Several of your local stores depend solely on mail-out circulars to tell you, the consumer, about their goods, services, special items



The merchants should ask themselves if those pretty color circulars can offer any of the following: support your clubs and church events, publish your local news, sponsor your Little League teams, give info on your local elections, tell the world when your children get married, your grandbabies are born, go to bat for you against unjust tax hikes, or fight for local improvements such as better roads, a needed bond

issue, or industrial expansion. In effect, the merchants who mail-out those circulars are themselves "shopping out-oftown" because that advertising dollar does not stay in Friona, to re-circulate back through the



No link was found between the consumption of high doses of the low calorie sweetener aspartame residents have been staying inside and seizures in studies conducted to stay cool. Jobe and Dailey, noted authorities in epilepsy research, conducted studies to determine whether rats particularly sensitive to seizures were affected by oral consumption of aspartame. Rats were given doses of aspartame equivalent to the amount an average-sized man would consume if he could drink 750 twelve-ounce cans of diet soda at one time. None had seizures.

In addition, the scientists used sound to induce seizures in the rats, and found that the severity of the seizures was not greater in those that had consumed aspartame.
