minimum wage at $\$ 3.35$ per hour beginning September 1 . That is the same as the Federal rate in effect since 1981. However, the Federal minimum applies only to farms using 500 man-days of labor in a
calendar quarter, while the State law will apply to all farms, large and small. Neither State nor Federal statutes require overtime for field work.
"To say farm labor laws are not a popular subject with producers is
probably an understatement,", comments Donald A. Johnson, Executive Vice President of
Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Lubbock-based Plains Cotton the books and we need to be familiar with them for our own protection against prescribed penalties.'
