## School Begins September 1

IT IS NOT news to anyone that we're in the middle of a hot, dry summer. The summer of 1987 may not be the hottest we've had, but it will do. And our rainfall during the past month or more has left considerably to be desired.

But if we think we have been hot in Parmer County, maybe we just need to look to some of our neighboring states in the Southwest.

On Sunday, the temperature in Las Vegas, Neva, reached the 107-degree mark. This is just an everyday occurrence for the gambling center.

Bullhead City, Arizona is claiming the title of "hottest city in the U.S.A.," and that's one title we're happy for them to have. The Arizona city has passed the 120-degree mark seven times in the past nine years, hitting a high of 126 in 1984.

Nighttime in that part of the country brings very little relief, as you know if you've ever driven across the desert to California. At least here on the High Plains our nights cool off to a comfortable level, although it was still 90 degrees the other night at 9 p.m.

But we can't hold a candle to Bullhead City, where often the temperature is still 100 degrees at midnight. "It doesn't get cool here, it just gets dark," one resident commented.

In the Arizona desert city, those who have construction jobs go to work at 4 a.m., and get off by 2 p.m., so as not to have to work in the "heat of the day."

It has been reported that jugs of water are standard equipment, even for short trips.

A story in *USA Today* reported that residents of Bullhead City turn off their water heaters during the summertime. The reason is simple: the water is already 90 degrees when it comes out the cold-water tap.

A hospital employee told about borrowing a thermometer from a friend. "I put it in the front seat of the car. By the time I had walked around to the driver's side it had exploded," the report said.

In Bullhead City, errands and chores are done early or after sundown. Food can spoil on a routine trip to the supermarket. Residents report a lot of instances of curdled milk or melted ice cream. The heat seems to have included a large portion of the country, according to the weather reports we have heard. The Midwest was struggling under a heat wave last week.

Tonya Guber told us that Aspen, Colorado, was the hottest she had ever seen, on a recent visit. So even the places that are supposed to be excluded from oppressive heat have suffered this summer.

THANKFULLY, the Iran-Contra hearings have ended, and perhaps the nation's politics can return to some semblance of order.

Whether or not you approved of the actions by Col. Oliver North and his associates, it is apparent to most observers that the hearings have occupied too much time on the national stage, and have been blown out of proportion by the national news media.

The hearings have cost the American taxpayers millions of dollars. It was pointed out by one observer that the cost of holding the hearings was double or perhaps quadruple the amount of money that was diverted to the Contras.

Probably the biggest irony of the hearings is the fact that Col. North--the main target of the congressional committee--has turned out to be almost a national hero after his grueling testimony before the committee.

After Col. North's testimony, donations for the Contras' cause poured in from around the country, and members of Congress, who previously were leaning away from supporting the Contras, were won over by North's rhetoric.

The 1987-88 school term will begin on Tuesday, September 1, according to Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe.

Due to the way the calendar falls, school will dismiss on Monday, September 7 for Labor Day. This will make four-day weeks for both the first two weeks of school.

Jarboe said that he has a full staff of teachers, having had to hire nine new teachers during the summer to replace those who moved or retired.

The Friona School District will have one additional instructor this year, a teacher to work with dyslexic students.

# Grid Workouts For Chieftains To Begin

Fresh from posting the best won-lost record in the school's history (9-3) last season, enthusiasm is expected to be the by-word as pre-season workouts begin for the Friona Chieftains on Monday.

The Chieftains, who advanced to the area playoffs last fall after scoring the school's first-ever post-season football playoff win, have a number of returning lettermen and starters returning, enough to make Coach Tommy Moss and his assistants eager to "get things started."

There was an air of anticipation among the coaching crew on Wednesday as they gathered to hand out football shoes for the 1987 players.

"In some ways, I feel that we're in better shape at this point than we were a year ago. We have an experienced quarterback. We have an outstanding group of returning lettermen and starters. And those people who think we're going to have to rebuild our entire line may be in for a surprise," Coach Moss says.

The dean of the district's coaching corps pointed out that the team has four players back who have started at the guard position at some time during the past two years. They are Albert Trevino, Daniel Padilla, John Cass and Paul Trimmell.

Cass, at 220, and Trimmell, 215, are two big reasons (excuse the pun) that the Chieftains once again expect to be ultra stingy on defense.

Stephen Moore, one of last year's tackles, returns. Big things are also expected of Randy Ramos, Mickey Pena and Keith Hancock.

The Chieftains have 17 lettermen, five offensive and six defensive starters from the team that downed Perryton, 14-10 in the bi-district playoff last November.

One of the main reasons for optimism in Chieftain country is the return of quarterback Daniel Echols. After an early-season battle for the starting spot in 1986, Echols started eight games, and rushed for 865 yards and passed for another 370.

And, although the team lost one returning letterman in Lance Gatlin, who moved to Corpus Christi, the team received a shot in the arm when David Bugg moved into the community. Bugg, whose family moved here from Pecos, is a 172-pound junior that will be a bona-fide candidate for the starting tailback spot.

"Bugg played junior varsity at Pecos, a class 4A school. He

appears to have some speed that will help us out. I visited with his coach from Pecos and he was real high on him. We're proud to have him in our camp," Moss said.

Also back from last year's team are runningbacks Ben Osborn and Terry Widner. Waiting in the wings is sophomore flash Andre Duran. But the addition of Bugg to the team may allow the coaching staff to leave Duran with his sophomore team, which is a talented group that will form the basis of the junior varsity team.

Other players that the Chieftains will be counting on include Brent Riethmayer and Matt Brogden.

"Defensively, we could be as good as we've ever been," says Coach Moss, who has stressed defense in his six years as Friona's grid boss. "If the other team doesn't score, then it's a cinch you won't lose," Moss quipped.

With the likes of all-state tackle Jeff Chaney and place-kicker Sam Montoya graduated, you'd think that the Chieftains have some really big shoes to fill--and they do.

But Coach Moss says, "We have about the same number of starters back as we did a year ago."

And a lot of these players had the luxury of a 12-game season, after the school's first "two playoff game" season. And this taste of success is expected to make the team hungry to be successful once again.

Two scrimmage games have been scheduled for the Chieftains.

One is against Lubbock Cooper here the week of August 17. The other is against Lubbock Roosevelt, another playoff veteran, at Lubbock the week of August 24.

Friona opens its 1987 season by hosting the River Road Wildcats on Friday, September 4.

## 14 Girls Enter In Miss Friona

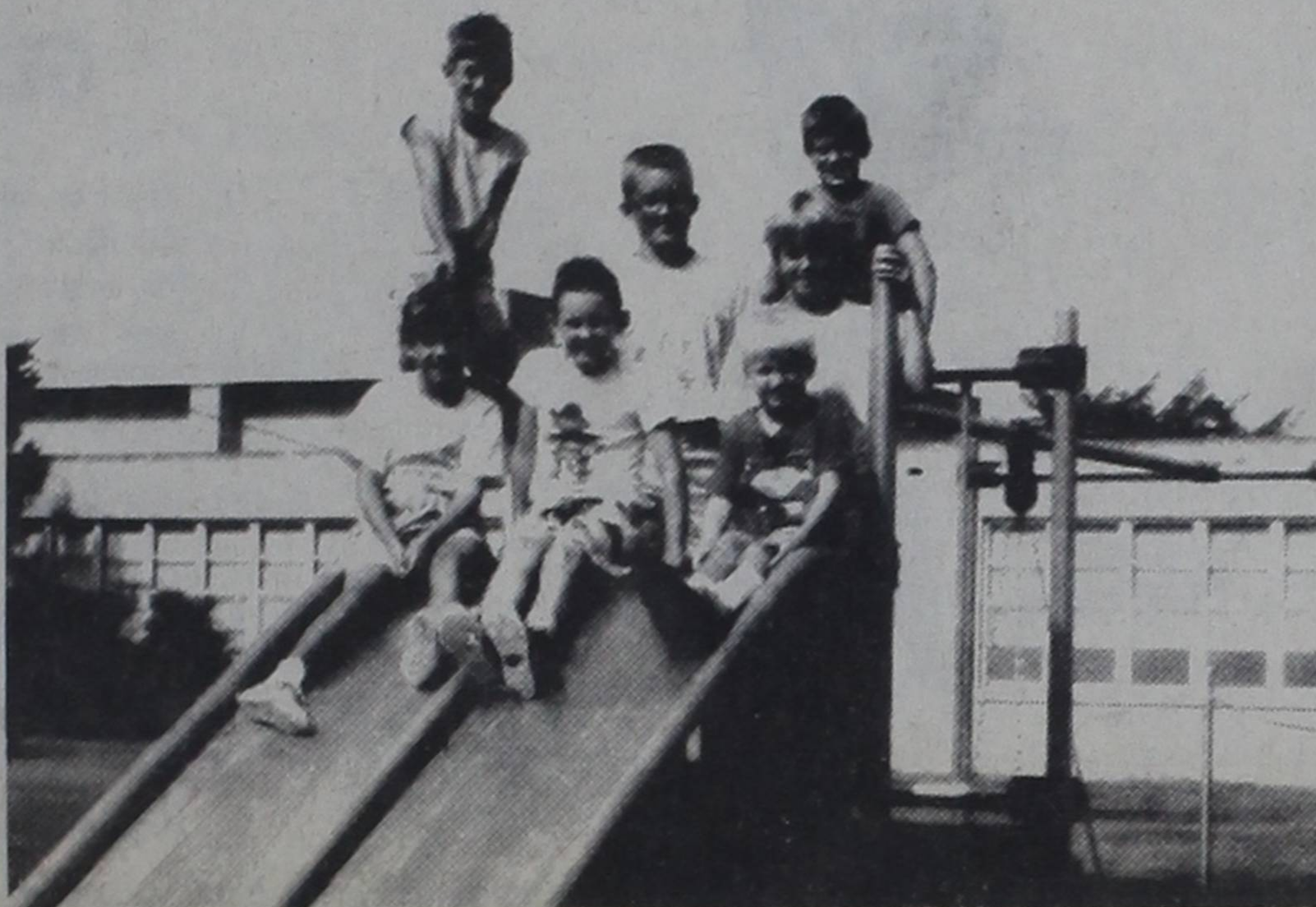
Fourteen contestants are entered in the 1987 Miss Friona pageant, according to Kathy Beard, Chamber of Commerce manager.

## Chiefs Have High Pre-Season Rating

The Friona Chieftains are being held in fairly high regard for 1987 by the football experts in pre-season ratings.

The Harris Rating System has given Friona a pre-season rating of 167, just one behind Littlefield, which is rated in the state's top ten by some polls. Last year the team made the "power rating" of 166 at the end of their season, their highest rating.

Harris says "The Frionans could be better than Littlefield if line play cooperates to its fullest capabilities. QB Daniel Echols, who started eight games and rushed for 865 yards, is the club's lethal weapon. An outstanding group of sophs means that Friona will be around for quite awhile."

Harris continues: "It appears that Littlefield and Friona will remain married to post-season play once again in '87. Tulia could surprise. Floydada, Muleshoe and Dimmitt all have a stronger appeal than in '86."

# Friona Flashbacks

**55 YEARS AGO--AUG. 5, 1932**

Parmer County is to have a County Home Demonstration Agent. At a recent meeting of the commissioners court, they voted to secure an agent for six months. She will begin her services right away--probably the second week in August.

Mayor F. W. Reeve, who was appointed as a delegate to represent the local Chamber of Commerce at a meeting of the State Highway Commission being held in Austin Wednesday, departed for that city Monday afternoon. Mr. Reeve has been deeply interested in the West Texas North and South Highway, and has taken an active part in promoting it, and it was to the end that he might exert a considerable influence in its favor with the Highway Commission by being in attendance at this meeting.

**45 YEARS AGO--JULY 31, 1942**

Bert Shackelford, consignee of the Texas Company, reports that he shipped for the company from Friona last week a carload of 41,190 pounds of scrap rubber. The Texas Company still has 11,000 pounds for shipment. The Texas Company purchased the large pile of scrap rubber taken in by the Friona Consumers Company.

Producers having farm stored wheat of the 1942 crop who desire a farm storage loan are required, under the regulations to execute farm storage worksheet prior to the time the loans will be made. **35 YEARS AGO--JULY 31, 1952**

Derailment of fourteen cars of an eastbound freight train near Summerfield Sunday afternoon halted traffic on the local Santa Fe line for some hours. Though the track was a shambles for several hundred feet, and eleven of the cars were overturned and stacked in some instances, no one was reported injured. The overturned cars were loaded with potash being shipped from Carlsbad, N.M. to eastern points.

Now awaiting Washington acceptance of their low bid for construction of rural telephone lines for the West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative to serve this area, the Thompson, Haight & Keister Construction Company of Oklahoma City will proceed with actual construction just as soon as materials become available.

**30 YEARS AGO--AUG. 1, 1957**

Construction of a new building to house the Friona office of Pioneer Natural Gas Company got underway this week. The concrete foundation is already poured. Site of the building is 701 Euclid Street, on the corner opposite the Friona Post Office. Builder is R.L. Rule of Friona. Rule and C.I. Wall, president of the company, announce a five-year contract with an option to continue to lease the building. Estimated cost of the building is \$7,500. Completion date is set for October 1.

After plunging 75 feet down an elevator man-lift shaft in a free-wheeling elevator car Tuesday morning a pair of repairmen are still alive to tell the story. Included in the frantic descent were Effie Grammer of Hutcheson, Kansas and Harry Ericson of Mt. Hope, Kansas. They are members of a construction crew making repairs on Friona Wheat Growers elevator.

**25 YEARS AGO--AUG. 2, 1962**

The Friona Jaycees, under the management of Walter Haws, will conduct its second annual Quarter Horse Show Saturday, August 4, at the Jaycees Arena. Last year's show was the first of its kind in the

history of Parmer County, and interest was such that the show has become an annual affair.

All irrigation farmers and landowners in the area are urged to attend a special meeting Friday night, August 3 at the Hub Community Center. The farmers are to hear a report from a committee which met July 24 with representatives of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District. T.I. Bursleson, chairman of the committee, said that the committee will report on its talk with Tom McFarland, manager of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District, and would tell the farmers what the District expects of them in regard to controlling their "tailwater."

**20 YEARS AGO--AUG. 3, 1967**

Parmer County citizens moved this week to block an attempt by two Hereford men to establish a private club on the outskirts of Friona. The two, Charles Joseph Lance and Adolph Eugene Vasek, were in the process of applying for a permit for the club through the Texas Liquor Control Board's Lubbock office.

A group of special commissioners made awards in 17 cases they heard last week in Farwell regarding right of way damages for a gas pipeline which will cross the county. Some 33 landowners in Parmer County are affected by the line, which crosses the southeast corner of the county, from southwest to northeast.

**15 YEARS AGO--AUG. 3, 1972**

Officials of Encounter '72 estimated that more than 10,000 persons attended the series of county-wide evangelistic services last week at Chieftain Field. Largest crowd was the concluding service on Sunday evening, when in the neighborhood of 1,750 people crowded into the stadium for the service.

## SS Benefit Changes Must Be Reported

People who get monthly supplemental security income (SSI) checks must report to Social Security any changes in their situation that may affect their eligibility for these checks or the amount of their payments. A person who fails to report such a change may be paid too much or too little.

The change must be reported within ten days after the end of the month in which it occurs. If the person fails to report a change as required under the law, Social Security will take action to recover any money paid out as a result. Similar action will be taken if the person receives money to which he or she is not entitled because of

having made a false statement. Moreover, the person may have to pay a penalty of up to \$100.

If the SSI recipient has already informed Social Security about a bank account, he or she does not have to report the same information again; however, if a single person has money and other resources that amount to more than \$1,800, or if a couple has money and other resources that amount to more than \$2,700, Social Security must be told about it. Resources refer to such things as personal property, automobiles, and savings accounts.

A person who starts working or who starts a business must also notify Social Security and report if his or her earnings change. Earnings refer not only to the actual money the person receives, but to food or anything else received as payment.

Any change in marital status or in the composition of the household must also be reported.

These are some of the items an SSI recipient must report. Information about additional reporting responsibilities can be obtained from any Social Security office.

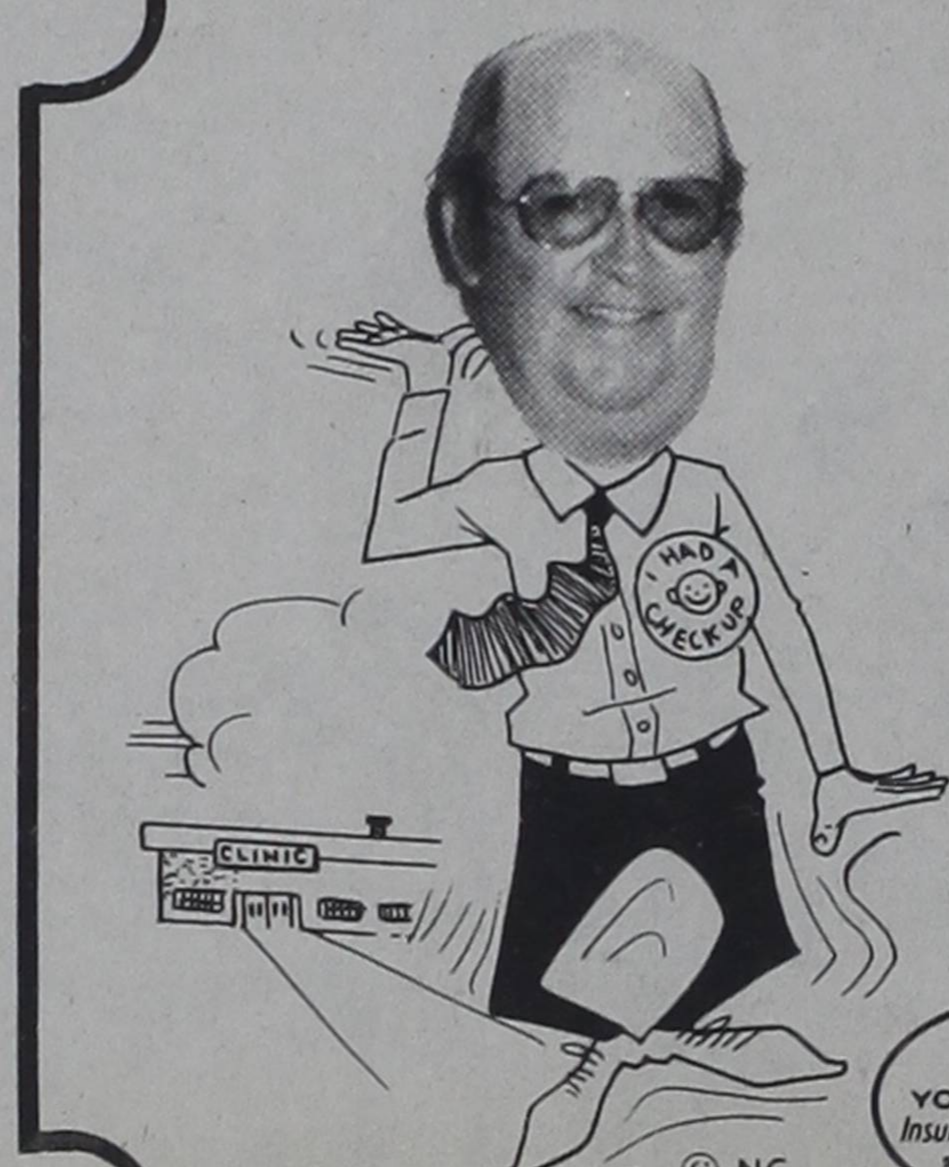
**10 YEARS AGO--JULY 31, 1977**

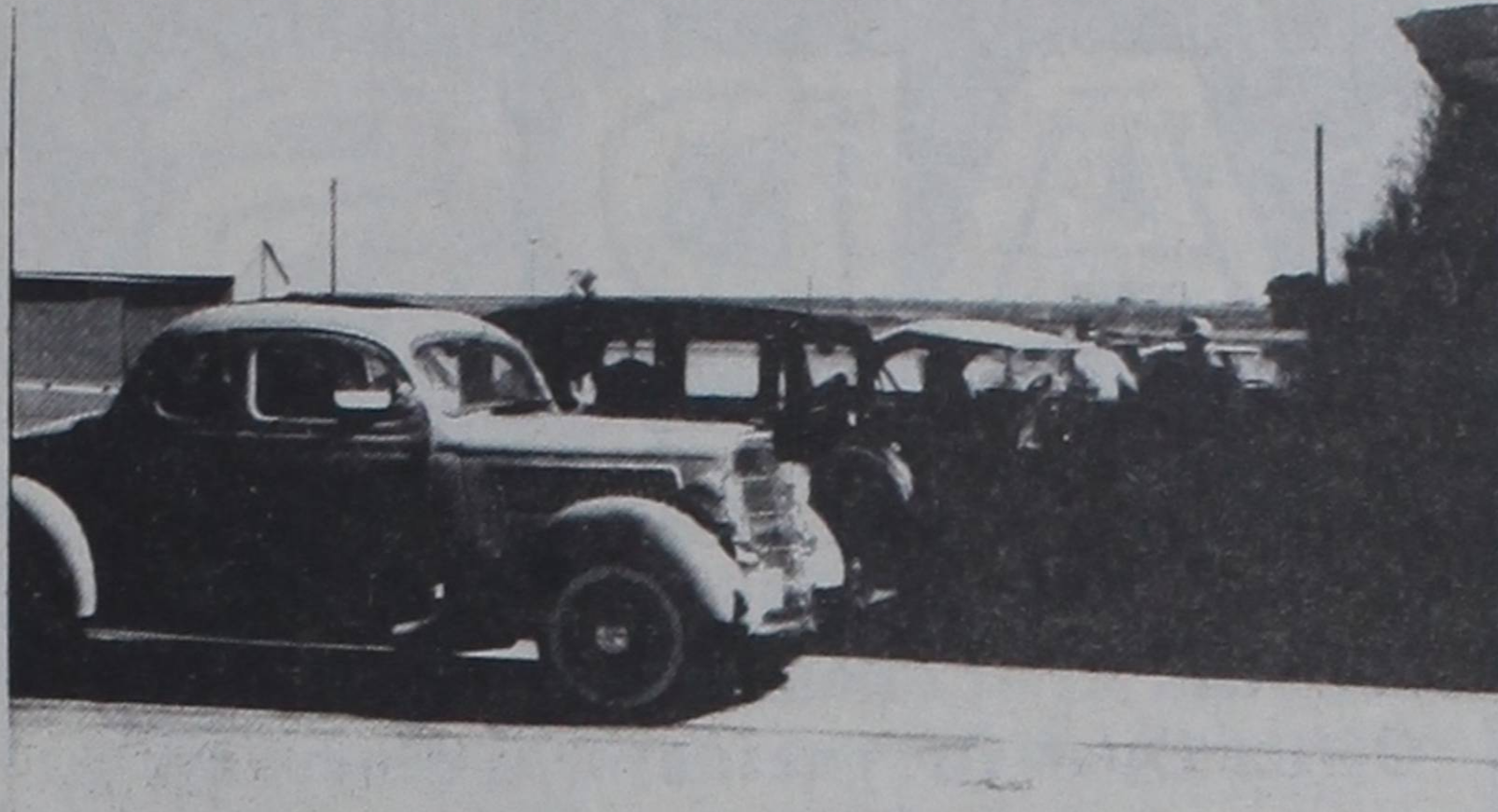

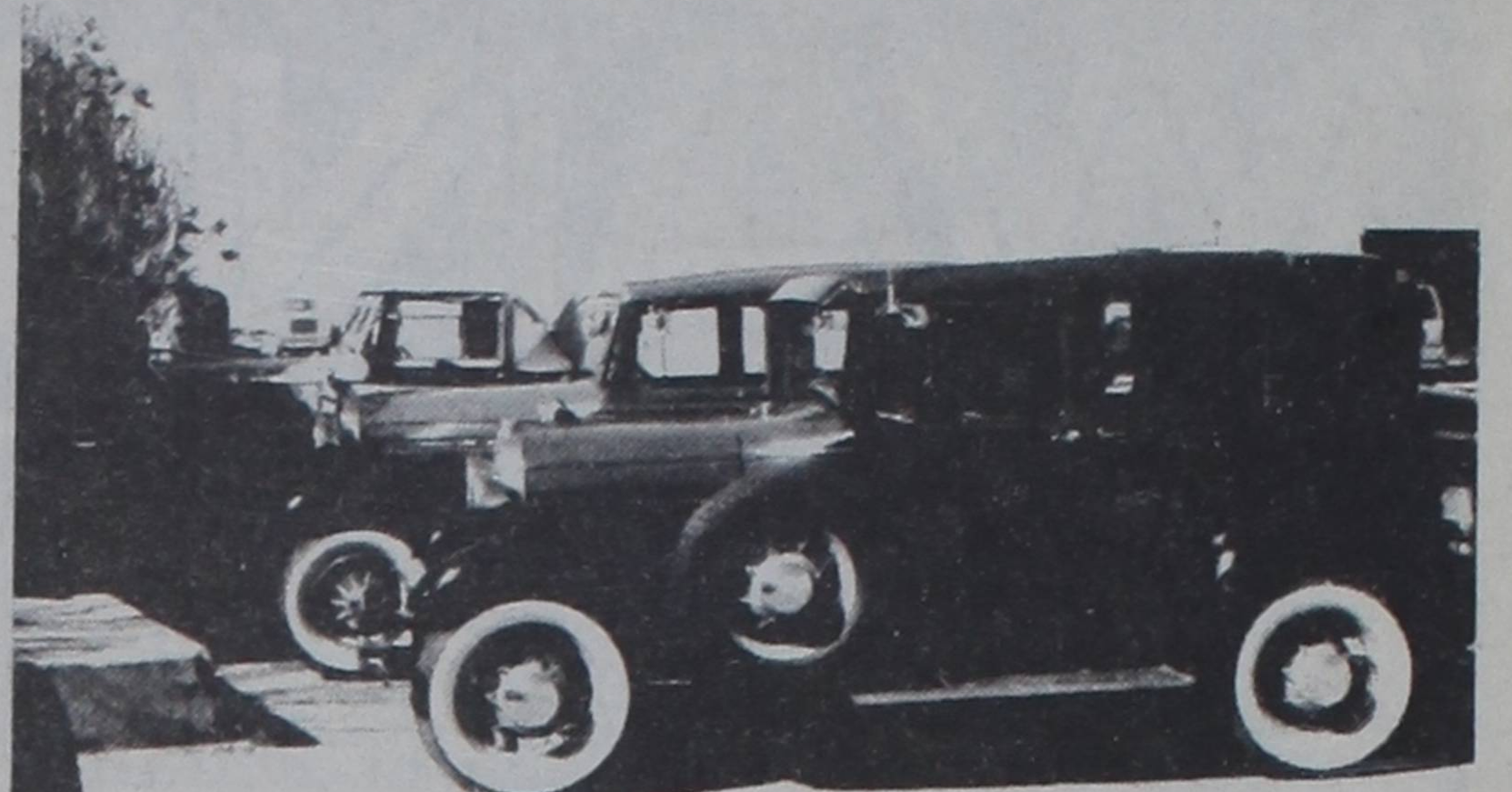

## Savings Bond Sales Up

United States Savings Bonds sales in Texas for the first seven months of fiscal year 1987 amounted to \$259,442,734, an increase of \$41 million or 18.9 per cent over the same period of 1986, T.J. Morrow, District Director for the U.S. Savings Bonds Division in Texas, announced this week. These sales represent 66.8 per cent of the state's 1987 assigned dollar goal of \$388 million.

Sales of Series EE Bonds amounted to \$1,062 during April, 1987 in Parmer County. The October 1986-April 1987 total for the county was \$15,749, which represents 28.6 per cent of the county's 1987 assigned dollar goal.

Nationally, April 1987 sales of Series EE Bonds totaled \$706 million, slightly higher than those for March 1987. Sales of U.S. Savings Bonds of \$7.72 billion for the first seven months of fiscal year 1987 increased 197 per cent and redemptions declined 14 per cent compared to the same period

for 1986. The increase in amount outstanding during April 1987 was \$755 million, for a total of \$95.42 billion, up 16 per cent over April 1986.

The market-based interest rate for the six-months period beginning May 1, 1987 is 5.84 per cent. The average yield for Bonds held since the beginning of the market-based interest rate on November 1, 1982 is 8.68 per cent.

Outstanding Series EE Bonds, Series E Bonds and Savings Notes held and earning interest for at least five years after November 1, 1982 are also eligible for this market-based yield.

All Series EE Bonds purchased on and after November 1, 1982--and held at least five years--will earn 85 per cent of the average market yield on Treasury marketable securities. Bonds held less than five years earn interest on a fixed, graduated scale.
