A LOT OF Friona folks miss out on a real treat about this time every year when they fail to attend the FHS Thespians' annual Fall Musical Production.

Nearly 100 young people participated in this year's presentation of "Carousel" this past Monday and Tuesday evening at the High School Auditorium. They had spent the past month working their little hearts out to learn lines, songs, dances, curtain cues, build sets, etc. They should have played to a packed house both nights.

I feel that we should show the same support to these 100 kids that we show to the 33 youngsters who make up the high school football team. In fact, several members of the varsity football squad were in the cast of "Carousel" and brought down the house with their rendition of the "Sailor's Hornpipe" dance. They did a really super job of it.

The scene stealer of the opening number was a full-scale revolving carousel which had been built by crew members Mitchell Gibson, Bruce Fleming and Lon Outland. I wished they could have brought the carousel back out at the end for the curtain calls, but there simply wasn't enough room on stage.

When you take into consideration the fact that the only vocal training these local kids ever get is from singing in their respective church choirs occasionally, you can appreciate the effort which goes into getting up on a stage in front of the townspeople and performing several solos.

The problem is that their sweet little voices do not travel as far as the back row of the auditorium so there are many times when the audience cannot hear the numbers as well as they should.

It would help immensely if there was a good sound system on the stage with several strategically-placed microphones hanging down from overhead. Perhaps some group will consider getting up a fund for this needed equipment sometime in the future.

Leigh Neelley, Rusty Rainey, Lory Tannahill, Stormi Upton, Daylen Gallman and Heather Griffin did an excellent job with the musical solos. And we'll be looking forward to seeing some good drama presentations in the future from Mark Madrid, Jeff Procter, Tricia Ichtertz and Keith Hancock.

Daylen Gallman, with his flair for comedy, simply stole the show as "Enoch Snow" along with his nine little children. The younger children in the play were just precious and did their parts extremely well.

In spite of a few bobbles here and there, a few missed cues and a few forgotten lines, the youngsters put together a fine entertaining evening and Joy Morton is to be commended for her untiring work with this large group of kids in the Fall Musical every year.

And SHAME ON YOU, if you are one of the ones who missed attending the play.

Results Given For Tuesday's Election

Parmer County voters turned out in record numbers for an off-year election on Tuesday to vote their wishes on the 25 proposed constitutional amendments and the two referendums.

Total vote in Parmer County was 1,444. This was 37 per cent of the registered voter potential.

County voters pretty well matched the trend of voters statewide on most of the major issues.

A big exception was on the referendum proposing parimutuel wagering, voted down in the county by a big margin, 952-465. Statewide, about 56 per cent of the voters approved the issue.

In Friona, the betting referendum was turned down as follows: Precinct 2, 67-24; Precinct 2-1, 236-102 and Precinct 2-1, 78-40.

County voters matched the trend on allowing bonds to finance incentives for the super-conducting supercollider to Texas. The vote there was 963 in favor to 397 opposed.

The most lop-sided vote in Parmer county was Referendum number one, denying Ross Perot's proposal to appoint members of the State Board of Education. A total of 1,157 county voters (82.6 per cent) were against this issue, to 243 favoring.

Local voters were even more heavily against the issue: Precinct 2, 71-18; Precinct 2-1, 306-32 and Precinct 2-2, 104-15. The issue was opposed by 88 per cent of Friona voters.

The county voted against tax exemptions for out-of-use offshore drilling equipment, proposed in Amendment 20, by almost a 2-1 margin, 833-430. That issue passed statewide by a narrow margin.

The two most popular amendments were Amendment 12,

automatic transfer of community property to surviving spouse, by 1,131 to 215, and Amendment 3, homestead tax exemption for surviving spouse 55 years of age or older, by 1,117-273.

County residents voted against proposed loans and grants to encourage economic development in the state, as put forth in Amendment 4, 760-538. The state passed that amendment by a narrow majority.

Amendment 10, exempting non-income producing personal property (boats, RVs, planes, etc.) from ad valorem taxes lost in Friona and Parmer County (684-606), but carried statewide.

Here's how Parmer County voted on the 25 proposed amendments and two propositions:

Amendment 1: State funds for self-insurance pool for grain storage facilities.

FOR: 995 AGAINST: 371

Amendment 2: Rural fire prevention districts tax increase option.

FOR: 554 AGAINST: 766

Amendment 3: Homestead tax exemption for surviving spouse 55 or older.

FOR: 1117 AGAINST: 273

Amendment 4: State loans, grants for economic development.

FOR: 538 AGAINST: 760

Amendment 5: Jointly constructed tollways.

FOR: 376 AGAINST: 865

Amendment 6: State bonding authority to finance new Texas products and businesses.

FOR: 519 AGAINST: 791

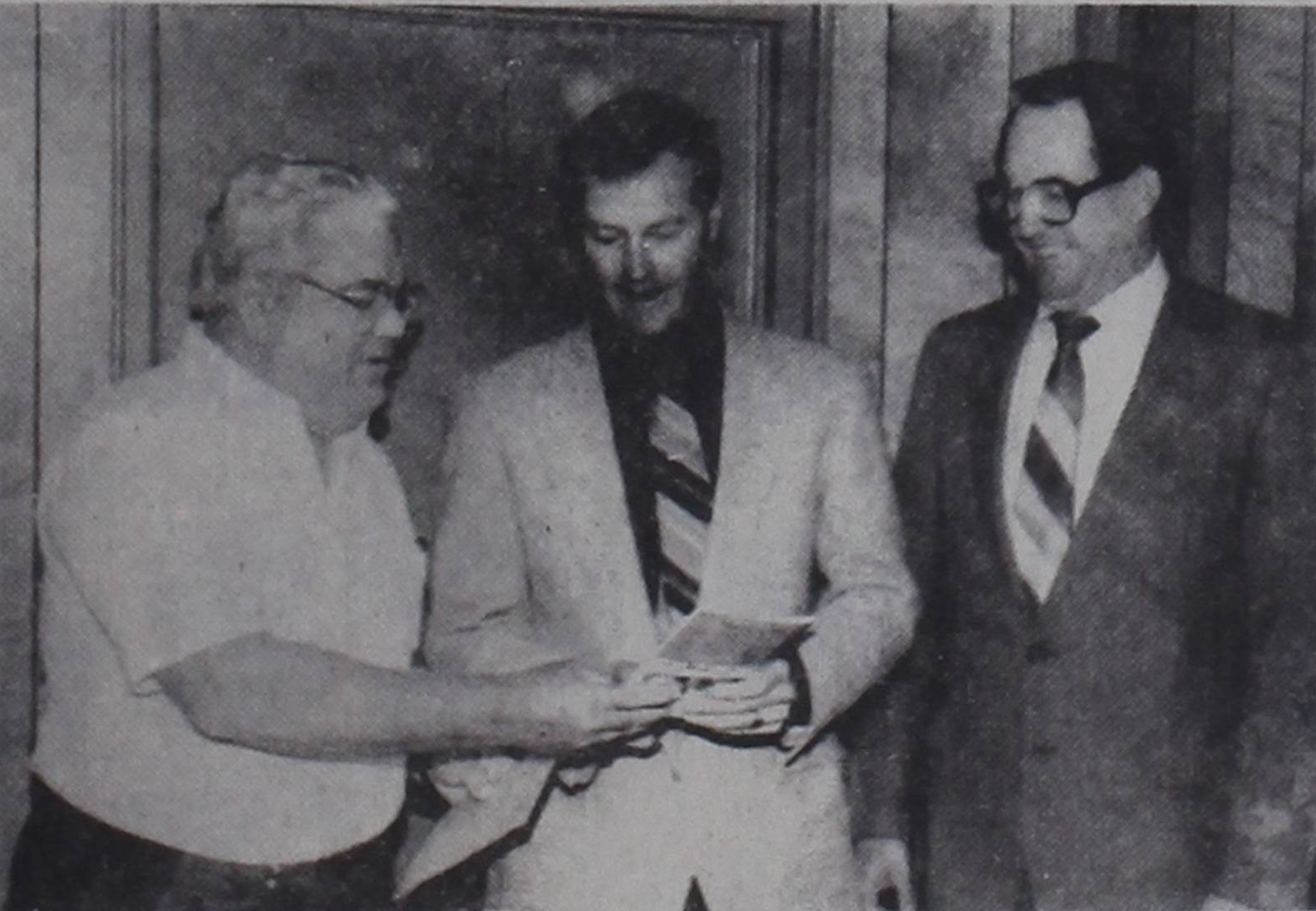
United Way Drive Kicked Off Here

Friona's United Way campaign for 1987 kicked off with a luncheon on Tuesday at the Girl Scout House.

Girl Scout leaders served the lunch, which was provided by Excel Corp. and prepared by Mr. Meat. Decorations and paper goods were provided by Keith Black Enterprises.

Principal speaker for the kickoff luncheon was Donny Carthel, Friona native who is currently serving as head football coach at Eastern New Mexico University.

"I have a lot in common with you as United Way workers," Carthel said. "I have to do a lot of recruiting, as you do, and I have to raise a lot of money for my program to succeed, as you do," he said.

The former Friona Chieftain star said he felt that growing up on a farm as he did helped to give him inner strength. The adversities faced by farmers, calmed by close family ties, have carried over into his work as a football coach, Carthel stated.

Carthel is the son of Bill and Ann Carthel of the Black community.

He said that he made his decision as a seventh grader that he wanted to go into coaching, and never wavered.

Along the way, there were some, already in the coaching business, who tried to discourage him from becoming a coach, but he persisted.

"Looking back, it's hard to figure out why I decided to go into football coaching. In the seventh grade, our record was 0-6-1. In the eighth, we were worse yet, at 0-7-1, and as ninth graders, our team was 0-9," Carthel recalled.

But he said that as a sophomore, Cecil Maddox convinced those on the junior varsity that they could win, and they had a 7-3 season and began to turn things around.

"Winning is a habit, just as losing is," Carthel declared. "Achievements in life come only to those who set goals," he said.

Carthel closed with a proverb that he said he felt was good, and might be used by the United Way workers: "Tell me—I forget. Show me—I remember. Involve me—I understand."

Also introduced at the luncheon were Becky Riethmayer and Allan Haile, co-chairmen of the 1987 U.W. campaign here.

Promotion Is Started

A Christmas shopping promotion has been launched locally by the Friona Chamber of Commerce.

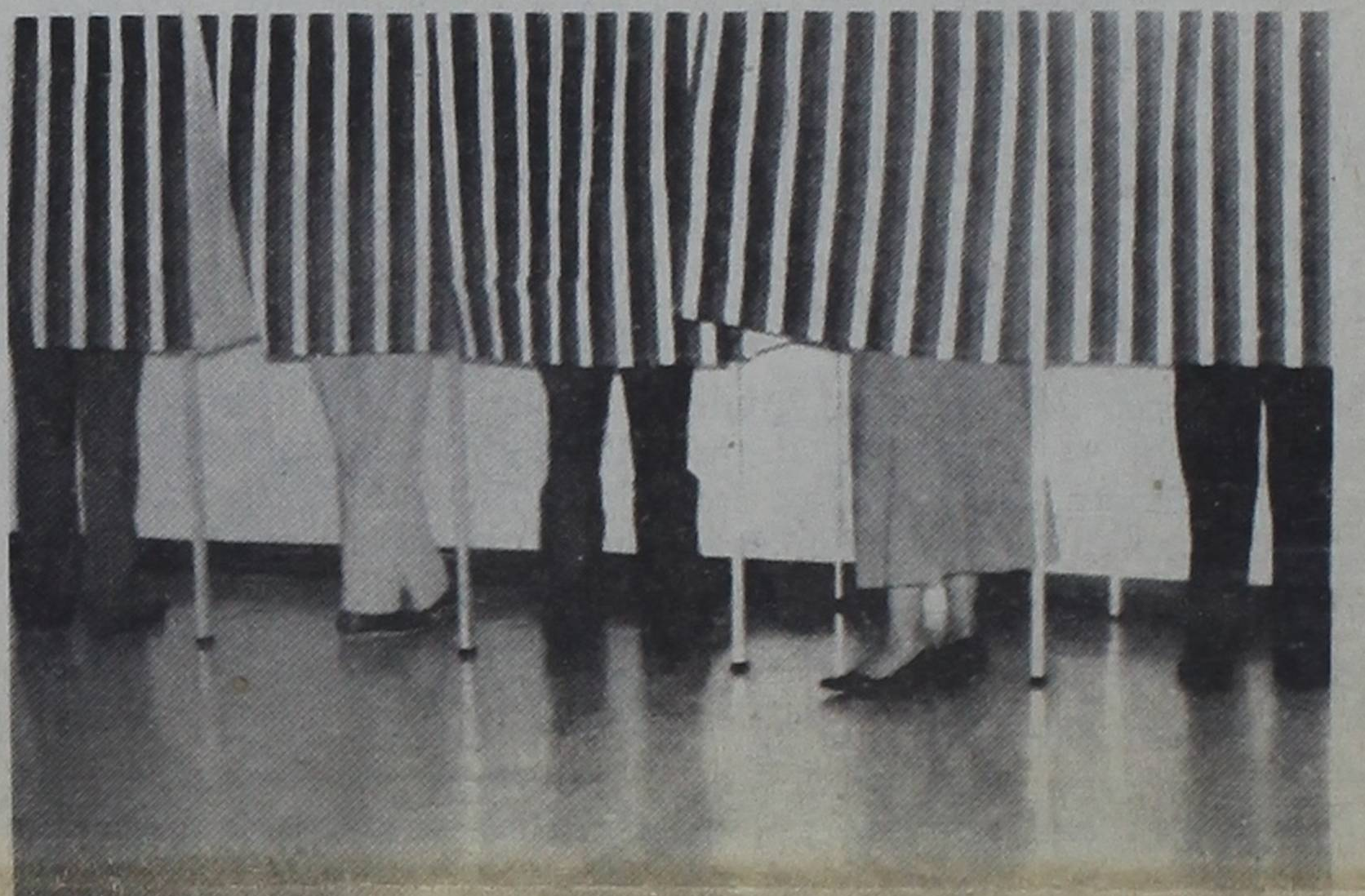
Thirteen retail merchants are participating in the 1987 promotion, during which \$600 worth of Friona script will be awarded in a drawing December 22.

Chiefs, 'Winds In Vital Game

The Friona Chieftains host the Floydada Whirlwinds Friday in a vital District 2-AAA game. For the second year in a row, the game has playoff implications for both teams.

Floydada enters the game 7-2 and 3-1, eyeing at least the number two playoff spot. The Chieftains are 7-2 and 2-2. Their playoff hopes depend on beating the Whirlwinds, and forcing a coin toss between themselves, Floydada and Tulia.

This may seem like a remote chance, but that's the way the Chiefs made the playoffs in 1982.

But the main obstacle may be in beating the Whirlwinds. Floydada has proved to be one of the most consistent teams in class AAA in the area this season. Last Friday they became the first team to score on powerful Littlefield since the opening game in a 24-6 loss.

"Floydada is a good, solid team. They have good size. They are mainly a running team, but can throw the ball when needed," said Coach Tommy Moss.

Floydada's quarterback, Cory Bates, is his team's offensive leader with 465 yards rushing and 624 yards passing. The 'Winds run the wishbone offense.

Friona counters with its Wing-T, also paced by their quarterback, Daniel Echols enters the game with 1,058 yards rushing and 448 yards passing. Ben Osborn has gained 851 yards in the rushing department.

The team got some good news this week when it learned that center-linebacker Albert Trevino, thought out for the game, will be able to play after all. Trevino was injured in both the Littlefield and Tulia games.

The Chieftains hope to finish on a positive note. "At the least, we want to feel that they enjoyed their season. And, going in with a 7-2 overall record isn't too bad," Moss said.

Considering the Chieftains were in a district where for the second straight year four teams had a shot at the playoffs on the last night of the season, it is quite an accomplishment.

55 YEARS AGO--OCT. 21, 1932

During the past ten days or two weeks, cotton has been rolling in to the Friona Gin in a fairly steady stream, to the extent that at least 150 bales will have been ginned by the close of this week. C.S. Waddell, manager of the gin, reports that the crop this season will make an average of one-half a bale or better to the acre. Cotton picking is affording employment to many Friona people who were unemployed.

45 YEARS AGO--OCT. 16, 1942

Since the armed forces have claimed practically all the eligible young men from this territory, many positions have been taken over by women. Our entire force of rural mail carriers is now composed of ladies. Our local bank is wholly in charge of ladies. Our local drug store is now served by two ladies, where a few months ago, all the employees were men. Another lady, Mrs. Wright Williams, is in charge of Uncle Sam's rationing business in Friona.

40 YEARS AGO--

35 YEARS AGO--OCT. 16, 1952

Something most unusual in the "Trade at Home" campaign ideas is being launched in the Star this week--that of a page message in which twelve merchants of the town cooperate in sponsoring. Beside the advertisement of each firm is a caricature of the firm manager drawn by Hut Hutson, Amarillo cartoonist.

Mr. Tom Jarboe, sixth grade teacher for the second year in the local schools, left Tuesday for induction into the Armed Forces at Fort Sill, Oklahoma. Mrs. Jarboe accompanied him.

30 YEARS AGO--OCT. 17, 1957

The Friona city commission Monday night authorized rate increase on two utilities, telephone service and natural gas. Effective date of the phone increase is the "next billing period," according to the ordinance, and the gas rate increase is due December 1, the ordinance is dated.

Easements for a paved farm-to-market road south and east of Friona have been completed, except for one. Clyde Goodwine, just south of town, has asked the

county \$1,000 for an easement involving 4.77 acres. He met with the commissioners court in Farwell Monday and made his request. The county seeks easements across the tracts of land he owns for the required right-of-way on the FM project.

25 YEARS AGO--OCT. 18, 1962

Grain sorghum farmers in Parmer County were all but winding up what had been termed one of the fastest and smoothest grain harvests in the county's history before rains early Wednesday brought an end to the ideal weather which has blessed the season for more than a week.

C.D. Nolan of the Lazbuddie community, delivered the first bale of cotton ever to be ginned at the Friona Farmers Co-op Gin on Tuesday of this week. The bale weighed 475 pounds.

20 YEARS AGO--OCT. 19, 1967

Work was progressing smoothly at Missouri Beef Packers this week, as officials hailed the "Indian Summer" weather as a God-send to their construction work. "We hope it continues like this until about next April," jokingly remarked Doyle Elliott, building superintendent. Elliott pointed out that workmen have finished the floor in the rendering room of the big plant. A large concrete parking area has been completed at the construction site, and work was progressing on a concrete roadway leading from the railway crossing to the plant proper.

15 YEARS AGO--OCT. 19, 1972

Plans for the formal Open House of the Friona Texas Federal Credit Union in the new location at the corner of Sixth and Euclid have been finished. October 15-22 is International Credit Union Week. This week marks the 123rd anniversary of the credit union with credit unions for safe investments, financial counseling and equitable loans. Open House will be held from 2-5 p.m. Sunday, October 22.

10 YEARS AGO--OCT. 23, 1977

Adding to the drama of a huge meteor that lighted up the sky in the West Texas-Eastern New Mexico area Tuesday night was the discovery of hundreds of meteor-like particles in a wheat field by Jack Patterson on his place

northwest of Friona. The special team headed by Dr. Everett Gibson, geochemist for NASA, determined Friday that the rocks discovered on the Patterson farm were not meteorites. They theorized that the rocks were a result of extreme heat which caused the sand to melt--which may have been caused by lightning, or some other heat force.

The Friona High School Band has been chosen to perform at the climax of the 1978 Greater Southwest Music Festival in Amarillo on Saturday, April 29.

5 YEARS AGO--OCT. 24, 1982

Grand Opening for the new Allsup's store on East Highway 60 was held Thursday morning. The newest Allsup's Convenience Store is labeled as "Number 217" in the growing chain of stores, founded by Lonnie Allsup in 1956.

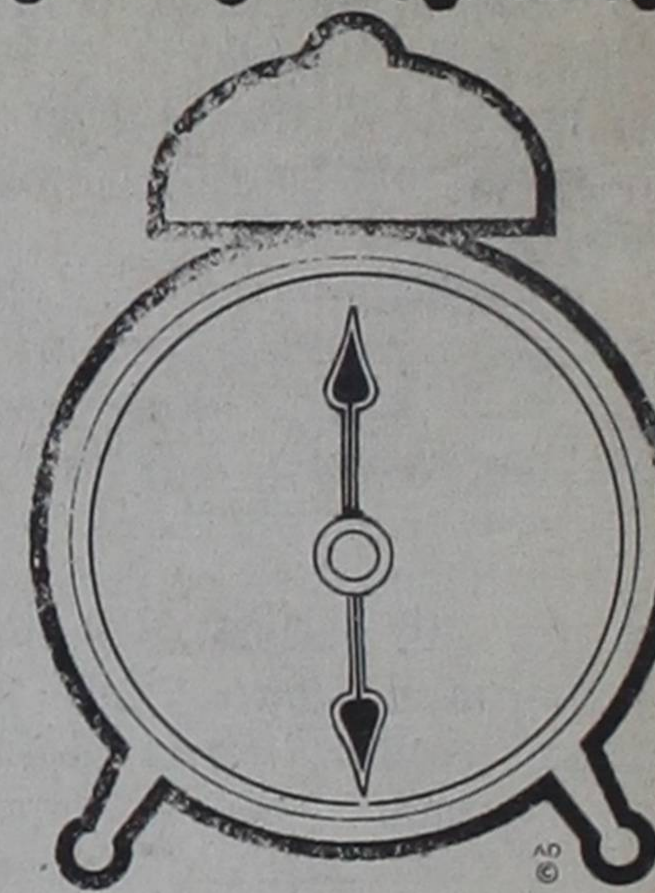
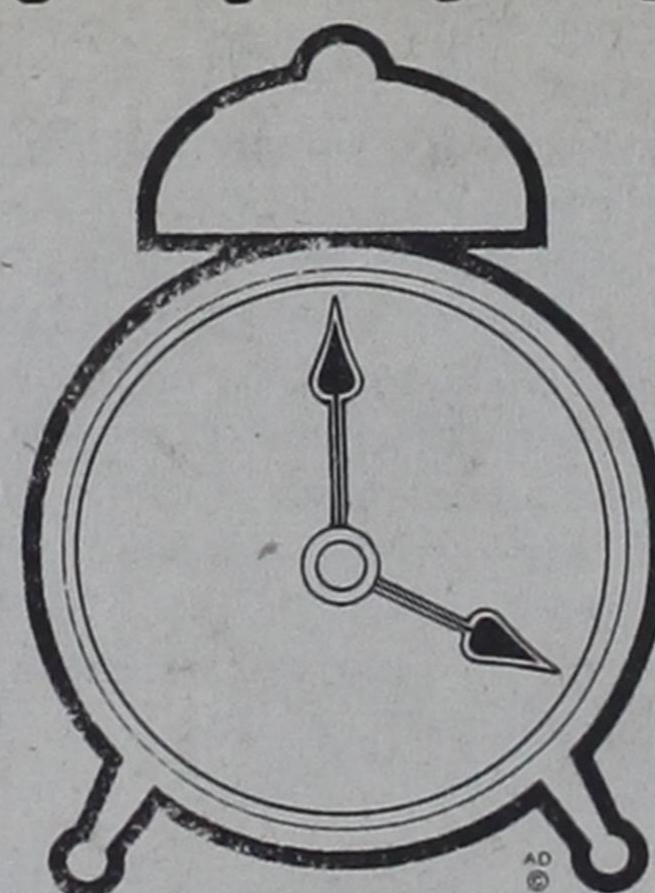

SPC Homecoming Slated On Nov. 21

When South Plains College alumni return to the campus November 21 for homecoming festivities, they will not only have the chance to visit with former schoolmates but also participate in the college's special 30th anniversary celebration.

"We have combined a variety of activities for alumni during this important time in SPC's history," explained Fred Harris, director of development, also who heads up alumni activities. "SPC has undergone many exciting and innovative changes in the past 30 years, and we would like to extend a special invitation to all SPC alumni and their families to visit the college on that day."

Festivities will include The McDonald's Basketball Classic, trips to be given away during the games to Puerto Villarta, Mexico, and Nassau, Bahamas, a dutch treat Mexican buffet, recreation of the college's original dedication ceremony, open house, coronation of the Homecoming King and Queen and homecoming dance.

The day's activities begin with registration, scheduled from 1-5 p.m. in the Student Center's lounge. A rededication ceremony at 2 p.m. in the Quadrangle will feature special guests who took part in the original ceremony on November 2, 1957--Preston Smith, then a state senator who supported the creation of SPC, and Dr. C.C. A huge birthday cake will then be sliced and served to all visitors.

Open house from 3-5 p.m. will allow alumni and other visitors to tour the college's facilities, talk with faculty, listen to performances by SPC's Symphonic and Jazz Bands and country/bluegrass ensembles, and view an art exhibit in the Creative Arts Building by distinguished

Chieftains Bounce Back 28-9 Win Over Dimmitt

The Friona Chieftains snapped their two-game losing streak with a 28-9 win over the Dimmitt Bobcats in a game at Chieftain Field last Friday.

The Chieftains raced to a 21-0 halftime lead, and then coasted to their seventh win of the season, while evening up their district record at 2-2.

Friona quickly drove 54 yards in only six plays the first time they had the ball, to take control of the game.

Cody Bracken rambled for a 19-yard gain on the team's second play from scrimmage.

On a third down play, Daniel Echols lofted a pass on which Terry Widner made a circus catch. Widner jumped, tipped the ball, kept it in front of him, and grabbed it before it hit the ground for a 20-yard gain that gave Friona the ball at the Dimmitt 15.

Ben Osborn then covered the rest of the distance, on runs of ten and five yards. He went in standing up from the five, and Friona had a 6-0 lead with four minutes gone.

Stephen Thornton tried to run for two points from his holding position, but was stopped short.

Dimmitt picked up a pair of first downs, and moved the ball to the Friona 44 before the Chieftain defense stiffened and forced a punt.

Thornton fielded the punt at the Friona 20 with a full head of steam. He got a couple of blocks and headed up the west sideline. Thornton completed the 80-yard run, only to see that an official had thrown a flag and charged Friona with a clipping penalty.

No one in the stands saw the clip, but regardless, the nice run was nullified, at least part of it. Friona took over at the Dimmitt 33.

Osborn ripped through for 13 yards, and Echols ran nine yards to the Dimmitt 12.

On third and goal from the five, Echols rolled out and fired a strike

to Cody Burney in the end zone for a touchdown. Echols then ran for two points and Friona's lead became 14-0 with 23 seconds left in the opening quarter.

Dimmitt made one first down, and Friona took over once again.

Bracken and Osborn each gave Friona first downs with ten-yard runs. Then Widner, who has had great success on the reverse play, ran for "only" 11 yards to the Dimmitt 36.

On a third down play, Echols passed to Widner for 12 yards and a big first down to the Bobcat 15-yard line.

Three plays later, Echols kept the ball, and with some good blocks, zig-zagged his way nine yards into the end zone. Burney's kick was perfect, and Friona had a 21-0 lead with 3:53 left in the half.

The turnover bug really bugged Friona in the second half. Echols was intercepted as the team got a drive underway early in the third quarter.

The next time Friona had the ball, Dimmitt forced a punting situation. The snap went several yards over Thornton's head and all the way out of the end zone, giving Dimmitt two points for a 21-2 score.

On Friona's next possession, a fumbled handoff gave Dimmitt the ball inside the Chieftain ten-yard line. On second down, the Bobcats scored on a pass play, and kicked the point for a 21-9 score.

Friona drove from their own 20 to the Dimmitt 38. A 14-yard run by Echols was the biggest gainer. But on the last play of the third quarter, the team fumbled, suffering its third turnover of the quarter.

The solid FHS defense forced Dimmitt to punt, however, and Friona took over at its 31-yard line.

On third down, Echols dropped back as if to pass, then tucked the ball away and headed upfield. He almost broke for a 64-yard TD run, but was forced out of bounds

at the Dimmitt 16 after a nifty 50-yard run.

Four plays later (and after Echols had another 11-yard gain), Ben Osborn dozed his way into the end zone, and Burney's kick made the score Friona 28, Dimmitt 9, with 7:11 left in the game.

Thornton intercepted a Dimmitt pass and ran it to the Bobcat 34. But Osborn fumbled on first down and Dimmitt got the ball back.

Dimmitt put on their only drive of the ball game, going from their own 34 to the Chieftain four, where it seemed they were a cinch to score.

But Mickey Pena intercepted a Dimmitt pass in the end zone, and that was the ball game. Friona ran out the clock for the win.

The backfield tandem of Echols and Osborn clicked for 151 and 128 yards respectively as the Chieftains snapped out of their two-game doledrums.

The 151-yard performance allowed Echols to go over the 1,000-yard mark in rushing statistics for the season. Echols is the first quarterback, at least in

modern history, to gain 1,000 yards for a season.

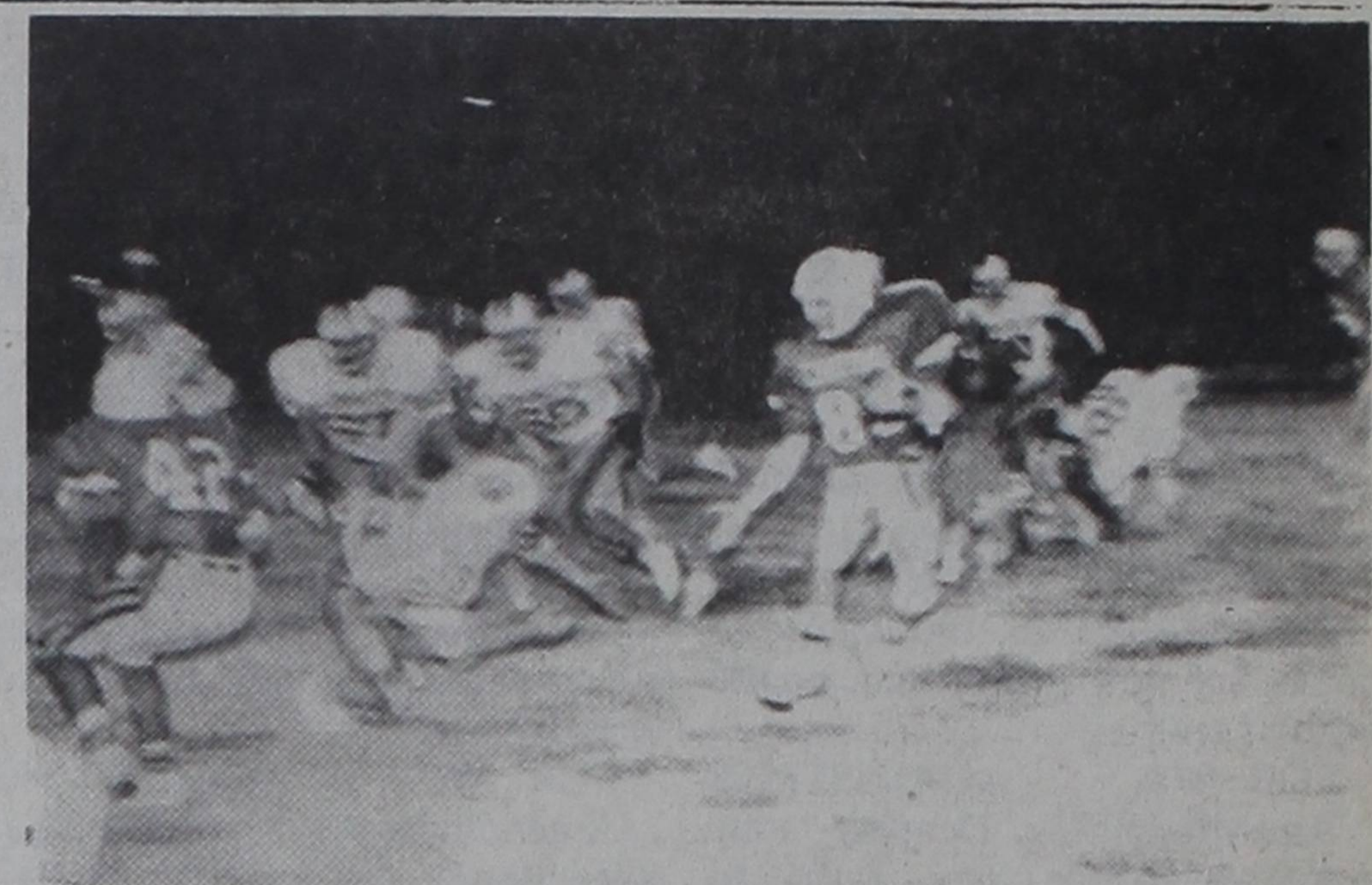
Church Sets Revival

The Friona United Methodist Church will host a revival meeting November 15-17.

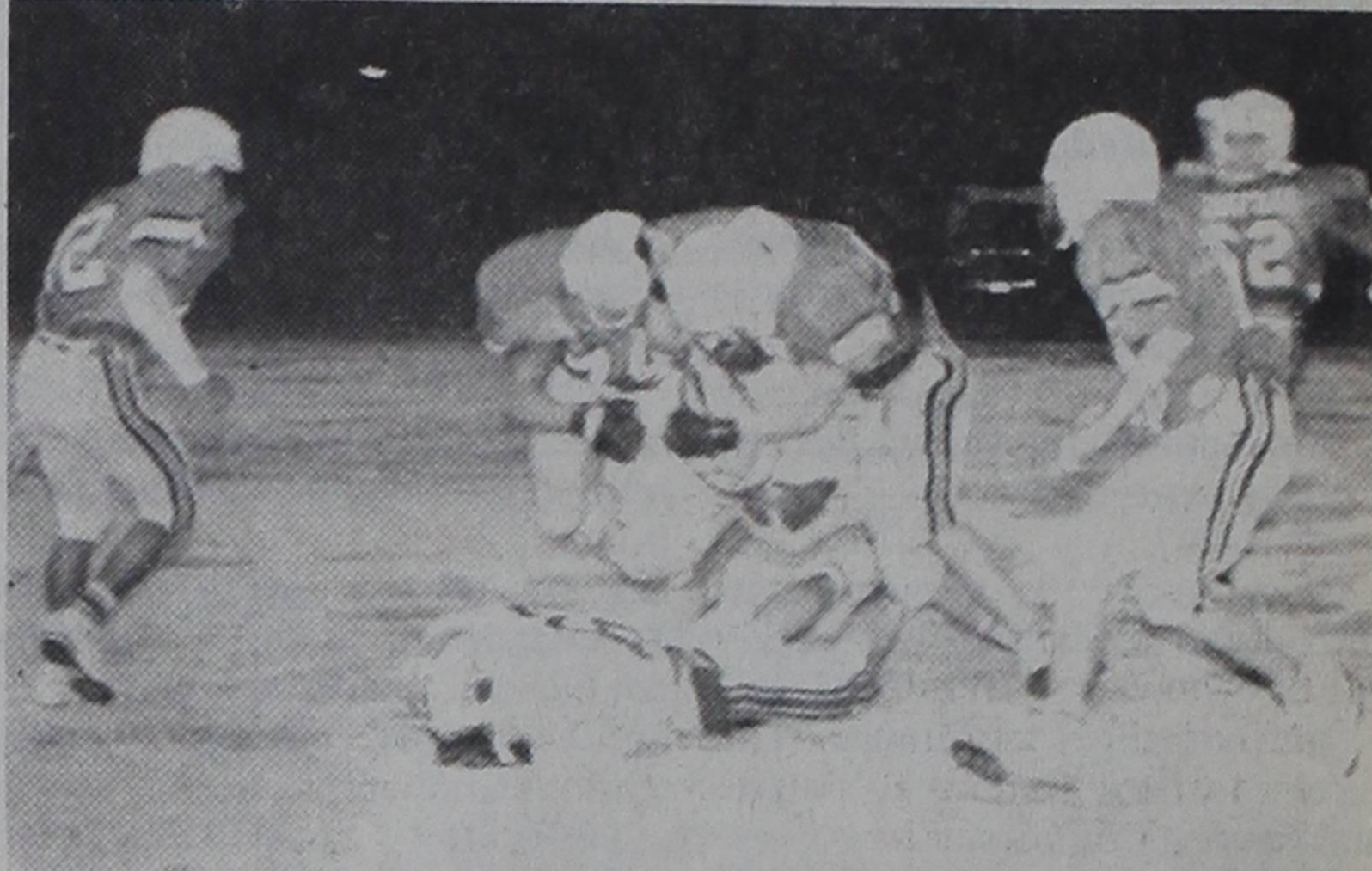

ASCS Official To Speak At Amarillo

The National Grain Sorghum Producers Association will host a "Producer Information" meeting at the Amarillo Farm & Ranch Show on Tuesday, November 17, from 1:30 until 4 p.m. The meeting will be held in the main meeting room of the Amarillo Civic Center.

Terrance G. "Terry" Harman, Texas State Director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) will address producers concerning compliance with the provisions of the farm program for 1988. There will be a planned "Question and Answer" period after Mr. Harman's presentation.

Harman, a Swisher County native, was appointed Executive Director of Texas ASCS in June 1987. He had previously served on the Texas agency for three years as District Director for 12 northwest Texas Panhandle counties. He later moved to Washington, D.C. and served as Regional Director of ASCS for 14 western states. Following that, he served as Director of the Cotton, Rice and Oilseeds Division of ASCS.

Dr. Bruce Boren, Animal Nutritionist and Associate Director of National GSPA, will present an overview of market development and research activities that the association is currently conducting. These activities include poultry feeding in Peru, Morocco, Turkey, Tunisia, Egypt, and Poland.

Established in 1955, the objective of National GSPA is to increase the profitability of grain sorghum production through: 1) market development, 2) research and education, and 3) legislative representation. The association has member in twenty-nine states, with state organizations in Texas, Kansas, Nebraska, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Missouri.

Carson County farmer, Billy Bob Brown, will preside over the meeting. Brown serves on the executive board of National GSPA as vice-president for Research and Education. He also serves as a director for the Grain Sorghum Promotion Federation, and was recently elected to the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board (state checkoff board.)
