
Your best friend says "Now promise me that you won't get mad at me if I tell you this." What ever it is, you know that it's something you don't want to hear.





Balloons To Draw Crowd

Definite plans were made Tuesday night by representatives of the Lubbock Balloon Club and the Board of Directors of Buffalo Springs Lake for a colorful spectacle that will be viewed by an estimated 40,000 people from over the West Texas, New Mexico, Oklahoma and Colorado area.

The affair will be the club's Third Annual Hot Air Balloon Rally to be held at sunrise on Saturday and Sunday, September 19 and 20 at the Buffalo Springs Lake site located just southeast of Lubbock's city limits. The lake area is widely known for its many ongoing entertainment features, especially the magnificent July 4 fireworks display that attracts thousands of viewers annually.

Agreements were reached between the two groups with emphasis being placed on the actual launch site area, insurance coverage, and parking for so large a group. Assurances were given by the Lake officials that more area is provided for parking than even the Albuquerque International Balloon Fiesta where five hundred balloons are launched with as many as 150,000 people attending the affair each day.

The Lubbock Rally could be launching as many as sixty of the colorful aircraft, rivaling or surpassing other balloon rallies held in Texas and the Southwest.

Everyone is invited to be on hand at dawn both days and watch all the launching proceedings. Launch will actually occur shortly after sunrise.




The thirty-sixth Jesko family reunion hosted by the Koelzer family was held on Sunday, August 2 at the Bull Barn in Hereford.
