## Musical Saw Is Resident's Project

All musical saws will saw wood All musical saws will saw wood
BUT all saws won't play music--
In 1987, if a person says, "T" going to go play with my saw," hey are not necessarily planning to build something. The almost forgotten art of playing the
musical saw is making its return, and rapidly gaining popularity. In the early 1800 's, a German merchant traveling in South Africa, came across some natives
working. They were singing, and their accompaniment was cross cut saws, struck with mallets. The
merchant returned to Germany, and started producing musical he legend of the "musical. Sow goes One century later, in the early 1900's, saw playing became popular in America. This popularity was due, in part, to a
successful vaudeville act, known as "The Weaver Brothers and
Elviry." Then in 1928, a German named Kleiber attracted serious attentions for the saw by performing a solo with the Berlin use of the fiddle bow replaced the mallet to produce haunting sustaining tones. This sound was "probably made, popular by the "hill billies" during the the country music scene.
I was introduced to the saw in
1983 by Cliff Knight, a snow bird from Iowa. He played a solo at church, using a piano mallet to
strike the saw. I was so fascinated that I could hardly wait until lunch and siesta were over to rush to their trailer. I had to try this! Cliff gave me a few instructions and Then off to Sears I dashed. I Then off to Sears I dashed. I found one that would work. The clerks thought I was crazy.
We got home, and I We got home, and I started real quick. First--"there ain't no notes on a saw, you just play the durn thing," and second-the saw was so stiff that it hurt my hand. Cliff made me a mallet, but some unexpected arm surgery nipped a
