Baird Trackmen to Graham Meet; Tie for Title at Iowa Park Relays

Baird Bear cindersmen will be in Graham Saturday for the huge Possum Kingdom Relays. Finals will be run Saturday night.

It will be the second meet of the young season for the Baird team, which wound up tied with Merkel for Division 1 honors at the Iowa Park Relays last week.

Both Merkel and Baird showed plenty of power in amassing 71 points each in the meet. Midlothian was third with 66.

The Bears won only two first places in the meet, but placed well enough in five other events to tack up the necessary points. Blue ribbons were won by Steve Stanley in the 440-yard dash and by the Baird mile relay team.

Stanley, whose winning time in the quarter mile was 53.4, was also a member of the winning relay team. Others in the mile relay quartet are Eddie Childers, Wally Harris and Maxie Gordon.

The same four also made up

the sprint relay team, which was third in that event behind Midlothian and Merkel.

Gordon also placed fourth in the quarter mile behind Stanley.

Tally Windham won two second places for Baird in the meet, behind Rotan's skilled Howard Von Loon in both weight events. Windham put the shot 49 ft., 3 in. as Von Loon set a new record with a 61 ft., 4 $\frac{3}{4}$ in. effort, then twirled the discus 134 ft. 8 $\frac{1}{2}$ in. for his other second-place finish.

Thomas Robbins picked up another second place for Baird in the half mile behind the 2:03.5 race by Douglas Lobsdon of Knox City.

Richard Crow added Baird's 71st point with a tie for fifth place in the pole vault at 10 feet.

The team may find sledding a little tougher this week. They will compete in Class A — which includes high schools in Class AA, A and B — at Graham.

FIGURES INDICATE UPWARD TREND IN POPULATION TOTALS FOR BAIRD

There has been a steady trend — upward — during the past year for Baird, a check of utility and other figures reveals.

Taking an average from the increase in customers by the various utility services here, there are 13 more families in Baird today than there was a year ago. If these apparent new families are of average size, there are about 45 more residents in Baird now than a year ago.

Where do these figures come from?

By comparing current utility customer figures with those of a year ago.

Biggest increase was shown in city sewer service, which now has 568 connections compared to 547 a year ago. This increase of 21 connections is not a fair figure to show growth, however, because

sewer line additions normally attract new customers anyway.

On the other end of the scale, the number of water connections is not a completely accurate comparison either. There are 632 now, compared to 673 a year ago. But there are water meters in the city which have more than one connection — meaning more than one family is using water through that meter.

Perhaps the fairest comparisons — and the most accurate — are in electric and gas service connections.

Lone Star Gas Co. has 718 connections in Baird, compared to 702 a year ago, an increase of 16 or just about the average.

And the municipal electric system has 735 connections at present, compared to 722 a

City Purchases New Generating Unit for Municipal Power Plant

City officials have accepted a contract for another General Motors dual-fuel 1,000KW generating unit which will increase the capacity of the present municipal plant to 3,600KWs.

This unit is the same type as the two generating units now operating in the plant.

A Fairbanks-Morse 300KW diesel fuel unit will be traded in on the deal, leaving the plant three dual-fuel gas motors and two older model diesel motors.

The newly purchased engine is remanufactured, carrying the same guarantee as a new engine. Instead of the usual 12-month

Peace Corps Testing In Abilene March 14

Peace Corps placement tests will be given at over 800 locations in the United States March 14. Among sites is Room 5 of the Federal Building in Abilene.

Over 5,000 qualified volunteers are needed to begin training this summer according to Sargent Shriver, Peace Corps director. Biggest need is for persons skilled in agriculture, health, engineering, construction or education.

Applicants should bring with them a completed Peace Corps questionnaire unless one has already been mailed to Corps headquarters. The forms are available at most post offices or from the Peace Corps, Washington, D.C.

Highway Work Near Halfway To Completion

Work on Interstate 20 through Callahan County is nearing the halfway point despite recent bad weather.

Nearest to completion is the segment which runs from a mile west of Clyde to two miles west of Baird. Construction is about 45 per cent complete on that segment which has a bid price of \$1,889,867.52.

The work includes grading, drainage structures, base and hot mix asphalt. Doing the work are Cooper & Woodruff Inc., Ferrier Bros. and Public Construction Co.

About 40 per cent complete is the Interstate 20 section from the Taylor-Callahan county line to a mile west of Clyde, almost seven miles in length.

Strain Bros. Inc. and J. H. Strain & Sons Inc. are contractors for that job on a bid of \$1,983,242.67. Included are grading, structures, base and hot mix asphaltic concrete paving.

Also almost half finished is a stretch slightly more than six miles long from the Callahan-Eastland county line to a mile west of Cisco. Cecil Ruby Co. Inc. is contractor for that \$1,893,545.04 job.

The contract calls for grading, structures, base and hot mix asphaltic concrete pavement.

QUICKIE LESSONS IN GRAMMAR BY LLOYD D. HUFF

Today we need to look at Italics. Italics, as you know, are the graceful slanted letters that appear sometimes in printing for various reasons which we shall consider; they are indicated in handwriting or typewriting by underlining the word once. This is the signal to the printer to set the word in italics.

I believe that we agreed in an earlier article that the larger divisions of books, magazines and newspapers would appear in italics, remembering that the italics in newspaper titles appear only with the actual name of the paper, not with the geographical location: Reporter-News would be italicized, but not Abilene; Star-Telegram would be underlined for italics, but not Ft. Worth. The names of ships have always been italicized and by extension to other means of travel, also trains and airplanes; and it would be the Dallas Eagle (italicized Eagle) and the United Airlines Big Chief (italicized Big Chief).

Another use for italics would be to indicate foreign words. For example, we would say: His personality shows much elan vital. The last two words in this sentence, as French words not yet fully incorporated into the English language, would be italicized. Certain theological, scientific, and philosophical terms that still belong more to the original language than to our own would be italicized; but where a word has made itself at home in our language, we dispense with the italics: There are too many cliches in his writing — the word "cliches" would not be italicized because it is an accepted part of our English language.

Finally, italics are useful for indicating stress or emphasis in writing, but this is an advantage that should not be overworked because obviously the more often we use any grammatical device, the less emphatic it becomes. If we underline often, for emphasis, the underlining will become common and lose value.

For homework, what is the difference between the words "historic" and "historical?" How are they used in writing? Answer from last week: "hyper-

bole" is a fancy, four-cylindere word with the accent on the second syllable. We Texans are often given over to hyperbole. It signifies exaggeration in what one says to the point that it is recognized as an exaggeration that is not to be taken as literal truth. "He is strong as an ox and nearly as smart," a Tex-

an's ten-gallon hat is a hyperbole, and "His eyes were big as saucers" and "She was cute as a speckled pup" are hyperboles. Hurry back!

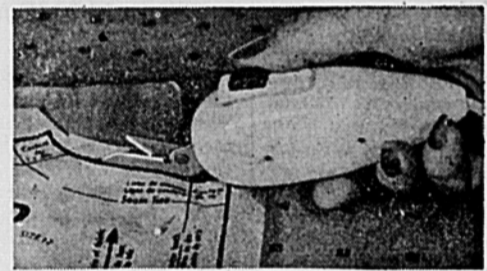

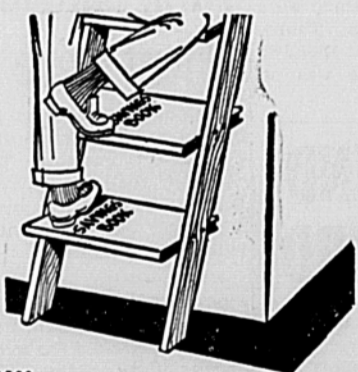

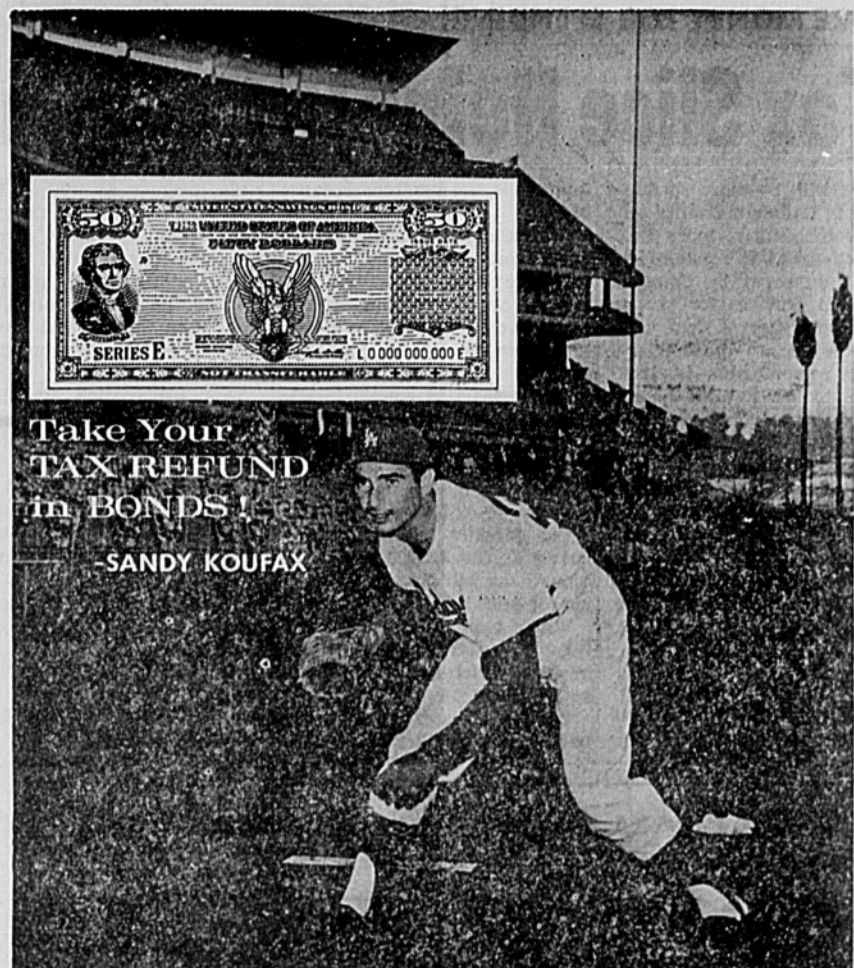

MORE MONEY FOR SPENDING

Tax Slice Helps In Callahan

There will be more spending money in Callahan County soon and, consequently, more business activity as a result of the tax cut approved by Congress.

The bill provides for tax reductions of different sizes, varying according to income level. For a person who is lucky enough to be in the highest bracket, the reduction this year will be very large. Instead of the 91 percent he had to pay last year on his taxable income, he will now have to turn back a mere 77 percent.

For those with modest incomes, the reduction in the tax rate is less dramatic. However, families in the lower brackets will profit considerably from the new "minimum standard deduction" of \$400 for husband and wife. Many families will be

lopped off the tax rolls because of it. In Callahan County, where average earnings have been on the rise and have reached \$5,670 per household before taxes, the savings will be greater than in many other communities.

For a married couple locally with two dependents and with an income equal to the prevailing average, the tax on 1964 earnings will become \$510, or \$81 less than before. For families with gross incomes at the \$12,000 level, the annual tax will drop to \$1,675, a cut of \$185.

Where gross earnings are only \$4,000 a year, the new tax will be \$220, which is \$68 below the current rate. Taking into account all Callahan County families, those with

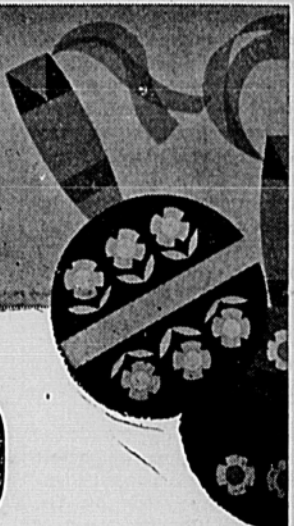
