County Raises Approved As Court Splits On Issue

Parmer County commissioners approved a new budget Monday which calls for a ten per cent salary increase for county employees.

By accepting the budget, the commissioners also accepted an increase in the tax rate which was part of the budget. The county's rate for a \$100 value for everything taxable in the state of Texas was \$0.2948 and will increase to \$0.3028 per \$100.

A certain tax increase is allowable each year by law, and this increase falls within the amount allowed, according to Bonnie Warren, County Clerk.

The budget was carried by a split vote. Two commissioners were in

favor and two were opposed to the budget. Judge Porter Roberts broke the tie in favor of the motion.

One of the dissenting commissioners, Ernest Anthony, said, "I don't want to vote for salary increases when the taxpayers haven't gotten a salary increase."

According to County Treasurer Anne Norton, the ten per cent pay raise plus an increase in Social Security and an increase in retirement will cost the county about \$70,000 to \$75,000 more annually.

The budget also calls for an increase in commissioners' travel pay. There is an increase in capital

outlay because of the possibility of installing an elevator in the county courthouse.

Certain expenditures within the budget are projected to be a little less than in the previous budget. Two of those areas include the jury fund and maintenance janitorial expenditures.

The budget does call for use of reserve funds to meet the pay increase and certain other expenditures.

Overall, the projected total receipts (or all the money the county projects to bring in) for 1988 will be \$1,689,826. The beginning balance for 1988 is projected to be \$1,033,219. Thus the total resources would be \$2,723,045. The total expenditures for all funds is projected at \$1,996,940. The ending balance based on these figures is \$726,104.

Weather Remains Good

Harvest operations in the Friona area were boosted during the past week by ideal fall weather, which has allowed harvest of the area's corn crop to pick up steam.

Temperatures dipped below the 50-degree mark virtually every morning this week, heralding the arrival of fall, but warmed up nicely each day, peaking at 83 degrees on Thursday afternoon.

The dry trend for the weather was just what the doctor ordered, according to agricultural observers.

"This has been a life-saver for the cotton," said ginner D.L. Carmichael. "If that rain had kept on, it was going to ruin the crop. But this is just what we were needing. Some of the cotton really looks good. It's making cotton every day," Carmichael said.

The longtime Friona cotton expert said that some farmers are considering applying a growth retardant, which might facilitate the maturing of the crop.

"This would affect the grade to some extent, and I think at this point it would also affect the yield," Carmichael commented.

AT PAMPA FRIDAY

Chiefs Seek 5-0 Plateau

The Friona Chieftains were stepping out of their classification Friday when they visited the class 4-A Pampa Harvesters. It was Friona's first visit to Pampa for a grid encounter, having hosted Pampa last year in the first-ever meeting.

Although Pampa was winless (except they gained a forfeit win from Hereford during the week), Coach Tommy Moss said the team's record might be deceiving.

Pampa has played some good teams, including Amarillo High School.

The Chieftains, meanwhile, were having problems with their starting lineup, due to injuries and the virus.

Randy Ramos, defensive tackle, injured a knee last week and will be out of action. Ironically, Ramos was filling in for Louis Dunnam, who got a knee injury the previous week against Portales.

Dunnam is expected to miss Friday's game, but tackle Paul Trimmell should be back in the lineup. Trimmell missed the Olton game with bruised ribs.

Friona was out to stretch their 1987 start to a 5-0 record, something achieved by only two other FHS grid teams in history.

The 1963 Chieftains, under Coach Don Light, was off to a 5-0 start enroute to winning their first eight games. The 1974 team, tutored by Bob Owen, hit the mid-season point unbeaten, and made it 6-0 before bowing to Olton in a vital district game.

It's Coach Moss' third try at the 5-0 level. He had been foiled twice by Morton, when the Indians tied Friona at the 1984 Homecoming, and then lost, 20-14 the following year at Morton.

Next Friday, the team plunges into district play when they visit Mulshoe. The Mules have a vastly improved team this year, and took a 3-1 record into their Friday game vs Lockney.

"We're just trying to get everybody ready," Coach Moss said.

Work Is Progressing On Depot

The Community Heritage Society of Friona, Inc.'s board of directors met this week to assess the progress on the outside restoration of the Santa Fe Depot.

The concrete and dirt work have been finished, and the roof work soon will be completed. Plans are being made to get the new moulding up around the eaves, and get the outside of the structure painted before cold weather.

Funds are needed for the outside painting, and a bake sale is planned for October; a booth at the Christmas in November bazaar, and a Christmas homes tour is being planned.

A memorial book is being started, to be maintained, which will list all memorials given to the depot fund. This will be displayed in the depot after the inside restoration is completed.

ANOTHER WORK DAY

Another work day will be held Sunday afternoon, October 4 at 2 p.m. at the depot. Last Sunday's turnout was small, and more are needed. Twenty people could finish the job in one afternoon, according to a spokesman.

Those coming to work are asked to bring scrapers and ladders, in order to get the depot ready for painting.

Coaches Grab Top Spots In Contest

Don Herbert weathered the strike-shortened and tie-marred third week's football contest to claim the weekly first prize.

Herbert, an assistant coach at Friona High School, picked 12 correct games, the best possible score for the week.

Only 14 games counted, due to the National Football League strike, and of those games, two ended in a tie, making them automatically wrong for contest purposes.

Herbert edged out head coach Tommy Moss, who had to settle for second place for the second week in a row, on the basis of the Friona-Olton tie-breaker score. Moss and Shane Pope of Quanah were two other contestants who matched Herbert with his score of 12.

Herbert captured the weekly first prize of \$10 after picking the Chieftains to win, 35-3. This was 11 points away from the score.

Moss picked Friona to win, 35-7, to miss the actual score by 15 points.

Fourteen contestants correctly picked 11 games, missing just one of the non-tie games and barely missing a shot at the weekly cash prizes. They were:

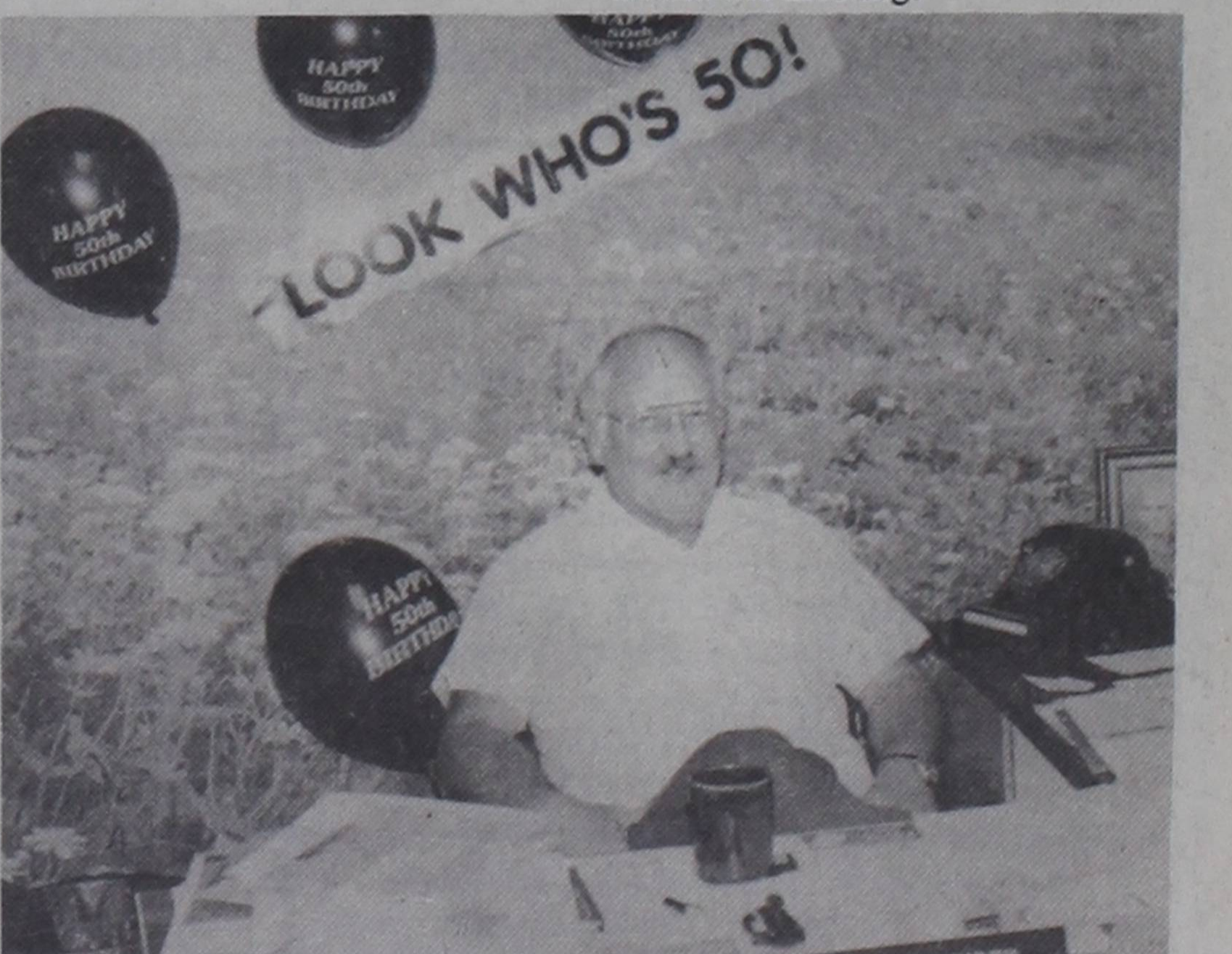

Ellis, 75, died Sunday morning at his residence after a brief illness. Justice of the Peace L.J. Blalock ruled the death due to natural causes.

Ellis was born in Sentinel, Oklahoma. He was valedictorian at Anton High School and later

served as superintendent of schools at Anton and Plains.

He taught English and social studies while attending Texas Technological College. Although he never attended law school, he passed the State Bar exam in 1943. When elected Hockley County Judge at age 27, he was the youngest person to assume that post.

He later was elected judge of Lubbock County Court-at-Law No. 1; appointed by Governor John Connally as the first judge of 137th District Court in 1965; and appointed by Gov. Preston Smith as chief justice of the Amarillo Appeals Court in 1970.

After retiring in 1977, Ellis continued working part time as a visiting district judge in Dallas County and taught at Texas Tech's School of Law.

His wife of 46 years, Myrle, died in 1985. He was a 50-year member of Anton Masonic Lodge.

Survivors include two sons, James Jr. of Dallas and John of Los Angeles, California; two sisters, Leona Minton and Leota Langston, both of Lubbock; a brother, Eugene, of Friona; and two grandchildren.

The family suggests memorials to the television ministry of First United Methodist Church or the American Heart Association.

Chiefs Blast Olton For H'coming Win

It was a night for scoring a lot of points, crowning the homecoming queen, and keeping some streaks going.

The Chieftains disposed of the Olton Mustangs, 43-0 in Friona's Homecoming Game last Friday.

The win kept Coach Moss' record in Homecoming games unbeaten at 6-0-1, and also tied him as Friona's winningest coach (with former coach Bob Owen) with his 41st win in 6½ seasons.

The win was the eighth grid win in the last nine starts for the Chieftains, and 11th in Friona's last 12 regular-season games, something of a rarity at FHS.

And it didn't take the Chieftains long to assume control in the game.

Quarterback Daniel Echols hit split end Stephen Thornton on a 37-yard pass and run play that moved the Chiefs from their own 30 to the Olton 33 on Friona's first play from scrimmage.

Ben Osborn showed that he came to play, crashing 14 yards up the middle to the Olton 13. Echols raced into the end zone for an

Chief JV Drops Two

The Friona High School junior varsity football team lost a pair of games after winning their first two games of the season.

The JV dropped a 24-13 game to Portales here September 17, and then fell to the Hereford JV on September 24, by a score of 10-0.

In the Portales game, Clint Deaton scored on a 25-yard pass from Brian Brogden. Willie White's kick was good.

The team's second score came on a five-yard pass to Ernie Crutchfield from Brogden. White again kicked the point.

Benny Vasquez carried 13 times for 76 yards, and Clint Deaton gained 51 yards on seven carries.

The Hereford game was a defensive struggle. Hereford recovered a fumble inside the Friona 20, and later kicked a field goal for a 3-0 lead.

In the second half, the visitors again recovered a fumble, and turned it into a touchdown.

Friona held the Whitefaces to only 40 yards total offense, but fumbles did them in.

Defensive linemen Eddie Hernandez, Mike Sutter, Brian Brogden and Darran Procter were singled out by Coach Steve Williams for their good play, along with linebackers Deaton, Vasquez and Benny Trevino.

The Chieftain JV stands at 2-2 after these two games.

8th Grade Braves Win

The eighth grade Braves have opened their 1987 season with a pair of shutout wins.

The team downed Hereford LaPlata, 30-0 in their first game, and followed that up with a 32-0 win over Olton last Thursday at Olton.

Ismael Rocha scored two TDs against the Hereford team, gaining 138 yards on five carries.

Curtis Brady scored once, and gained 90 yards. Chad Hamilton made his one carry good for 50 yards and a score.

Louis Abeyta had two carries for ten yards and one two-point conversion run.

Marcus Reyes carried twice for six yards and one PAT. Scott Houston ran for the other conversion.

On defense, Ismael Rocha had seven tackles; Wayne Jackson six; Marcus Reyes, Alex Mendoza, Ricky Madrigal, Koby Rogers, four each.

In the Olton game, Rocha carried six times for 164 yards and three touchdowns. Curtis Brady had the team's other touchdown, and gained 88 yards on seven tries.

Abeyta carried five times on 43 yards, plus a PAT run. Houston had one carry for five yards, and also added two point-after runs, as the team was four for four in running the two-pointers.

Defensively, Abeyta had six tackles; Madrigal, Reyes and Jose Cigarroa had four each; Rocha, Wayne Jackson, and Brady had three each. Madrigal also recovered a fumble.

apparent touchdown, but clipping was called, moving the ball back to the 19.

However, Osborn covered the distance in two runs, his last one from four yards out for his first TD of the season. Cody Burney's kick gave Friona a 7-0 lead, as only 5:12 had elapsed in the first quarter.

Olton picked up a first down, then Friona forced a punt. Osborn gave the team a first down with a power run out to the 44-yard line.

Then Echols weaved his way 25 yards to the Olton 20, finally being dragged down.

On a third down play from the Olton 16, Echols swept left end and hit the end zone flag for the touchdown. Burney's kick was low, but Friona had upped its lead to 13-0 with 1:44 still left in the opening quarter.

Echols hit Terry Widner for a 36-yard gain on a pass play when Friona got the ball back. Osborn then ripped for 13 yards and Echols made 15 on a rollout. But Echols' pass was intercepted at the Olton 15 to end this scoring threat.

The Chieftains backed Olton up to their one-yard line, but let them out of the hole when officials called a face mask penalty against the Chiefs on a third and 26 play, giving Olton a first down.

But they still forced the Mustangs to punt, and then turned Echols loose on a punt return.

The Chieftain speedster took the ball on his own 39, and sped up the west sideline, being caught only because the tackler had an angle on Echols, at the Olton eight. It was a 53-yard punt return.

Two plays later, Osborn cracked over from the four. Echols rolled out and across the goal-line for the two-pointer, giving Friona a comfortable 21-0 halftime lead.

In the third quarter, Olton's defense tightened up, and Friona seemed to lose its concentration. The Chiefs had only one first down in the quarter, and could not get a drive going.

Olton had a chance to score in the quarter, driving to the Friona five. But Albert Trevino foiled their plans by intercepting a pitchout and running the ball out to the 25 to end the threat. Trevino had an assist from Brent Riethmayer, who hit the quarterback on the play.

The Chiefs overcame a second and 37 situation (after two straight 15-yard penalties), to keep a scoring drive going early in the fourth quarter.

Echols made 22 yards on a rollout to set up the score at the Olton eight, and Osborn ran seven then one yard for his third touchdown. Burney's kick made the score 28-0 with 7:12 left in the game.

Olton fumbled at their eleven after the kickoff, giving Friona an easy drive. Although Coach Moss inserted his reserves, Cody

Bracken powered eight yards for a touchdown. Thornton took the high snap and ran it for a two-pointer, extending Friona's lead to 36-0 at the 5:41 mark.

The fired-up Friona defense forced yet another turnover, after a pass completion, giving Friona the ball at the Olton 37.

David Bugg had a 19-yard gain to the Olton 16, and Terry Widner went over untouched as the reverse play worked to perfection for the second-string backfield. Burney's kick again worked, for a final margin of 43-0.

The Chieftains scored 22 points in less than five minutes of clock time in the fourth quarter.

Osborn gained 172 yards, the season's high for an individual, on 25 carries, and Echols snaked his way for 132 yards, giving him 442 for the season. Echols ranks fifth among the rushing leaders on the South Plains after four games, and is the leader among district players.

The Chieftains have not allowed a point in the second half so far this season, and have outscored their opponents, 57-0 in second half action.

NOTICE OF NEW TARIFF OFFERING CENTRANETSSM SERVICE

General Telephone Company of the Southwest gives notice of its proposed new tariff offering, CentranetsSM Service, which is to be offered in all company wire centers where such facilities exist to provide the service.

Centranet is a central office based service which provides PBX type features to multi-line business customers. Basic operating features include Direct Inward Dialing (DID), Direct Outward Dialing (DOD), Station-to-Station Dialing, Automatic Identified Outward Dialing (AIOD), and Touch Calling. The tariff is designed for Centranet customers with a minimum of 2 and maximum of 100 main station lines.
