## IOOF-Rebekahs Donate To Drive

The Friona Oddfellow Lodge #203 and Rebekah Lodge #308 this week presented a \$500.00 donation to the Friona Heritage Society, for use in refurbishing the old Santa Fe depot.

"The Oddfellow Lodge and Rebekah Lodge have been active in Friona some 29 years, and have had many projects to raise money for a lot of worthy causes in our community," said a spokesperson for the organizations.

"We also help maintain and support a nursing home at Ennis, Texas, and a children's home in Corsicana, Texas, and support the World Eye Bank, among other things," the spokesman continued.

In a recent letter from the Sovereign Grand Master, Percy J. Henry, the local members were notified that the Oddfellows and Rebekahs gave an approximate total of \$175,000 to the Arthritis Foundation and Society International.

One of the fun projects instrumental in helping to raise a part of this money was for each member of the Oddfellows and Rebekahs to donate one cent per pound of their weight.

"We spent a lot of years selling spoudburgers down at the City Park, so we feel that it is only fitting that we donate to the Heritage Society to help with this project, to beautify the park," said Lauretta Brookfield, spokesperson for the organizations.

The Friona United Way chairman Becky Riethmayer has reported that the program has, thus far, fallen short of this year's projected goal by about a thousand dollars.

## Chemigation Is Workshop Subject

DIMMITT--A workshop to help farmers who have center pivot irrigation systems to learn more about their potential for applying fertilizers and insecticides will be held in Dimmitt on Monday, Feb. 22, at the Expo Building.

Many High Plains producers have invested in center pivot systems due to their greater water efficiency and labor saving, said Dr. Allen Knutson, Castro County Extension entomologist. "Some pesticides and fertilizers can be effectively applied through center pivots," he noted.

This practice, termed chemigation, can reduce application timing, Knutson said.

The workshop, to be conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, will emphasize safe and effective use of center pivots for chemigation. It will begin at 8:30 a.m. and end at 3:30 p.m. A FREE catered lunch will be available.

The program will begin with a comparison of the

economics of center pivot versus furrow irrigation by Dr. Steve Amosson, Extension agricultural economist at Amarillo. Application of fertilizers by center pivot systems will be discussed by Dr. Michael Hickey, Extension soil chemist at Lubbock.

Fungicides for chemigation will be covered by Dr. Harold Kaufman, Extension plant pathologist, Lubbock. New regulations by the Environmental Protection Agency regarding chemigation and human safety will be reviewed by Dr. W. Pat Morrison, Extension entomologist, Lubbock.

Insecticides for chemigation will be discussed by Knutson. Chemigation with low energy precision application (LEPA) center pivot application will be the topic of Dr. Brent Bean, Extension agronomist, Amarillo. Chemigation equipment and calibration will be explained by Leon New, Extension agricultural engineer and irrigation specialist, Amarillo.

# Friona Flashbacks

....from the files of The Friona Star

## 60 YEARS AGO—FEB. 17, 1928

An entire train of Holt tractors passed through Friona Monday morning, heading east, supposedly for distribution in the Panhandle country. This was a sight rather unusual in a way; since most all shipments of any kind of farm machinery passing through Friona are headed west. But the Holt factory being in Oakland, California, this train was being shipped toward eastern farms.

## 50 YEARS AGO—FEB. 18, 1938

O.G. Turner of this locality has just completed his invention of a pump and windmill, which will be, perhaps, the most successful invention of its kind yet devised.

The people of the Congregational Church here are expecting the arrival of their new pastor, Rev. Carl C. Dollar, during this week. Rev. Dollar is expected to preach his first sermon locally on Sunday.

## 45 YEARS AGO—FEB. 12, 1943

Approximately 300 people attended a memorial service in the Methodist Church here in honor of Private Arthur Thomas Parker, U.S. Marines, who was reported killed in action somewhere in the Pacific area February 4, according to a telegram to his father, Willis Parker of Friona. So far as is known, he was the first Panhandle serviceman to give his life in defense of his country during World War II.

## 40 YEARS AGO—FEB. 13, 1948

The Lions athletic club tied for first place honors in the Dimmitt Invitational Tournament in which eight teams were entered. Those who played for the Friona team were Ben Allen, Joe Brummett, John Renner, Junior Renner, James White, Rex Dennison, DeWayne Cleveland, Leslie Ford and Douglas Gonser.

## 35 YEARS AGO—FEB. 21, 1953

Friona faculty members held a social Wednesday night with hostesses being Mrs. Wayne Stark, Mrs. John Benger and Miss Evelyn Carey.

Mr. Rodrick Cravens of Houston, partner in the Cravens-Dargan insurance firm of Houston, was a business visitor in the Ethridge-Spring Insurance office this week.

## 30 YEARS AGO—FEB. 13, 1958

Floyd Crume, work unit conservationist with the Friona office of the Soil Conservation Service, has announced his resignation to enter private business, effective February 23. The soil conservationist will become a sales engineer for Tellyer Pipe Company of Friona.

Six men were nominated to fill three upcoming vacancies on the Board of Directors of the Friona Chamber of Commerce. Names of the six nominees, Billy Nichols, Robert Ginsburg, Kenneth Williams, Gaylord Maurer, Joe Ferrell and Hollis Horton, were placed on ballots which were mailed out earlier this week.

## 25 YEARS AGO—FEB. 14, 1963

Some three inches of snow fell Sunday, Monday and Tuesday of this week, bringing some relief to the dry conditions locally. The Friona area had received officially only .02 inch of moisture since last December 1, prior to the snow of this week, which added .20 inch of moisture. Some of the snow drifted considerably, however.

## 20 YEARS AGO—FEB. 8, 1968

After a packed city council meeting room expressed interest in additional safety factors for the school crossing at highways around the school system, the Friona City Council voted Monday to employ two crossing attendants.

Voter registration topped the all-time record in Parmer County by over 1,000, it was revealed this week by Parmer County Tax Assessor-Collector Hugh Moseley. The county will have a total of 3,873 qualified voters in 1968 elections.

## 15 YEARS AGO—FEB. 15, 1973

Two excellent girls basketball teams will square off at 11:30 a.m. Saturday in Lubbock Coliseum in the Region I tournament. Friona (23-6), and Spearman (30-3) will be the opponents. The two teams met in the finals of Friona's invitational tournament last December 2, with Spearman making off with a one-point win, 36-35.

## 10 YEARS AGO—FEB. 26, 1978

Joan Carson of Bovina won Grand Champion Steer honors last week at the Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show. This was her second county

title in three years. She won with a 1191-pound Charolais cross. Joe Reeve, 13-year-old 4-H Club member from Friona, became the first Friona youngster in 18 years to claim the Grand Champion Barrow honors. He won with a 242-pound Duroc. Tim Garner of Bovina had the prize lamb, a 109-pound medium wool entry.

Young showmen from Parmer County will receive a total of \$66,343.42 for their efforts at the Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show, a tabulation this week by show officials revealed.

## 5 YEARS AGO—FEB. 20, 1983

Two members of the Friona Chieftains' 1982 football team, which made the playoffs for the first time in 17 years, have been signed to scholarships. They are Mark Montoya and Michael Chaney. Montoya, kicking specialist for the Chiefs, was signed to a scholarship by the University of Texas at El Paso by UTEP staff member Donny Carthel. Chaney, a tackle, was signed by McMurry. Coach Tommy Moss says he is hopeful that other members of the team will be offered scholarships.

## Hulsey Seeks 2nd Term

Poppy Hulsey has authorized this newspaper to announce her candidacy for the Second Texas Silver-Haired Legislature.

The Texas Silver-Haired Legislature will consist of 116 elected representatives from the 28 Area Agency on Aging Districts. Four of these will be elected to represent the Panhandle, which is divided into three areas for voting.

The southern area includes these 11 counties: Swisher, Castro, Parmer, Deaf Smith, Brisco, Hall, Oldham, Wheeler, Donley, Collinsworth, and Gray. Voting for members of the second Silver-Haired Legislature will be held on May 24, 1988, and if there are no polling places in your county, there will be absentee ballots available. A voter must be registered to vote in Texas, 60 years of age by Jan. 1, 1988, and live in the area in which you vote.

# Technology Helps Student's Art Interest

Innovation and modern technology have joined forces to make a dream come true for one Texas Tech student.

Jamie Herring, a sophomore arts and sciences undecided major, was forced to make changes in her lifestyle three years ago when an accident left her confined to a wheelchair. Despite the limitations caused by the inability to use her hands or arms, Herring refused to give up one of her dreams the desire to pursue artistic endeavors.

More than a year ago, James Koerlin, director of the biocybernetics lab in Thompson Hall, began working to make Herring's dream a reality. A year of planning was culminated during the Christmas holidays with the arrival of a new Apple Macintosh SE computer that enabled Herring to enroll in art classes at Tech and allow her more independence.

When all the programs are installed, Herring will be able to control her environment with the computer.

Koerlin said she will be able to dim the lights in her room or turn them on or off. The system will control the thermostat in the room and can be programmed to operate any electrical device, including the telephone, he said.

The Macintosh also can turn pages for Herring when she reads and is equipped with a several programs, including a slide show and a music program.

The word processing program, which is linked to a color printer, was written for Herring by Koerlin. He said the program was expanded to include accommodations for other disabilities and now is being distributed nationally.

Herring operates the Macintosh with the use of a headset devised by Koerlin. The headset is equipped with infrared sensors that communicate with the computer. The sensors track the motion of her head, and Herring activates commands by sending a puff of air to the computer through a straw.

A Macintosh II, which is housed in the Advanced Technology Learning Center in the Tech library, offers Herring even greater opportunities to pursue her interest in art.

The computer in the ATLC lab can be equipped with the Pixelpaint program, which Koerlin said will provide Herring with a creative outlet.

"Jamie will be able to mix colors just like a person with a palette," Koerlin said. "She will be able to soften colors or to add depth."

"Computer hardware and software exists which could allow Jamie to be a commercial artist on a competitive basis."

Herring is a pioneer in the field of computer art for the disabled, Koerlin said, and the paperwork and bureaucratic process involved in acquiring the computer system for her moved slowly.

"This is a ground-breaking event, a step in a new direction for the Texas Rehabilitation Commission," he said.

The TRC, which provided Herring with the computer, never has purchased a Macintosh before, Koerlin said.

Koerlin also works with Scott Tooke, who has cerebral palsy. Koerlin recently installed a new computer tray on Tooke's wheelchair. Tooke uses the tray to communicate with others.

Koerlin said he eventually hopes to patch Tooke's tray into Herring's system to increase his communication capabilities.

Although Herring and Tooke are the only students on campus receiving assistance from the Tech biocybernetics lab, Koerlin said he would like to expand the lab's aid to the blind and deaf.

"I have the greatest job in the world. I am absolutely sure I do," Koerlin said. "It is great to be able to

go home and tell my wife about Jamie or Scott's latest adventures, or to look forward to helping others in the future."

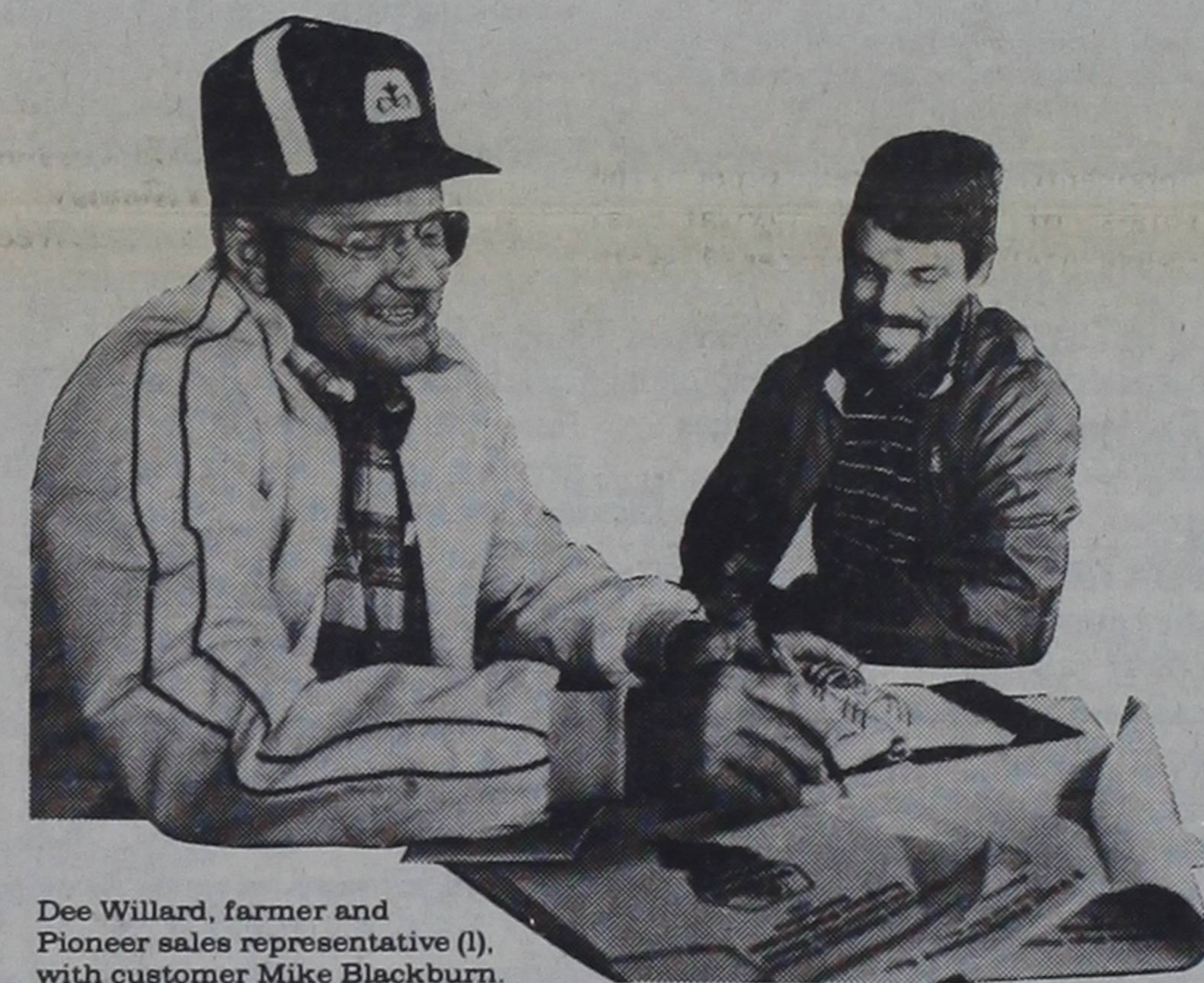

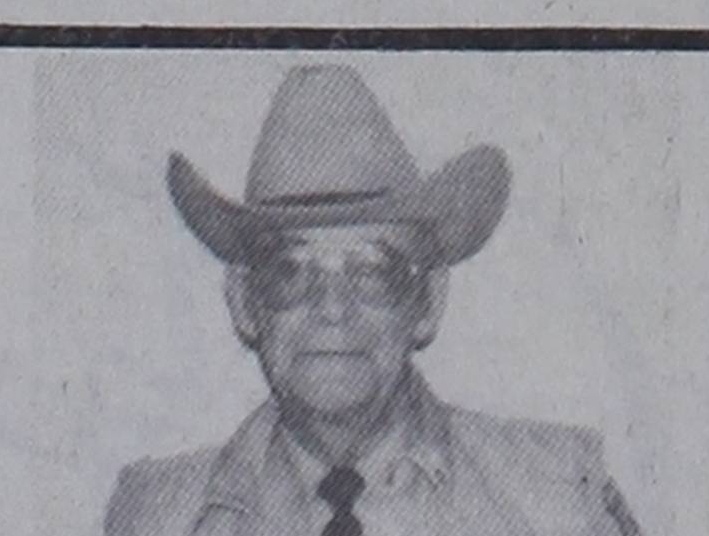

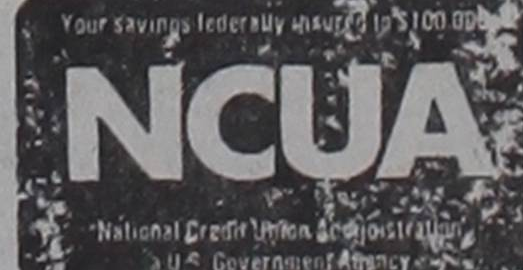

# Chieftains Top Mules To Place Fourth In District

The Friona Chieftains scored a win over Muleshoe in overtime as their district season wound down. The win enabled the team to finish with a 2-3 second-half record in district, good for fourth place.

The game, played at Muleshoe last Friday, February 12, showed some of the best scoring balance by the team all season.

Daniel Echols scored three first-quarter baskets, Brent Riethmayer came up with a pair of baskets and a free throw, and Cody Burney scored two field goals as the Chieftains took a 19-12 lead after one quarter of play.

Echols continued hot in the second quarter, with two baskets and two of three from the line, and Riethmayer likewise hit a pair from in close and was two of five from the line. Rusty Rainey pitched in a pair of field goals, and Friona went to the intermission leading the Mules, 38-30.

The Chieftains' scoring fell off in the third quarter. Burney got two baskets and a free throw, and Rainey had three points, but the Mules pulled ahead, 49-48 at the third quarter buzzer.

Echols canned a pair of layups and made a free throw for the Chiefs in the final quarter, as regulation time found the two teams tied at 58-all.

The Chieftains were determined, and outscored the home team, 5-0 in the three-minute overtime for the win. Riethmayer had Friona's only field goal, and one-pointers were added by Echols, Glen Trimmell and Burney.

Four players scored in double figures, with Echols sacking 20 points in his final basketball appearance for FHS, Burney having 15, and seniors Riethmayer and Rainey bowing out with great performances with 14 and 13 points respectively.

The Chieftains hit 17 of 45 from the field, 38 per cent, and 15 of 27 from the line, 56 per cent. But where they won the game was on the board, where they had an eye-popping 65-15 edge over the

Mules, completely dominating the boards.

Riethmayer had the unbelievable total of 21 rebounds; Rainey had 13, Burney 11 and Echols 10.

"We were in complete control. I felt confident all the way, even though the game went into overtime," said Chieftain Coach T.J. Parks.

On Tuesday, February 14 the Chiefs visited Dimmitt to finish their season, and fell to the potent Bobcats, 90-43.

Friona stayed in the game for awhile, trailing just by five, 18-13 at the end of a quarter. Daniel Echols had six points and Cody Burney five (including a three-point basket).

But the 'Cats turned on the steam with 23 points in the second quarter, 21 in the third and 28 in the fourth, to wrap up the district title with an unblemished record.

Echols scored 19 points to pace Friona's scoring, the only Chieftain in double figures.

Eighteen members of Modern Study Club met on February 16 at the Womens Club House.

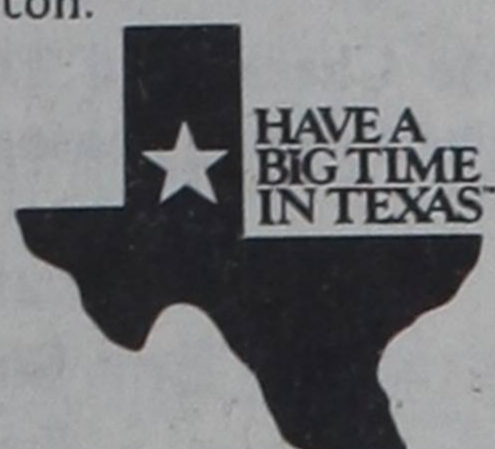
Roll call was answered with "A tribute to Farmer County Community Hospital."

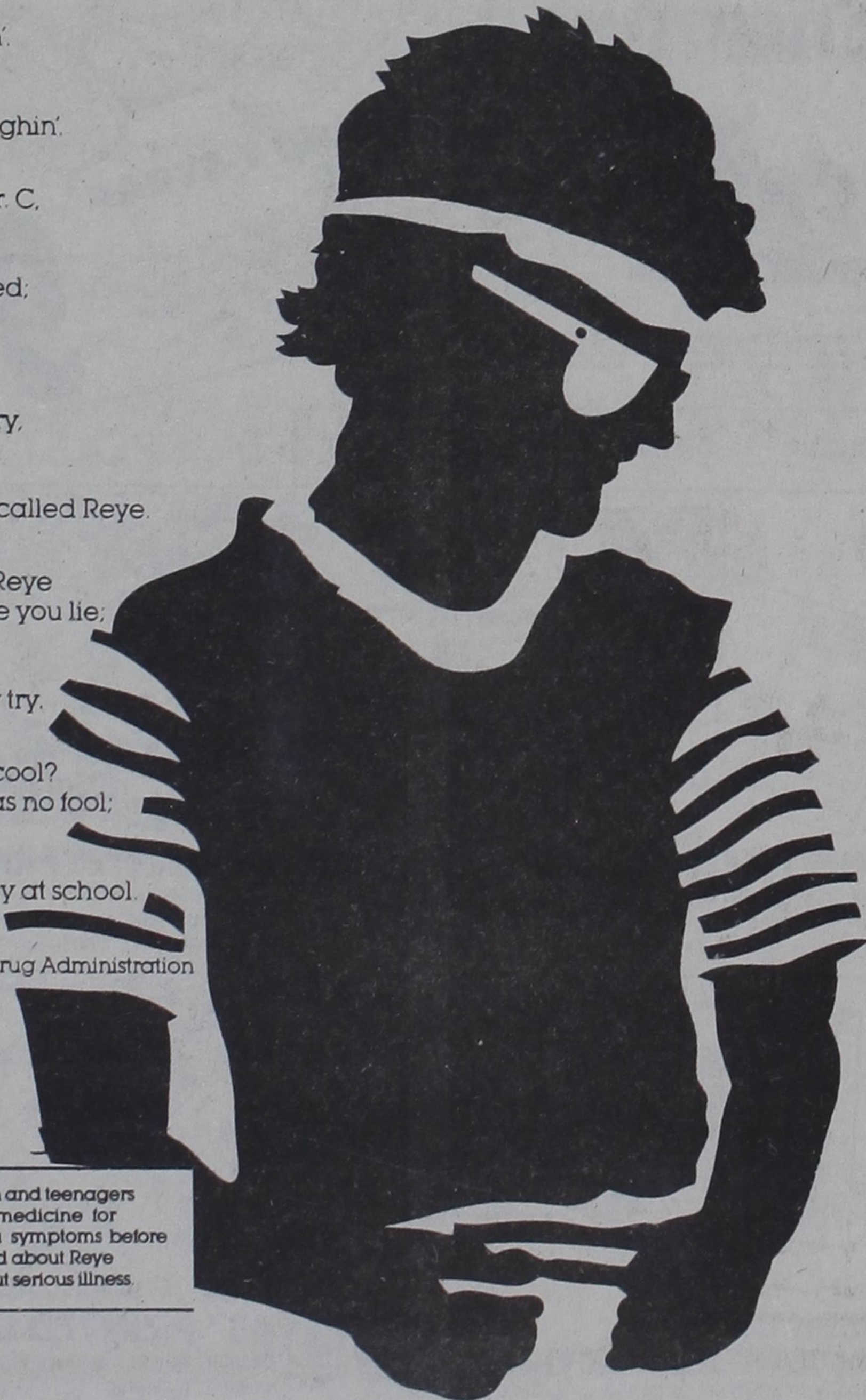

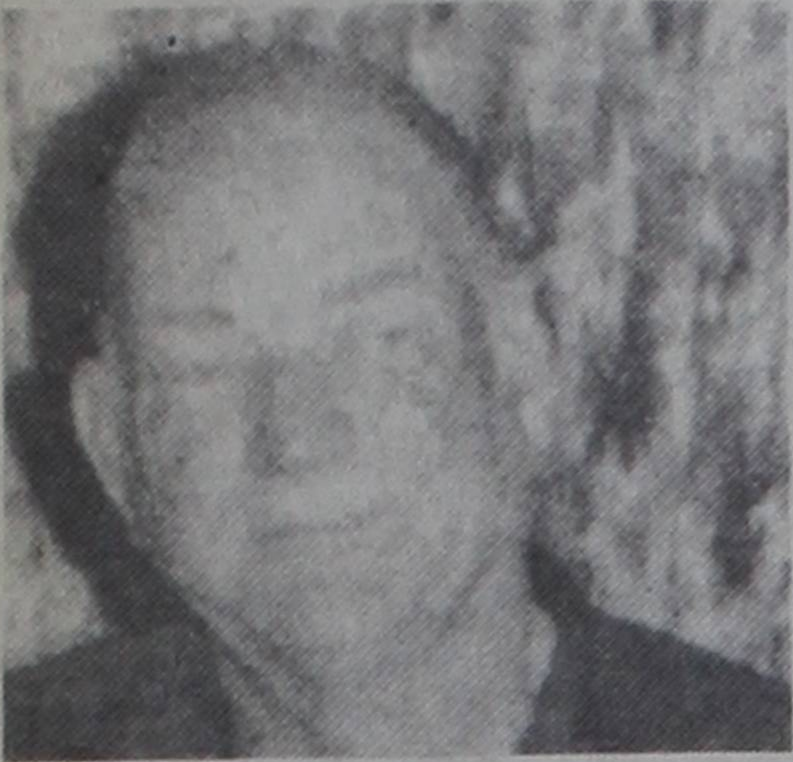

# Ruben Taylor Tells About His Career As A Fireman

Not long after moving to Friona in 1945, Ruben Taylor began serving as a volunteer fireman. He retired from the local fire department recently, after giving over 42 years of volunteer service.

In a recent interview, Taylor told how the department's ability to fight fires has improved.

When he first became a fireman, the fire department kept its equipment at different places in the city. A trailer with fire hoses was located at one place, and the truck would be housed at another location.

After a fire, hoses were washed by hand, hung outside on a rack to dry, rolled and loaded on a trailer, again ready for use. Today an automated

washer and dryer accomplish this work in far less time than in the old days.

Taylor pointed out that Friona citizens have worked to acquire good equipment for the fire department. "The people of Friona have really supported our money-raising projects that the fire department has undertaken in order to purchase equipment," Taylor said.

Taylor remembers the fire at PACO Feed Yard as being the one which took him the longest to fight. That fire involved haystacks and burr piles, and was complicated by wind. Bovina, Hereford and Muleshoe sent units to the fire to assist in its control.

He names the toughest fire as the one at the old locker plant. Answering the alarm just before midnight, firemen fought the blaze all through the next day.

The walls of the old plant were thick and made of solid redwood. The weather was bitter cold, causing ice to form over the fire hoses, pinning them to the ground. Some of the firefighters sustained frostbite to their ears while working on the fire.

What motivates firemen to keep fighting fires for so long? Most firemen describe it as a sense of service to their community.

Ruben Taylor summed it up saying that when the fire alarm goes off, to him it is saying, "Hey, Ruben, I need some help." As a fireman, Taylor has done his share of the helping.

Even though he has retired from the force, he still helped out at a recent fire, advising, directing rookies, feeding work-weary firemen in the dark.

It is apparent that a man cannot fully retire from doing what he loves to do.

It is good to see the spirit of volunteerism in practice here in Friona.

The fire department acknowledges that it will miss the experience Taylor represents but is confident that this experience can be called upon any time it is needed.

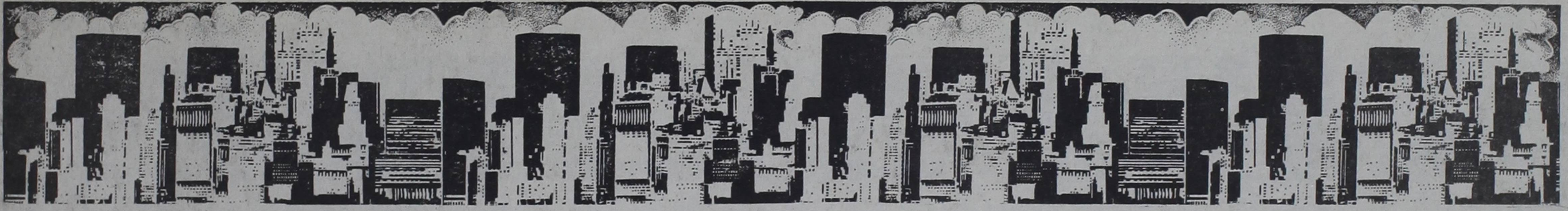

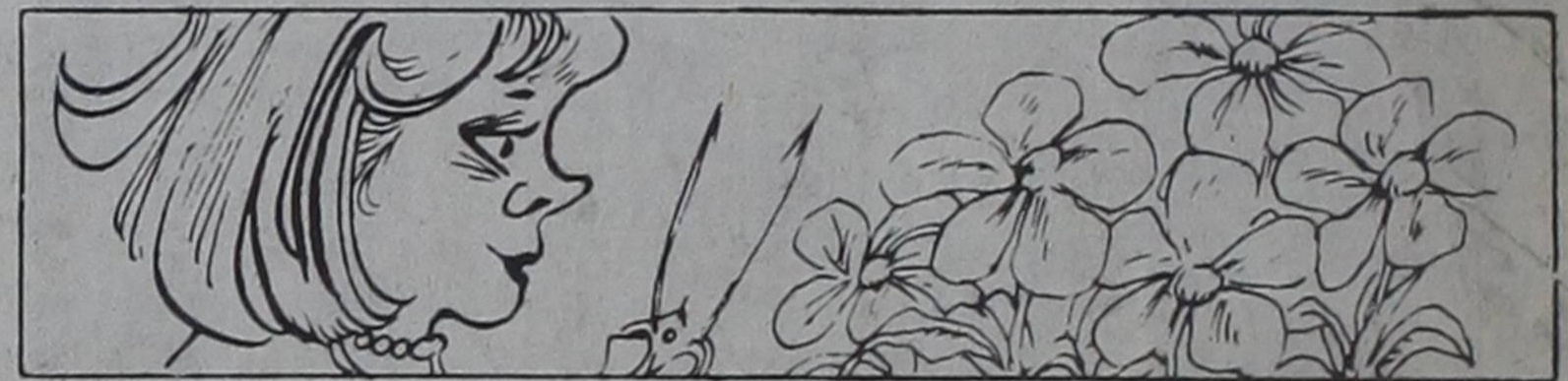

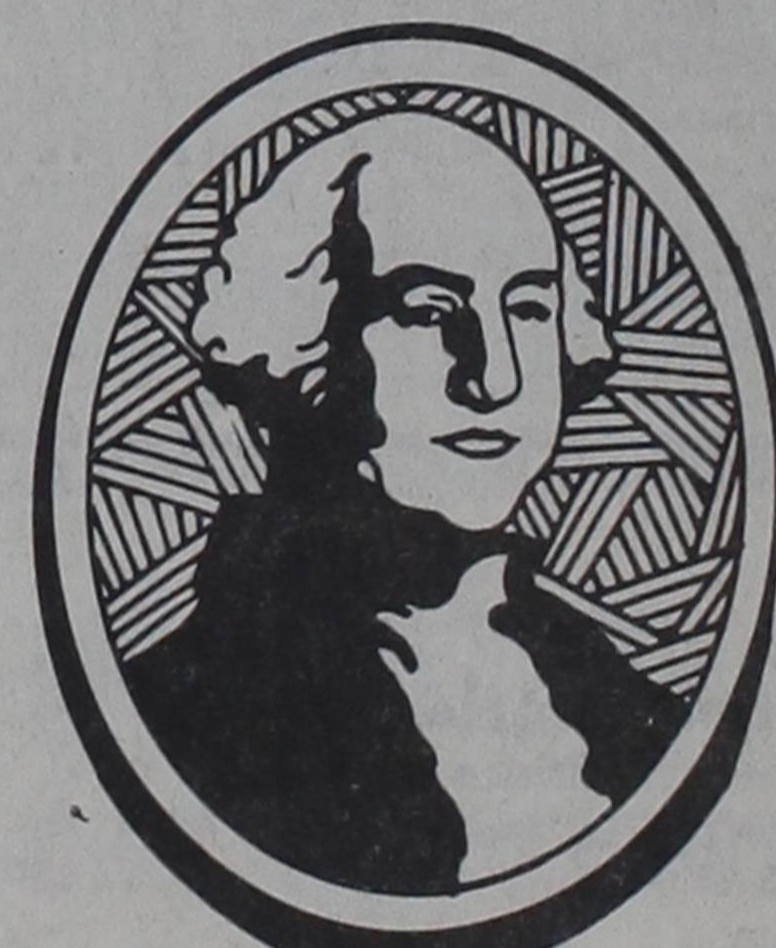
