Maize Days Is A Big Success

Friona's 1987 Maize Days celebration concluded last Saturday with everything being a success, in spite of the morning rainfall which slightly dampened the participants and spectators.

In spite of the rain, the parade went off on schedule, and a good crowd of spectators was on hand.

Shortly after the beginning of the parade, the rain slowed considerably and by parade's end, had quit. The remainder of the day's activities were held without bother by the weather.

It was the first time in a number of years for the parade to be threatened by rain.

The Maize Days barbecue drew a crowd of around 500, according to Chamber of Commerce manager Kathy Beard.

Those eating barbecue were served in short order.

The E&B Funtime Carnival concluded a good week's run, with especially good crowds on Friday and Saturday. According to Wendell Gresham, negotiations are being completed to have the carnival here again next year.

A highlight of the projects at the carnival area were special booths sponsored and manned by employees of the Excel Corp. They operated a fajita sale and dunking booth Friday and Saturday, raising \$1,213.67 which was donated to the Friona High School Band for their proposed trip next spring.










Girl Born To Local Couple
