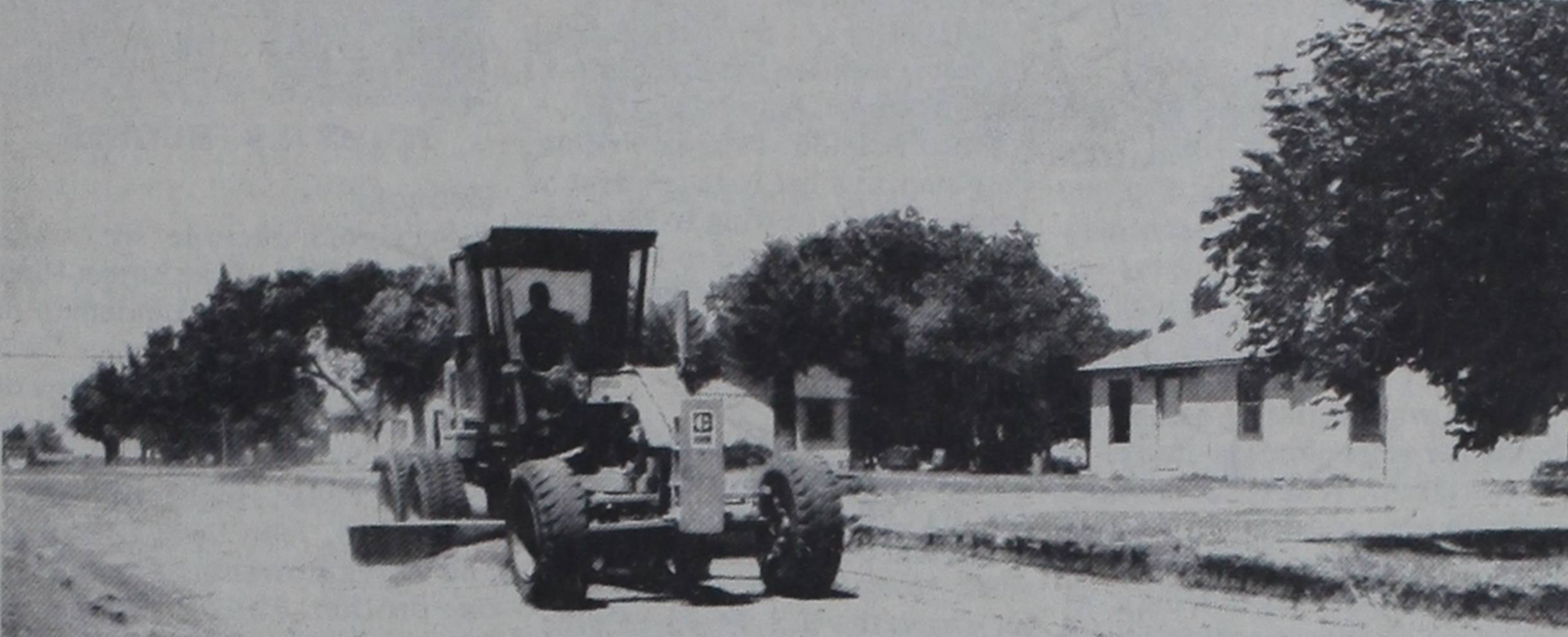
This fiesty little old Leo still puts in an eight-hour work day, then goes home to putter in his garden (a full acre) and goes roller skating in his spare time.

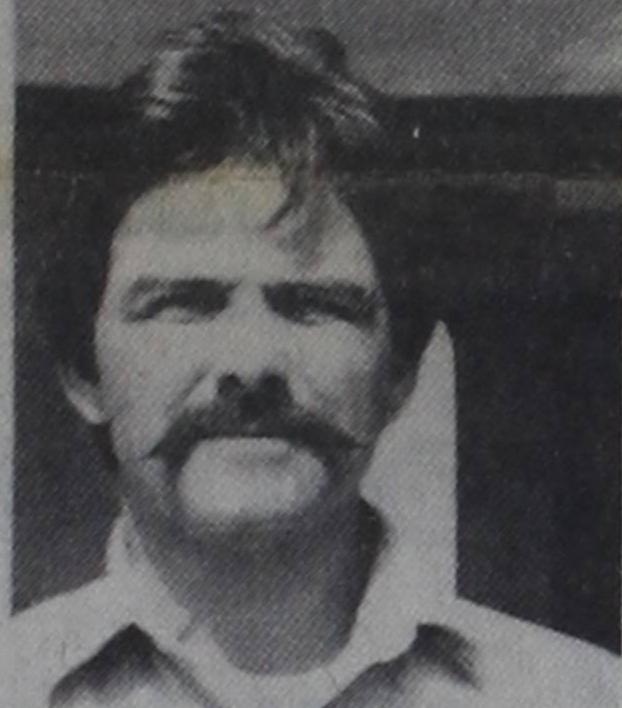

His primary duties at the Friona Field Office will be administration of Conservation Reserve Program (C.R.P.) contracts.

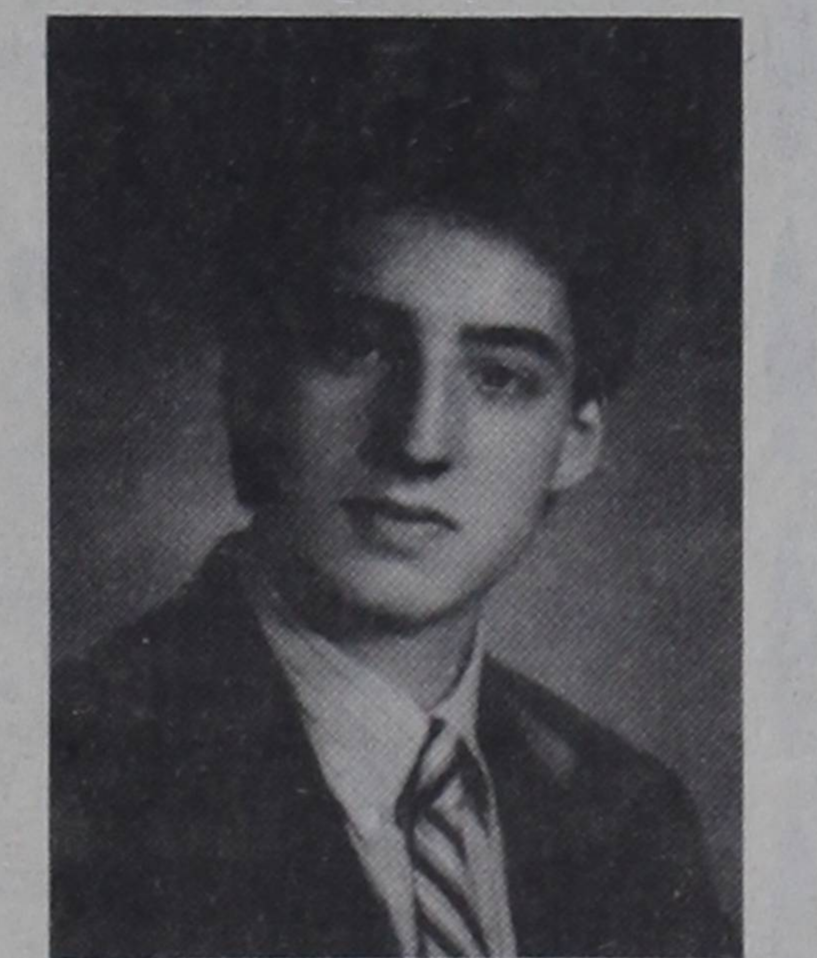
lane divided highway continues to make progress.

The process of securing right-of-way has been underway for quite some time. Randall Dillard, TDHPT spokesman, said that the department has made some purchases of needed right of way in Castro County, and is now in the process of making pre-appraisal contacts in Parmer County.

In the last few months, the right of way and survey work has proceeded from the Castro-Parmer County line near Summerfield up to and including the city of Friona. "There are 34 parcels of land we are dealing with in Parmer County, from the Castro County line to the city limits of Friona," Dillard said.

The widening project involves a 37.9-mile section of U.S. Highway 60 from the Castro-Deaf Smith County line to Farwell in southwestern Parmer County, at a cost estimate of \$24.9 million.

In the meantime, the highway department spokesman said that the Texas Highway Commission

took a major step toward realization of the project in May, when it authorized the state highway department to begin making designs for the Highway 60 project.

"This project was among others that we had submitted to the commission for approval, and we secured the go-ahead," Dillard said.

The highway department official could give no estimate as to the amount of time the drawing of the plans might take, but did say that the work would be done by the Lubbock District office of the TDHPT.

He also added that the state's budget crunch, which has seen a portion of the state's highway funds "borrowed" for other funds until such time as they were needed, should not be a hindrance to the Highway 60 project.

"We feel real comfortable that the widening of Highway 60 should be able to proceed as planned," Dillard said. In regard to the right of way work, he stated, "We wish that the work could be done faster, but in order to be fair to everyone involved, the process has to be a very slow one."

The widening of U.S. Highway 60 through Parmer County has been a high priority for most area residents for over 25 years. The project has faced first one obstacle and then another in the past quarter-century.

Residents are crossing their fingers that this time the project will continue through to conclusion, before they become the next "statistic" on the highway.

The bank spokesman said that the crops were having to call on the good sub-moisture which the area received back in May and June.

Floyd Reeve, who farms southeast of Friona, was hoping for an end to the hot, dry trend. "We usually get a little rain in July, but we sure didn't this year," Reeve said.

On the positive side, the hot, dry weather has boosted cotton prospects, and that crop is doing better than it has in a number of years.

One thing's for sure--we are another day closer to a good rain.

## Chaney Plays For Winning All-Stars

With less than one minute to play in the 1987 Whataburger All Star Football Game, the North capped a 10-play, 61-yard drive with a touchdown that held off the South to win the 53rd annual All Star football classic, 16-13.

A crowd of 17,526 at T.C.U.'s Amon Carter Stadium, the fourteenth largest to witness the gathering of Texas' top high school football players, braved the 96 degree temperature posted at kick-off.

The North gained 202 yards rushing compared to 160 for the South which was paced by the offensive Most Valuable Player, Frankie Smith of Groesbeck. The North, led by the defensive Most Valuable Player Terry Johnson of Jefferson, claimed six interceptions and limited the South to 64 yards passing. The victorious North Squad passed for 193 yards.

For the North, Jeff Chaney, a lineman from Friona, helped anchor his team's defensive line with several key tackles.

"That last drive was a thing to behold," said victorious North head coach Gary Childress of North Mesquite. "The South stopped our momentum several times but we managed to get the job done when it counted most."

"The turnovers really hurt us," said South Head Coach Gary Malesky of San Antonio Holmes. "But our defense gave us an

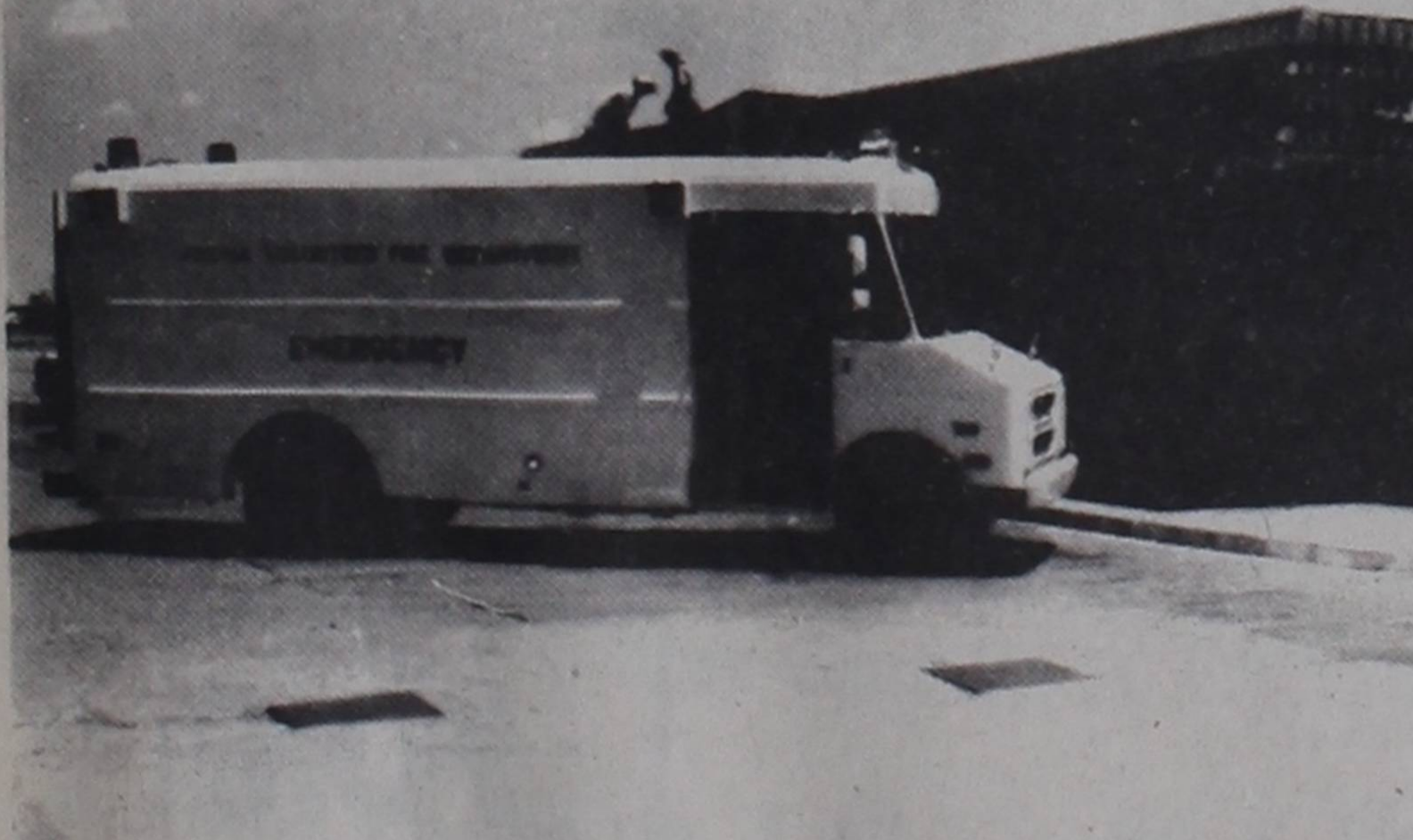

outstanding effort which helped keep us in the game."

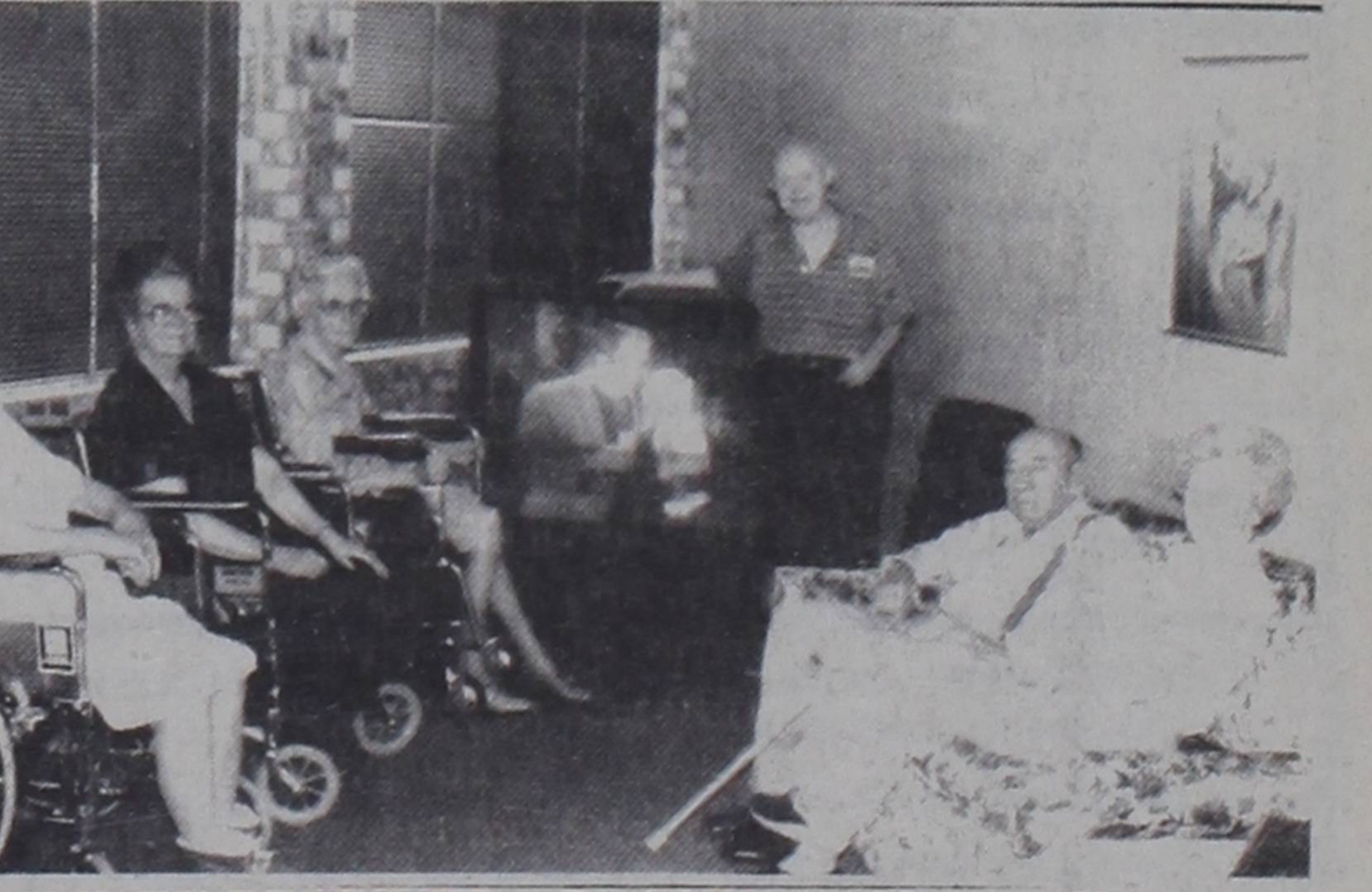

**55 YEARS AGO—JULY 29, 1932**  
Returns from last week's Democratic Primary in Parmer County showed that Ferguson received 698 votes for governor, Sterling 420 and Hunter 207. Aldridge led the voting for county judge with 716 votes, Goodwine received 651, and Ray 268. Hall was elected Sheriff with 1002 votes, to 515 for Hawkins and 131 for Hawks. Rushing received the nomination for County and District Clerk with 980 votes, to 666 for McCuan. Witherspoon led the ballot for District Attorney, with 1005 votes, to 520 for Richards.

**45 YEARS AGO—JULY 24, 1942**  
The June 30 registration of 18, 19 and 20-year-old youths in Parmer County showed a total of 128 men, according to the order number list released this week by the county selective service board. Names are arranged according to age. Only men who have reached their 20th birthday are now liable for military service. Others become eligible as they reach their 20th birthday.

**40 YEARS AGO—**

**35 YEARS AGO—JULY 24, 1952**  
Formal opening of Strickland's Shamrock Service Station in Friona has been announced for this Saturday and Sunday. This is the first Shamrock station in Friona, and it will be owned and operated by Paul Strickland. Lee Campbell will assist Mr. Strickland in keeping the station open 24 hours per day.

**30 YEARS AGO—JULY 25, 1957**  
Repair and patchup work on the well that failed about two weeks ago started in Friona last Thursday as a well service rig pulled up to the pump house and hoisted the pump and housing from the hole. This was done after the city commission

decided last week to start looking for more water. A 1957 Ford, stolen from in front of a cafe in Clovis Saturday night, was overturned northeast of Bovina Sunday morning. The driver, Louis Williams, was arrested Sunday afternoon and was charged with speeding. He was fined \$10 and court costs in J.R. Thornton's justice of the peace court Monday morning, before being turned over to Clovis authorities.

**25 YEARS AGO—JULY 26, 1962**  
Two indictments of four counts each against Emmett Tabor, former mayor of Bovina, were returned by Parmer County Grand Jury following a Monday session. A shortage of \$13,055.21 was found in City of Bovina funds following Tabor's resignation as mayor in February. Restitution of the entire amount was made.

**20 YEARS AGO—JULY 27, 1967**  
Work is progressing at Missouri Beef Packers, with construction approaching the height of activity, according to Rufus Davis, plant engineer. At the present time, 24 men are working full time on various stages of construction. Within 30 days, Davis says he expects to have 70 men working in a daytime shift and 70 working a night shift, when things really reach "high gear."

averaged over 1,250 per evening. The first service last Sunday drew the largest crowd to date, when around 1,600 people turned out. Excellent weather blessed the first three services.

## J.B. Hughes Rites Held

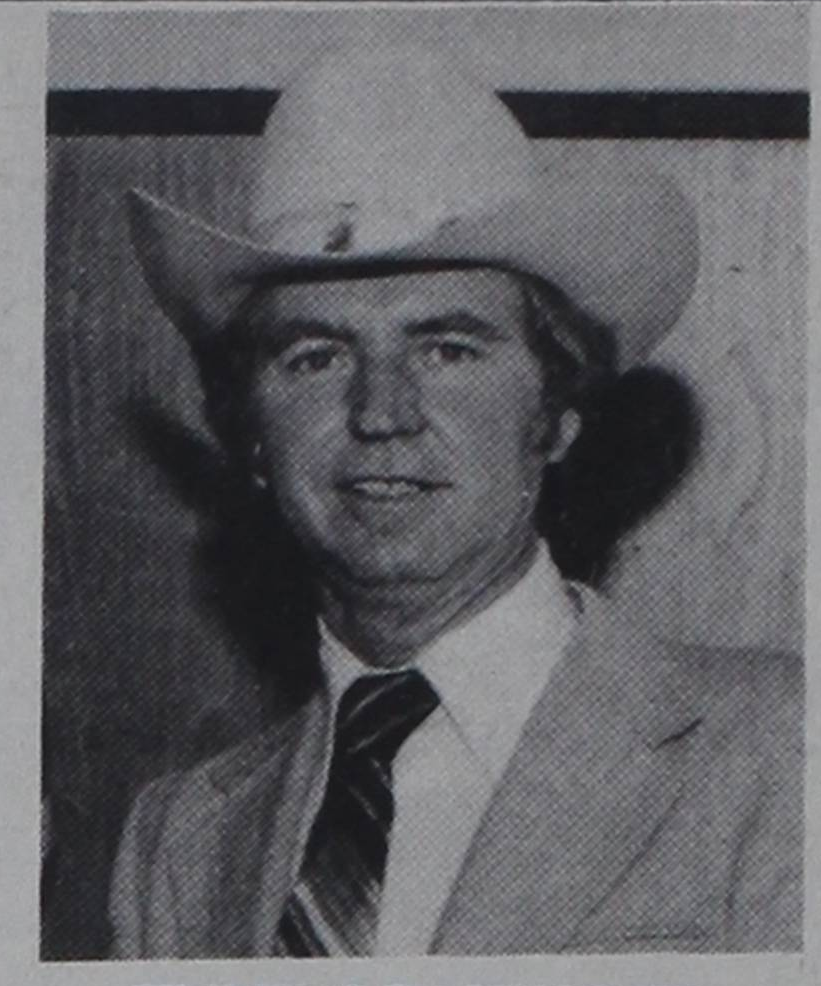

## Around The House

 Keep Farm, Family  
 Finances Separate

In these difficult economic times, keeping family finances separate from those of the farming or ranching operation can help with money and stress management. Household expenses may seem small compared to business expenses. However, relatively small amounts, when added together, can become a drain on family resources.

Good records are a special help in the effort to control living expenses. Many families simply don't know where their money goes each month. But if they wrote down each expenditure--in a notebook, a checkbook register, or even on a piece of paper taped to the refrigerator door--the family spending patterns would become clear.

At the end of the month, the expenses can be divided into budget categories. That can help family members see where expenses might be trimmed. It also forms the basis for planning the next month's spending so you can live within your income.

It's not advisable to mix family and business accounts. A better strategy is to have a separate account for family living expenses and to transfer a regular allocation from the business account into it.

That will make it easier for family members to work at keeping living expenses within the regularly allotted amount.

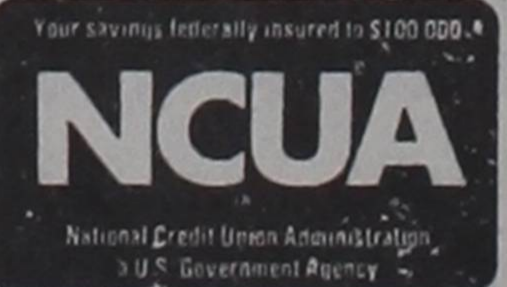

# Health Screening Slated August 12

American lifestyles are killing us. According to the U.S. Surgeon General, lifestyle choices (such as smoking, poor nutrition, alcohol and substance abuse, and lack of exercise) have made the greatest impact on health-status deterioration in the last twenty years.

If you look at the cause of cancer and heart disease--smoking, stress, poor diet--it is apparent that most of these causes of death can be attacked only through educating the public that the individual is responsible for the way he or she lives and dies.

Socially and philosophically, momentum has been growing for support of health promotion--disease prevention activities. We assume the public generally believes that preventing illness is better than curing, whenever possible. This belief has further economic impetus supportive of political and legislative action.

High blood cholesterol is a risk factor in heart disease. The higher level of cholesterol in the blood, the more likely a subject is to sustain a heart attack. According to the American Heart Association, one in four people will have high blood pressure, and only one in every three who have high blood pressure will be aware of it.

death rate in the state. High blood pressure is one of the controllable risk factors for cardiovascular disease. It contributes significantly to death from heart disease, strokes, and renal disease.

Diabetes Mellitus contributes to mortality directly as the primary cause of death and indirectly as a contributing factor in heart disease, peripheral vascular disease, kidney disease, and infection. It is a major source of visual impairment and blindness.

In 1985, approximately 1/3 of all pregnant women in Texas did not seek prenatal care early in pregnancy. Although there are reasons for this, lack of knowledge of its importance is one of the primary causes.

Breast cancer occurs in one of every eleven women. Every woman needs to guard against the disease with regular physical examination and monthly breast self examinations. However, certain "risk factors" need careful attention so you can have the advantage of early detection. When you find breast cancer early, before it has spread, the chances of cure are very high.

The Panhandle Health Care Coalition is a non-profit organization involved with health promotion in the Panhandle area by providing health screening as a preventive measure. The Coalition will be doing health screenings of various types throughout the Panhandle communities. The screenings will be preceded or followed by educational seminars. The educational programs will be aimed at preventive health measures. The screenings will be directed at identifying those people at-risk for certain diseases, doing further testing, and trying to get them under medical care and follow-up.

There will be a fee charged according to income. If a person would like one blood test, the charge is \$3.00 or both blood tests for \$5.00. If a person is unable to pay, there will be no fee charged. The blood tests require you do not eat or drink at least eight hours prior to testing.

The Health Screening for Friona/Parmer County will be held at the Friona Community Center in Friona on August 12, from 10 a.m.-2 p.m. Health screening for high blood pressure, cholesterol and diabetes will be available.
