**DESPITE HANDICAPS** imposed on them by the weather, the young men responsible for the first Baird FFA rodeo put together a show which reflected credit to both themselves and their chapter.

Doing anything for the first time has special problems, since there is no past experience to help out. But the chapter, and especially the committee in charge of arrangements, performed like veterans.

The experience gained this year will prove invaluable next year, especially if the rodeo is expanded to include contestants from outside this immediate area.

Junior rodeos have proved popular in many towns. One could become quite a drawing card for Baird during the early summer months each year.

Perhaps such a program has flopped here in the past, but it seems to us it would be nice to have an official Miss Baird to represent the town when the occasion demands.

She could, for example, help represent the city on trips boosting the sheriff's posse rodeo, and at the rodeo.

Such a contest is a regular feature at July 4 activities at such nearby towns as Cisco and Breckenridge. Merkel — much the size of Baird — had a successful program last week. And at Clyde, about 100 girls turned out for competition a couple of months ago to name a new Miss Clyde.

A Miss Baird contest might be a fitting climax to festivities here — perhaps July 4 or Labor Day?

Perhaps no elective county post, with the possible exception of county judge, has more day-to-day effect on Callahan residents than does the sheriff's office.

The sheriff, of course, is responsible for the safety and protection of county residents. But the department also dispenses a good portion of the county's tax dollar.

Although this is the only local race on the Democratic ballot and the Republicans have none at all, we urge every qualified voter to make it to the polls Saturday.

If you do not use your ballot, you have no right to complain about our government.

## Voters Select Sheriff Saturday

### Teenagers Win First 2 Games

Defending champion Baird teen-age baseballers raced off to a fast start in district play last week, blasting Albany by 9-4 in the season's first game. The team backed that up with a 15-0 whitewashing of Clyde Monday night.

Richard Windham and Wally Harris combined to hold the Clyde team to two hits in the Monday tilt while Baird took advantage of six errors and eight walks for its 15 runs.

Baird scored in every inning but the fifth, while Clyde got only one runner to third and just three as far as second. The winners tallied three in the first, two in the second, iced it away with five in the third, added one in the fourth and wound up with four runs in the sixth.

Biggest blow of the night was a home run by Windham in the third. He was also the game's top hitter with three safeties. Richie Crow and Stanley McGowen had two each.

Windham was also the winning pitcher against Albany, although he had to have help from Harris and Bruce Bell. An Albany outburst in the sixth chased Windham from the mound and netted four runs.

Harris paced Baird hitting with two in three tries. He, Windham and Maxie Gordon all scored two runs each.

### Eula School Voters Approve Bond Issue

Voters in Eula Rural High School District approved a \$60,000 tax bond issue Saturday with an overwhelming 90-3 tally.

Bond funds will be used to construct new cafeteria and library buildings along with remodeling work on some existing school facilities.

Titte and Luther of Abilene is the architectural firm for the project. Present plans call for work to get underway this summer.

Alone on the Republican ballot is the race between Jack Cox and George Bush for the GOP nomination for United States Senator.

All regular Democratic voting precincts will be in operation Saturday, although the turnout is expected to be considerably lighter than for the first primary.

Republican voting boxes will be in Baird, Clyde and Cross Plains.

A Clyde cowgirl and a Baird cowboy walked off with top honors Friday and Saturday in the first annual Baird FFA Rodeo, which was unreeled in the Callahan County Sheriff's Posse arena.

Cool, threatening weather cut into rodeo attendance, but had no noticeable effect on action inside the arena.

Pat Horner of Clyde racked up 26 points during the two-night rodeo to win the trophy as best all-around cowgirl. Second was Jane Ann Miller of Eula, who compiled 20 points.

It was closer in the boys division, where Roy McAdams had 25 points for the trophy as best all-around cowboy. Only one point behind was Eddie Don Edmondson, however.

All four of the top individuals won two trophies each as well as placing in the top five in other events.

More than 100 youngsters took part in the competition, which was open to any student enrolled in a Callahan County school. Moran students were also invited.

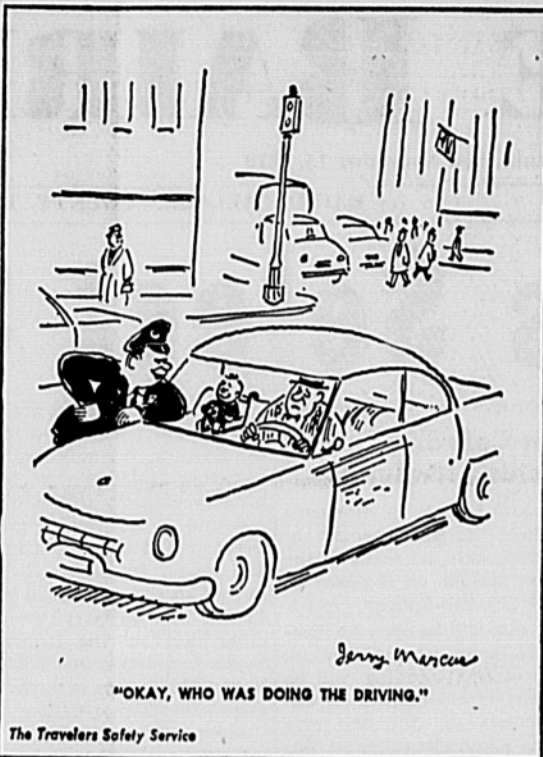

## Outdoors In Texas

For many years the carp was considered absolutely worthless. It was rated as a pest that contaminated our waters and did no good whatsoever. Then an angler caught one of these bronze-colored scrappers on sport tackle. That incident shed new light on the carp's personality. Anti-carp sentiment began to waver slightly. Maybe, just maybe, this carp wasn't as bad as most people led us to believe.

When it comes to public relations, the carp is about the sorriest fish that swims. It has carried this stigma of being a pest for so long that it doesn't know how to act in its newest role, that of a sport fish. But many people don't cuss the carp anymore. They're too busy having a ball catching it.

Five years ago it was rare to see anyone fishing for carp; today carp fishermen are fairly commonplace on all our Texas lakes. There is good reason for this upsurge in popularity. A piscatorial survey in the Highland Lakes of Central Texas a few years back revealed for instance, that the balance of fish population was something like 70 per cent rough fish and 30 per cent game fish.

This means, quite simply, that your odds of catching a rough fish are much better than a game fish.

Which brings us back to a much-debated question. Just

what is a game fish? One that will hit an artificial bait? If this is the true guldstick, then the carp can't be classified as a game fish. But on the business end of a fishing line, this stubborn battler does itself proud. It is a strong, grudging scrapper that doesn't know what the word "quit" means.

But just because they are plentiful doesn't mean they are easy to catch. Quite the contrary. Carp, and its kissin' cousin the buffalo, can be just as ornery as a bass at times. The man who succeeds day in and day out, of course, is the person who knows his ABC's of carp-fishing technique.

You don't have to travel far to find a supply of catchable carp. They are literally everywhere. All of our man-made lakes carry an astronomical population. So do our streams.

Only worry is getting them congregated in an area. This is best done by baiting. Most popular system is simply to scatter chunks of cottonseed cake in the water or anchor burlap bags of cottonseed meal on the bottom. Carp are attracted to the cottonseed.

Texas Parks and Wildlife Commission (Reagan State Building, Austin) has two free booklets which gives the low-down on carp fishing. They are titled "What the Experts Say About Carp Fishing" and "Let's Go Carp Fishing."

In these booklets there are many recipes for concocting your own baits. But many commercial baits now on the market are just as good.

These dough baits are best fished on a tiny treble hook (about the No. 10 size) since the carp has a small, round mouth. Simply mold the bait around the hook, throw it out and sit back to wait. Carp fishing isn't a fast sport. The person who succeeds at it is long on patience.

A carp roots along the bottom, sucking up food with its round mouth. It will pick up a bait which is lying still on bottom but will ignore one that is moving at all.

A carp telegraphs its bite in a series of light taps. The secret is having a delicate feel, letting the carp get the bait inside its mouth before driving the steel home.

Any kind of tackle is suitable for carp fishing. A medium-sized spinning outfit seems to be the universal favorite.

Contrary to popular belief, carp aren't too bad on the dinner table. Secret is knowing how to prepare them.

Best method we've found is to chunk the fish and cook in a pressure cooker until the meat falls away from the bones. After removing the bones, mold the meat into patties and fry, just as you would fry salmon croquets.

When they're a rich, golden brown, serve with French fries or hushpuppies. I guarantee everyone will come back for seconds.

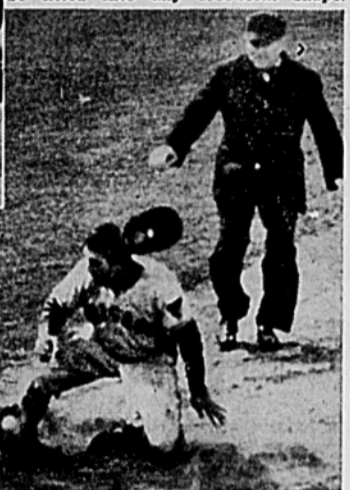

## Clyde-Eula Ag Groups Set Swine Short Course

A swine short course for adult farmers will be held June 15-18 under the sponsorship of the Clyde and Eula high school vocational agriculture departments, according to L. F. Newton and B. M. Coppinger, superintendents, and James Trammell and Claude Rock, vocational agriculture teacher.

Joe Tocquigny, swine specialist with the vocational agriculture division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Husbandry at Texas A&M University will be instructor.

Tocquigny holds a B.S. degree in agricultural education from Texas A&I College, and an M.S. degree in agriculture from Texas A&I. He has been a Hampshire breeder and commercial feeder for the past 10 years, maintaining a 15 sow herd.

"Many swine short courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Tocquigny and all have met with outstanding success," according to J. B. Payne, area supervisor of vocational agriculture. Arrangements for the adult education short course in swine husbandry and in other fields are made through Payne's office at Stephenville.

The short course at Clyde Vocational Agriculture building is scheduled to begin June 15 at 8 p.m. Other meetings in the series of four will be held June 16, 17, and 18.

During the dates the short course is in progress, Tocquigny will be available to assist students with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Trammell and Rock.

## 2,200-Foot Rotary Wildcat Is Proposed for Callahan County

John W. Barbee of Abilene staked No. 1 Fred Cutbirth as a proposed 2,200 foot rotary Cross Cut Sand wildcat in Callahan County.

Location is 10 miles west of Cross Plains on a 160-acre lease. It spots 1,787 feet from the south and east lines of Bartola Garcia Survey 204.

Perkins Prothro Co. of Wichita Falls completed No. 2 Hugh Jones, Section 22, BBB&C Survey, one mile southeast of Eula. It is 660 feet west of the firm's No. 1 Jones, recent Cook Sand discovery prorated in the regular field.

No. 2 Jones had a daily potential of 21.43 barrels of 41 gravity oil, plus 25 per cent water. It is pumping from a casing notch at 1,692 feet where the pay was treated with 1,000 gallons of acid. The 4½-inch casing is set at 1,765 feet and the hole bottomed at 1,780 feet.

Don L. Choate and Wico Oil

Co. of Abilene staked two regular field locations 3½ miles north of Baird. Both are to test the Canyon Sand.

No. 2-B Frances Cooley is on a 160-acre lease. It spots 1,320 feet from the south and 330 feet from the west lines of Section 143, BBB&C Survey. Permit depth applied for is 2,750 feet with rotary.

No. 6-B James L. Snyder spots 330 feet from the south and 1,320 feet from the east lines of Section 138, BBB&C Survey, and a 160-acre lease. Proposed depth is 2,300 feet with rotary.

Great Expectations Oil Corp., Fort Worth, has staked a 3,975 foot Gardner Sand test in the Callahan County Regular Field.

No. 1 Beulah Dyer is located three miles northwest of Clyde. Drillsite is spotted 2,391 feet from north and 1,690 feet from west lines of Section 40, BBB&C Survey and a 595-acre lease.

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# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN — Texas Restaurant Association, headquartered in Austin, is backing a proposal to legalize the sale of mixed drinks in Texas.

Executive Vice President W. Price Jr., of the 2600-member organization, reports that a six-member committee of his group has drawn a bill for presentation.

TRA's bill would authorize lo-

cal option elections on the sale, by food establishments, of distilled spirits in sealed containers of two ounces or less. Also it would extend the liquor curfew until 2 a.m.

Price said he has sounded out a number of legislators and found them enthusiastic. One of the most prominent members of the House of Representatives is expected to introduce the mea-

sure. Price, however, declined to name the sponsor.

Repeated efforts to legalize over-the-bar sales of mixed drinks in Texas have collapsed in recent sessions of the Legislature under combined weight of opposition by united dry forces and church groups.

"This is not a wet-dry issue," said non-drinking ex-restaurantier Price. "Texans can buy anything they want to drink right now. All we are trying to do is make it convenient for a man who wants to have a drink served in a dignified manner at a nice restaurant to be able to get one."

Price, who also is secretary of the Texas Tourist Council, said he believes sale of mixed drinks will definitely stimulate the tourist program in our state.

Furthermore, he estimated the TRA bill would produce nearly \$3,000,000 a year in new tax revenue.

"SKY'S THE LIMIT" — Legislative Budget Board members heard a warning from their executive director, Vernon McGee, that "the sky seems to be the limit" on state agency spending requests for 1956-67.

As an example, McGee cited budget proposals of the State hospital system and institutions of higher education.

He also noted the legislative committee of the State Bar of Texas judicial section has proposed big pay boosts — of \$12,000 a year — for judges. Under the Bar Committee's plan, base salaries of district judges would be doubled — from \$12,000 to \$24,000 a year. Court of Civil Appeals judges would be raised from \$16,000 to \$28,000, and the Supreme Court and Court of Criminal Appeals from \$20,000 to \$32,000.

Some civil appeals judges had requested no raises at all until the committee report came out, McGee said. But amended budget requests now are being received and the \$12,000 raises supported in budget hearings now underway.

RUMP DELEGATION THREATENED — Threat of a rump liberal delegation to the national democratic convention was posed by State AFL-CIO President H. S. (Hank) Brown.

Brown said a sure way to prevent that is for all legally-elected delegates to be seated at the state democratic convention at Houston on June 16 and for the convention to embrace the national party platform and all party nominees.

Gov. John Connally said moderate-conservative delegates will comprise two-thirds of the duly elected representatives at the June meeting, and he does not want resolutions endorsing all planks of the national platform.

State Democratic Executive Committee Chairman Frank C. Erwin Jr. has named Austin attorney Will D. Davis as head of a SDEC panel to hear delegation contests from Bexar, Dallas, Harris, Hutchinson, Edwards, Randall and Sherman Counties. SDEC will make the final decision as to which delegations to seat. The eight con-

tests involve 819 of the Houston convention's 2,834 votes.

The Houston convention will name delegates to the democratic national presidential nominating convention and select Texas national committee representatives. Texas Democrats are united in support of President Johnson this year. Key issue is whether the convention will support the national platform and agree to support all party nominees.

PRESIDENT HONORED — President Lyndon B. Johnson returned to Austin and Johnson City to address commencement ceremonies, talk politics and visit with friends.

In his fourth trip to his home state since becoming president, Johnson addressed graduates of Johnson High School in Johnson City, where he graduated 40 years earlier, and the University of Texas. Both the President and Mrs. Johnson received an honorary degree from UT.

The biggest gathering of state officials and lawmakers in the capital city since the last legislative session turned out to hear the President's university speech and visit with him at a reception afterward.

COURT SPEAK — Sunday closing laws specifically authorize emergency purchases, Supreme Court held in a Nueces County case. Case involved weekend sales by Shoppers World on emergency certificates.

Decision did not pass on constitutionality of the 1961 closing statute, although one judge said in a concurring opinion the whole act should be declared invalid.

The high court also concluded oil and gas production formulas adopted by the Texas Railroad Commission are subject only to timely attacks in court. Its opinion apparently continues some 2,000 allocated formulas placed in doubt by its 1961 "Normanna" decision. The court overturned lower court rulings invalidating Calhoun County gas field allocation. Aluminum Company of America claimed small track operators were permitted to drain away \$9,000,000 worth of gas from an Alcoa lease.

Texas Water Commission findings authorizing the City of Wichita Falls to build \$12,500,000 "Halsell Dam" on Little Wichita River were upheld by the Third Court of Civil Appeals. Commission affirmed a Travis County District court ruling of last June. Suit was brought by landowners in the proposed reservoir area, who claimed the dam should be constructed 27.7 miles from Wichita Falls instead of 11 miles from the city as planned.

Supreme Court agreed to review cases where courts of civil appeals ruled paying traffic fines in corporation court does not constitute a conviction which can be counted toward drivers license suspension.

OIL IMPORTS CHANGES URGED — Gov. John Connally and state railroad commissioners have called on U. S. Secretary of Interior Stewart L. Udall to revise the oil imports program before the next quota period starting July 1.

They particularly recommended oil from the Texas region of surplus be moved to the West Coast where foreign oil continues to fill almost total market growth. Connally said deterioration in Texas crude prices and production dropoff "threaten to erase the slight progress of 1963 and assure a third consecu-
