 On Dry NoteThe month of July is ending, with very little rainfall ecorded in the local area
However, in spite of the lack of rainfall, crops in the area are holding up pretty well, according to Gary Brown, agricultural specialist for Friona State Bank.
"Crops are looking good for the most part. The milo is needing another drink, and if it doesn't rain soon, it will have to be irrigated. We're fortunate that we haven't had a bunch of 100 -degree temperatures. That would have been worse," Brown said.
The bank spokesman said that the crops were having to call on the good sub-moisture which the area received back in May and June.
Floyd Reeve, who farms southeast of Friona, was hoping for an end to the hot, dry trend. "We usually get a little rain in July, but we sure didn't this year," Reeve little
said.
On the positive side, the hot, dry weather has boosted cotton prospects, and that crop is doing better than it has in a number of years.
One thing's for sure--we are another day closer to a good rain.

Program may be farmers' eserve bet to make a profit on highly erodible cost of conservation. "According to USDA rules,
compliance with the conservation provisions of the 1985 Food Security Act requires farmers who
plan to cultivate highly erodible
cropland after January cropland after January 1, 1990, to
develop a conservation plan by 1990," William Donham, district conservationist for the USDA Soil Conservation Service at Friona
reported. "They must also protect their land against soil erosion with applied conservation practices by
1995 if they want to participate in USDA programs. These practices USDA programs. These practices
may include conservation tillage \(\begin{aligned} & \text { systems, terraces, grassed } \\ & \text { waterways, stripcropping, or other }\end{aligned}\) practices."
CRP offers farmers cost sharing and annual rental payments to convert this highly erodible to permanent vegetation,
croplan and a chance to bypass expensive conservation treatment, retain eligibility for USDA programs,
and ensure a return on this land. "Most land fitting the highly erodible criteria is not only erodicult to protect against erosion,
difficult but often produces poor crop yields and has a low profit
potential," Donham said. "Most
of Conservation Reserve Program return to this land."'
Under the CRP, farmers receive wildlife to establish grass or widlife plantings on highly
erodible croppand. Cost sharing is provided for 50 per cent of eligible costs of establishment. Annual
