THE KIDS ARE going back to school. I am probably the only parent in the entire world who hates to see September roll around each year because the youngsters get back into the school routine. Several reasons.

First...CLOCKS. There is a lot less clock-watching during the summer months. You don't have to get them anywhere on time in the summer, do you? If you get them there, you don't have to pick them up on time either.

If the gang is to meet at the pool at two, you can be fifteen minutes late getting the kids there and you don't have to feel guilty about it because no one is going to make them run laps and no one is going to make them write "I will not be late to the pool" 100 times.

The childhood years fly by so fast. In the summertime, the pace slows down just a bit so that they (and we) can enjoy those fleeting moments.

Shrieks and a rhythmic squeak, squeak, mean they are peacefully swinging in the back yard. Squeals and a lot of splashing, mean they are playing in the wading pool.

Blood-curdling yells and a steady thump, thump, mean they are jumping on the trampoline. Then you get the rat-a-tat-a-tat-a of a playing card flapping against the spokes of the bicycle wheel. Later there is the sound of all that horrible "music" they play on the electronic equipment in their rooms. (That's about the time you start to browse in the stores for earphones.)

And then the sound of the lawn mower means you have finally gotten the kid up old enough to be a little help around the place.

Yes, the sound of silence is deafening in September.

The third reason that I do not look forward to September is FOOTBALL. Each autumn, the game of football touches the lives of every person in America, old and young, whether they want it to or not.

If you don't believe me, just drive down the residential streets of any hometown in the country the week after school starts. Tiny little girls are out on the driveways of their homes, hopping up and down with their pom poms, practicing for being cheerleaders at some time in the distant future. Tiny little boys are busy bruising the bobs of their friends out on the front lawns.

If they had acted like that back last summer, you would have called them in for a lecture about how it is not nice to throw yourself at your neighbor, wrestle him to the ground, take his ball away from him and then turn and run off with it in the other direction. But suddenly, all this anti-social behavior is okay since school started.

The adverse effects of football on husbands is such a complex subject that I will have to discuss it in another column. Meanwhile, we'll say "Bye" to the kids until May 27, 1988 hoping that they will be a lot smarter (more knowledgeable) than they were on September 1, 1987.

Enrollment Gains In Scholastics

Enrollment in the Friona Independent School District on Friday, September 4 stood at 1,267, according to Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe.

The enrollment totals for the fourth day of the term showed a gain of four students from the corresponding day of 1986.

The elementary section showed a gain of 14 students, with a total of 634. High school gained nine students, with 345 at the present. Only the junior high totals were down, by seven from last year's totals to 288.

Enrollment totals, with last year's totals in parenthesis, were as follows:

Pre-kindergarten: 31 (37); Special Education, combination unit: 12 (7); E.C.U.: 5 (6); kindergarten: 108 (98); first grade: 97 (113); second grade: 102 (102); third grade: 92 (86); fourth grade: 89 (94); fifth grade: 101 (89). Total elementary: 634 (632).

Sixth grade: 88 (90); seventh grade: 92 (101); eighth grade: 94 (94); Life Skills unit: 14 (10). Junior High totals: 288 (295).

Ninth grade: 96 (99); tenth grade: 98 (85); eleventh grade: 79 (82) and twelfth grade: 72 (70). High school total: 345 (336). Grand totals: 1,267 (1,263).

Enrollment figures are expected to continue to grow after Labor Day, as is usually the case.

Maize Days Set For Big Climax

Friona's 1987 Maize Days celebration will head into its final and biggest day on Saturday.

Kicking off things will be the hot cake breakfast sponsored by the American Legion, from 5:30-8 a.m. at the high school cafeteria.

The Dixon six-mile run starts at 8 a.m. at Anthony's corner north of Friona, concluding at Highway 60. All runners are urged to enter the race.

The annual Maize Days parade begins at 10:30 a.m. Saturday on Main Street.

The Maize Days Barbecue will begin serving at 11:30 a.m. at the Community Center, catered by K-Bob's of Hereford.

A photography show is underway at the former Winner's Choice location, Seventh and Main. Modern Study Club's Country Store also is being held there.

A craft show is underway at the

Community Center. Various organizations and clubs will be holding booths, food sales, etc., at the Community Center during the barbecue period.

E&B Funtime Rides have been operating all week, with 12 carnival rides. The carnival will continue through Saturday night.

Rounding out the schedule will be a dance Saturday night, featuring the Tiny Lynn Band, at the community center. Tickets are \$7 for singles and \$10 for couples.

Chieftains Open '87 Season

The Chieftains were opening their 1987 season by hosting the River Road Wildcats Friday at Chieftain Field.

Among Friona's concerns during the week was its kicking game, having been handled for the past four years by the graduated Sam Montoya, who gained all-state mention in his career at FHS.

However, Coach Tommy Moss said that junior Cody Burney would do the place-kicking and sophomore Andre Duran would handle punting for the team.

Coach Moss was going for his fifth straight opening game win against the Wildcats, against whom he has a personal 5-2 record. Friona leads the series against the Amarillo school, 6-4.

Next week, the team travels to Idalou to meet another Wildcat team. Idalou is a team Friona hasn't beaten (in only four tries). Last season, the Chiefs threatened but dropped a 9-7 decision, one of only two regular season losses by the team, which set its all-time winning record with a 9-3 mark.

Football Contest Kicks Off Here

The always-popular football contest, sponsored by the Friona Star for the past 28 years, is being announced in this week's issue of the Star.

A tie-breaker game, usually the Friona Chieftain game, will be used to break weekly ties as well as those that might develop in the race for grand prizes.

55 YEARS AGO--SEPT. 2, 1932

One of the saddest accidents that has ever visited the Friona community was the loss of the lives of Mrs. C.S. Waddell and her two small daughters, which occurred one mile east of Bovina Sunday night as a result of the deluge of waters that visited this locality and that of Bovina on that date.

Mr. Waddell, his wife and three small daughters had been visiting in Eastern New Mexico over the weekend and were on their way home when they were overtaken by the rain storm which was perhaps the heaviest that has ever visited this locality (from 15 to 17 inches were reported by farmers west of Friona).

On reaching Bovina, Waddell found that the bridge crossing Running Water Draw was destroyed. He then thought to continue his journey homeward by taking the Ozark Trails Highway (Hwy. 86) east from Bovina, and arrive at Friona by way of Homeland (Hub). However, upon coming to the place where this highway crosses the same draw, the Waddell automobile was swept from the roadway. Waddell managed to escape with the youngest daughter, Billie May, but Mrs. Waddell and the two older children, Virginia, six, and Vivian, four, were swept downstream in the darkness.

Search parties organized on Monday failed to locate the three bodies. In fact, 20-year-old Richard Caldwell of Bovina drowned while trying to help find them.

One of the bodies was found at the bridge which was built across

the stream last winter due south of Friona, about 11 miles from where it was thrown into the water. The body of Mrs. Waddell was found two miles further east.

(The Star's four pages are filled with other accounts of near tragedy caused by what was possibly the biggest flood in the area's history, which turned our usually empty draws into rampaging rivers.)

35 YEARS AGO--AUG. 28, 1952

School opens at Friona with registration of the seniors this Friday afternoon. Superintendent of Schools is Dalton Caffey. High School principal is Dillie Kelley. John Parish is principal of the

grade school. In high school, J.T. Gee returns as head of the vocational agriculture department. Raymond Cook returns as head coach and mathematics instructor. Mr. Murry D. Ford, WT graduate, will be coach of girls basketball. Tom Jarboe will return as a sixth grade teacher.

Lazbuddie Schools also open next Monday. J.G. Ward is superintendent. C.W. Dukes is high school principal and coach.

30 YEARS AGO--AUG. 29, 1957

A U.S. Air Force four-engine fuel transport plane crashed Wednesday morning at 10:04 a.m. six miles north and four west of Bovina. The plane's crew, six airmen, had bailed out near Hereford. The crash, which scattered debris for approximately 3/4 of a mile in a swath 50 yards wide, was on a farm owned by A.B. Wilkinson, who lives in Bovina.

20 YEARS AGO--AUG. 31, 1967

Bill Morgan, former Chief of Police in Friona, accepted the position once again this week as Ken McDermitt resigned to pursue other interests. McDermitt had held the position since June of 1966.

The north wall "skeleton" has been put up at Missouri Beef Packers' Friona plant. The length of the building will be 620 feet. Work is progressing nicely in the original construction portion.

18 YEARS AGO--AUG. 31, 1972

The Friona, Texas Federal Credit Union was named to receive the 1972 Thrift Honor Award by the National Credit Union Administration. The award is designed to be awarded to credit unions who are in the top ten per cent, nationally, depending on growth.

15 YEARS AGO--AUG. 28, 1977

The Wilson-Welch family will be starting its fourth generation in Friona schools Monday when Melanie and Mende Petree, five, will enter kindergarten. Louisa Wilson graduated from Friona High School in 1924. Her daughter, Mamie Lou Welch, graduated in 1946 and the mother of the twins, Jan Petree, who is Mrs. Welch's daughter, graduated in 1968.





Chiefs Shine Vs. Roosevelt

The Friona Chieftains outscored Lubbock Roosevelt, 2-0 in a controlled scrimmage last Friday evening at Lubbock.

Sophomore Andre Duran got both of Friona's touchdowns, on runs of three and four yards.

The Chieftain defense pretty well shut down Roosevelt's attack, giving up only a couple of first downs.

"They had one pass play that gained 32 yards when we went for

the interception, and another play that gained 20 yards. Except for those two plays, we shut them down," said Coach Tommy Moss.

At the last part of the scrimmage, the two teams played a regular quarter of football. During that time, Friona scored one of its touchdowns, going the distance in 11 plays.

They stopped Roosevelt, and then had another drive going, but decided to punt on fourth and

short yardage. The Chiefs had a third drive going toward the end of the scrimmage.

In the special quarter, Friona gained 90 yards and held Roosevelt to none. In the series of 20 plays each, Friona gained 140 yards to 58 for the hosts.

Individually, Daniel Echols gained 69 yards on eight carries. Duran gained 53 yards on just five tries, having long gains of 18 and 20 yards. Ben Osborn gained 46 yards in 12 plays; Toby Gibson 32 yards in seven and Cody Bracken 25 yards in four tries.

"We improved considerably over our first scrimmage," said Coach Moss, evidently pleased with the players' efforts.
