WE HOPE THAT last week's story in The Baird Star about Baird's existing water supply will go a long way toward stopping some of the rumors and guesses which have been circulating of late.

ALTHOUGH LACK OF rain and falling livestock prices have taken some toll in this area's business picture in recent months, this country's bank deposit figures all some lightness to the situation.

With bank deposits higher than they were both for last quarter and for a year ago, this area has yet to be badly hurt by weather conditions.

Just one good, general rain would go a long way toward restoring this area's usual bright economic outlook.

County Livestock Producers Ask For Emergency Feed Program

Callahan County Disaster Committee has submitted an application to the state ASC office requesting Callahan County be declared a drought disaster area.

If the request is granted, Callahan County livestock producers will become eligible for an emergency feed program. The application was sent in after the committee met with a group of about 100 livestock producers Saturday night. All the producers felt that the drought was more severe than last winter's dry period when Callahan County had an emergency feed program.

If the application is approved, livestock producers can buy grain sorghum for \$1.51½ per cwt. for foundation livestock and for \$2.02 cwt for other livestock.

Normally it takes six to eight weeks after an application is submitted before any grain is available. Since at the present time, there are no counties designated as drought disaster areas, it may take longer for approval and longer before grain is available.

Committee members are Tommie Harris, chairman of the count ASC committee; John Curry, FHA Supervisor, and Pat Garner, county agent.

Norman Finley Services Held

Funeral for Norman L. Finley, 65, of Abilene were at 10 a.m. Monday in Elliott Funeral Home there. Burial was in Baird Cemetery.

Mr. Finley, a native of Callahan County, died at 11:15 a.m. Saturday in Hendrick Memorial Hospital. He had been confined in the hospital since accidentally shot in the stomach April 8.

Mr. Finley was hit by a .22 caliber rifle slug as he crawled through a fence east of Baird. He had been driving in that area when he spotted a bobcat. He left his pickup to pursue the animal.

A rancher, he was born Aug. 30, 1898 in Callahan County but moved to Abilene 13 years later with his family. He was graduated from Abilene High School and attended Trinity University and Hardin-Simmons University.

He married Katherine Barnes in Waco Oct. 16, 1942. Mr. Finley was a member of Central Presbyterian Church and Abilene Country Club.

Surviving in addition to his wife are a daughter, Kathy Elizabeth of Abilene; two sons, Ross of Farmington, N. M. and Gene Lee of Baird; and four grandchildren.

COUNTY BANK DEPOSITS SHOW OVERALL INCREASE

Deposits in Callahan County banks are higher than at either the end of the first quarter of 1963 or this time last year despite prolonged dry weather which has cut into the area's agriculture picture.

Loans from the three banks also total higher than for either of the two mentioned earlier quarters.

Figures issued in response to a call for report of condition at the close of business June 30 showed Callahan County with bank deposits of \$10,308,409—\$4,869,426 at First National in Baird, \$2,208,551 in Peoples State at Clyde and \$3,230,432 in Citizens State at Cross Plains.

Loans for the same quarter include \$1,309,657 at the Baird bank, \$1,200,613 at the Clyde bank, and \$1,288,792 at the Cross

Teens Eye District Meet

Their perfect record still unblemished, members of Baird's champion teenage baseball team turned their attention from league play to the district tournament this week.

The team will face Burnet, champion of the Lampasas league, at 9:30 p.m. next Wednesday in Brownwood in a first-round District 6 game. If they win the first tilt, Baird will play again at 7 p.m. Thursday. A loss would mean they take the field again at 4:30 p.m. next Thursday instead.

The four-day tournament will end with the championship game Saturday night, with the winner advancing to the state tournament.

Baird ran its district record to 14 straight last Thursday with a one-sided 21-0 romp over Cross Plains, then wound up Monday night with an 8-1 verdict over Carbon.

Tuesday night the team took down Haskell in a practice game, 4-1. The two will meet in another practice match at 8 p.m. this Thursday.

Bobby Smith and Glen Ferguson, picked up by Baird for the tournament trail, handled most of the mound chores against Haskell Tuesday, with mainstay Richard Windham helping out in the seventh.

The three gave up seven hits, walked two and fanned seven.

Baird got only three hits for the night, but bunched two of them with a walk and a rash of Haskell errors to score all four runs in the first frame.

TO STOP SANITATION DEFICIT

City Eyes Trash Fee Hike

Possibility of a 50-cent per month increase in city trash pickup fees is being considered by Baird City Council. The city's sanitation service has cost over \$7,000 more than it has made during the past five years.

If approved, the increase would be an attempt to put the sanitation service on a break-even basis, as well as to provide better service.

New rates would be \$1 per month for residence and \$3 per month for commercial. Present rates are 50 cents per month for twice-monthly pickup in the residential area and \$2.50 per month for three-times-a-week collection in the downtown fire zone.

The trash collection system in Baird was created a number of years ago by the city council in answer to requests from residents. It was placed on a take it or leave it basis, since funds were not available to provide a regular service without bond money.

The voluntary participation service has continued since that time, with only residents or businessmen who were willing to pay for the service getting it. Records indicate the operating

loss for the sanitation service over the past five years:

In addition, the expense of disposing of trash and rubbish has been high. Dump ground pits dug and covered during the last five years cost the city \$1,741.

And the above figures do not include cost of the truck.

The city has made an effort to maintain a reasonable service for the 50 cents per month for residential twice a month hauling, and \$2.50 commercial for three haulings a week in the fire zone.

There are several reasons why the present system is not entirely satisfactory but the main one is that resident have not adhered to the rules and regulations at all times, city officials say.

The present sanitation department was set up to collect residential ashes and rubbish twice a month. Residents were to furnish suitable metal containers

for cans and bottles and to burn all combustible trash, with residue from burning included in the pickup.

The business section pickup was set for three times each week. This schedule was necessary as burning trash in the fire zone is prohibited by law. Paper, boxes and rubbish has to be hauled out of the fire zone to maintain the fire insurance rates.

But many people in the residential section, the city says, have put rocks, dirt and wet garbage (which were not supposed to be) in the trash containers and expected the trash truck to haul everything for 50 cents per month.

The city does extra hauling of tree limbs, and other rubbish — for an extra charge — but this hauling is done only as fast as can be arranged between regular hauling.

While trash hauling fees have not been raised, many Baird residents have expressed willingness to city officials to pay more for more dependable service.

That willingness plus the need to put the city's sanitation service on a break-even basis set off consideration of the possible rate hike by the council.

Housekeeping Best Way to Stop Animals From Eating Metals

A diet of nails and wire may seem odd. But many animals seem attracted to it — to the dismay of their owners.

"Hardware disease," scientifically dubbed, "traumatic gastritis," causes considerable economic loss to livestock producers each year and much of it could be prevented, says County Agent Pat C. Garner.

One of the best preventive measures, he adds, is to keep the pasture, feedlot, barn and barnyard free of stray bits of metal. In other words, a good "housekeeping" program as it concerns the livestock operation will pay good dividends, Garner explains.

The problem is most common among cattle, especially dairy cattle, says the agent. Sheep and goats, being ruminants, are al-

so subject to the disease. The food is swallowed or gulped to be chewed later as cud. Small foreign objects may pass unnoticed into the stomach.

Sharp bits of metal may work their way through the stomach wall. This may cause only a temporary digestive upset if the metal becomes embedded in the stomach wall and surrounded by scar tissue. But the trouble is more serious if the metal penetrates the wall into other organs. The result may be infection or often death for the animal.

Some symptoms of hardware disease are similar to those of other diseases. For this reason, a veterinarian should be called to diagnose and begin treatment as soon as possible.
