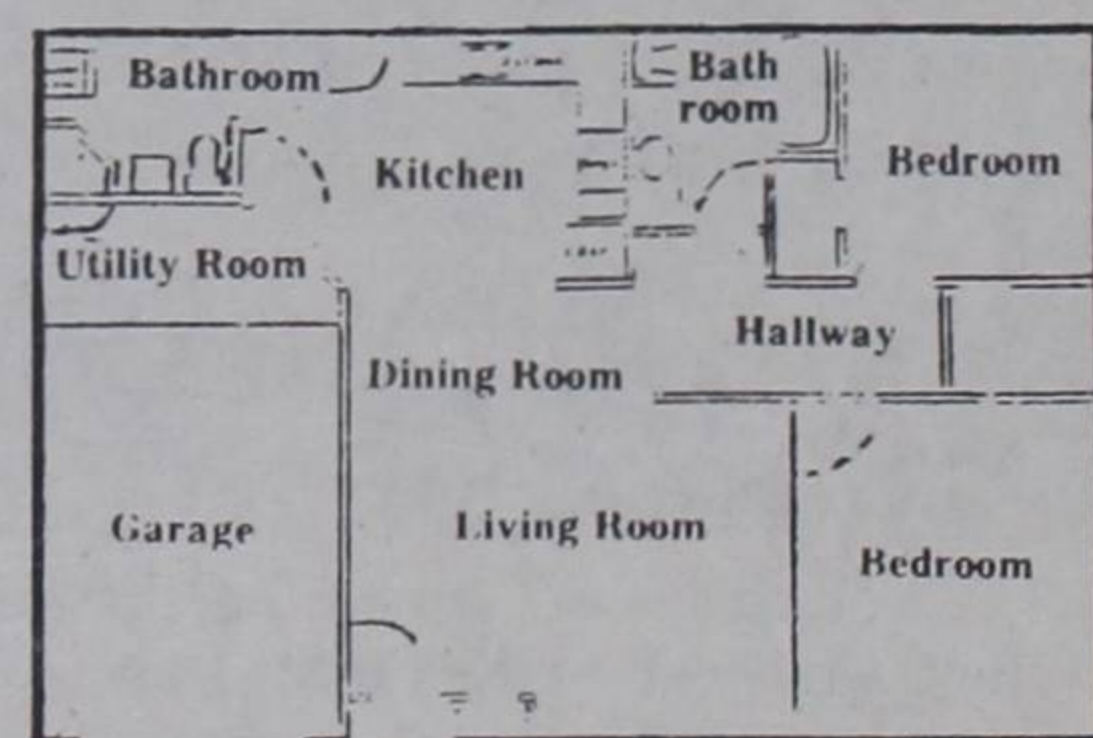

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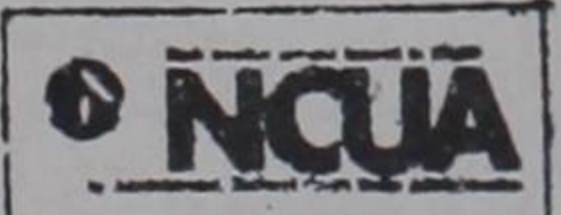
