60 YEARS AGO—MARCH 16, 1928

Whether to remain a village or to become an incorporated town with a commission form of government will be decided by voters of Friona on Monday, March 19, the date set for the special election.

Mr. F.T. Schlenker, whose farm is about 14 miles west of Friona, last week sold sixty head of graded Hereford cows, for the sum of \$4,000, or an average of \$66.66 per head.

50 YEARS AGO—MARCH 11, 1938

At a recent meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Friona Independent School, Prof. O.M. Stewart was re-elected to the position of superintendent of the school for the next term.

Work on the new highway 33-60 through Parmer County has been progressing at a very satisfactory rate during the past two or three weeks. The first layer of caliche has been laid and packed between the Deaf Smith County line and the eastern edge of Friona.

45 YEARS AGO—MARCH 12, 1943

After having served as pastor of the local Baptist Church for more than five years, Rev. Joe Wilson recently tendered his resignation, and plans to accept a similar position at Sundown.

Miss Charline McFarland of Friona is doing practice teaching in the Lubbock public schools this semester. The daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J.B. McFarland, she is a senior public school music major.

40 YEARS AGO—MARCH 12, 1948

Joint funeral services for George S. Stowers and Alvin A. Crow, victims of a tragic rail crossing crash at South Main Street last Friday, were conducted Sunday afternoon at the Friona Methodist Church.

35 YEARS AGO—MARCH 12, 1953

The staking of lines of the West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative has now been completed in Parmer County. Four exchanges are to be located in this county, as follows—Parmer, 3 miles north and 7 miles west of Friona; Hub, 3 miles south and 4 miles east of Friona; Tharp, 3 miles north of Bovina, and Oklahoma Lane, 1 mile northwest of Lariat.

30 YEARS AGO—MARCH 12, 1958

Friona's Squaws bowed out of the running for the Region I girls' basketball (Class A) tournament in Lubbock by a score of 54-74. The White Deer girls went on after the win over Friona to trim defending champion Ropesville 77-61 Saturday night in the Class A finals.

Foul weather cancelled the appearance of Congressman Waggoner Carr at the annual Chamber of Commerce Banquet Wednesday night.

A special Open House is slated for Tuesday at which the people in this area will get the first look at the new Case tractors with years-ahead styling, engineering and performance. 25 YEARS AGO—MARCH 14, 1963

20 YEARS AGO—MARCH 7, 1968

A late-winter blizzard interrupted the Friona area's spring-like weather early this week, but the cold front brought additional moisture to farmland, which now is in the best shape moisture-wise that it has been for many seasons at this time of year. The City of Friona measured a total of .40 inches of moisture in the form of rain, drizzle, sleet and snow.

5 YEARS AGO—MARCH 13, 1983

He won the points title with 580 points, and 18-year-old Richie Herring, who finished 50 points behind Cash in fifth place, made Friona one of the most respected drag-racing towns in the Texas Panhandle last season.

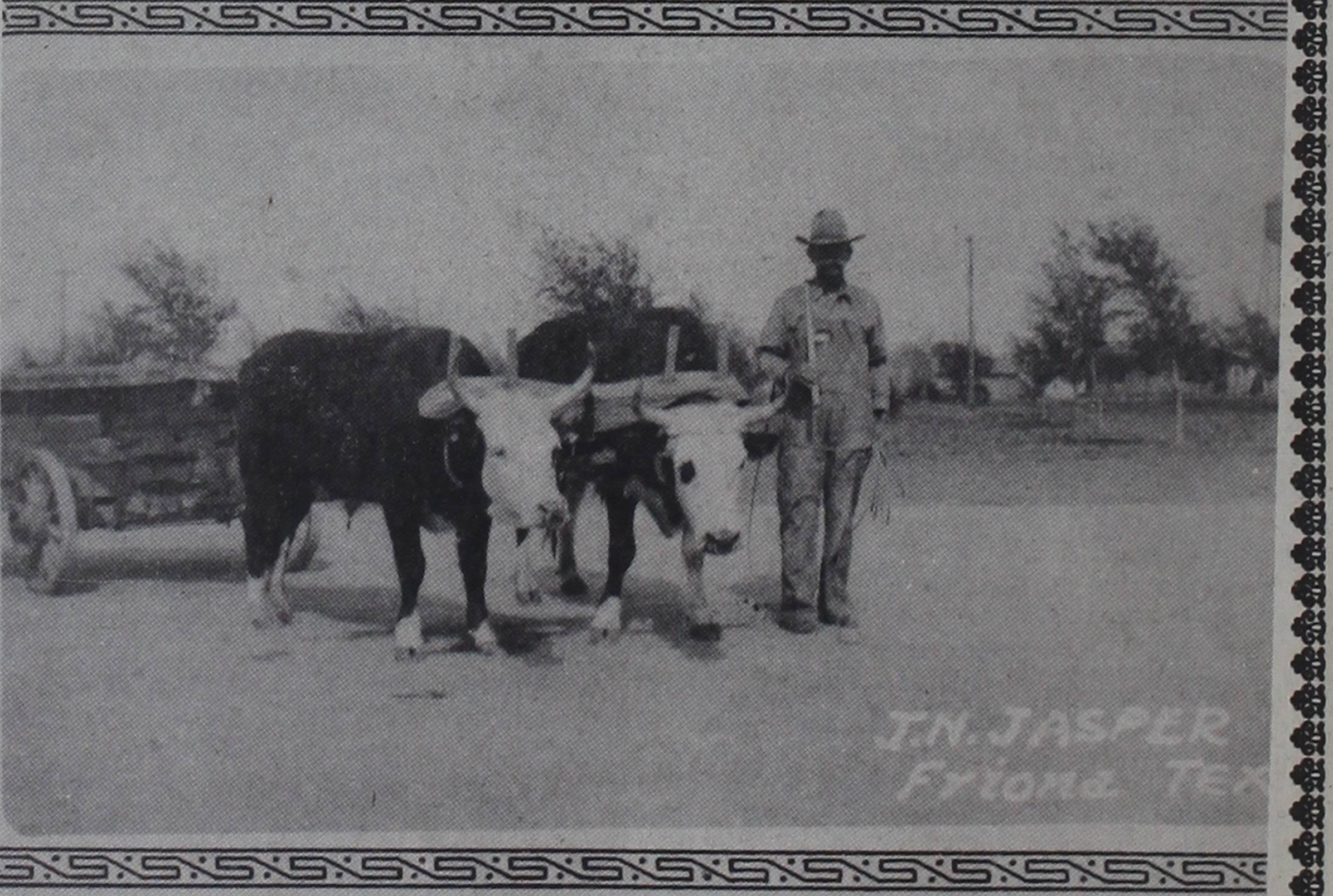


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Remember When...




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Schilling Rites Held In Slaton

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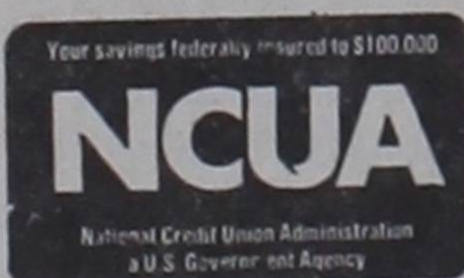

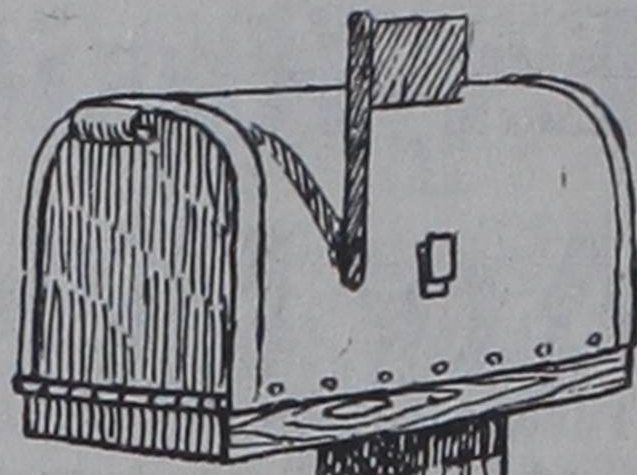

Dear Sir:

As a member of the West Texas State University Foundation Board, I feel it is time we recognize what a real asset WTSU is, not only to Amarillo and Canyon, but to the entire region. A large percentage of our graduates stay in the Amarillo and Canyon area and make major contributions to the area of banking, nursing, technology, teaching, agriculture, accounting, computer science and management.

West Texas State University plays a major impact on the cultural enhancement of the Amarillo area through its faculty involvement in such groups as the Amarillo Symphony. More than 50 per cent of the Symphony's principal musicians are derived from the Department of Music and Dance. The Harrington String Quartet is funded by a grant from the Harrington Foundation, and performs regularly throughout the Panhandle area.

Independent of the jobs that are filled from our graduates at West Texas State and the cultural impact this university has, it is important to point out that WTSU has an economic impact of 100 million dollars to the Amarillo area on an annual basis. Court Justice, place 1 race.

Raul Gonzales outpolled Art Vega, 581-472 for the Justice of the Supreme Court, Place 2 nomination. Mike McCormick received the most votes for Presiding Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, 632-474 over Ron Chapman.

Commissioners Ernest Anthony and Robert White were nominated for re-election without opposition, as was county Democratic Chairman Wendol Christian.

In the referendum proposition, leaving Texans the right to select their judges by a direct vote of the people rather than by appointment, this carried by a huge margin in Parmer County, 1348-192.

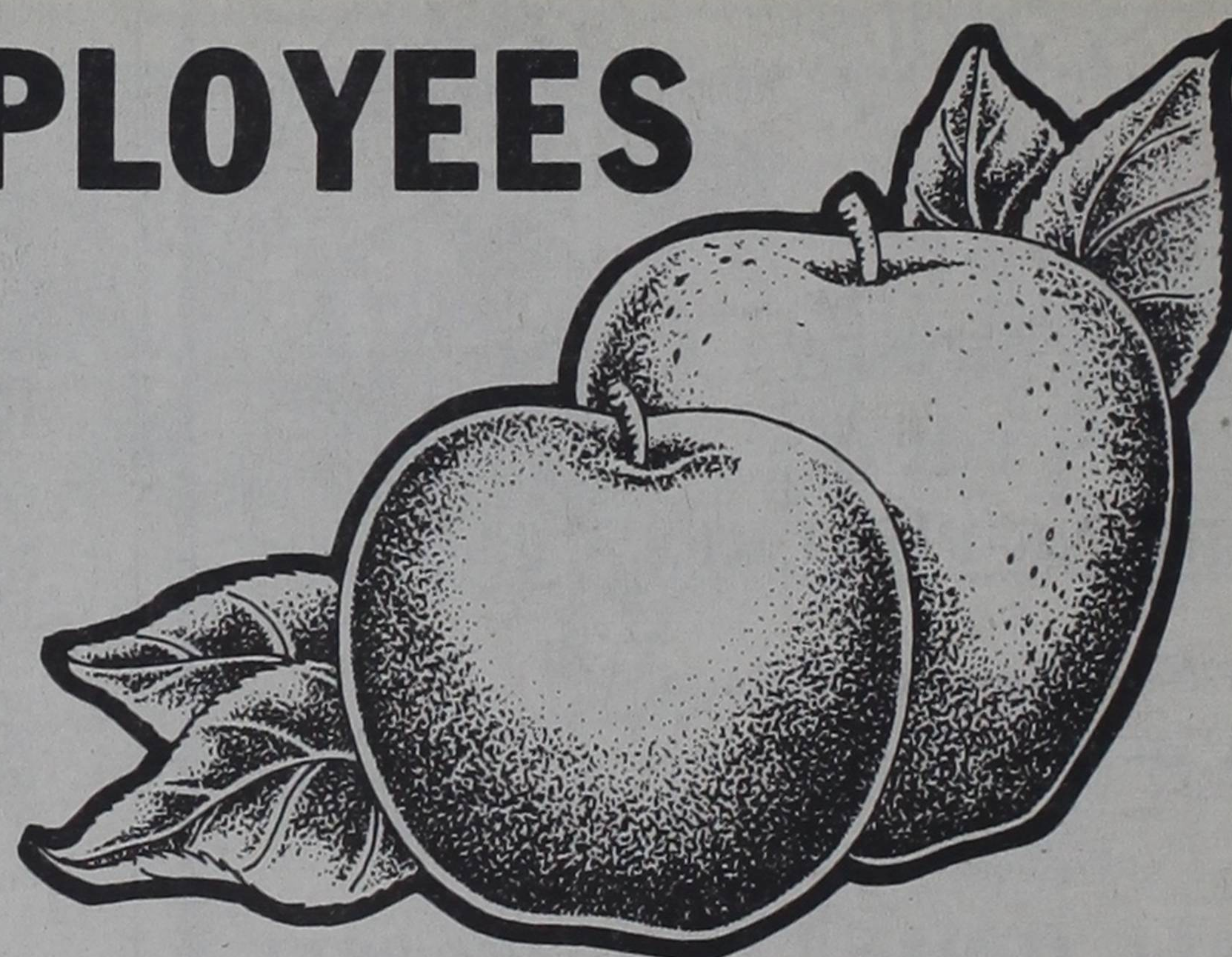
Registration is \$2.50 and the luncheon will cost \$5.50. Deadline for registration is March 17.

Chieftains Have Good Showing At Dalhart

The Friona Chieftain track and field team placed third overall at the XIT Relays at Dalhart last Friday and Saturday. The Chiefs scored 95 points, just a point behind Pampa, and trailing the host Wolves who won the team title.

Friona's effort was paced by wins by Cody Burney in the high jump, Stephen Thornton in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles, and a gritty win by the FHS 1600-meter relay team.

Burney won the high jump with a personal best jump of 6-6.

Thornton won the hurdles race for the second week in a row with a time of 40.5.

The mile relay team held off the host Dalhart team to post a win with a time of 3:28.0. Team members were Cody Bracken, Thornton, Toby Gibson and Daniel Echols.

Due to the recent spring break, as well as a late winter blast, many members of the squad were competing with only a couple of days' workout in track.

This was evident as Echols was edged in the open 400-meter race by Dalhart's Charlie Tiggs. Echols still posted an outstanding time of 50.54 in the event, in his first race of the season. "Daniel ran that race strictly on talent. His time will come down as he works out and the season progresses," said Chieftain coach Steve Williams.

Paul Trimmell won a silver medal in the shot put, heaving the ball 42 feet, eight inches.

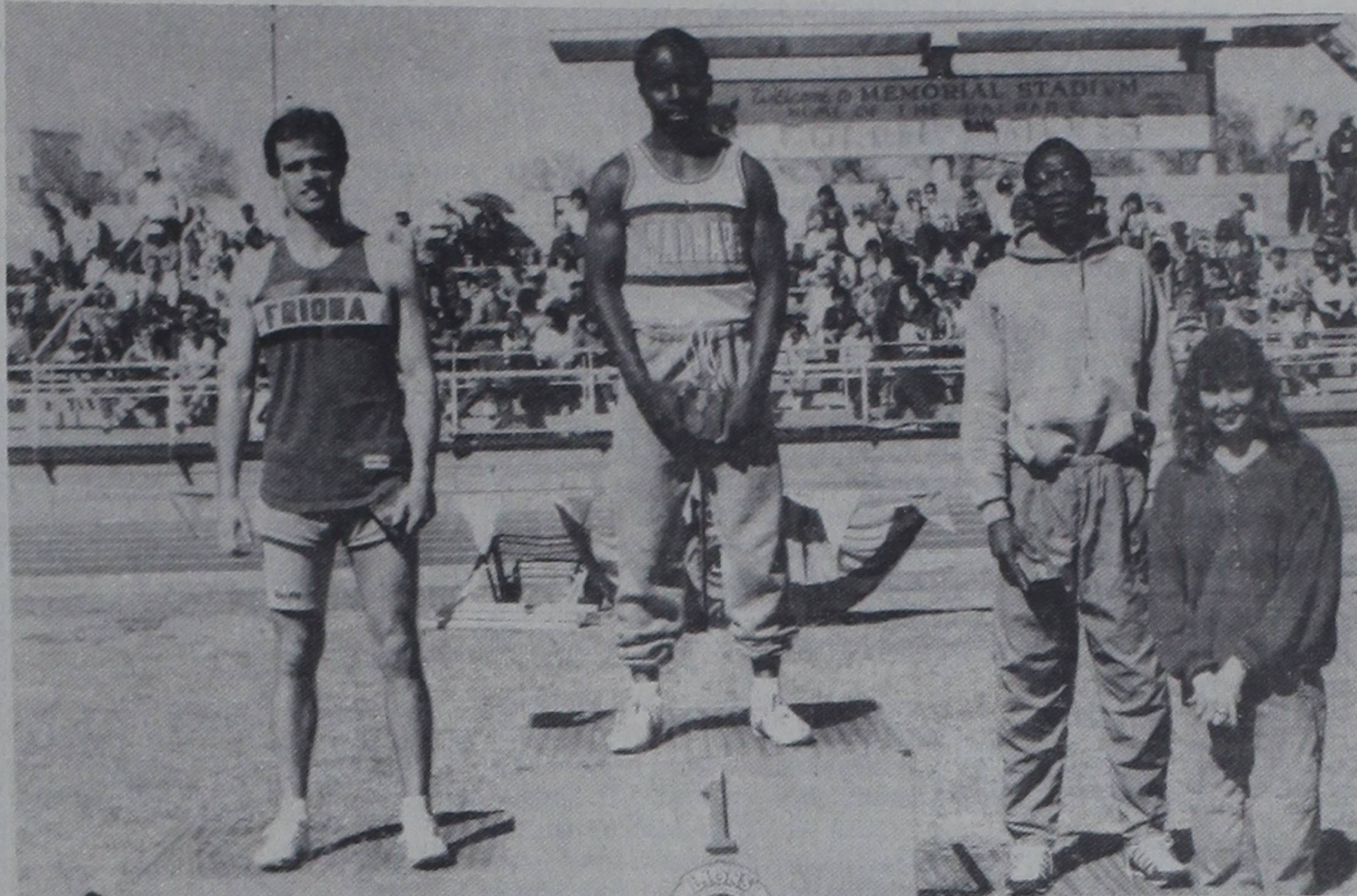
David Bugg placed third in the 110-meter high hurdles with a time of 15.5, and Thornton likewise had a bronze medal in the long jump with a 19-8 effort.

Thornton is competing with a broken wrist suffered just before the track season got underway.

Other point-winners for Friona included Rusty Rainey, fourth in the shot put at 41-10; Cody Bracken, fourth in the 200-meter dash at 24.2; Albert Trevino, fourth in the pole vault at 11-6 and the 400-meter relay team, fourth with a time of 45.01.

Members of the sprint relay are Glen Trimmell, Gibson, Thornton and Echols.

Otherwise, Bracken placed fifth in the 100-meter dash with a time

of 11.7; John Ed Duke was sixth in the 3200-meter run at 11:10; Echols was fifth in the high jump at 6-2, Jackie Lafuente placed sixth in the 800-meter run at 2:22 and Jerry Lafuente placed sixth in the 1600-meter run at 5:04.

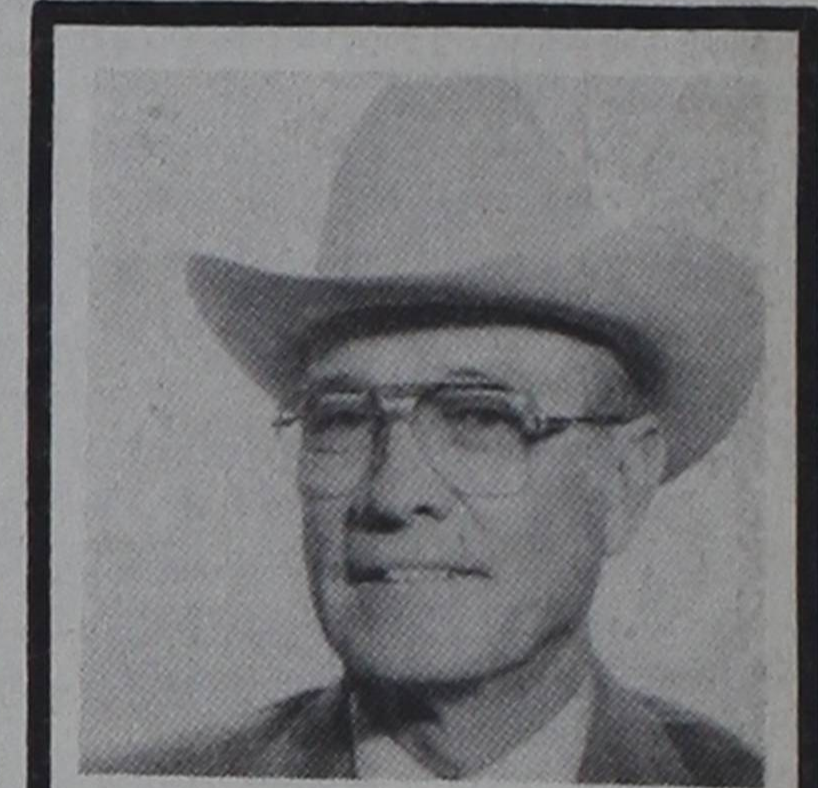

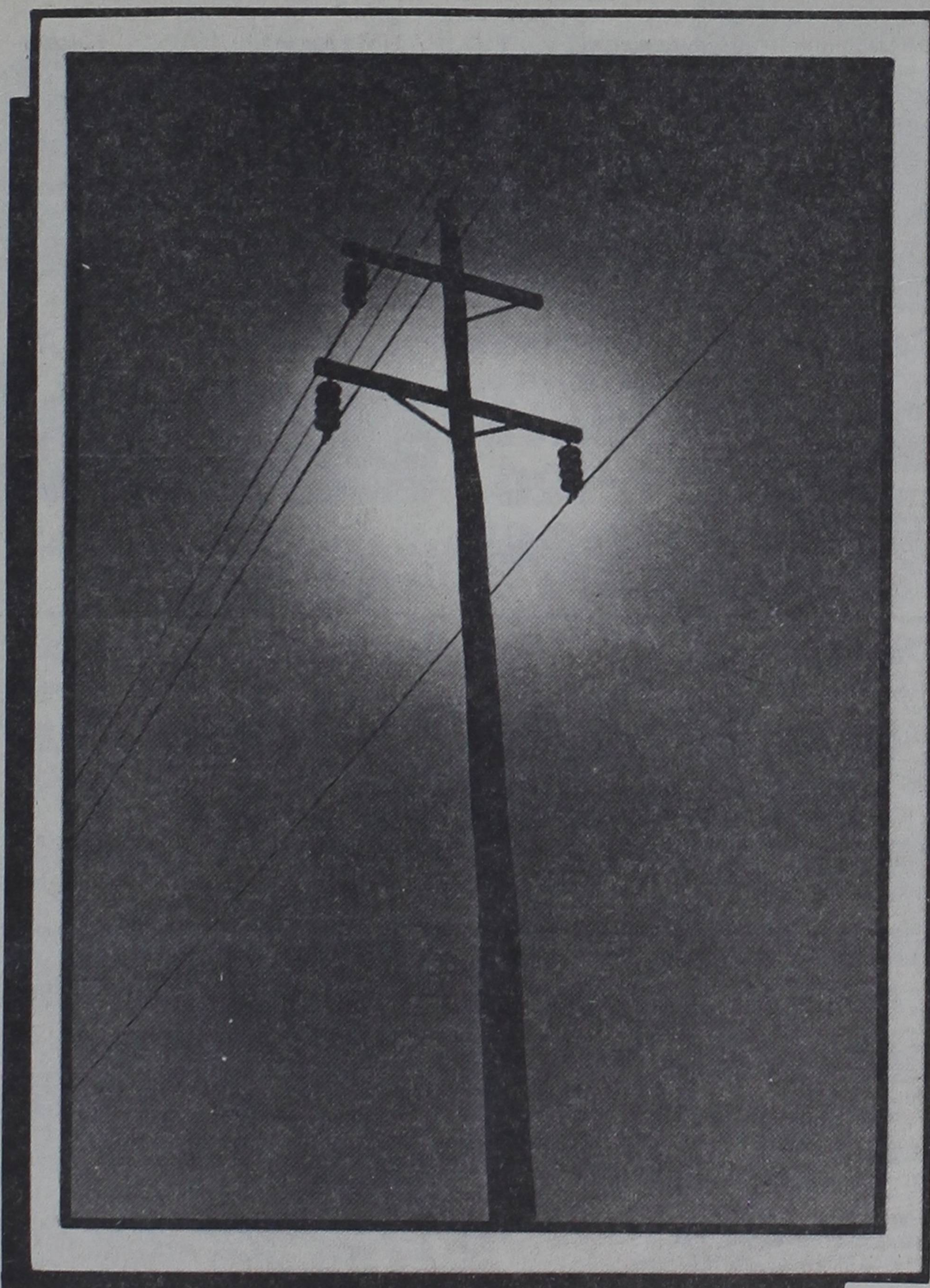
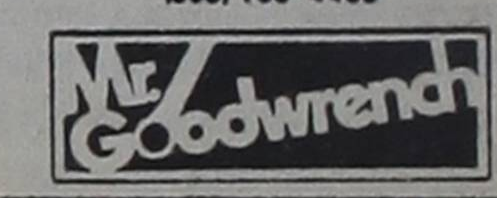

Other schools competing were Clovis High School, Heizer Junior High, Lovington High School, Portales High School and Robertson High School.

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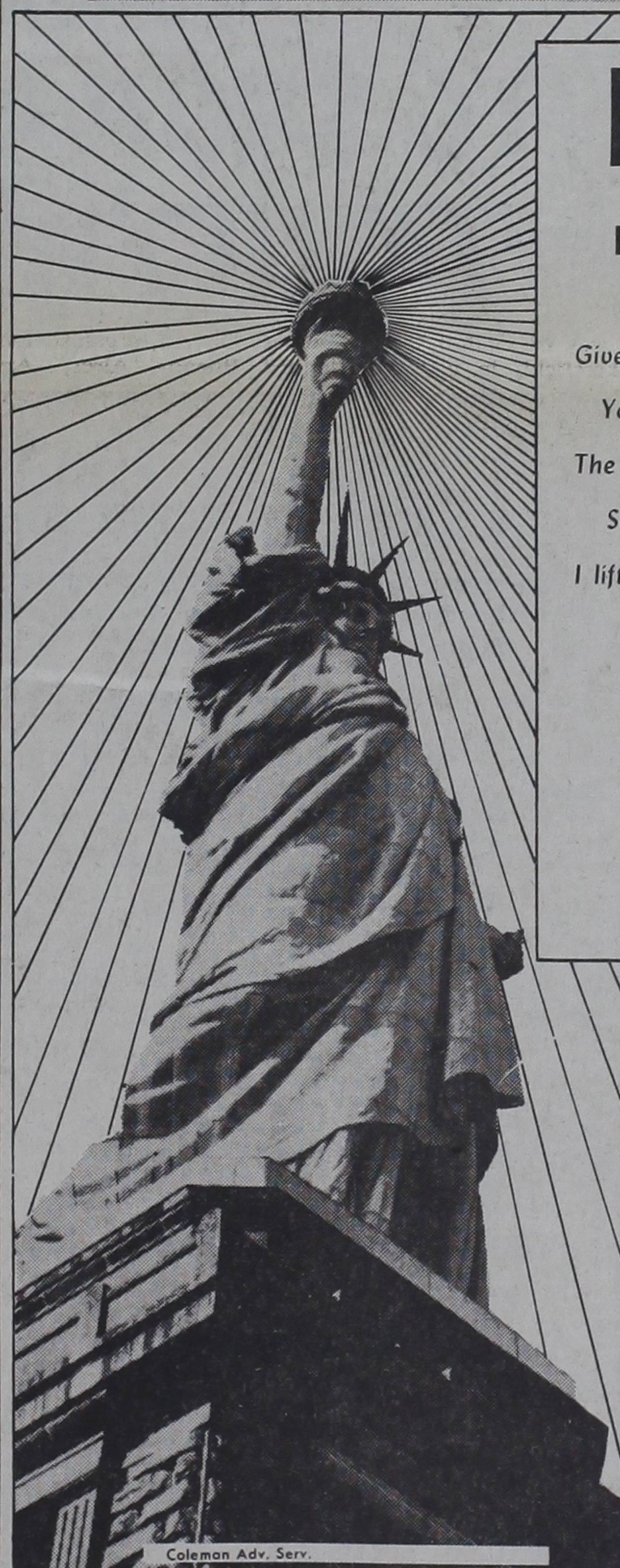

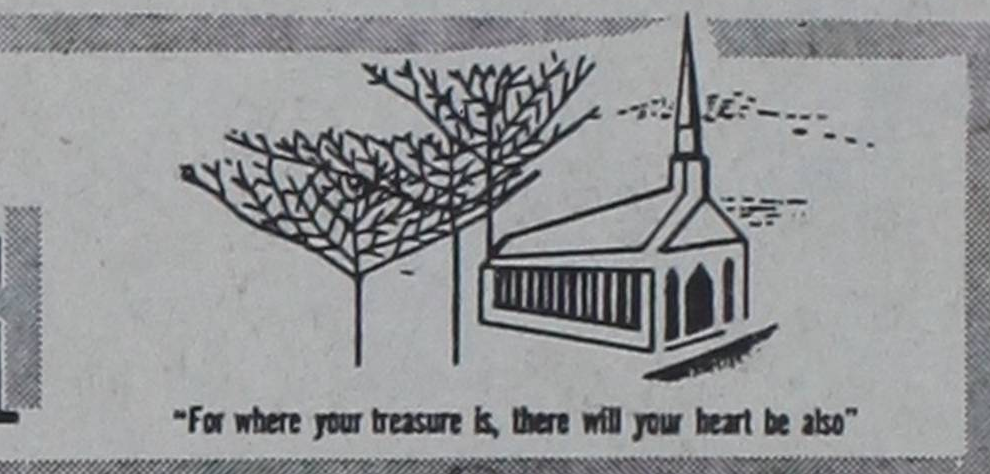

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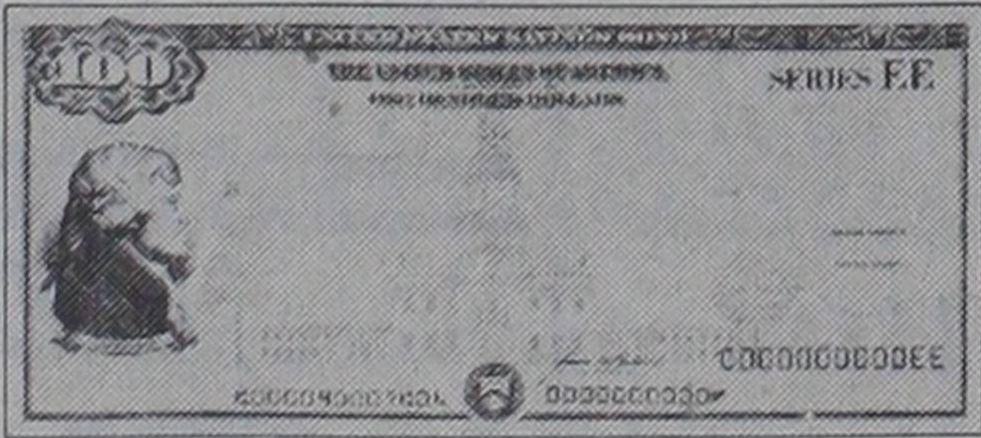
