

"MY TURN"

HERE'S AN UPDATE of health news from various sources:

Coronary heart disease is the leading cause of death in the U.S., killing more than 750,000 people each year. The Center for Disease Control, after an intensive analysis of several studies, now says that the link between heart disease and physical inactivity is as strong as the link between heart disease and high blood pressure.

Nearly 60% of Americans don't get any regular exercise, which is defined as three 20-minute sessions per week. Also 80 to 90% don't engage in a regular aerobic exercise program. In contrast, 18% do smoke a pack of cigarettes a day, 10% have a systolic blood pressure level above 150, and 10% have a blood cholesterol level over 268.

The CDC researchers suggest that even less-than-rigorous exercise, as long as it is performed regularly, may also be somewhat protective against heart disease.

Quite a lot of local people appear to be taking their daily dose of exercise in the form of walks around their neighborhoods or at the track each evening after supper.

Auto drivers heading down the street in a westerly direction have trouble seeing pedestrians (or much of anything else) at that time of day with the bright setting sun right at eye level.

Accidents are the third leading cause of death in this country, so we urge local walkers to use caution, walk close to curbs since there are so few sidewalks in town, and be prepared to hop onto the nearest lawn or driveway if a car appears to be driving strangely.

A recent bulletin published by the Texas Department of Health indicates that there have been 695 new cases of AIDS reported in Texas since January of this year. There have been 165 deaths from AIDS in Texas since January.

Harris County, which takes in the city of Houston, had by far the largest number of AIDS cases reported, 268 and 51 deaths. Dallas County was second with 194 reported cases, but had 55 deaths from the disease since the first of the year.

One of the persistent myths about this disease concerns the donating of blood. Health officials say that it is not possible to catch AIDS when you are donating blood. Blood banks use sterile, throwaway needles and collection equipment so there is no way that a donor could be exposed. Unfounded fears have contributed to a blood shortage.

It was recently reported that the incubation period for this disease is longer than was first believed. I have not yet seen a report on how this change might affect the current blood supply. I am worried about the fact that there are large medical facilities (using large amounts of blood) located in Houston, which also has the largest population of gays in the state and the largest incidence of AIDS cases.

We'll be keeping an eye on this situation.

Another health myth which has been around for a long time is that low blood pressure can be just as bad for you as high blood pressure. Wrong! Hypotension, as low blood pressure is known, is not considered a disease and cannot be the cause of weakness, headaches or fatigue. Some people maintain a blood pressure of 90/60 for all of their life without showing any ill effects. In fact, such a blood pressure level appears to go along with good health and long life.

Friona Man Is Charged In Death

John Price of Friona was charged Tuesday, October 13, with aggravated assault with a deadly weapon in the Monday night stabbing death of Virgil Ray Widmier, 36, of Dawn, formerly of Friona.

Price was charged before Deaf Smith County Justice of the Peace, Johnny Turrentine of Hereford, and bond was set at \$50,000.

A domestic argument apparently prompted the fatal stabbing about 8 p.m. Monday at Widmier's residence about five miles north of Dawn on Farm Road 809.

According to reports, Price had gone to Widmier's residence to help his ex-wife remove her belongings from the trailer. Widmier returned to the residence and the two began fighting when a knife was pulled and the victim was stabbed.

Widmier died late Monday at Deaf Smith General Hospital in Hereford.

Price was arrested at the scene following the assault.

Jarboe To End School Career

Superintendent of Schools Tom B. Jarboe, who has served as head of the Friona Independent School District for the past 14 years, told the local school board on Monday that this would be his last year at his position.

Jarboe, who would still have a year remaining on a three-year contract, asked to be released from the remainder of the contract effective June 30, 1988. He has been associated with the Friona School System since January of 1952.

"I just felt that a change might

be in order. I definitely am not leaving with any bad feeling. This is a tremendous community which has supported its school in a most positive manner over many years. The school board members over the past years have been committed and dedicated servants. I am most grateful for the support that each of you has given me along with your predecessors," Jarboe said in a letter to the school board.

Jarboe said that it was his plan to remain in Friona. "I will certainly have to find something to do, as I am not one who can do nothing and be content," he said.

In an interview with the Friona Star publisher, Jarboe indicated that the increased demands placed on the school system in recent years have become a frustration "that might be better handled by a younger person."

Jarboe said he had chosen the present time to make his decision official, "as we have school underway and I want you to have ample time and not feel rushed in selecting a superintendent."

"We would like to express to Mr. Jarboe our appreciation for his dedicated work. We sure hate to see him retire, but wish him well," said school board president Jerry Hinkle, who said that no decision has been made as to how the vacancy will be filled.

In other business, the board voted to participate in a public awareness week relating to substance abuse.

It gave approval to the junior class to once again hold the Junior-Senior banquet and prom at the Hereford Country Club.

Approval was granted for the school to participate in a Title II math and science improvement and the drug-free schools co-op with the Educational Service Center, Amarillo. Jarboe explained that schools in the area pool the money that is available through this co-op in order for it to go further.

Jerry London and Floyd Reeve were nominated to serve as directors on the Parmer County Appraisal District for new two-year terms. Both London and Reeve are currently finishing two-year terms, and indicated they would serve again if elected.

Although the state board of education has dropped the mandated tuberculosis testing requirement for school personnel and students, upon the recommendation of the State Health Department, Friona will continue requiring the tests for new employees and all seventh grade students each year.

The board is looking into the prospects of building four new classrooms at the elementary school, in order to meet the mandated 1-22 rule as required by H.B. 72. The board is looking into various routes it might pursue in the matter. More rooms are expected to be needed at the third and fourth grade levels.

The board also passed a resolution taking a strong stand saying the state board of education needs to be elected rather than appointed. This will require a "no" vote on the proposition, which will be on the November 3 ballot.

The Friona PTA will meet Monday, October 19 at 7:30 p.m. at the Grade School Cafeteria.

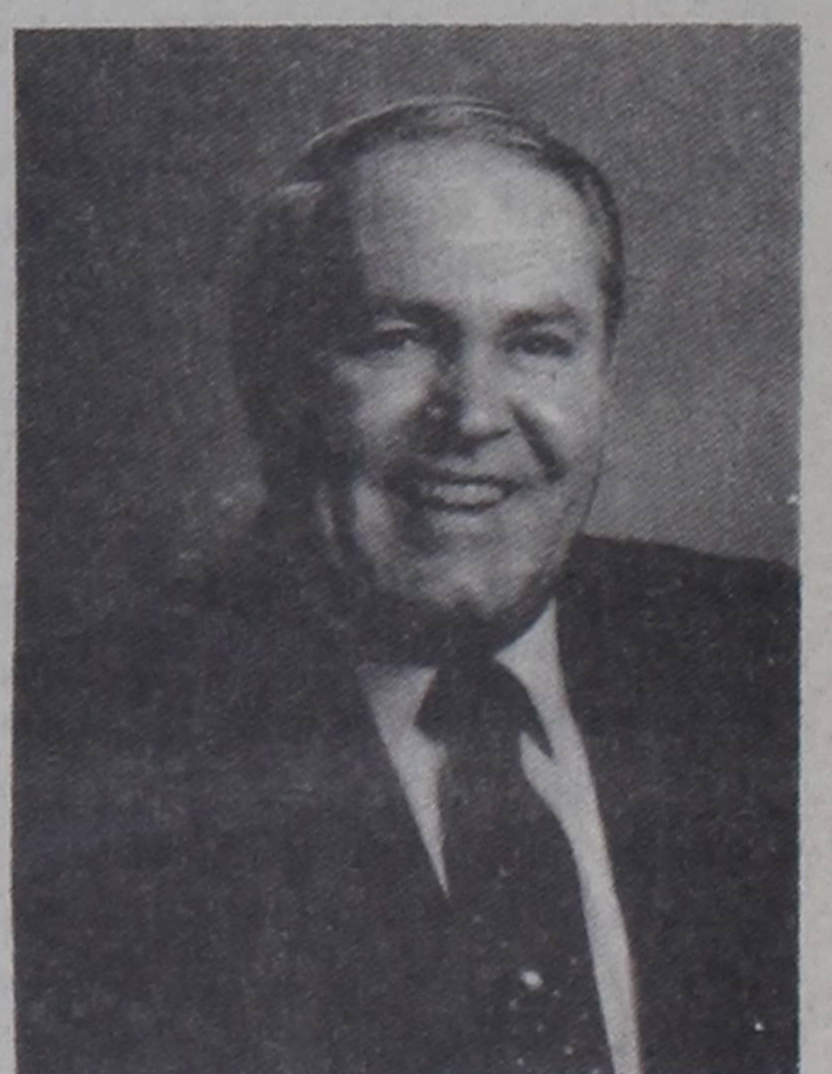
The program is on "AIDS Education," and will be presented by Tommie Mercer, school nurse. There will be adult subjects, according to the spokesman.

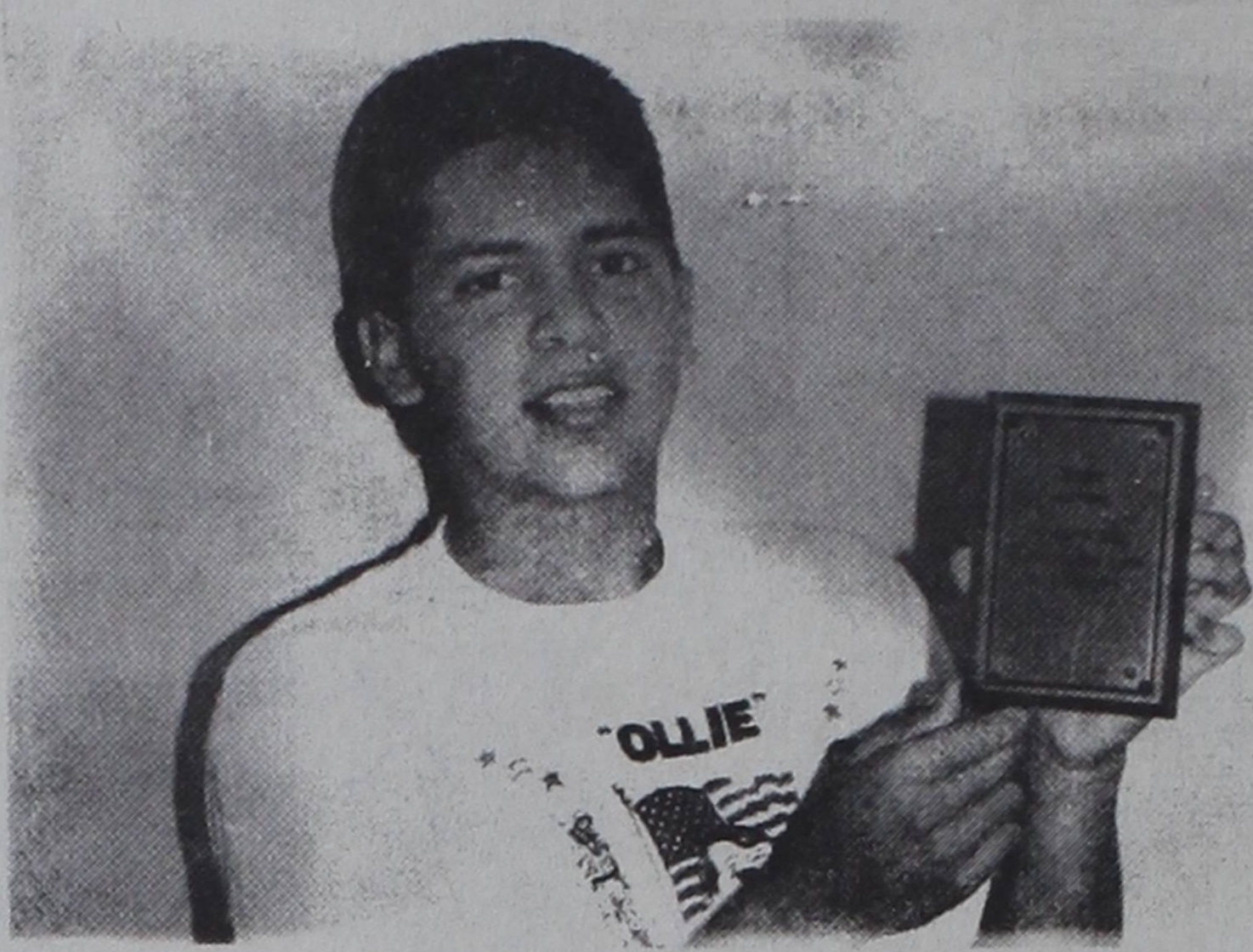
Arrangements were by Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

Medicare Is Available For Kidney Failure

People in the Clovis area suffering from permanent kidney failure should know that Medicare health insurance is available for those who need a kidney transplant or regular kidney dialysis, Carl Thompson, Social Security Manager in Clovis, said recently.

A person who has permanent kidney failure can get Medicare if she or he:

*Worked long enough to be insured under Social Security, or

*Already gets Social Security benefits, or

*Is the wife, husband, or child of someone who has worked long enough under Social Security.

Medicare coverage generally begins with the third month after the month the person starts getting dialysis treatments.

Coverage can also begin in the first month of a course of dialysis if the person takes part in an approved self-dialysis training program and the person expects to self-dialyze after the course.

Coverage can also begin the month the person is admitted to an approved hospital for a kidney transplant if the transplant takes place within three months.

Medicare generally ends twelve months after the month a person no longer needs maintenance dialysis for 36 months following a kidney transplant.

Early S.S. Retirement Requires Good Planning

Despite longer life spans, early retirement continues to be popular and most people retire before 65. But it takes more planning to achieve successful retirement over an increasingly longer term.

The period between stopping work and receiving Social Security benefits may pose special problems for the early retirees, particularly those who work for employers who encourage or permit retirement as early as 55 to 60, such as policemen, fire fighters, and the military. Full Social Security benefits are payable at 65, but reduced benefits can start at 62.

One problem results from the way Social Security benefits are figured. Benefit amounts are based on average annual earnings over a person's working life. When your benefits are figured, the years after retirement from your regular job up until 62 will count also. If a person had no earnings or low

earnings during this period, this could lower the lifetime average earnings and result in a lower benefit amount.

Another problem occurs with people who retire early from companies that have pension plans that take Social Security coverage into account and reduces the company pensions. The Social Security benefit a person would receive at 62 is usually estimated by projecting a set rate of wage increases over the years including the years just before 62.

However, employees should note that they may request their employers to use the actual earnings histories available from the Social Security Administration. This may mean higher pensions for workers with uneven earnings histories and/or gaps in wages. This is because the lower the Social Security benefit, the higher the private pension

under the company plan. Internal Revenue Service rules also require employers who estimate past year's earnings to use the annual wages index published by the Social Security Administration or to assume salary increases of at least six per cent.

The problem of health insurance coverage after a person leaves a regular job and before Medicare begins at 65 is also an issue. You should consider retaining the group health insurance coverage provided by your employer if possible. You may also consider joining a health maintenance organization with the provision that the coverage will be changed to supplement Medicare protection at age 65.

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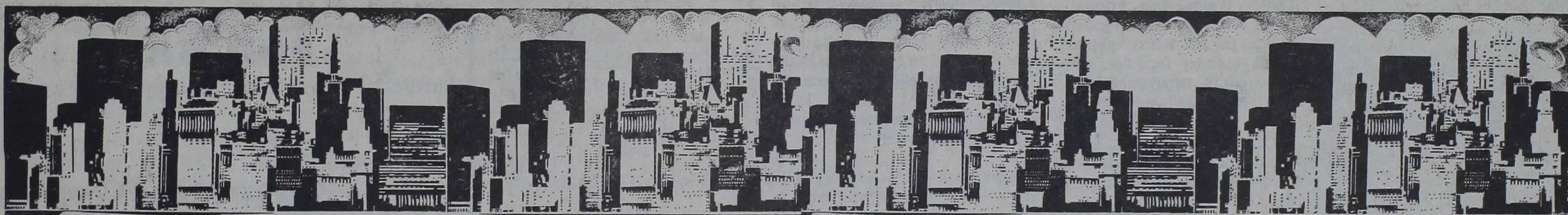

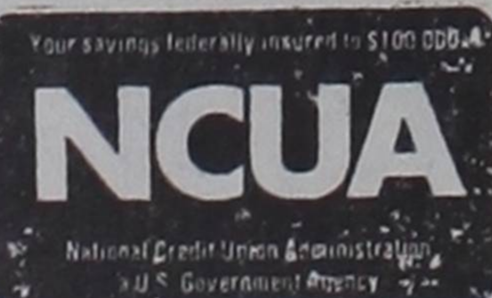

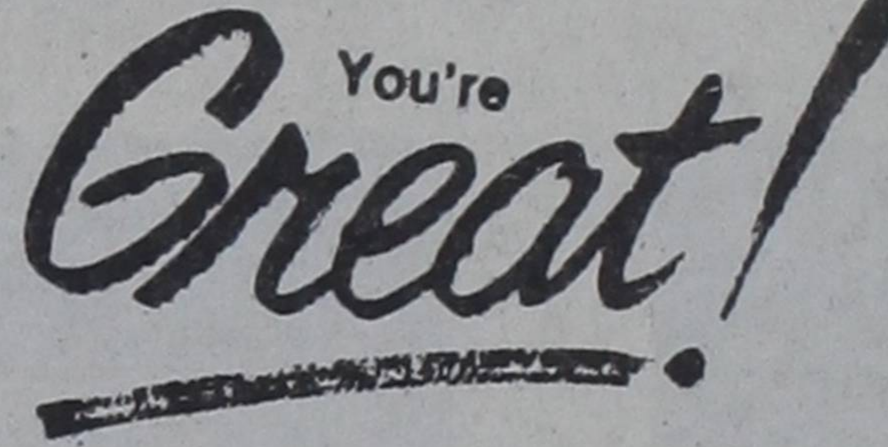

Rocha gained 96 yards on 13 carries and scored one two-point conversion.

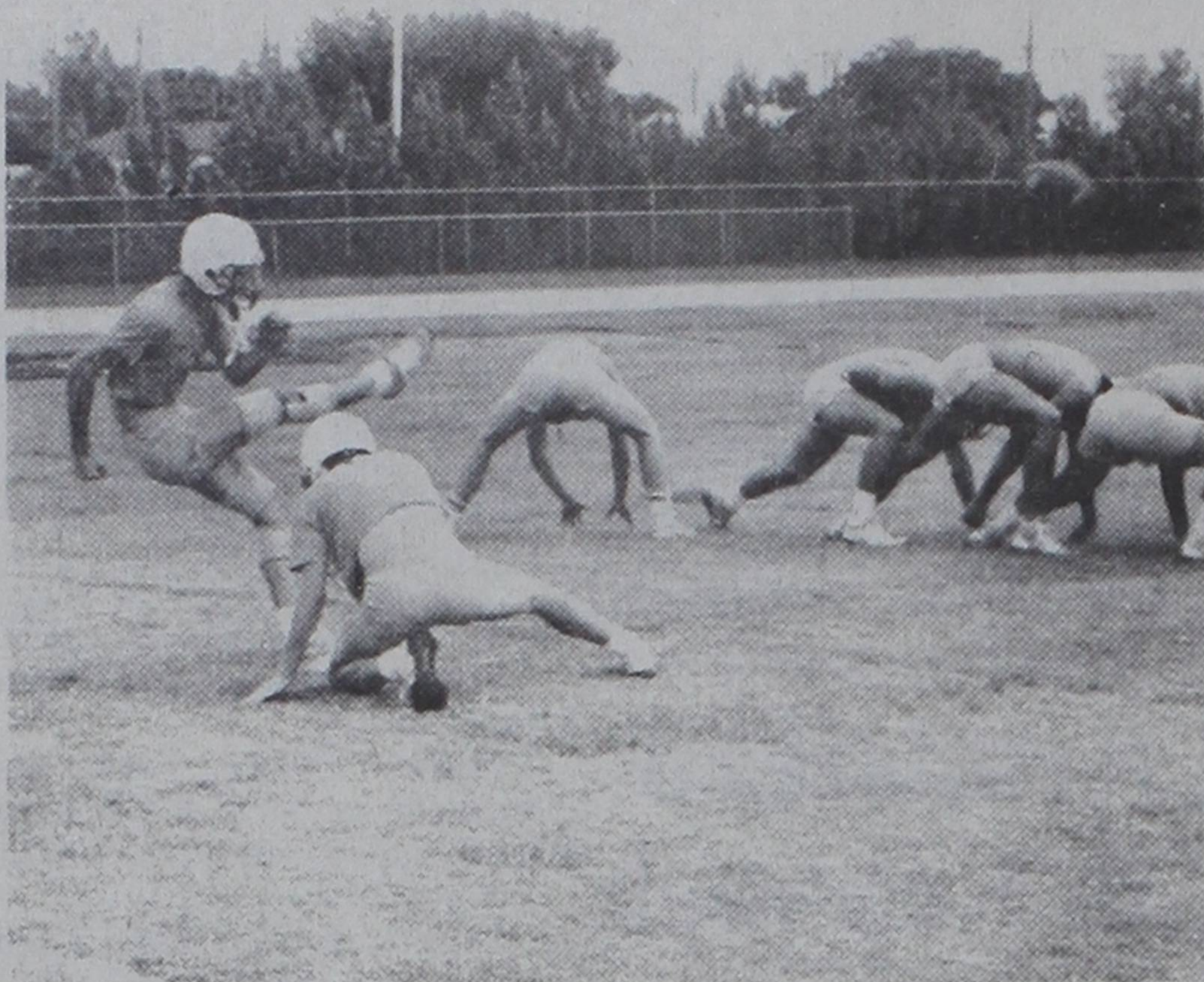
Abeyta carried eight times for 114 yards, and scored three touchdowns. Curtis Brady added 44 yards.

Chieftains Zap Muleshoe In District Opener 27-17

Friona's Chieftains almost equalled the total number of yards that Muleshoe had allowed their five non-district opponents, in scoring a 27-17 win over the Mules in the district 2-AAA opener for both teams last Friday night.

The visiting Chieftains racked up 367 total yards in the game. The Mules had allowed their first five opponents only 89 yards per game. And Friona showed the Mules some defense of their own, limiting Muleshoe to just 109 total yards.

Friona scored on three of their first five possessions of the first half, to take command of the game at halftime, and then really put on the defense in the third quarter, allowing the Mules just 14 yards during that 12-minute period.

In fact, the victory margin would have been even bigger, had not the Chieftains decided to give up a safety in the final minutes, which mushroomed into a 10-point "gimmie."

The Chieftains quickly marched 64 yards in only seven plays in the first quarter to grab the lead in the game.

Quarterback Daniel Echols had a ten-yard gain, as did fullback Ben Osborn. Cody Bracken raced 18 yards to advance into Muleshoe territory, then had a 12-yard run to the Mules' eleven-yard-line.

At this point, Echols took the ball on an end sweep, and beat the Muleshoe defenders to the left corner. Friona had two chances at the PAT kick due to a penalty, but Muleshoe blocked the second one, and the lead was just 6-0 with 5:18 left in the quarter.

The next time the Chiefs had the ball, the blitzing Mule defense did their work, forcing a Friona punt. The ball was centered over punter Stephen Thornton's head, and he had to retrieve it, being tackled at the Friona 16.

Muleshoe took advantage of the break, and seven plays later got on the scoreboard when Michael Dunham crashed over from a yard out. The kick gave Muleshoe a 7-6 lead with 11:10 left in the first half.

Friona answered the challenge. The Chieftains put together a 73-

yard drive to regain the lead. Osborn ripped off a 25-yard gain on the first play from scrimmage, an impressive run that was Friona's longest gain of the ball game.

Osborn gave the team a first down with a six-yard run that moved the ball to the Muleshoe 22, and after the team was penalized back to the 28, he had an 11-yard gain that gave Friona a first and goal situation at the ten yard line.

Echols ran the keeper and dived for the goal-line from about three yards out. But the Mule defense stopped the Friona signal-caller at the one.

Osborn crashed in, to give Friona a 12-7 lead. The Chiefs tried for two points, but Echols' pass was knocked down on the attempt, with 6:14 left in the half.

Friona got the ball back at their own 44 after holding the Mules and forcing a punt.

On third and 13, Echols lofted a perfect pass that Thornton caught over his shoulder in full stride, and ran down to the Muleshoe 12-yard line. The pass play was good for a 47-yard gain, longest pass and run play of Friona's season.

Five plays later, Osborn again crashed into the end zone. Echols danced across for a two-point PAT, and Friona had hiked its lead to 20-7 with 2:20 left in the half.

At the halftime, the blitzing Friona defense, led by linebacker David Bugg, had limited the fired-up Muleshoe offense to only 72 yards.

In the third quarter, the Chieftains backed Muleshoe into their own territory and took over at the Mules' 45 after a punt.

Echols and Osborn took turns advancing the ball, and then Bracken ran 11 yards to the Muleshoe nine. It seemed like a sure scoring drive, but on fourth and goal from the one, the vaunted Muleshoe defense lived up to its pre-game billing, stopping Osborn just short of the goal.

However, Friona again held, and shortly had the ball back at the Muleshoe 27 after the Mules

shanked a punt.

Echols sent Thornton on a post pattern, and threw a strike to the Chieftain receiver, who was all alone in the end zone. Burney's kick split the uprights as Friona hiked its lead to 27-7 before the end of the third quarter.

Early in the fourth quarter, Friona was once again on a drive. Echols raced around end for a nice 18-yard gain, lacking just one block going all the way. Then he repeated with a 17-yard burst that placed the ball at the Muleshoe 30.

Osborn ripped through the line for 13 yards to the 17, as it seemed the team would not be stopped. But Bracken fumbled, for Friona's only turnover of the game, and the Mules took over.

Coach Tommy Moss allowed his reserves to get some experience in the fourth quarter, and matched against the Muleshoe defense, they never could muster a gain.

In fact, the team found itself in a hole at their own eight inside the two-minute mark, and Moss allowed Thornton, the punter, to down the ball in the end zone, giving Muleshoe a two-point safety.

The strategy backfired, however, after a nice kickoff from the 20 was returned 54 yards by Muleshoe to the Friona nine. Echols saved the touchdown momentarily by running the Mule ball-carrier out of bounds at the nine.

Three plays later, the third Muleshoe quarterback, Ronnie Perez, hit Dunham in the end zone, and Dunham ran the two-pointer with 22 seconds left.

The game was a hard one on Muleshoe, whose quarterback, Jeff Hicks, had three bones broken in his foot. The Mules' backup quarterback then sustained a concussion, and Muleshoe had to do some shuffling to come up with a signal-caller.

The win narrowed Muleshoe's lead in the ancient series to 20-16-1, and extended Coach Tommy Moss' personal record against the Mules to 5-2.

"I thought we played exceptionally well. The kids seem

to really get up every week," said Coach Moss.

Opportunities Await Volunteers

The new 4-H year starts in September, and the 4-H program offers unlimited opportunities for volunteers to help young people learn and develop.
4-H is the youth development program of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System. It focuses on the needs, interests and concerns of boys and girls in the third grade to 19 years of age, says Janette Pierce, county Extension agent and 4-H program coordinator. Its aim is to help young people develop through practical learning experiences such as preparing a nutritious meal, building book shelves or growing a vegetable garden.
Since young people do not develop their skills and attitudes overnight, they need and seek guidance from 4-H volunteers who can help them probe the "why" as well as show them "how to do it."

Helping youth develop, however, requires different kinds of leadership, Pierce points out. For those who prefer to work primarily with youth, 4-H offers leadership roles related to the organization, project or activity aspects of a 4-H group. While the "club manager" guides the overall operation of a 4-H group, "project and activity leaders" help boys and girls learn by involving them in a specific project, such as clothing, auto repair and bicycle safety, and related activities such as safety clinics, exhibits and local tours. These leaders, may in turn, be assisted by junior and teen leaders who work closely with an adult or teen advisor.

Volunteers who prefer to work primarily with adults also have a wide range of choices, explains Pierce. A 4-H project or activity chairman helps other leaders with a specific project or activity. A 4-H recruiter seeks out youth and adults interested in becoming 4-H members or leaders, then allows the 4-H organizer to help the new group get started. Volunteers also are assisted by the 4-H trainer who helps train other leaders in the area and by the 4-H resource person who secures special materials or people from the community.

If you are interested in young people, want to share your talents and hobbies, and enjoy meeting other adults with your same interests, consider being a 4-H volunteer.

Contact the county Extension office for more information on the 4-H program and the role of volunteer leaders, Pierce points out.

All programs and information of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are available to everyone without regard to race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap, or socio-economic level.

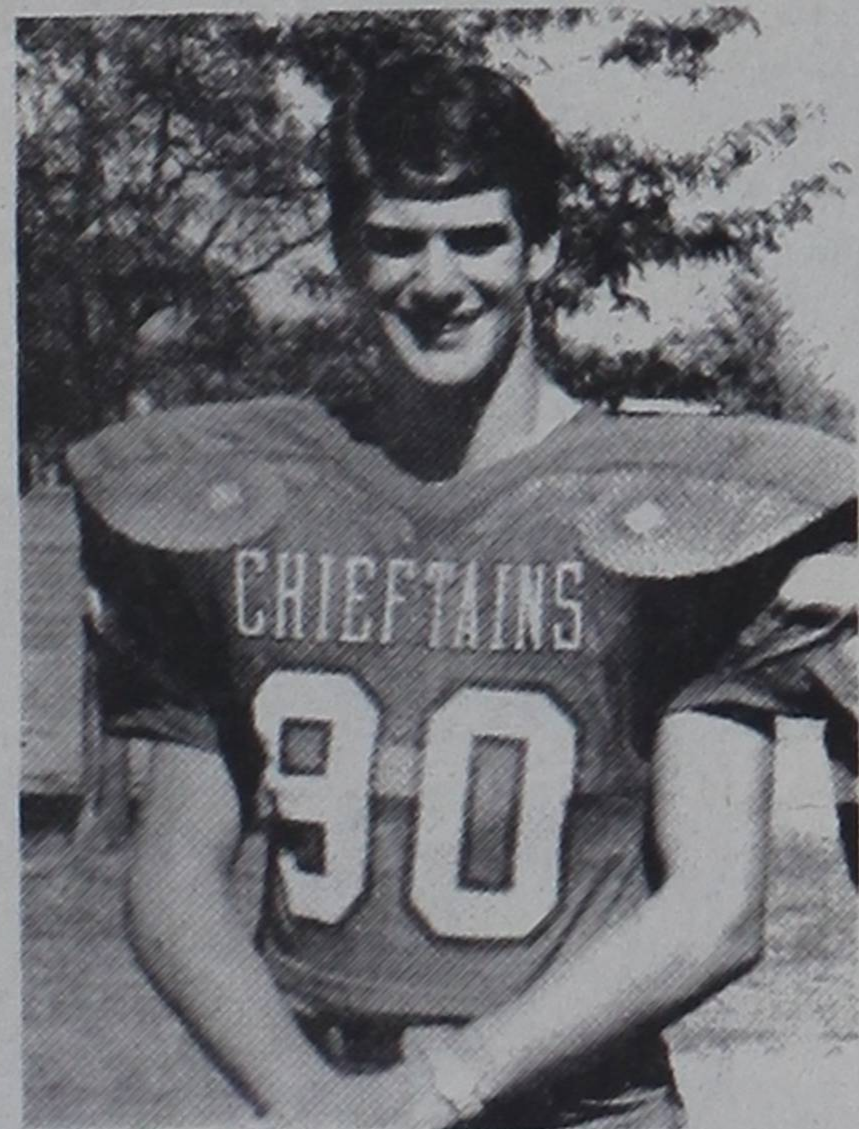

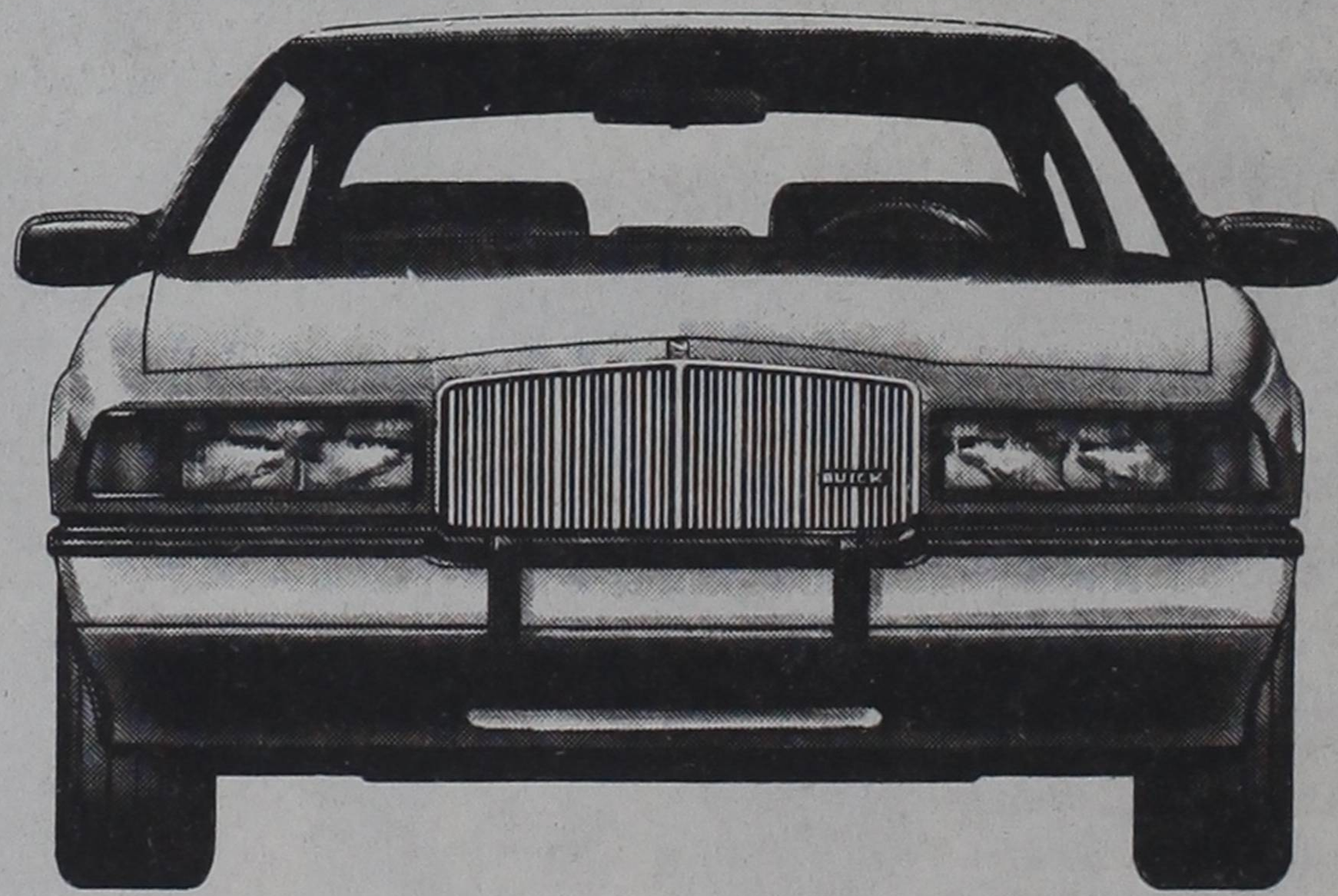

Direct Deposit Does Offer Advantages

Residents of the Clovis area who get Social Security benefits can reap several advantages by taking part in the direct deposit program and have their checks deposited directly into an account in a financial institution, Carl Thompson, Social Security Manager in Clovis, said recently.

Checks are sent directly to a checking or savings account in a bank, savings institution, credit union, or other financial institution rather than to the person's home.

Direct deposit advantages include:

*A person does not have to be home to get the check. The money is available right away.

*There is no worry about the check being lost or stolen.

*There is no need to stand in line to cash or deposit the check.

*A checkbook provides a written record for keeping track of one's money.

To arrange for direct deposit, a person should complete direct deposit form SF-1199. The form can be obtained at any financial institution. A person's Social Security check contains all the information needed to complete the form. A person should check to make sure how the institution will handle the account.

It is very important for people with direct deposit to continue notifying Social Security of any address change so they will receive any notices sent about their benefits.

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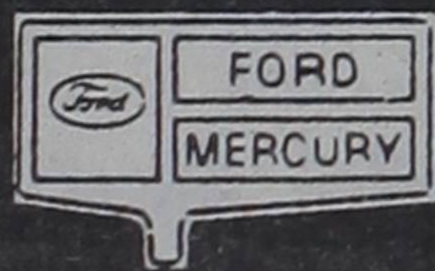
